AN OPEN LETTER TO E. C. DE BACA, DELEGATE

"Oaks White," Democrat, Seems to Have Grave Fears That His Party is Going Down in Defeat This Fall

SAYS WILSON HAS EXHIBITED A SHOW OF BACK BONE

You will excuse me for taking the liberty of addressing you thus publicly. My acquaintance with you being only in your public capacity is my excuse. It seems to me that the occasion is paramount.

We as Democrats know that we must do something extraordinary to win the coming national election. There is no use in beating birds round the bush. While Mr. Wilson has exhibited a show of back bone in the submarine matter with Germany, it was like hitting a man when he was down. Germany is fighting the world and could not afford to break with the U. S. It was an opportune moment for Mr. Wilson to exhibit a show of back bone. On the other hand the true peaceful tendencies of the man have been shown in the Mexico matter. Instead of back bone it has been back down.

Now my proposition is just this: Here in the Southwest the sentiment is for stalwart dealing with Mexico. The man of the largest development of cheek and bravado is popular—Roosevelt. Democrats are all for him to be nominated by the Republicans. He goes up and down the country knocking his teeth and looking savage. He has exercised his teeth so much because the U. S. wouldn't fight that they are the most prominent feature of his otherwise mild and lovely face. Set as they are between cheeks that have the world beaten for cheek they remind me of what Roscoe Conklyn said of him. Conklyn was at the time the great leader of the Republicans of the Empire state New York, while Roosevelt had just started out on his brilliant career as policeman, or some other office in connection with the police department of New York City. Someone suggested Roosevelt as fit for some office. Conklyn said: "That young man with the big teeth? He thinks that he discovered the ten commandments."

This sentiment in the Southwest has made me bold to address you. You, of course, couldn't do otherwise than advocate a bold policy in our national convention. You would be going contrary to public sentiment in your own state to advocate peace at any price, then jeopardizing your political future. On the other hand the only chance for our party to win is in adopting a platform for peace even if we have to run for it. I call to my support on this proposition no less a person than Wm. J. Bryan, who has peerlessly carried our business in three campaigns. He says the only chance the Democrats have to win is by throwing out from our ranks this habit to catch the peace loving Republicans.

As a waver candidate Wilson would be beaten on a peace platform. He can't stand on a peace platform. He is never bowed by his platform. We cannot disagree the fact if we would, that he is the logical candidate. Every man of our party of status will be willing to stand with me and not Wilson head

the forlorn hope.

This brings me to what I want to say. Since it would be political death for you to stand up in our national convention and advocate a peace platform, your only escape is in proving an alibi. I am willing to pacify myself as your proxy.

The idea of being a proxy is very distasteful to me. In our local convention I can usually go as a regular delegate. Sometimes at our primaries in this place I am the only person present and then all I have to do is to send myself. I have never yet met a _____ in the convention.

The very first time I had to consider a proxy I could but look upon it with contempt. It was years ago when the hay market riot occurred in Chicago. August Spies was sentenced to be hung with other rioters. The daughter of Mrs. Van Gard who was an anarchist lecture fell in love with August. He was in prison and their marriage was celebrated through his proxy. It appeared in the papers thus: "Marriage by Proxy." Hans Snyder had a sweetheart in the far off fatherland while Hans lived in Milwaukee and tooted in the band. He loved his sweetheart fondly and keenly felt her loss. But Hans had not the money to pay her way across. So Wilhelma waited and Snyder waited too, because in their condition they had nothing else to do. One morning in the paper Hans Snyder read about how Hina and August knocked everybody out. "Dee marriage by proxy just fit me like a shoe, and me and Wilhelma will marry dat very vay too." Hans thought then wrote a letter, no sooner said than done, and Hans and Wilhelma were "speedily" made one.

"Ten years of married proxy had fled into the past and Hans and Wilhelma were soon to meet at last. For she was coming to him across the billows, his faithful Wilhelma, the lily of the Rhine." "The day of her arrival Hans Snyder laughed and cried and waited at the station to greet his charming bride. She came at last and Hans stood at the station gate, to greet his Wilhelma, but not the other eight.

"Hans looked on in some amazement and Wilhelma cried, dot is your fader child's go stand up mit his side. Hans stood among them as passive as a bleat, but in his soul he muttered I no like that by dam."

Bill Bryan is in the same predicament as I am. If he goes to the convention he has got to get a proxy. I hope he will be there. He could lend me valuable assistance in forcing a peace plank into our platform.

