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COLONEL ROOSEVELT FOR PRESIDENT

New York Tribune Says it is Advocating Roosevelt for the Presidency Because the Country Needs Him

NO ONE ELSE WILL QUICKEN THE PULSE OF THE NATION

Colonel Roosevelt and no "pussy-footing!" The Tribune likes this candidate and this issue.

It regards Senator Root; its favorite so long as he had a chance of nomination, is now practically eliminated. It cannot interpret any more hopefully the failure of the "oxygen treatment" which his candidacy received, in the shape of the manifesto with seventy-five signers. The party thinks that Mr. Root would not be so likely to win as either Colonel Roosevelt or Justice Hughes, and it wants him as Secretary of State in the next Republican administration, since it cannot have him as President.

We are for Colonel Roosevelt because we believe the country needs no one else will quicken the pulse of the nation as he will quicken it. No one else will stir the conscience of the people as he will stir it. No one else will inspire patriotism as he will inspire it.

No one else personifies the issue which the Republican party must make as he personifies it. No one else presents so effective an antithesis to Wilson as he. If we are Americans, real Americans, the Colonel is our man. While timid politicians were consulting the census books and counting the German vote he spoke and the country hearkened. He is the leader in the fight for Americanism, and we don't believe in changing leaders when we are going to the front.

We are for Colonel Roosevelt in spite of the fact that we were against him four years ago. No one fought him harder than we. No one will fight harder for him. It has not been easy to put aside our pride, our sense of resentment at what occurred in 1912, and the hundred other things that tend to keep alive divisions. But we have put them aside and are putting them aside because we feel that they have no place in a crisis like this. We come out for Colonel Roosevelt as a Republican newspaper, intending to remain Republican, and we feel that in doing so we are doing the best thing not only for the nation but for the Republican party.

We might have preferred another leader, but there is no other leader. Justice Hughes might have spoken if he had been free to speak. Indeed, we feel sure he would have spoken, and for Americanism, had silences not been imposed upon him, and then we should have preferred him. But the plain fact is that he did not speak, that he could not speak.

If the Justice should be chosen leader in the fight for a worthier nationalism, he would have to take the torch that Colonel Roosevelt has thus far borne. He would have to accept an issue that meant

its most only in another man's hands. Surely in the transfer we should lose our side. As a people we should feel that we had hung back, that we hadn't gone the limit in the true American way. The governments of Europe would feel this, too. They would conclude that we meant to temporize. Something would be lost of the moral effect of moving straight on under the leadership of the man who represents the purpose of this country as no one else does or can.

The Colonel stands for the things The Tribune stands for. These things will be advanced more by his nomination than by any other nomination that can be made. The Tribune must support him.

We are doing more this year than choosing a new President. We are choosing which way the country shall go in the era that is now opening, just as our fathers chose the nation's path in the days of 1800.—New York Tribune.

PAPER PRICES STILL CLIMBING

The Outlook this week received from the wholesale paper houses another notice—about the fourth of a similar nature to come to hand during the last month—which reads something like this:

"Another advance in the price of all kinds of paper."

The wholesale price of all sorts blank paper is going skyward. News print paper has advanced over 50 per cent., and the most ordinary bond paper commonly used for typewriter letter paper, has advanced over 75 per cent., and the price is still soaring. Just what the outcome will be no one can foretell, but there is one thing certain, if the prices go much higher, all kinds of paper will be held at a premium in a few more weeks and the use of same for all purposes will be curtailed to the minimum.

HELD ON GRAVE CHARGE

A most serious charge was before Justice Massie yesterday afternoon in which W. H. Cavanaugh of Tecolote was plaintiff and one Florentino Flores the defendant. It was charged that on Wednesday night Flores in company with three other Mexicans entered the dwelling of Cavanaugh who is advanced in years, and as the victim lived alone the old man found himself completely at the mercy of his ruthless assailants. Besides being mercilessly beaten and threatened with death at the points of three rifles, Cavanaugh was robbed of some \$400 cash—in fact the house was completely rifled, even the supply of provisions being taken by the villainous quartette of scoundrels.

