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MODERN COTTAGES FOR RURAL TEACHERS

New Mexico to be One of the First States to Get the Benefit of This Plan When Carried Into Effect

U. S. BUREAU OF EDUCATION HAS THE MATTER IN HAND

The biggest, most universal scheme for social service in the history of America, one affecting every hamlet in the land has been instituted by the National Lumber Manufacturers' association, in the proposal to build a home for every rural school teacher in America.

New Mexico will be one of the first states where the plan will be carried into effect, and a thorough investigation of the conditions in this state preceded the announcement of the social service plans of the lumber manufacturers. The association has not as yet formulated its plans for pushing this new department of public service by actually assisting the schools of the nation to build homes for teachers, but work on this philanthropic enterprise is already under way and the association plans to have its plans ready for announcement in a few weeks.

The plan to spread the gospel of homes for school teachers over the land was first broached only a few weeks ago at a conference of the directors of the association. It proved instantly popular. The idea was taken up by the United States Bureau of Education, and the first result of this cooperation between the lumbermen of the nation and the government itself is in the issuance of a brochure entitled "Teachers' Cottages," by R. S. Kellogg of Chicago, secretary of the National Lumber Manufacturers' association, in cooperation with the United States Bureau of Education and which is being sent to every county superintendent of schools in America. The Rockefeller Foundation has already approved of the plan and is giving \$25,000 to foster this work with more money to come.

The proposal to build these teachers' cottages all over the land follows out the idea that has already been carried into extensive success by the state of Washington.

The national association has taken up this social service work in the belief that the education of the nation will be immensely advanced if the teachers of the nation's young are properly housed. The theory is that if teachers are provided with proper homes, the country districts will be able to secure better teachers, avoid the constant changes by which the schools are always in a torn-up condition. As Secretary Kellogg phrases it in his work, which constitutes a survey of the movement and its possibilities:

"Under present circumstances, the teaching of a country school often becomes simply a temporary expedient for the teacher the first term after getting a certificate, and ambitious teachers who are anxious to grow in their profession, and make something of themselves, go to the city schools just as soon as

possible, where living conditions are better. The country schools are always left with the largest proportion of young, inexperienced, poorly trained teachers.

Mr. Kellogg urges also that the teachers' cottages, or as he calls them, teacherages, should be models of sanitation, artistic, though inexpensive, and so constructed that they may be not only homes, but real social centers for the rural neighborhoods.

In order to further this plan of properly caring for the teachers, the lumbermen's organization is ready to prepare plans to assist rural communities in providing their teachers with the kind of homes which have proved satisfactory in Washington, and in the other more scattered localities where they have been built.

New Mexico has been selected as one of the first states for the general introduction of this idea of a teachers' cottage for every rural school, because of the special needs of this state for rural education.

"One place is trying the teacher's cottage plan this year. It is a serious problem in this State in many districts," says the U. S. Bureau of Education report.

KIMMONS TRIAL IS IN PROGRESS

Trial of John T. Kimmons Alleged Murderer of N. B. Brown Will Consume the Entire Week

CASE GIVEN TO JURY LATE YESTERDAY AFTERNOON

The entire week of the District Court has been taken up with the trial of the State against John T. Kimmons, who is charged with murdering Napoleon B. Brown near Corona last spring. Monday morning the jury was selected without any delay and the court has made very rapid progress with this case. The arguments were completed yesterday afternoon and the case given to the jury at 5 o'clock, but up to press hour they have been unable to reach a verdict.

The case was brought here on a change of venue from Torrance County where the killing took place.

The state is being represented by District Attorney H. B. Hamilton and is assisted by Judge W. W. Gatewood of Roswell, while the defence is being conducted by Col. Geo. W. Prichard of Santa Fe.

This case grew out of a dispute arising between Kimmons and Brown over a fence line along which the deceased had workmen chopping wood.

According to the testimony of T. W. Allen, the only eye witness to the killing, Kimmons and his wife came to the point of the killing, Mrs. Kimmons with a shot gun and her husband armed with a revolver and were talking to Allen about being over the line when Brown came up. A heated argument was engaged in and the killing followed. In addition to Allen the state used Mr. Marble a surveyor, as a witness. A very thorough account of the details of the case leading up to the killing was given by Allen.