You may want to know how I stand on the candidate, whom I am for, I will do as you advise about that. There are only two men available, Mr. Wilson and Mr. Ford. Bryan is three times and out. His experience has been a school of adversity to our party. From that experience he has qualified himself to advise his party how to win. He says it must be on a peace platform.

There is no doubt of Mr. Ford's principal on peace. On all other subjects we don't know how he stands. But if we make peace the paramount issue he has demonstrated how he stands. He has spent millions to stop the European war, there can be but one objection to Mr. Ford. If he was taken by surprise by one of his enemies, the overlaid for instance, he might be overtaken before he could crank up his machine and escape. He would then have to fight because he could not run.

COMPANIES THAT ARE INCORPORATING

Two Mining Companies and One Stock Farm Company of Lincoln County Are Incorporating

WILLOW SPRING COAL MINE AMONG LIST

Incorporation papers have been filed by the Willow Springs Coal Company of this city, which recently took over this property which is a few miles south of here. The capitalization is \$250,000, the shares being of a par value of \$100 and \$200,000 being common and \$50,000 preferred stock. Joseph J. Ayers is named as the statutory agent. The incorporators and directors are: F. C. Mason, New York, 500 shares; George C. Benedict, Carrizozo, 995 shares; J. L. Ryals of Cordele, Georgia, five shares; Mrs. Harriett McIvers, Carrizozo, 995 shares; John A. Green, Nashville, Tenn., five shares. The articles of incorporation will appear in the Outlook next week.

WHITE OAKS MINES

The White Oaks Mines Consolidated, Incorporated, at White Oaks have taken out incorporation papers under the laws of New Mexico. The capital stock is \$1,000,000, the number of shares of which the capital stock consists is \$200,000 of the value of \$500 per share. Richard Wightman is named as president and C. Ashof, secretary, with Fred Spencer Ashler, William H. Horsefall and James B. Collins as directors. All of the above reside in New York. Their principal office in New Mexico is located at White Oaks. This company is also incorporated under the laws of the state of New York. The incorporation papers of this firm will be found in another column.

ADELITA STOCK FARM

The Adelita Stock Farm Company located about four miles east of Carrizozo has filed incorporation papers. The capitalization is \$50,000 with three shares issued, being of a par value of \$300. The incorporators are Lewis Powell, Adelle Powell, President, and James P. Colp, Secretary. Mr. Colp is also named as the statutory agent. The company is also incorporated under the laws of Arizona. The articles of incorporation appear elsewhere in this issue.

OUTLIE AND CONSCIOUSNESS

President Wilson made a speech at a Washington club the other evening and from a report of his language as published in a Washington newspaper we are enabled to catch a glimpse of the workings of the Wilsonian mind. Mr. Wilson said that, from his prior experience—evidently referring to his career as a schoolmaster—he had learned that the most direct approach to a boy's consciousness lies through his cuticle. In other words, if you want to influence a boy, spank him. This practice the President heartily approves of. He has tried to apply it to Congress, with only measurable success, and Congress is very tired of it. In some instances Congressmen have successfully revolted against the schoolmaster's birch. They did it in the case of the Philippines bill, in the case of Rubles, and they plan to repeat the process with Brandeis.

There are others beside school boys and Congressmen to whom this practice of birching is likewise applicable. Even Presidents are not sacrosanct in regard to it, as Mr. Wilson will learn before long. In the past three years many attempts have been made to approach his consciousness. Reputable business men have gone to Washington, thinking that out of their experience they could tell him something enlightening to his inexperience. They have been met with the assertion that they are corrupt and invidious lobbyists. Senators and Representatives have gone to the White House trying to tell the President what Congress thinks about different matters. They have gone away with the executive expletives wounding their sensibilities and shattering their ear drums.

These incidents are numerous—and it is now evident that the only approach to the Presidential consciousness is by way of his cuticle. Maps are being made for utilizing that approach.

ARGENTINA AND THE U. S.

Argentina increased her hold on the American market 56 per cent, comparing the nine months ended March 1916, with the similar period of 1915, under the Democratic tariff law—imports from that country totaling \$79,000,000 for the 1916, against \$52,000,000 for the 1915 period. The bulk of our imports from Argentina pay no revenue into the United States Treasury because they are on the free list. When the war is over the huge volume of exports sent by Argentina to Europe, will be looking for a free trade market. It is probably no exaggeration to say that Argentina will be able to supply us with \$200,000,000 worth of food products annually, but do we want to buy all our food from Argentina, or do we want to give

the American farmer a fair share of our patronage? The Democrats are trying to tickle the farmer under the chin with the rural credits bill while they frisk him for his wallet with a free trade tariff law. But the good old Democratic bunco days are over.