Local officers hastened to the scene with all possible speed and arrested four Mexicans as suspects.

Mr. Cavanaugh was able to definitely identify only one of them as his assailant, so Flores who was unquestionably one of the band was retained in default of \$2000 bond to await in a local cell the action of the next district court. The other three hombres could not be positively connected with the affair and although they were duly set at liberty, they continue under the officers' surveillance while the search for the absolute establishing of the guilt is being prosecuted.

All the community is filled with repugance at the extreme cowardice and atrocity of this outrage and the best wishes of all good men attend the officers as they strive to run the other three to earth. Needless to say the task is a difficult one owing to the solitary life which Mr. Cavanaugh led as foreman of a gang of laborers at this E. P. & S. W. way station.

WILLOW SPRINGS MINE TO BE MODERNIZED

The New Owner Has Big Plans and Ample Resources to Put Them Through to the Smallest Detail

NEW AND MODERN MACHINERY WILL BE INSTALLED

The syndicate which has taken over the Willow Springs Coal properties has big plans and ample resources to put them through to the smallest detail. Realizing the possibilities of this great deposit of mineral coal Geo. C. Benedict, the new managing owner, and his associates will completely modernize every feature of the mechanical operation. The passages into the mine will be enlarged, larger cars put in operation, a new hoist and machinery for its manipulation. One feature which the former owner had had to combat was the lack of houses to take care of the employees. Accordingly the erection of five dwelling houses will be begun immediately, and more will doubtless be provided as the increased production of the mine calls for additional operations.

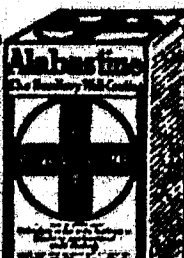

Acercas de la Guerra.

Un submarino alemán fué hundido por los buques franceses e ingleses y el equipaje capturado.

El gabinete español se reúne para discutir el hundimiento de buques españoles por los submarinos alemanes.

El reporte oficial del attaché americano corrobora las noticias del hundimiento del Sussex por un submarino alemán.

Los Ingleses capturaron la ciudad de Félahie en Mesopotamia, de los Turcos, en su progreso hacia el socorro de la fuerza inglesa sitiada en Kut-el-Amara.

Francia publica una declaración al efecto de anunciar al mundo que durante el mes de marzo los aliados demoleron treinta y cinco aeroplanos alemanes.

Los Alemanes capturan la aldea de Haucourt, al noroeste de Verdun. Los Franceses toman gran parte del Bois Carré y también repulan los teutones en peleas subterráneas violentas.

Sport.

Ralph Glaze, ex "pitcher" grande de liga y "coach," adiestrador el año p. pasado en la Universidad de la California meridional, fué formalmente nombrado adiestrador de pelota en la Universidad de Drake en Des Moines, Iowa.

Las acciones civiles en corte de Juan F. Coffey, capitán de pelota, y su esposa, en contra de J. C. McGill, propietario de pelota y director, en que el capitán y su esposa se esfuerzan en obtener \$20,000 por un ataque contra la Señora Coffey, tendrán lugar en la corte de distrito en Denver detrás de puertas cerradas.

General.

Las donaciones totales de la institución de Rockefeller durante 1915 se elevaron a la suma de \$7,527,932. Además de esta cantidad se dieron promesas de gastar \$1,086,023 durante 1916 en favor de organizaciones que no están afiliadas con la institución.

El consul García, oficial en jefe de Carranza al largo de la frontera, se declaró en favor de la opinión que aconseja la retirada de Méjico de las tropas americanas. Y no cabe duda ninguna en El Paso que la opinión de García refleja fielmente el deseo no expresado de Carranza. García dijo que la continuación de los movimientos de las tropas americanas adentro del país podría causar un desacuerdo general.

