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REPUBLICANS ARE MUCH STRONGER

No Time For a Boy to go to Mill Now. That is the Way the Democrats Feel According to Albuquerque Journal

INTERESTING POLL FOR THE CHOICE OF CANDIDATES

The election this year is more vital to the state of New Mexico than was the election of 1911. This year, New Mexico will be called upon to cast her vote for the state and county officers and for presidential electors.

The republican leaders are at work. The democrats are not working, so far as anybody knows. The personnel of the republican ticket is now generally known. No one has the slightest idea who will be named by the democrats for any position on their ticket. They are as sheep without a shepherd—leaderless and not specially concerned when they talk of the election next fall. It is with the optimism of people who have not analyzed a situation, but believe, somehow or other, they will win. When a possible nomination for any one of the leading places on the ticket is mentioned, it is usually some man who would stand no more chance of election in New Mexico than he would of flying to the moon and back on the same day. Usually he would be all right as a democratic nominee in Texas or Mississippi.

Nothing is being done to promote an insurrection in the republican party, such as made possible the partial success of the democrats in 1911. The movement led by former Governor Hagerman, former Governor Otero, former Attorney General Prichard, R. H. Hanna, W. H. Gillenwater, and the powerful Reynolds family, to say nothing of a host of republicans in other sections of the state, cost the republican candidate for governor thousands of votes and added thousands to the vote of the democratic candidate. It was a powerful influence on the entire ticket.

For example, W. O. McDonald had a plurality of 1488 in the counties of Bernalillo and Sandoval. The symptoms are that the plurality this year for the republican candidate for governor will be quite as much, thus making a difference of approximately 3,000 votes in those two counties alone. What are the democrats doing to prevent this slump or to offset it?

The ticket nominated by the republicans will not be easily beaten at the polls. Elections in New Mexico are not exactly the same as elections in Iowa or Kansas, and because candidates nominated here would not be strong in an eastern state is no reason why they would not be vote-getters here. In measuring candidates for office we do not use exactly the same standard that is supposed to be employed in Ohio, for example.

Without the slightest prejudice for or against them, in comparison with their competitors for the nomination, the Journal says in fact that nothing short of a

merical will prevent the nomination of Holm O. Bursum for governor and Frank A. Hubbell for United States senator. For Hernandez there will be no opposition in the convention. Let it be said here that a careful survey of the situation in New Mexico fails to find a stronger republican trio for the positions Bursum is far stronger than he was five years ago, and there is no indication of a revolt against him. Certainly some of the most powerful influences in independent republican movement against him then will be for him now.

Frank A. Hubbell will hold the bulk of the Anglo-American republican vote. He will get the republican native vote, and, unless the democrats put up the strongest man they can find, he will get quite a percentage of the native democratic vote. On that point there is no need for delusion. There is a race sentiment in this state that is growing in insensibility, and considerably more than half of the voters are Spanish Americans. If you will study the composition of the various counties of New Mexico, it will be seen that about one half of the normal democratic vote is Spanish American. As "La Revista de Taos" said of Hubbell, "we consider him one of us." That is the native view of it.

And the race feeling on the part of the natives is not without some sort of justification. With more than half of the voters in the state, they found when they came to size up the results of the first state election that every native who ran against an Anglo American of any politics was beaten. The result was that the Anglos had the governor, two United States senators, two members of congress, three members of the supreme court, three members of the corporation commission, the attorney general, the treasurer, the auditor of the superintendent of public instruction, eight circuit judges, seven district attorneys, and the natives had a lieutenant governor, the secretary of state and one district attorney.

Was it to be wondered at that when the opportunity came, in 1914, there was a decided race feeling displayed in the congressional election? The race feeling is still there, and the party that fails to recognize it can have the fun of running—what ever fun may be had out of a campaign doomed, in the very nature of things, to defeat.

Still, the democrats have a chance to put up a ticket and make an organization that would win over any ticket the republicans might put in the field. But if they are to win they must stop running in circles, stop fighting among themselves, and get down to business.

LINCOLN COUNTY TEACHERS MEET

Lincoln County Teachers' Association Held a Successful Convention at Capitan Last Friday and Saturday

MANY PROMINENT EDUCATORS IN ATTENDANCE

The teachers of Lincoln County have just closed the most successful convention in the history of their association, at Capitan, where the county High School is located. The entire two days, Friday and Saturday, March 10th and 11th, were taken up with the various activities, and the work was so well planned, organized and executed, that there was not an idle moment for any one concerned.