The defence began their case by the introduction of witnesses and plaintiffs as to the different times in question, and especially the one in controversy between the tracts of Brown and Kimmons, after which the defendant was placed upon the stand and gave his version of the difficulties leading up to the killing and his conversation and that of Brown at the time immediately before the fatal shooting. His testimony contradicted that of the witness, Allen, in several material instances, regarding the distances of the different parties at the time of the shooting, and the positions relatively of Brown and Kimmons just before and at the time the shots were fired. Kimmons testified that the deceased, was within about three steps with the axe raised above his head and coming at him rapidly when he shot and killed Brown; and on being interrogated by his counsel as to why he shot, stated that he was afraid he would be cut down or killed by Brown with that axe, as he had it drawn and was coming at him when he fired to save himself from being killed. This plea of self-defence has been indicated throughout the

trial in the cross-examination of the state's witnesses by counsel for defence; and, of course, made more forceful by direct examination of the defendant and his wife, who were also present at the time of the shooting.

The defendant's wife testified and substantiated her husband's testimony in most instances; however, being slightly different with regard to the positions and distances of the several persons at the time the shots were fired.

It is the state's contention that Brown was 16.5 feet from Kimmons when the shot was fired, and that the axe was in Brown's left hand with the blade resting upon the ground. That is so testified to by Allen, which is controverted by both the defendant and his wife, who both put Brown within 10 to 12 feet of Kimmons and both state that the ax was raised or drawn to a position above the shoulder and that he was making toward Kimmons in that attitude when Kimmons fired.

IMPROVEMENTS IN CO. SCHOOLS MARKED

Progressiveness of County Shown by Rapid Strides Made in Educational Affairs During the Past Five Years

FIFTEEN NEW BUILDINGS HAVE BEEN ERECTED

There is nothing that bespeaks prosperity for a community any stronger than good schools. That Lincoln County has taken its place among the progressive school counties of the state is proven by the rapid strides taken in school affairs during the past few years. With a record of 15 buildings, 11 remodeled buildings and several planned for the summer months, Supt. Mrs. W. L. Gumm can point with pride to school achievements in Lincoln County.

Five years ago most of the schools were taught by teachers who were not qualified for their work and who secured their positions through permits granted by school authorities. That condition has changed and today there are no permit teachers in the county, while the majority of the teachers are either life or first grade teachers with a minority of second and third grade teachers.

The school month has increased from five to an average of seven and one half months, an increase of nearly 25 per cent with a corresponding increase in the number of teachers employed, while the school enrolment has shown an increase of twenty per cent.

Cooperation has been the keynote of relationship among parents, school boards and the superintendent, with the result that the county is wide awake to its need in an educational way.

Andrew McCurdy, who has been employed as superintendent of the Carrizozo High School for the past three years and who has been retained for the coming school year is a man of high educational qualifications and has worked untiringly for the good of the schools.

A large percent of the teachers of the county will attend one or the other of the state normals, while some few have been employed to teach short summer terms at different parts of the county.

It is said by those who have seen the school buildings throughout the county which have been erected in the past few years are among the better class of rural school buildings of the state, have splendid light and equipment.

In school affairs it can be seen at a glance that Lincoln County has kept pace with the best in New Mexico.

LEFT FOR SILVER CITY

Mr. and Mrs. Andrew McCurdy left Monday evening for Silver City where Mr. McCurdy has been employed by the New Mexico Normal University to teach the classes in higher mathematics during the summer term. Washington.

Alemania, en una nota recibida por el departamento de estado por cable del embajador Gerard, admite que una torpillera alemana destruyó el vapor Sussex del servicio de la Mancha en violación a las promesas dadas a los Estados Unidos; expresa su pésame por el accidente; anuncia que el comandante del submarino ha sido "convenientemente castigado" y declara su disposición a pagar una indemnidad adecuada a los Americanos heridos en el vapor.

Extranjero.

Los aeroplanos ingleses cayeron 18,000 libras de alimentos además de piezas de correo y otras cosas en Kut-el-Amara entre el 11 y el 20 de abril.