Occidente.

Cincuenta personas, incluyendo mujeres y niños fueron matados por los bandidos entre Torreon y Zacatecas el 28 de marzo, cuando los criminales dominieron el tren en que viajaban, según noticias traídas a El Paso, Tex., por pasajeros.

El Gran Ejército de la República marcó el punto de medio siglo de su existencia, y una nación dió prueba de su amor y respeto para con los hombres que entre 1861 y 1865 se atrevieron en exponerse a la muerte en el campo de batalla a fin de que pudiese mantenerse la unión de los estados.

Docientas y cincuenta mujeres-iran a un campamento militar en el Presidio de los Estados Unidos en San Francisco el 1º de junio, por seis semanas bajo disciplina estrictamente militar, con el objeto de aprender la manera según la cual se conduce la guerra, dice un anuncio procedente de la Señora Frederick H Colburn de la sección de mujeres de la Liga de la Marina.

Washington.

Una Resolución de común acuerdo ordenando a la oficina de censo de recoger y publicar estadísticas de algodón crudo y preparado y sus productos consumidos en la fabricación de explosivos fué adoptada por la cámara, 169 contra 123.

Unas leyes prohibiendo el comercio inter-estado en artículos fabricados en las prisiones fueron presentadas con urgencia delante del comité de labor del senado por representantes de fabricantes que se declararon incapaces de luchar industrialmente con los fabricantes de las prisiones.

Una denegación categórica por el secretario Lansing fué la contestación oficial a persistentes reportes diciendo que se podría que las tropas americanas fuesen retiradas de Méjico dentro de poco, sin tener cuenta de lo que pueda ocurrir, bueno o malo, en la zona emprendida contra Villa. El Señor Lansing y el secretario Baker ambos indicaron que no había presente intención de cambiar las órdenes originales dadas al Gen. Funston.

The necessity for increasing the agricultural production is commanding even more attention in 1916, and it is now announced that soldiers in Canada may obtain leave of absence from their military duties in the spring for a certain length of time to enable them to plant the seed for the crops in every Province of the Dominion.

The fact that the Government recognizes the seeding and harvesting of Canada's crops as being of the first importance is perhaps the best evidence that conscription or any increase of taxes which would reduce the agricultural activity of Canada will never be considered by the authorities.

Owing to the number who have enlisted for overseas service it has been found necessary to secure farm labor in the United States. It is hoped that fifty thousand can be secured.—Advertisement.

Colorado.

El viejo hotel de Spaulding en Colorado Springs se vendió en \$50,000.

Ben B. Lindsey de la corte juvenil recibió una carta amenazándole de muerte.

La convención anual de distrito de los Caballeros de Pitias se celebrará en Montrose los miércoles y jueves, 7 y 8 de junio.

El gobernador Carlson nombró a F. J. Radford de Trinidad miembro de la junta consultiva de la comisión de estado de caminos de gran comunicación.

Las minas en el distrito de Cripple Creek produjeron 86,672 toneladas durante e mes de marzo cuyo valor representa \$14.17 la tonelada, y el total de \$1,227,810.

Dos prisioneros ensayaron de escapar las rejas de su calabozo en la cárcel de Denver con el fin evidente de realizar un plan de liberación previamente hecho.

Los trabajos han empezado en la pescadería de Durango, y cuando estén acabados esta será una de las más bellas del país. Se van a agregar muchos elementos de perfección.

W. B. Slaughter, ex-presidente del quebrantado banco Nacional Mercantil de Pueblo, llegó de su casa en Dallas, Texas, para comparecer ante la corte federal de distrito bajo acusación de operaciones fraudulentas en conexión con la bancarrota de la institución que dirigió hace un año.