Early in the day teachers began to arrive from all parts of Lincoln County. The Carrizozo delegation, consisting of ten teachers, together with the majority of the important talent, arrived over the E. P. & S. W. about 10 a. m. They were immediately assigned to the various homes of Capitan for entertainment during their stay there. The remainder of the forenoon was occupied with the display of school work entered for prizes and the first regular session began at 1:30 p. m. with president Andrew McCurdy of Carrizozo in the chair.

The meeting was addressed by president E. L. Enloe of the Silver City Normal, Hon. Filadelfo Baca of the State Department of Education at Santa Fe, and Prof. Deano A. Worcester of the chair of psychology in the University of New Mexico, at Albuquerque. Every address was full of merit and was well-received. Similar addresses were delivered at every session and to enthusiastic audiences.

On Friday evening Prof. Rupert Stewart of the State A. & M. College delivered a stereopticon lecture on the work of the institution in general. Some excellent slides were shown, and an excellent idea of the work was given, having a tendency to interest high school graduates and others in what is being done at this great New Mexico' educational plant.

A general forenoon session was held Saturday, an afternoon session and an evening session. The main feature of the evening session were the declamatory contest and the debate, between the two high schools of the County, Capitan and Carrizozo. The declamatory contest was represented by Jenny Boone of Capitan and Lorena Haley of Carrizozo. Both declamations were full of merit, but Miss Boone met with the greater consideration from the judges.

The debate on question of a literacy test to restrict immigration was won by Seth Smith and Maud Bryan of Capitan, Louis Adams and Dan Mayes defending the negative side for Carrizozo in a most creditable manner. In other contests, Little Creek afforded the best speller, and Clarence Leggett of Carrizozo captured the Arithmetic medal with a perfect score, the next nearest con-

testant having finished with two columns of figures untouched and a much longer time. On spelling the same candidate represented Carrizozo with a grade of 94 per cent. Little Creek made 96 per cent.

Through the courtesy of local automobilists, practically the entire high school from Carrizozo was able to attend the Saturday evening meeting. The chorus from Carrizozo rendered two selections. The Capitan chorus also were programmed for a selection.

The people of Capitan deserved much credit for the manner in which they provided for the entertainment of the large number in attendance. The homes of the townspeople were thrown open for the occasion and the Capitan garage and private owners offered taxi service at all time and gave a free trip to Fort Stanton the last afternoon. It will be a convention long remembered. Elsewhere in this issue will be found the report of the resolutions committee and the acknowledgment of thanks to local automobile owners for their making it possible for so many pupils, to attend the Saturday evening session.

LINCOLN COUNTY LAND SALE

A public sale of Lincoln County lands involving several thousand acres, located in different parts of the county, was held here yesterday morning at the court house by the Land Commissioner Robt. Ervein, as had previous been advertised in the Outlook. None of the land was sold for less than \$3.00 per acre and with only a few exceptions did the bidding exceed the minimum price. A tract of nineteen acres located near the mal pias was sold for \$65.00 per acre, Ed. Harris being the successful bidder against M. B. Foreman. Another tract, located at Jake Springs, also exceeded the minimum price. This was bid in by Truman A. Spencer at \$10.00 per acre. W. J. Ayers, section foreman at Jake Springs, being the other contestant.

DESTRUCTIVE FIRE

The ranch house of Mr. and Mrs. Joe R. Adams located about one mile and a half south of here was destroyed by fire last Sunday evening about nine o'clock. The house was not occupied at the time of the fire, but the family was making preparations to move out in a few days. Most of their household effects which had just recently been taken to the place were also destroyed. Neither the building or contents were insured. The origin of the fire is unknown.