Diez personas fueron ejecutadas en Irlanda, dijo Harold J. Tennant, subsecretario del departamento de la guerra, a un orador en la Casa de Comunes en Londres. Setenta y tres personas recibieron sentencias de servidumbre penal y seis al trabajo forzoso. El número de casualidades entre los paisanos en la revuelta en Irlanda hasta el 9 de mayo fué estimado por el primer ministro en 189 muertos y 614 heridos.

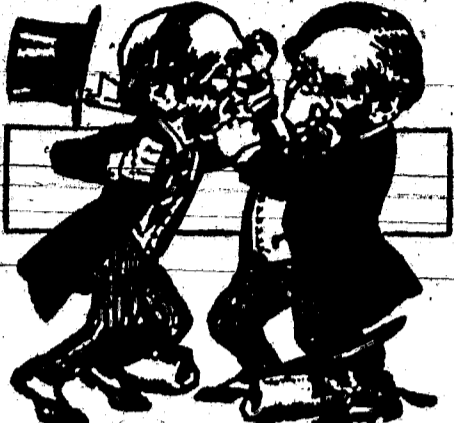

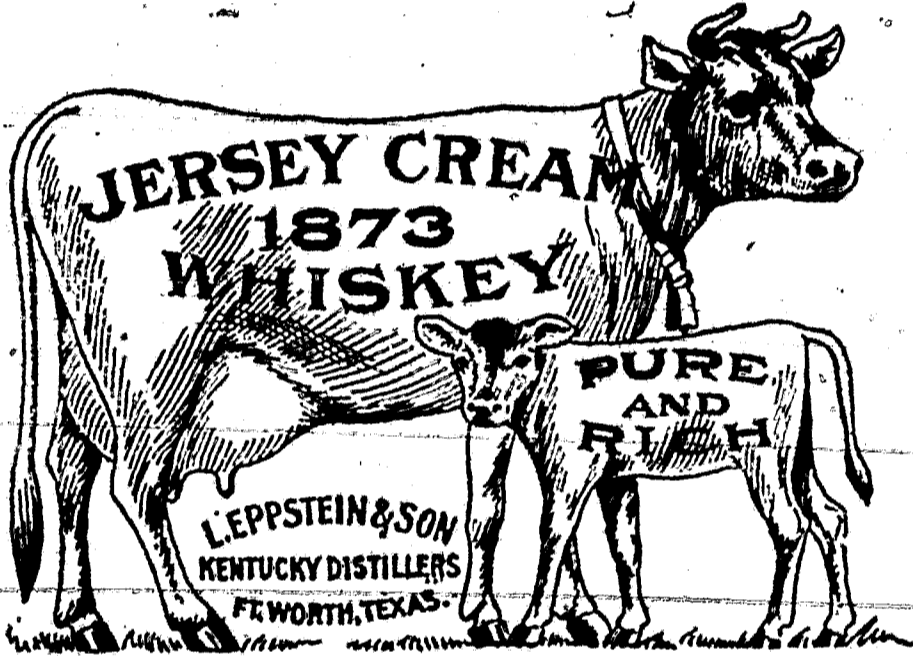

THE GOOD SAMARITAN.

Luke 10:25-37—Jan. 18.

"Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself."—Mark 12:31.

Our Studies since the first of the year relate to the last six months of our Lord's ministry.

Jesus knew that His death was approaching; that He must, as the antitypical Passover Lamb, be put to death the following Spring, on the fourteenth day of the first month. His ministry had only begun to awaken the people.

The seventy, whose ordination, or commission, we considered a week ago, were sent across the Jordan into Perea. Shortly afterward, Jesus Himself went thither. The purpose of His ministry was to thoroughly awaken the Jews to the fact that the time of their visitation had come. This witness bore fruit—after Pentecost.

Later, the seventy returned, expressing joy and confidence, remarking that even the demons were subject to them in the Father's name. The Master took occasion to tell them that they overlooked their chief cause of joy, saying, "Rejoice, rather, that your names are written in Heaven"—than that demons are subject to your command.

So it is with us. Salvation is a personal matter, and works and preaching are merely incidentals connected with it. The great time for works is future. Thus, if faithful, we shall be associated with the Redeemer in His work of regenerating humanity.