Lesson to Be Learned.
According to the United States census, the population in California cities of over one hundred thousand people has increased, in the decade from 1900 to 1910, from 29 to 37.2 per cent. The population in districts outside of cities of ten thousand and over has decreased from 56.9 per cent, in 1900, to 46.7 per cent, in 1910. Most of this decrease of the percentage of population of agricultural districts has gone to the big cities of over one hundred thousand.

This clearly shows the prevailing tendency. It also shows the grave necessity for building cities that are fit places for the permanent housing of the larger part of the population.

For Deaf and Dumb in India.
Fourteen years ago a school was opened in Palamcottah, South India, for deaf and dumb children, the only missionary effort among the 200,000 deaf of India. About 300 children of every race and creed, from all parts of India, and sent by every missionary society, have passed through the school, and over a hundred are studying there now. The Hindus are beginning to realize the good of educating the deaf, and last year asked government help to enable them to open a school in Madras. Last January a small school was opened in Madras; already it is full with 15 children.—Missionary Review.

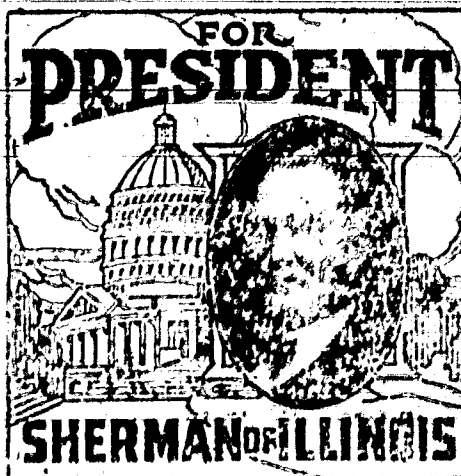

OUT WEST AND IN WASHINGTON

When Mr. Wilson was swinging round the circle, about two months ago, he said—at Pittsburg, Jan. 29, "I am not jealous of debate. If what I propose cannot stand debate then something ought to be substituted for it which can." And again—at Chicago, Jan. 31—he said: "You must not get impatient because there are long processes of debate at Washington. Wait for the end of debate."

From Washington there now comes news which indicates that the President has changed his mind. He is reported to be sending daily for members of congress to urge them to speed up the action of their bodies in all legislation. He demanded that the Gore and McLeMore resolutions be laid on the table—which meant that they could not be debated in any manner. He has approved the action of the Democratic leaders in the House and of the House Democratic caucus to devise rules to gag discussion and to put the administration's measures through with practically no discussion and with no opportunity for effective amendment. In short, he has come to believe that what he proposes cannot stand debate—but he does not seek to have something substituted for it which will. He is no longer patient of debate and is unwilling to wait for a natural end to it. He wants to bring debate in Congress to a sudden termination through the application of a gag.

What will he say if he ever swings round the circle again?

WATCHFUL WOBBLING

There is an extremely serious side to watchful wobbling as applied to European affairs. The President may reverse himself from time to time in regard to Mexico without doing a great deal more than to get himself in bad with red blooded Americans. He can pose as a pacifist one day and bombard Vera Cruz the next; he can be too proud to fight one week and in favor of the biggest navy and army in the world the next, without necessarily bringing serious results upon his country. But when his chronic habit of turning somersaults and impraving convictions is applied to the European situation it becomes decidedly serious. First, the allies are notified that they will not be permitted to carry guns on merchantmen if they were to enter American ports. A little later it was decided they could carry guns after all. Then we raise the contention with Germany that armed merchantmen are not cruisers.

What must Europe think of it? And to what an extent does the impression of spinelessness given by the Wilson administration constitute an invitation to trouble?

THE CUTTLE FISH AS A NATIONAL EMBLEM

Senator Fall of New Mexico has accused the administration of cuttle fish diplomacy. It is unkind but it is apt.

The cuttle fish is a "dibranchiate cephalopodous" mollusk—without teeth—which relies for defense upon its ability to squirt ink. It is, of course, the best India ink, capable of obscuring much by its powers of diffusion. Having no teeth, ink affords some measure of defense.