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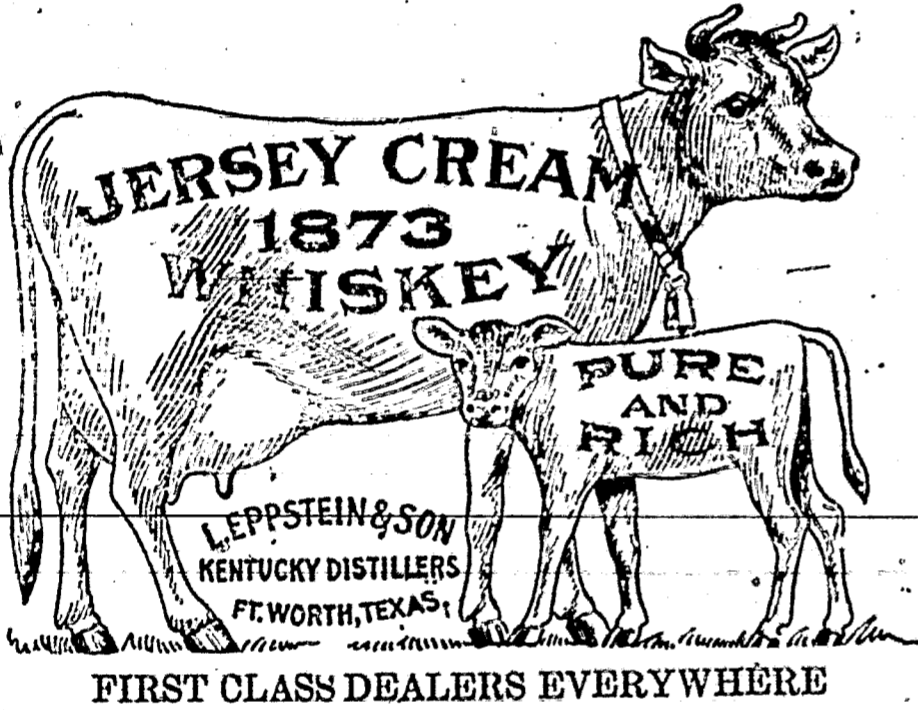

WIN G. O. P. RACE**

REPUBLICAN LEADERS LOOK FOR
PRACTICAL BUSINESS MAN
TO HEAD TICKET.

**COLEMAN DU PONT NAMED
AS LIKELY CANDIDATE**

Delaware Man Has Splendid Reputation as a Self-Made Leader in Constructive Business.

EITHER IS SAFE

The Sun, like every other paper
of the state, we suppose, has received
the announcement of Hon. T. B.
Catron as a candidate for the United
State senate to succeed himself.
The Hon. Frank Hubbell, the astute
politician of Bernalillo county, has
also notified the public that his hat
is also in the ring for senatorial
honors. Personally, we believe that
the interests of our young state are
perfectly safe in the hands of either
one of these competent gentlemen.
Mr. Catron has resided in the state
so long, ever since the close of the
Civil war, in fact, that we consider
him as almost a native of New Mex-
ico, while Mr. Hubbell is in fact a
native son. There will probably be
others, however, in this contest be-
fore the closing of the entries, and
while we do not believe that there
will be another one more genuinely
fitted and qualified for this impor-
tant office than the two gentlemen
named above, in justice to the late
comers we reserve judgment until
the entries are all in.

We expect to have something to
say in regard to the county ticket
in a short time and have our
opinions that we intend to express
and fight for. If it means a fight
to be made on a part of the repub-
lican ticket, we welcome the fight
because we believe that the proper
place to purify party politics is in
the party and not by bolting a con-
vention and joining some other
party, but if the party is once firmly
convinced that party adherents
and party voters will support only
that part of the ticket which is
clean, then we will have a ticket
that can be conscientiously voted
by the rank and file of the party,
but until we do convince them of
that fact we will have a ticket put
out by a few of the leaders and
with an object of pacifying certain
prominent families.—Moquero Sun.

BRITAIN ABANDONING FREE TRADE

The doom of the British free
trade policy and the establishment
of Great Britain's commerce on a
protective basis are foreshadowed
by proposals set forth in the "White
Paper" of the advisory committee
of the British Board of Trade, re-
cently made public. For years free
traders of this country have pointed
to Great Britain as a practical ex-
ample of a country operating suc-
cessfully under free trade, ignoring
the fact that the per capita cus-
toms receipts from such articles as
spirits, sugar, tobacco, tea and
coffee, alone, were nearly 30 per
cent greater than the customs re-
ceipts from the entire import list
of the United States.

Protective rates of duty were
submitted to the committee on such
industries as paper manufacture,
painted matter, cutlery, fancy leath-
er goods, all forms of manufactur-
ed glass, china and earthenware,
toys, brushes and brushware. Im-
portations from Germany and Aus-
tria of table and lighting glassware
and mechanical toys, are to be pro-
hibited for specified periods of time.
The proposals not only contain
plans for a commercial warfare
against the Central Powers, but the
duty rates submitted for imposition
after the war are declared to be
"nothing more than approximate
indications of the amount of pro-
tection which the British firms
thought necessary in each case."
Undoubtedly the list will be extend-
ed as study of the subject progres-
ses, and free trade in England will
soon be a thing of the past.

