COUNTY ROAD COMMISSION MET MONDAY

Lincoln County Road Commission Held a Regular Meeting Monday and Transacted Much Business

\$2500 PAID OUT OF ROAD AND BRIDGE FUND

The Lincoln County Road Commissioners held a regular meeting Monday in the court house. Dr. J. W. Law, Chairman, J. B. French, Secretary, Treasurer, and Harry B. Dawson, Clerk, were present.

Considerable business was transacted, and it is quite likely that the board will purchase some heavy road machinery, such as crusher, roller, etc., just as soon as the funds will permit. The Board has felt the need of this kind of machinery to be used in preparing the surface of roads in localities where it is not possible to obtain good gravel, for a long time. The road fund however, makes the purchase impossible at this time.

In regard to the complaint made to the board by Faustino Salcido and Pedro Pena that the public road from the H. J. Felice had been fenced by one Jose Gonzalez, the board ordered that said obstruction be removed that travel may be resumed over the old road.

After receiving the views reported on the opening of the road leading south out of Carrizozo along the railroad right of way to the Oscuro road, the board favors the change provided the right of way is granted without cost to the county. The board is willing to open the road and place the necessary culverts and bridges and put it in passable condition, it being understood that the bridges be built high enough to allow passage for cattle under them.

Secretary French was instructed to buy a road drag to be left in the vicinity of Oscuro to be used in caring for the grade on the road now being opened in the Three Rivers sand bed by the State Highway Commission.

The clerk was authorized to send letter of authority and receipt book to Faustino Salcido at Tinnie, in order that he may warn out men in his locality to work the roads and give them receipts for road tax work to be done on road south to Pallas.

Relative to the bills pro-rated at the last meeting, the same were ordered paid in full and warrants drawn and approved for payment. Bills aggregating \$2500.00 were paid out of the Road and Bridge fund.

Evidence evinced by the preliminary hearing warranted the placing of the accused under a bond of \$1000 each, in default of which the local jail is now providing entertainment to while away the hours until the next grand jury gets together.

Más de veinte hombres y mujeres de Denver, entre los cuales se encuentran trabajadores, costureras y tenedores de posadas, dieron notas de "acomodación" á John S. Cusack, ex cajero del Primer Banco Nacional de Wellington, que más tarde empeñaron á Cusack en transacciones por las cuales se encuentra ahora en un juicio ante la corte de los Estados Unidos en Denver acusado de malversaciones representando \$20,000 de los fondos de la institución.

Thomas F. McGuire, asesino de Harry R. Montgomery, á quien él mató el 5 de julio, y que fué mandado al hospital de condado de Denver el 18 de noviembre, en donde murió, según se suponía entonces, fué removido á la cárcel de condado en donde se encuentra ahora encarcelado en "banker's row," en la ala oeste de la prisión, en frente del corredor en donde se encuentra el Coronel James C. Bulger, también condenado por asesinato.

Un descubrimiento de oro tan puro que se puede enviar á la moneda sin estar sometido al tratamiento que acompaña siempre la explotación de los grados menores se hizo en la propiedad de la Dunking Leasing Company, en Breckenridge, y si estuviera del mismo grado toda la vena los propietarios sacarían de ella millones de pesos. El ex senador O. K. Gaymon es el principal propietario de la mina y recibió \$20,000 para su día de Navidad de tres pequeños cuerpos del mineral.

La acción legal de la junta de igualización de estado, que tiende á obligar á Clair J. Fletcher, asesor del condado de Denver, á elevar á \$55,000,000 la estimación de Denver, será combatida en la corte de distrito porque "la aumentación hecha por la comisión de tasaciones de Denver sobre la propiedad interesada lo fué arbitrariamente, caprichosamente é ilegalmente y fué considerada solo como un asunto de que se puede disponer con toda ligereza de propiedad," según la contestación presentada en el caso por la oficina del procurador de la ciudad.



The "lonely President in the

For instance, he has been one of the
most drastic critics of President Wil-

eral treasury and which places the
American farmer, the American manu-
facturer, and the American laborer at
the mercy of foreign competition, and
for a foreign policy which has destroy-
ed the respect that the American flag
and American citizens once command-
ed in every quarter of the globe.

A Preparedness Pioneer.
Likewise Mr. Estabrook was the first
man prominently before the public to
outline a concrete program of national
defense, which he presented in an ad-
dress before the American Bankers'
Association September 8th last at Seat-
tle, characterized by the Seattle Times
as "one of the most remarkable ad-
dresses ever delivered in the North-
West," and he was the first Republi-
can leader to point the way to the reunion
and harmonizing of all elements of the
party, his "Get-Together" plea before
the McKinley Club of Omaha, Nebras-
ka, last October, having attracted wide-
spread attention.

From the time Mr. Estabrook open-
ed the Republican National campaign
in Chicago in 1908 he has been recog-
nized as one of the ablest campaigners
in the United States, and there have
been few speakers in greater demand.

The issues in the great contest of
1916, which is to restore the Republi-
can party to the administration of na-
tional affairs, will be Protection, Pro-
perty, and Preparedness, in Mr. Estabrook's
judgment, with "Get-Together"
as the slogan for Republicans of every
shade of opinion. He has been preach-
ing this gospel in all sections of the
country, and has met with enthusiastic
receptions everywhere he has gone.