But with Americans the game of squirting ink does not afford defense. All it does is to obscure from us the unpleasant faces of possible enemies, and sometimes also gives offense to those possible enemies.

We suggest the cuttle fish as a new, and we hope temporary national emblem.—Chicago Tribune.

AN ANTI-SCUTTLING VIEW

The passage of an act of Congress committing the United States to the evacuation of the Philippines in two years or in four or at any specific time in the near future would be a criminal blunder. It would be a serious blow to the morale of the native population. It would be a provocation to trouble with any power which happens to covet the islands. It would be a harm to our national self respect, since in our hearts we could regard it in no way save as a cowardly abandonment of a sacred duty.

The foreign menace is plain to all sensible men. So long as we continue to hold the islands it is probable no direct attack will be made upon them. But were we to reduce our defensive position to a mere protectorate it is practically certain that in a year or two an ambitious rival would gamble on our pacifism and gobble them up.

Surrender of the islands in the near future is unthinkable and to set a date even tentatively for such an event is merely to provoke immediate unrest among the Filipinos and great bitterness and charges of bad faith when—as must inevitably be the case—the pledge would be broken.—New York Evening Sun.

There was a business meeting of the School Board Saturday L. Olsen coming from Carrizozo where he is well drilling, to attend.

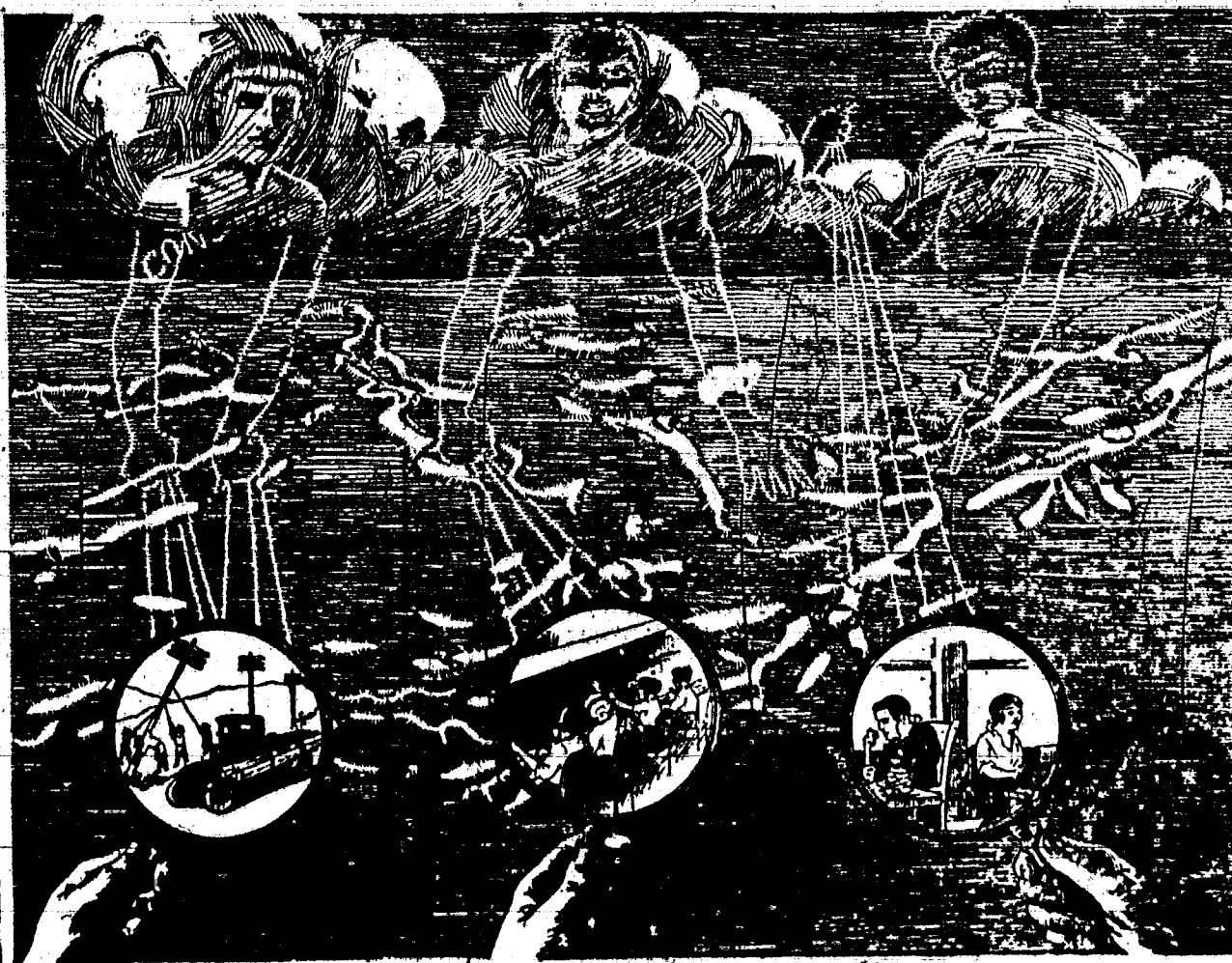

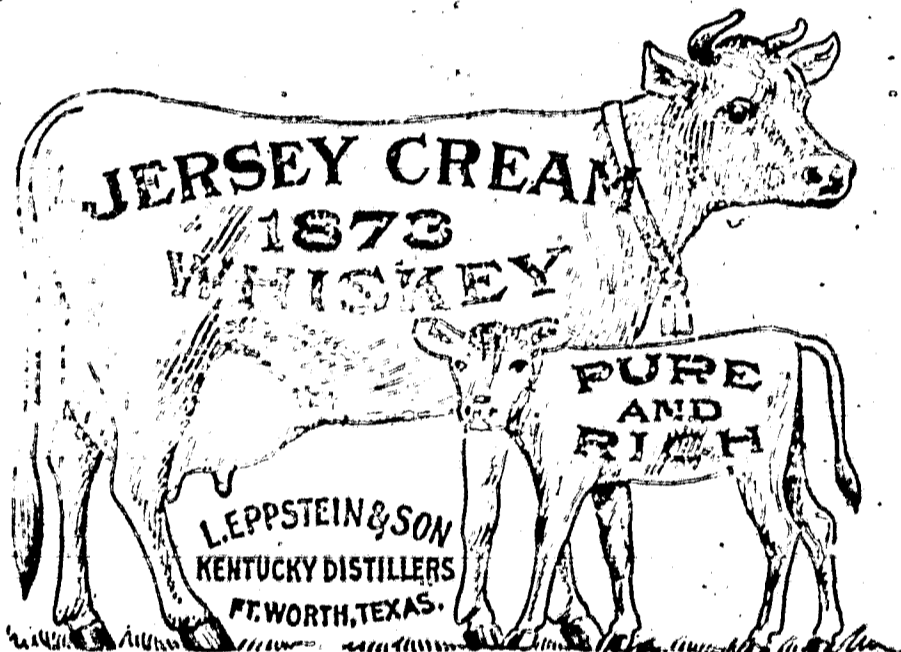

ROAD BUILDING

Detailed studies of local road building systems in 100 counties are now being carried on by the department of agriculture in co-operation with the state highway departments and local road authorities.

The purpose of this study is to discover the points of excellence and defects in existing local methods of building and maintaining roads which will aid the state authorities to put local road management on a systematized basis. The co-operating state authorities have been asked to designate counties that present typical and exceptional features as to topography, character of road materials, methods of construction and maintenance, administrative organization, methods of road financing and traffic conditions. From these lists 100 counties will be selected, and in these counties the division of road economics will make intensive studies.