Some days ago an announcement
was received in this country of the
unanimous adoption of a resolution
presented to the Vienna Chamber
of Commerce looking to a trade
combination between Austria and
Germany for the protection of their
commercial interests, and an align-
ment against the Allied Powers.
These extensive preparations for
warfare on enemy commerce have
such deep significance to the people
of the United States that only a
return to the Republican policy of
protection will give them a feeling
of security. If there is to be a war-
fare of tariffs and trade combinations
in Europe, a shifting of the currents
of trade must inevitably follow,
and that country which has the low-
est tariff wall will be the country
which is submerged with those
goods which are denied European
ports of entry. The Underwood
law is permitting 74 per cent of our
imports to come in free of duty to-
day. The present average rate of
duty on all imports coming to our
shores is less than ten per cent.

Republicans are unanimously for
a protective tariff. Democratic
leaders, like Senators Simmons and
Underwood, Speaker Clark and
Chairman Kitchin, still cling to the
present law and believe it is ade-
quate. Other Democrats are seek-
ing to delay tariff revision by organ-
izing a tariff commission to make
an investigation which would re-
quire at least five years to complete.
Five years ago, when we had a tar-
iff board, the Democrats killed it
by refusing to appropriate for its
maintenance. President Wilson is
for "everything by turn and noth-
ing long", provided it will catch
votes.

Considering the temper of the
country, the lack of cohesion in the
Democratic ranks, and the proved
efficiency of the Republican pro-
tective policy, it is not difficult to
decide which party is best suited to
handle the situation, and which
one will be entrusted with that job
after March 4, 1917.

We urge upon all citizens of New Mexico, and upon teachers in particular, the desirability, from both a private and public point of view, of supporting, by attending or sending children to attend, our own Agricultural College, State University, State Normal School; and others of our State institutions.

We earnestly recommend the wide-spread formation of Boys' and Girls' Industrial Clubs, for the promotion in our state of agricultural capability, and a spirit of self-reliance and self-respect in our school children.

We also desire at this time to express our general approval of the text books adopted last year, which, on the whole, we consider superior to the groups they supersede.

We also irrevocably and unalterably endorse the movement to establish pensions for teachers, and urge that such measure be enacted in law at the earliest possible moment, by special session of the legislature, if necessary, with the usual emergency clause attached.