The arrangement which Gen. Scott arrived at with Oregon is described at Washington as a "gentlemen's agreement." We think there is an error in the grammatical number in this language. So far as Gen. Scott is concerned it is undoubtedly a "gentleman's agreement." But as for the Oregon and of it—well, that is a different story.

We, the undersigned, all being persons of full age, and at least two-thirds being citizens of the United States, and at least one of us a resident of the State of New Mexico, desiring to form a stock corporation pursuant to the Stock Corporations Law of the State of New Mexico do hereby make, sign, acknowledge, and file this Certificate for that purpose, as follows:
ARTICLE I
The name of the proposed corporation is WHITE OAKS MINE, CONSOLIDATED, (INCORPORATED).
ARTICLE II
The purposes for which it is to be formed are:
I

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF THE ADELITA STOCK FARM COMPANY KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS: That we, the undersigned, being citizens of the United States, and residents of the State of New Mexico and the State of California, respectfully have this day voluntarily associated ourselves for the purpose of forming a corporation under the laws of the State of Arizona, and to that end and for that purpose we hereby CERTIFY as follows:

I The name of the said corporation shall be Adelita Stock Farm Company, and the names of the incorporators are JAMES P. COLP, whose place of residence is Carrizozo, New Mexico, LEWIS M. POWELL, and ADELE POWELL, whose place of residence is Pasadena, County of Los Angeles, State of California.

II That the principal place of business of said corporation shall be Phoenix, Arizona and the corporation may establish branch offices either within or without the State of Arizona, where meetings of the Board of Directors may be held.

III That the purposes for which this corporation is formed are as follows, to wit: (a) To acquire by purchase, bond, agreement, option, deed, or other instrument of conveyance, or in any other manner whatsoever, or in any manner whatever, to receive, possess, own, hold use, lease, supply, farm, maintain, mortgage, sell or otherwise dispose of real property, (b) To buy, sell, hold, acquire, own, deal in, or dispose of, personal or mixed property, merchandise or manufactured, or natural products of any kind whatsoever

(c) To buy, sell, acquire, hold, own, hypothecate, or in any wise deal in or with, or dispose of, the shares of the capital stock or bonds, or evidences of property or indebtedness of this corporation, or of any Corporation, association or joint stock company, or person, or any interest whatever in such or any kind of property (d) To carry on in all their branches, all kinds of construction, manufacturing, mercantile, mechanical and commercial business, (e) To contribute in any manner to the expense of promoting, constructing, improving, or maintaining any works of any kind whatsoever or however owned, which in the judgement of its board of directors for the time being, may be calculated directly or indirectly to advance the interests of the company.

(f) To promote, maintain, do, perform, execute, acquire, own, hold, or dispose of each, all, or anything incidental to, or necessary, convenient or proper, in the judgement of its board of directors for the time being, to carry out or perform any of the matters things, or purposes aforesaid, or incidental thereto, or connected therewith, or to exercise or acquire any rights, franchises or privileges which may be deemed necessary, requisite, useful, convenient, incidental or auxiliary to any of the purposes, objects, or things therein referred to, or that, in the judgement of its board of directors for the time being, may tend to advance the interests of the company, directly or indirectly.

(g) To borrow money and incur any other legal obligation and, as security for the repayment of such money, or as security for the performance of such obligation of this or of any corporation, to mortgage all or any of its real property and hypothecate all or any of its personal property, and to do any act or thing and to incur any obligation in the name and behalf of the company aforesaid, not prohibited by law, and in connection therewith, to do whatever may be necessary, convenient or appurtenant, and generally to do and perform all other acts and things, and engage in and do and perform all or any other business which may be or become necessary, useful, convenient, auxiliary or appurtenant to the business and principal purposes of the corporation aforesaid.

IV The authorized amount of capital stock of this corporation shall be Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000.00) divided into fifty thousand (50,000) shares of the par value of One Dollar (\$1.00) each, at such time as the Board of Directors may by resolution direct, said capital stock shall be paid into this corporation either by cash or sale or transfer of real or personal property, or as hereinafter otherwise provided, for the uses and purposes of said corporation, upon the payment of which shares of the capital stock may be issued, and the capital stock so issued shall thereupon and thereby become and be fully paid up and non-assessable, and in the absence of actual fraud in the transaction

the judgement of the Directors as to the value of the property purchased, shall be conclusively.
V The time of the commencement of this corporation shall be the date of the issuance of a Certificate of Incorporation according to law, and the termination thereof shall be twenty-five (25) years thereafter, with the privilege of renewal as provided by law.