Who is My Neighbor?

At this point—today's Study opens a lawyer thought to entrap the Master by asking, "Master, what shall I do to inherit eternal life?" In those days, when Israel's only law was God's Law, a lawyer was one well versed in Moses' teachings. Jesus therefore said, How do you understand the matter? You know what is written in the Law.



The Doctor of Theology replied, We are to love the Lord our God with all our heart, with all our soul, with all our strength, with all our mind; and our neighbor as ourselves. Jesus approved, saying, Do this—keep the Law, and you shall live. You will never die.

The lawyer was caught. He knew that the people of Israel had been dying for centuries, notwithstanding the Law; yet himself and others were outwardly claiming to keep the Law. Out of his own testimony Jesus showed him that he was not keeping the Law, as he and the Pharisees in general pretended to do. No fallen man can keep God's perfect Law; for it is so comprehensive that only a perfect man could keep it thoroughly.

The lawyer sought to make the best of a bad argument. Instead of acknowledging his defeat, he asked, "Who is my neighbor?" This was one of the points which Jesus had particularly made against the Pharisees—that they were outwardly pious, religious—prayed, fasted, etc.; yet in heart they were unjust, and took advantage of widows and orphans, not loving these as themselves. The lawyer sought to imply that according to God's law only certain special ones were neighbors.

Should Do Good to All as We Have Opportunity.

Jesus again outgeneraled him, saying, I will give you a parable. A man going down to Jericho was beset by thieves, who wounded him and left him half dead. There happened that way a priest, one of the highest representatives of the Law. When he saw the man, he passed by on the other side. Likewise a Levite passed by, next in relationship to God's service. He went near, looked at the man, but did nothing. Then came along a Samaritan, who bound up the wounds, took the man to an inn, cared for him at the sacrifice of time and strength, and finally paid for his keep until his own return from Jerusalem.

WHAT THE WOMEN WILL DO

In several states of the Union,
women will vote next fall in the
presidential election. Democrats
profess to believe that a great ma-
jority of the women will disregard
the economic fallacies of the Wilson
administration, its extravagance,
the impaired public service, the
violation of campaign pledges and
the sacrifice of national dignity, and
will vote for Wilson on the theory
that he 'kept us out of war.'

Men who thus delude themselves
are doomed to disappointment.
There may be a few women who
didn't notice the industrial depres-
sion into which this country was
thrown by the tariff legislation of
1913; but they are few indeed.
Most women know when their hus-
bands or fathers are having a hard
time to make a living. Many wo-
men are in business for themselves.
In either case, they had very firmly
impressed upon their minds in 1913-
14 the disastrous effects of tariff
laws that throw our markets open
to the foreign producer who can
undersell the American producer
because of lower wage expenditures.

Most American women don't want
American workmen forced to com-
pete on an equality with the work-
men of Europe and Asia. They
believe in maintaining higher stand-
ards of living in the United States
and they recognize the necessity
for a protective tariff in order that
this may be accomplished.

Women believe in the merit
system in the government service
and have been active in promoting
the Civil Service reform which this
administration has endeavored to
overthrow. Women who have sons
or brothers getting on in the indus-
trial world, are believers in efficiency
in government as well as in private

business. They will not give their
approval to an administration
which has at every opportunity
demonstrated its incapacity for the
management of large affairs.

The up-to-date woman reads the
news and editorial columns of the
press—not the society and fashion
columns only—and she knows that
it was the war that brought a tem-
porary relief from the hard times
caused by Democratic tariff tinkering.
The politician who thinks he
can fool the women regarding the
real issues of the coming campaign
is fooling nobody but himself. Trying
to evade the facts of 1913-14 by
the false plea that "he kept us out
of war" will gain no more votes
among the women than among the
men, and the renunciation of the
Republican party indicates that
there will be exceedingly few mi-
led.

Secretary of Commerce Redfield
says the Bureau of Foreign and
Domestic Commerce has had diffi-
culty in securing suitable men for
its foreign investigations. This is
the first intimation we have had
that any effort had been made.
Upon the recommendation of the
Secretary of Commerce attaches
were exempted from the Civil Serv-
ice test as to qualifications. This was
a pretty plain indication that "suit-
able" was regarded as synonymous
with "deserving Democrats." If
not, why relieve those candidates
from a competitive test?