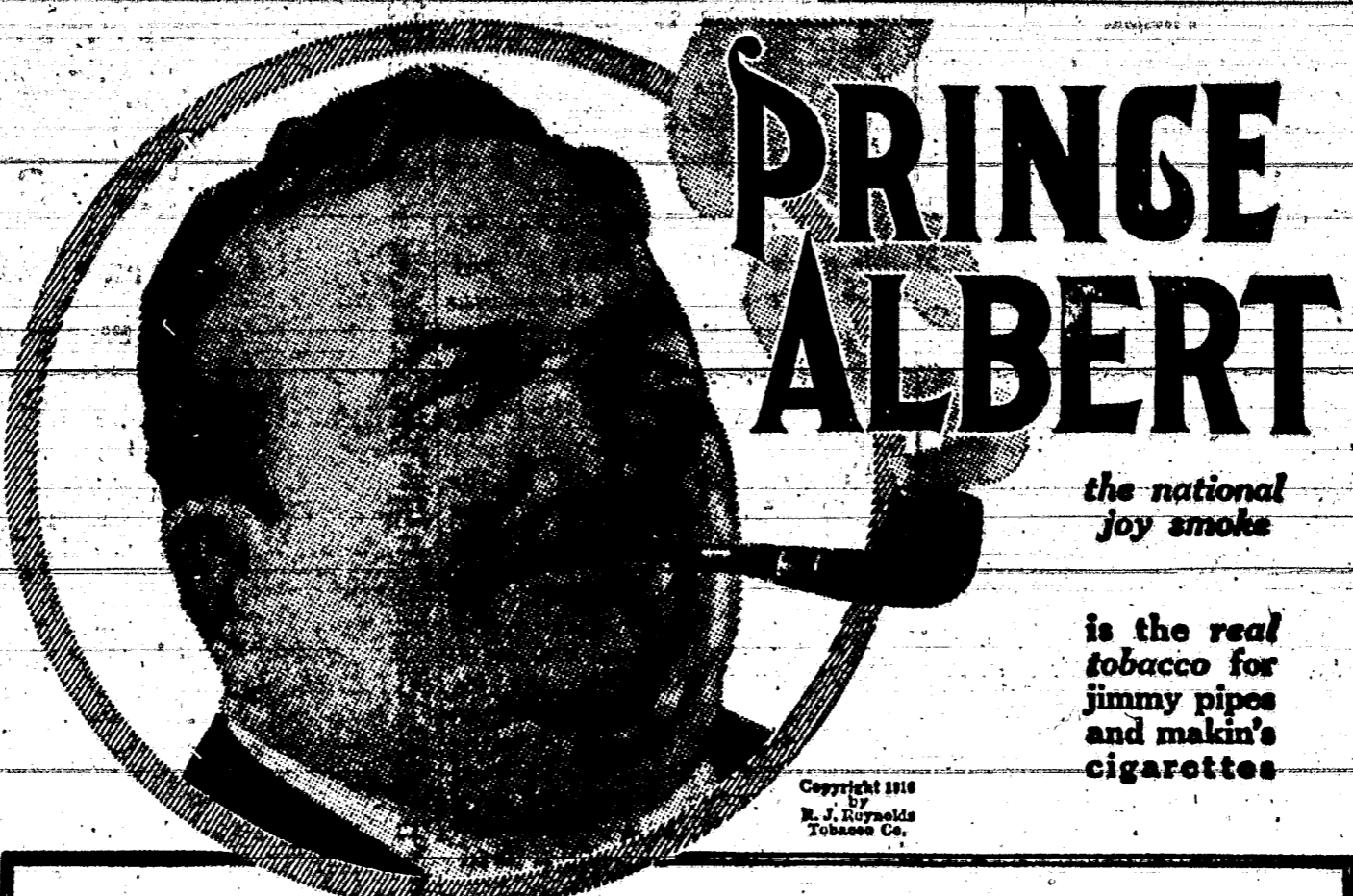

BIBLE STUDY ON

HOPE FOR THE SODOMITES.

Genesis 19:12-17, 23-29—March 9.

"Come ye out from among them, and be ye separate, saith the Lord, and touch no unclean thing."—2 Corinthians 6:17.

WHEN Abraham was ninety nine years old—in 2021 B. C.—his encampment was at Hebron. There the Lord and two angels appeared to him as men. He knew them not, but entered into conversation with them. (Hebrews 13:2.) The one called the Lord was doubtless the Logos, subsequently man's Redeemer. The Lord on this occasion told Abraham that Ishmael would not be the heir of the Promise, but that shortly Sarah would have a son. The next year Isaac was born.

As Abraham walked a little distance with his visitors, he learned who they really were. And that the destruction of Sodom was imminent. Nobly and generously he petitioned God's Mercy on the Sodomites. The Lord gave assurance that if there were even ten righteous in Sodom, it would be spared.

Thus of the Sodomites and the "Sarah shall have a son."

made illustrations of the great lesson. "All the wicked will He destroy." We are to remember that these are not illustrations of eternal torment, but of destruction. These merely passed into destruction a few years sooner than ordinarily; for the death sentence passed upon humanity in Adam. But since "Jesus Christ by the grace of God tasted death for every man," all of Adam's children will eventually come from the tomb.

"And Delivered Righteous Lot."

St. Peter informs us that Lot was not in sympathy with his surroundings. (2 Peter 2:7, 8.) The flight of Lot, with his wife and two unmarried daughters, is simply told in our lesson. The intimation of verse 29 is that God's Mercy toward Lot was because of his relationship to Abraham. This view is consistent with all Scriptural statements on the subject.

Adam's entire race was condemned to death in him. Hence Divine Justice owed them nothing. Divine Mercy had entered into a special Covenant with Abraham, but that Covenant extended to none others, except Abraham's seed. Therefore Lot's relationship to Abraham was the only reason why God should favor him.

"There's a Witness in God's Mercy."

This does not signify that God is merciless, but that, having provided a way by which He will exercise Mercy, He rarely exercises it outside of that channel. The channel of God's Mercy is Christ Jesus, who declared, "No man cometh unto the Father but by Me." St. Peter substantiates this statement. See Acts 4:12. The Scriptures clearly teach that none were saved until Jesus died. This is the key which unlocks the wonders of God's grace even though to some the statement may seem astounding.