VI The affairs of this corporation shall be conducted by a Board of Directors consisting of not less than three, nor more than five members, each of whom shall be a stockholder of record in the corporation said Board of Directors shall hold office for one year or until their successors are duly elected and qualified, and any vacancy in said Board of Directors shall be filled by the remaining directors from among the stockholders of record in the corporation. VII The officers of the corporation shall consist of the President, Vice President and Secretary and Treasurer together with such other officers as the Board of Directors or the By-Laws may provide for, or may be deemed necessary by resolution of the said Board of Directors for the transaction of the business of the corporation.

VIII The highest amount of indebtedness to which this corporation shall at any time be subject, shall be Five Thousand Dollars (\$5000.00)

IX The private property of the stockholders of this corporation shall be forever exempt from corporation debts of any kind whatsoever.

STOP SEIZING MAIL

U. S. NOTIFIES BRITAIN AND FRANCE IN VIGOROUS NOTE.

"Lawless Practice" on Seas "No Longer Can Be Tolerated," and Allies Are Warned to Change Policy.

Western Newspaper Union News Service. Washington, May 29.—The text of the communication addressed to the British and French ambassadors, to whom it was delivered Wednesday, in part follows:

"Department of State, Washington, May 29, 1915.—Excellency: I have the honor to acknowledge receipt of your excellency's note of April 3 last, transmitting a memorandum dated February 15, 1915, and communicated in substance to the American ambassador in London on February 28th, in which are stated the contentions of the British and French governments in regard to the right to detain and examine parcels and letter-mails en route by sea between the United States and Europe.

"After a discussion of the use of the mails for the transmission of parcels and of the limitations to be placed on 'inviolable' the joint memorandum of February 15 closes with the following assertions: '1. That from the standpoint of the right of visitation and eventual arrest and seizure, merchandise shipped in post parcels needs not and shall not be treated otherwise than merchandise shipped in any other manner.'

"2. That the inviolability of postal correspondence stipulated by the convention of 1864 and the Hague of 1907 does not in any way affect the right of the allied governments to visit and, if occasion arise, arrest and seize merchandise hidden in the wrappers, envelopes or letters contained in the mail bags. That true to their engagements and respectful of genuine correspondence the allied governments will refrain from seizing and confiscating such correspondence, letters or dispatches and will insure their speediest possible transmission, as soon as the security of their character shall have been ascertained."

Allies' Contentions Rejected. "In reply the government of the United States desires to state that it does not consider that the postal union convention of 1864 necessarily applies to the interference by the British and French governments with the overseas transportation of mails of which the government of the United States complains. Furthermore, the allied powers appear to have overlooked the admission of the government of the United States that post parcels may be treated as merchandise subject to the exercise of belligerent rights as recognized by international law. But the government of the United States does not admit that such parcels are subject to such exercise of the right of police supervision and eventual seizure which belongs to belligerents with reference to all cargoes on the high seas, as asserted in the joint note under acknowledgment.

Right of Search Limited. "It is noted with satisfaction that the British and French governments do not claim, and, in the opinion of this government, properly do not claim, that their so-called 'blockade' measures are sufficient grounds upon which to base a right to interfere with all classes of mail matter in transit to or from the neutral powers. On the contrary, their contention appears to be that as genuine correspondence is under conventional stipulation 'inviolable,' mail matter of other classes is subject to detention and examination. While the government of the United States agrees that 'genuine correspondence' mail is inviolable, it does not admit that belligerents may search other private sea-borne mails for any other purpose than to discover whether they contain articles of enemy ownership carried on the mails or to seize or under sealed cover as letter mail, though they may intercept at sea all mails coming out of or going into ports of the enemy's coast which are effectively blockaded.

Mails Seized in Port. "The governments of the United States, Great Britain and France, however, appear to be in substantial agreement as to principle. The method of applying the principle is the chief cause of difference.

"Though giving assurances that they consider 'genuine correspondence' to be inviolable and that they will, 'true to their engagements,' refrain on the high seas from seizing and confiscating such correspondence,' the allied governments proceed to deprive neutral governments of the benefits of these assurances by seizing and confiscating mails from vessels in port in violation of the principle.

"They compel neutral ships without just cause, to enter their own ports or they induce shipping lines, through some form of duress, to send their mail ships via British ports, or they detain all vessels merely calling at British ports, thus acquiring by force or unlawful means an illegal jurisdiction.