Now the Democratic publicity
agents tell us the Republicans are
"without an issue." Only a short
time ago President Wilson declared
that the tariff is the only issue we
have left. Never mind, the Ameri-
can voter can find plenty of reasons
for giving the Democratic party a
rest from what has proven to be a
task beyond its capacity.

President Wilson is putting up a
'non-partisan' plea, now that elec-
tion is near at hand. That is all
right, Mr. Wilson, we shall be just
as non-partisan as you were in
naming the Federal Reserve Board.

Miss Price spent Monday and Tuesday of last week in El Paso.

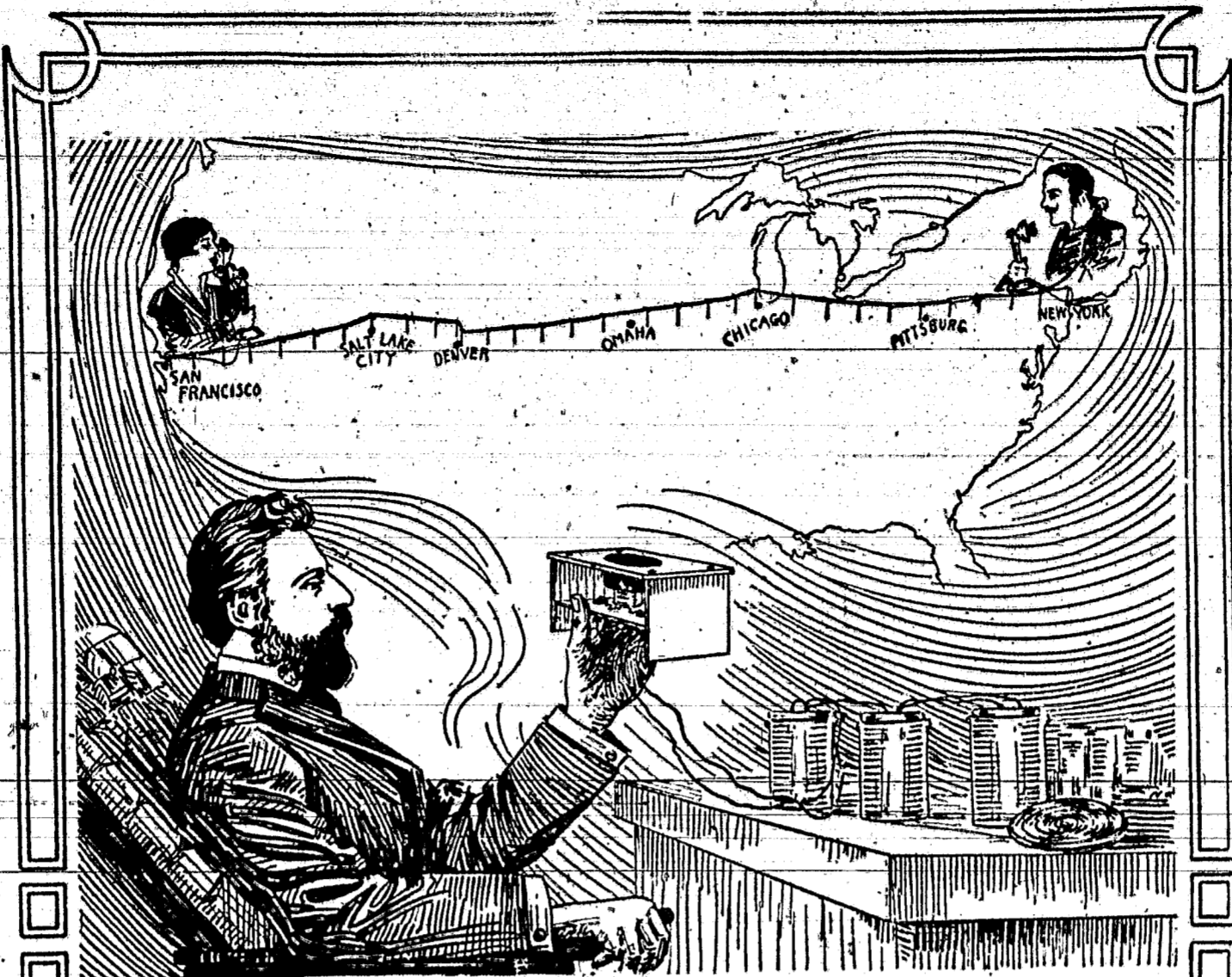
COST OF PRINTING MATERIAL

"How is the increase in cost of all printing material going to affect the small town publisher?" was the subject of an address delivered by J. E. Barber, editor of the Wayland N. Y. Register, before the Western New York Newspaper Publishers' association at Rochester, April 15.

Mr. Barber said: "The question is one which is ussling not only the small town

publisher, but the large printing concerns of the country. Never before, I believe, in the history of the printing business has the future been quite so problematical as at present. No one can foresee the outcome, and with almost daily arrival of notices of advance in the price of all grades of paper and printing material of every description it surely keeps some small town publishers guessing. Probably no industry is harder hit by the great European conflict than is our. The reasons for the increased prices are too well known to go into. These prices are likely to continue and even increase while the war lasts, and while no one can forestall its duration, many authorities believe it will last a year or two longer. In any event conditions are not favorable for early peace.

"Universally with advanced prices the consumer is the one to suffer, and I can see no exception in this case. I am convinced from observation, enquiry and knowledge first hand that many printers have been doing business on small margin that it was soon wiped out with the advances in the cost of stock, etc. I fully believe the public is prepared to pay higher prices for printed matter than have in most cases been charged in the past. Have not too many of us been too much afraid of losing a job and figured so closely on many of them for the profit we should have had? Low priced competition perhaps has in a measure been to blame for this."

DOINGS AND HAPPENINGS THAT MARK THE PROGRESS OF THE AGE.

ABOUT THE WAR

Germany repulses Russian attack south of Garbunovka with heavy casualties.