We should rid ourselves of the thought that the holy men of the past went to Heaven, and the remainder of mankind to eternal torture. The Bible most distinctly declares that all

both good and bad, "slept with their fathers." They still sleep, awaiting the time when Abraham's Seed (Galatians 3:16, 29) will be completed, and set up God's Kingdom on earth, overthrow sin and death, and deliver the captives from the tomb.

The First, or Chief Resurrection.

The First Resurrection began with our Lord Jesus and is not yet complete; for all the Elect are to share both His sacrificial death and His Resurrection. These will reign with Christ a thousand years, and as the Seed of Abraham, fully empowered, will bless all those redeemed by the precious blood of Calvary.—Revelation 20:4.

St. Paul emphasizes this point in Hebrews 11:38-40, declaring that while the Ancient Worthies received indications of God's favors, nevertheless that favor can come only through Christ. Consequently they cannot reach everlasting life until the Spiritual Seed of Abraham shall have been completed. Jesus also attested that they had not gone to Heaven, saying, "No man hath ascended up to Heaven."—John 3:13.

El jueves los Alemanes recomenzaron su gran ofensiva en la región de Verdun en donde la pelea se ha desarrollado por más de dos semanas después de dos días de calma entre la artillería.

La vigésima celebración anual de días de frontera de Cheyenne tendrá lugar los 20-29 de julio.

El obispo Francis J. McConnell de Denver es elegido de presidente de la Asociación de educación religiosa en la convención anual en Chicago.

Washington.

Extranjero.

La contestación anglo-francesa a la protesta de los Estados Unidos relativamente a la interceptación del correo en tránsito entre América y Europa será entregada inmediatamente, según se anuncia en Londres.

Un despacho de El Paso dice: El poder de Carranza en México está en decadencia, pues Félix Díaz, con una fuerza constantemente aumentando, se está avanzando por el estado de Vera Cruz. Las fuerzas de Carranza en oposición al estandarte de Díaz fueron obligadas a retirarse con pérdidas enormes. Muchas de las tropas salvadas en contra del nuevo jefe al central se juntaron con él. Entretanto Carranza, por ejecuciones al por mayor, está procurando atterrorizar al populacho a fin de guardarlo en favor de su gobierno. Reclutamientos, después de la captura de El Ora, las tropas de Carranza mataron y asesinaron a 200 soldados de Zapata.

CANADA'S PLANS FOR WAR REVENUE

So Wisely Distributed That Taxation Will Affect Farmers to a Degree Practically Unnoticeable.

So many rumors have been circulated regarding war taxation in Canada that the statement made by Sir Thomas White, Canadian Minister of Finance, of the Government's plans for raising war revenue should be given the widest circulation. Sir Thomas made it clear that the revenue will be raised by taxing the profits of incorporated companies whenever those profits exceed seven per cent, and the profits of unincorporated firms or partnerships when the profits exceed ten per cent. On all such excess profits these companies or firms will have to contribute one-quarter to the Government. Transportation companies, banks, mining, milling, and other companies will be subject to this taxation, but life insurance companies, and companies with less than fifty thousand dollars capitalization, and companies, firms, or individuals engaged in agriculture or stock raising, are exempt, and pay no part of this taxation. The only other additional taxation proposed is an increase of fifty cents a barrel in the customs duty on apples, and one-half cent a gallon in customs duty on certain kinds of oils.

It will be noticed that this taxation is being applied in such a way that it does not affect farmers in the slightest degree, except, perhaps, through a small increase in cost of apples and oil. The war revenue is to be paid out of the profits of the big firms and companies with capital of over fifty thousand dollars, and even these are allowed seven per cent in some cases, and ten per cent in others, or clear profits before they have to pay any part of this taxation. It will be seen that the whole policy is to place the war expenditure taxation on those who have been making big profits and are able to pay it, and to encourage farming and stockraising by exempting farmers and stockraisers from the taxation. This ought to set at rest every rumor that the farmer or the farmer's land is being taxed to pay the cost of the war.—Advertisement.

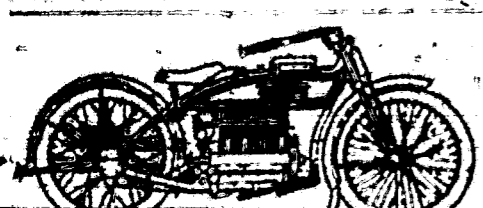