Censorship Assailed. "Acting upon this enforced jurisdiction the authorities remove all mail, genuine correspondence as well as post parcels; take them to London, where every piece, even though of neutral origin and destination, is opened and critically examined, to determine the sincerity of their character, in accordance with the interpretation given by the British and French censors. Finally, the expurgated remains is forwarded, frequently after irreparable delay, to its destination.

"Ships are detained en route to or from the United States or to or from other neutral countries, and mails are held and delayed for several days, and, in some cases, for weeks, and even months, even though not routed to ports of North Europe, via British ports.

"This has been the procedure which has been practiced since the announcement of February 15, 1915. To some extent, the same practice was followed before that date, calling for the protest of this government of January 4, 1915. But to that protest the memorandum under acknowledgment makes no reference and is entirely unresponsive.

The government of the United States must again insist with emphasis that the British and French governments do not obtain rightful jurisdiction of ships by forcing or inducing them to visit their ports for the purpose of seizing their mails, or thereby depriving belligerent rights as to sea ships than they could exercise on the high seas; for there is, in the opinion of the government of the United States, no legal distinction between the seizure of mails at sea, which is announced as abandoned, and their seizure from vessels voluntarily or involuntarily in port.

The British and French practice amounts to an unwarranted limitation of the use by neutrals of the world's highway for the transmission of correspondence. The practice actually followed by the allied powers must be held to justify the conclusion, therefore, that the announcement of February 15 was merely notice that one illegal practice had been abandoned to make place for the development of another, more onerous and vexatious in character.

Hague Rule Violated. "The present practice is a violation not only of the spirit of the announcement of February 15, but of the rule of the Hague Convention, upon which it is concededly based. Aside from this, it is a violation of the prior practice of nations which Great Britain and her allies have in the past assisted to establish and maintain.

"The arbitrary methods employed by the British and French governments have resulted most disastrously to citizens of the United States. Important papers which can never be duplicated, or can be duplicated only with great difficulty, such as United States patents for inventions, rare documents, legal papers relating to the settlement of estates, powers of attorney, fire insurance claims, income tax returns and similar matters, have been lost.

"Delays in receiving shipping documents have caused great loss and inconvenience by preventing prompt delivery of goods.

"Business opportunities are lost by failure to transmit properly bills, specifications and contracts.

Money Order Lists Missing. "Business correspondence, relating to legitimate and bona fide trade between neutral countries, correspondence of a personal nature, and also certain official correspondence such as money order lists and other matter forwarded by government departments, are detained, lost or possibly destroyed.

"Not only are American commercial interests injured, but rights of property are violated, and the rules of international law and custom are palpably disregarded.

"The government of the United States is inclined to the opinion that the class of mail matter which includes stocks, bonds, coupons and similar securities is to be regarded as of the same nature as merchandise or other articles of property and subject to the same exercise of belligerent rights. Money orders, checks, drafts, notes and other negotiable instruments which may pass as the equivalent of money are to be considered, also, to be classed as merchandise.

"Correspondence, including shipping agreements, money order lists and papers of that character, even though relating to 'enemy supplies or exports,' unless carried on the same ship as the property referred to, are, in the opinion of this government, to be regarded as 'genuine correspondence' and entitled to an unobstructed passage.

"The government of the United States, in view of the improper methods employed by the British and French authorities in interrupting mails passing between the United States and other neutral countries and between the United States and the empire of Great Britain, can no longer tolerate the wrongs which citizens of the United States suffer and continue to suffer through these methods.

Rights Must Be Observed. "To submit to a lawless practice of this character would open the door to repeated violations of international law by the belligerent powers on the ground of military necessity, of which the violator would be the sole judge. Manifestly a neutral nation cannot permit its rights on the high seas to be determined by belligerents or the exercise of their rights to be permitted or denied arbitrarily by the government of a warring nation.

"The rights of neutrals are as sacred as the rights of belligerents and must be as strictly observed.

"The government of the United States, content in the regard for its neutral rights and the rights of neutrals, which the British and French governments have so often proclaimed and the disregard of which they have urged as vigorously against their enemies in the present war, expects the present practice of the British and French authorities in the treatment of mails from or to the United States to cease, and belligerent rights, as exercised, to conform to the principle governing the passage of mail matter and to the recognized practice of nations.

"Only a radical change in the present British and French policy, restoring to the United States its full rights as a neutral power, will satisfy this government.

P. Kinney at the conclusion of several days of evidence. He declared his decision that the claimant was not the widow of Stratton, according to the testimony given by witnesses.