Two more leaders in the Irish rebellion, James Connolly and John McDermott, were shot in Dublin.

Intense artillery actions in progress in Col di Lana zone, with no apparent advantage on either side.

Turks bombard Russian ports on Black sea in retaliation for attacks on open towns along Anatolian coast.

Irish situation again at crisis and Premier Asquith hurries to Dublin to assume charge of the military administration.

White Star liner Cymric torpedoed by submarine. London reports one other British ship and one French vessel sunk.

Germany's latest peace overtures do not offer a basis for negotiations, declared Lord Robert Cecil, British minister of war trade.

London admits loss of 500 yards of trenches near Vermelles in German night attack, but claims part of ground regained in counter assault.

French report recapture of vantage points taken from them southeast of Haucourt. Heavy bombardments proceeding near Dead Man's hill and Culleres.

Russians still fleeing eastward in Caucasus before Turkish attack, according to Constantinople report, but Petrograd, apparently ignoring this feature of the campaign, claims repulse of advance toward Bagdad.

What appears to be the first engagement in the long-expected German offensive against Saloniki is reported from Athens, the Germans capturing a village and later being forced to evacuate it by a French counter attack.

The American and Mexican conferences at El Paso Thursday, announced they had decided to suspend their conferences and report back to their governments in order that these may conclude the negotiations through their respective foreign departments.

With 8,000 additional troops under orders for the Mexican border, including 4,000 national guardsmen from Arizona, New Mexico and Texas, Washington officials felt that necessary steps had been taken to prevent further raiding of American border towns by bandits.

WESTERN

About 150 shopmen at Laramie, Wyo., are affected by the increase of 5 per cent in pay announced by the Union Pacific railroad.

One hundred cowboys of Montana have offered their services to the Helena United States recruiting officer for war with Mexico.

Meager telephone advices from Clayton, New Mex., tell of the destruction of Kenton, Okla., a town of 1,000, by fire of unknown origin. The loss is placed at \$60,000.

Mexican bandits raided the Polar's mining camp seven miles below Lochiel on the border, driving out Americans who escaped to Nogales in automobiles. Colonel Sage, commanding at Nogales, sent a company of infantry and twenty cavalrymen to guard Lochiel, Washington camp and other towns on the American side.