This investigation is prompted by the fact that there is at present very little knowledge as to the most effective and economical methods by which a county can develop its roads. At present the methods of financing local road improvements vary from

calling on farmers for a certain number of days labor in lieu of a road tax, or the use of county prisoners in road construction, to bond issues or maintenance of roads from dramshop license funds.

The department will study all of these systems with the view to determining what system or combination of systems works best in actual practice.

There is, however, at present no standard system of keeping accounts for road building and maintenance and as a result, while some counties know to a penny the purpose for which money was spent, others have no definite check or reporting system. Among various counties with the same conditions, cost for excavation or other labor is anything but uniform, and many counties, because of the absence of definite knowledge, fail to use local and cheap materials and construct roads which are unnecessarily expensive for their purposes, or which will wear out before the bond issues are redeemed. The investigation will include a careful study of the use of convict labor in road construction.

In connection with the scientific study, the department's highway engineers will advise freely with local officials as to improvements, and thus give each county visited the advantage of direct co-operation, engineering supervision and assistance.

These investigations, it is believed, will yield important economic data bearing especially on the benefits and burdens of road improvement and allowing the extent to which financial outlay under given typical conditions is justifiable.

Drying Films for the Movies.

The drying of photographic films by the ordinary method is a slow process and is the cause of much delay in the manufacture of the long strips required for moving pictures. To reduce the time of production one of the big film companies has introduced an electrical apparatus that greatly facilitates the process. The wet films are wound spirally on large drums 27 feet in diameter, which are introduced into a casing that has a 3,000-watt air heater set in the back. The current is turned on, the drum is steadily revolved by a small electric motor, with the result that the film is now thoroughly dried in about one-fourth the time previously required, which varies from one to ten hours, according to the humidity of the atmosphere.

The percentage earned upon capital invested was 6 1/2% in 1912, 80% in 1913, 23 1/3 in 1914, and 50% in 1915, in which year it paid a cash dividend of 58%.

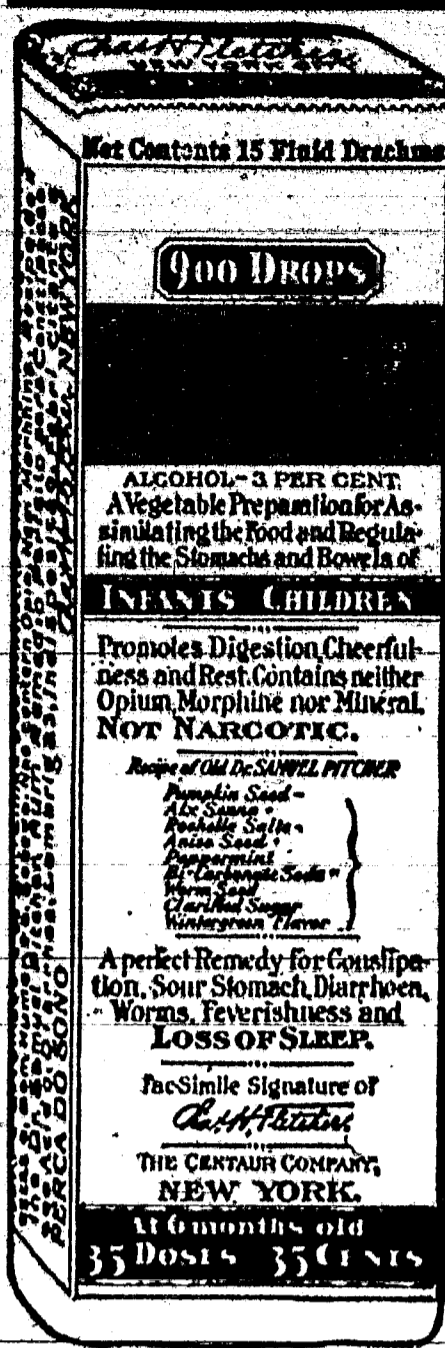