The sentence of life imprisonment at Cheyenne, Wyo., imposed on Walter L. Cottrell, alias William L. Carlisle, the Union Pacific train bandit, terminates a criminal career which began when Cottrell was only 17 years of age, and extended through nine years to the present time. This fact became known when information gathered for the state was released because of the prisoner's conviction, sentence and permanent segregation.

WASHINGTON

The Bankhead good roads bill, appropriating \$85,000,000 for the construction of post roads, passed the Senate. It appropriates \$10,000,000 for roads for the national forests.

America's next step in the negotiations with the entente allies regarding treatment of neutral commerce will be delayed on account of the implied threat contained in the German note of May 5.

FOREIGN

Maj. Gen. Geo. W. Goethals, announced that he would resign June 1 as governor general of the Panama canal zone.

A Havas dispatch from Athens says that several pretenders to the throne of Albania are conducting active propaganda.

British aeroplanes dropped 18,000 pounds of food in addition to mail and military stores in Kut-el-Amara between April 11 and 20.

The Afton-Bladet prints a rumor of an unsuccessful plot by Socialists and anarchists against the life of King Gustave of Sweden.

Gregory Rasputin, the Russian monk who is reputed to have exercised great influence over Emperor Nicholas, has been assassinated.

The announcement is expected shortly at Vienna of the betrothal of an Austrian archduchess and Prince Boris, heir to the throne of Bulgaria.

Premier Asquith's sudden resolve to go to Dublin, which was hailed by his supporters as a stroke of genius, has had the effect of assuaging political passions.

An official British estimate of German casualties in April, issued in London, places the total at 91,162. The number of German casualties since the beginning of the war is given as 2,822,079.

A Budapest dispatch says the work of a modern Bluebeard has been discovered by the police in the village of Cinkota. While searching the home of a missing soldier they found seven lead-cases, each containing the body of a woman.

Fourteen persons have been executed in Ireland, Harold J. Tennant, parliamentary under-secretary for war, told a questioner in the House of Commons in London. Seventy-three persons have received sentences of penal servitude and six of imprisonment at hard labor. The number of casualties among civilians in the uprising in Ireland up to May 9 was given by Premier Asquith as 186 killed and 614 wounded.

SPORTING NEWS

Thirty-five members were enrolled in the Pueblo Rifle Club.

Yale's tennis team easily defeated Dartmouth in New York, taking all nine matches.

The Sioux City Western League Baseball Club announced the purchase of Grover Gilmore, former Federal League outfielder and Denver player.

Mike Collins, manager of Fred Fulton, said in Chicago that he had wired an offer of \$27,000 to Jess Willard for a ten-round contest at Hudson, Wis., on July 4.

Omaha will be awarded the silver loving cup offered by Gov. Arthur Capper of Kansas to the team in the Western League that had the largest attendance on opening day, according to a message from President F. C. Zehrung of Topeka.

GENERAL

New Mexico's forces, comprising approximately 1,100 men, are ready to start to the border, according to Adjutant General Herring.

Thirteen vessels from Portland have been destroyed in the war zone by mines or submarines since the European conflict began, according to figures made public at Portland, Ore.

Curtis Bayless, an American farmer, was shot and killed a short distance from his home, near Mercedes, Tex., by a band of four or five Mexicans who succeeded in escaping, presumably to the Mexican side of the Rio Grande.

Reuben H. Shafford was found guilty in the Federal Court at Cheyenne of having made an attack on Miss Katherine Simota in Yellowstone Park two years ago, the jury fixing the penalty at imprisonment for life.

A violent wind storm which swept Minnesota and parts of North Dakota and western Wisconsin caused considerable property damage. At Two Harbors, Minn., a man was killed by lightning. At Crookston, Minn., a tabernacle was unroofed during services but no one was hurt. The roof of the grandstand at La Crosse, Wis., baseball park was lifted by the wind and dropped on a street car, slightly injuring several passengers.

Hope that at the end of the present war the nations of the world would undertake a joint effort to keep the peace, backed by a common police force, was expressed by President Wilson in an interview with a committee of the American Union Against Militarism, which called to protest against his preparedness program and advise him that they had found a fear of militarism in the country west of the Alleghenias.
