## BURSUM'S SPEECH OF ACCEPTANCE

Says Governor McDonald is a Friend of Mr. McDonald and Always Demands Quick Action in Land Matters

### FORGOT HIS OLD SLOGAN OF "LET THE PEOPLE RULE"

I am not unmindful of the high compliment you have paid me and the expression of confidence which you repose by selecting me as your candidate for governor. I accept this trust, and shall expend every energy to the utmost of my ability toward assisting in carrying the Republican banner to victory. With a united party, aggressive and constant devotion in behalf of our cause, we have every reason to feel confident that on the 7th day of November next, at the close of the polls, the the Republican ticket from top to bottom, as nominated in this convention, will be triumphant.

This is a Republican year. The voters of the United States look to the Republican party for a constructive policy, for such action as will promote the progress and prosperity of the whole people. This is but natural. After nearly four years of Democratic administration the Democrats have been found wanting in statesmanship, in stability and in vision and American citizens throughout this land feel humiliated at the results caused by the vacillating, unstable, changeable peace-at-any-price policy of the Democrats. There has been so little respect in foreign lands for the rights of American citizens. The present chief executive of the nation has been on all sides of all questions, and while the people might be informed as to his policy of today, they would be perfectly safe to assume that his policy of tomorrow would be the reverse. Vacillation and uncertainty in the policies of government are calculated to create distrust, and distrust means industrial depression. No Nation can prosper without absolute confidence in the stability of the administration of the government. Here in this state we have had nearly five years of Democratic rule. The people are tired and restless of the do-nothing policy of Governor McDonald. During these five years not one sentence of constructive legislation has been proposed by your chief executive. Under the constitution of this state the legislature and the executive are constituted as the law making body of the state, the accepted theory being that there should be co-operation and consultation between the executive and the legislature. Yet during these five years not one ounce of the spirit of co-operation has been exhibited by the chief executive of this state. The policy of Governor McDonald has been to shirk and shrink every responsibility. He has been content to draw his salary and sit back on his dignity, finding fault with that which others have done and to exercise his prerogative of the veto.

My friends, no progress can be made, no new development can be expected, either in government or industry, except by and through a constructive policy. It is only through a constructive policy, it is only through this sort of a policy that mistakes are ascertained. Mistakes we have made in the past and mistakes can only be rectified through

## NEGLIGENCE DEMOCRATS

The democratic administration has been scandalously negligent in the supervision of our state banking institutions and in some cases they have not failed to see that the law was observed but have actually aided in an attempt to bolster up unworthy institutions at the expense of the depositors. In Las Cruces the citizens of Dona Ana county were told by Democratic officials that the First State bank was solvent. They were told this in the face of the fact that the governor's traveling auditor's force well knew that the bank was hopelessly insolvent and the treasurer of the Agricultural college was pouring in state money with one hand and drawing overdrafts with the other. Up to the present time there is still \$78,000 property of the Agricultural college, which as yet has not been recovered and we await with patience, and I hope, a pardonable degree of interest for some defense of these methods pursued by the Democratic administration of this state.

The time for political banks has long passed and even though such banks may be substantial contributors to the campaign funds of a political party no party can continue to command the confidence of its people who will pay political debts with the people's money.

## CATTLE AND SHEEP

Under the Republican administration for the past 20 years the administration of the cattle and sheep sanitary boards were absolutely non-partisan. They were regarded as dealing with industrial interests to the prosperity of the state.

Under the Democratic administration the only thing that has been done is to have a knowledge of the industries affected. For years under Republican administration the cattle sanitary board was the head of that sheep sanitary board of this state. He was a practical man, well versed in the business of cattle raising. The leading sheep raisers of the state were selected as members of the sheep sanitary board, to administer the affairs relating to the sheep industry and the Hon. Solomon Luna, who was the leading sheep raiser of New Mexico on account of his peculiar fitness and knowledge of that industry was the chairman of the sheep sanitary board. Under the Democratic administration Governor McDonald has seen fit to retain for all practical purposes for the supervisory authority of the sheep industry of this state a man wholly untrained in the sheep industry. There can be no defense of this action except the payment of a political debt at the expense of the sheep raisers of New Mexico, and one of the first acts that Governor McDonald did, after assuming the office of governor, was to request the resignation of Hon. Solomon Luna as the head of that sheep sanitary board. As to the cattle sanitary board we have no criticism to make. We may assume, however, that Governor McDonald is a practical cattle raiser and that in maintaining the high standard of efficiency with reference to the cattle sanitary board, he did not forget his own personal welfare.

## FOR COUNTY SUPER-INTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

Mrs. W. L. Gumm Announces Candidacy for Office of County Superintendent of Schools

### HAS A KNOWLEDGE OF CONDITIONS IN EACH DISTRICT

In another column will be found the announcement of Mrs. W. L. Gumm as a candidate for the office of Superintendent of Lincoln County. Mrs. Gumm received her schooling in the public schools of St Louis and Kansas City, Mo., graduating from the Central High School of the latter place and later taking a post graduate course in professional work at the New Mexico State Normal at Silver City.

For eight years she taught in the graded schools of Kansas City and since coming to Lincoln County, in 1894, has been actively interested in the county schools, teaching at first near Angus on her father's ranch, then teaching three years at White Oaks, three years in Lincoln and four years in Carrizozo.

She has served four years as a member of the county board of examiners and two years as president of the county teachers' association.

Mrs. Gumm has been a county school superintendent and she attended every important educational meeting in the state and is not honored with the

Educational Council, president of the county, president's section of the New Educational Association, president of the Women's Knife and Fork Club—all state organizations.

During the time Mrs. Gumm has been superintendent the schools have grown from 40 rooms in 1911 taught by teachers of whom 13 held 1st grade or better certificates, 11 held second grade, 6 third grade and 10 permits to 70 rooms in 1916, taught by teachers of whom 57 hold 1st grade or better certificates, 9 holding second grade, 3 third grade and no permits.

Recognizing the power of strong, well qualified teachers, it has been Mrs. Gumm's constant aim to have experienced teachers in each room especially with the primary classes, that the children might start correctly in their studies, making sure of a strong foundation.

In these years twenty new buildings have been built, some in new districts and some to replace old school house. Four have been remodeled to meet modern ideas of lighting and school needs, and ten have been thoroughly repaired.

With a thorough knowledge of the conditions of each school district of this county, her acquaintance with the pupils, teachers and patrons and familiarity with school laws and customs, Mrs. Gumm feels she can give the county even better supervision for the coming two years than ever before and is asking for reelection solely on her record as an official.

## SENITORAL NOMINEE

James V. Tully's record was fully commended by his unanimous nomination for State Senator from the fifteenth senatorial district, comprising the counties of Otero, Lincoln, Socorro and Torrance, when the republicans considered his candidacy at their convention in the Capital City last week. It was fully understood that Lincoln County should be honored with the nominee this time, and the promise was made good, and not only was this county awarded an especial distinction by this choice, but a man was nominated who stands pre-eminently fitted for this responsible office—one of the most responsible in the gift of the people. As was mentioned in a previous issue, upon the occasion of Mr. Tully's announcement, he has had previous experience in the New Mexico Legislature, having served a term in the lower house of that body. Furthermore, he is a successful man, an educated citizen, and one with extreme popularity among all classes of the people of the County. He is a man of ability and genuine statesmanship, and if his election follows this strong commendation afforded him by the state convention, he will be ever on the alert to champion the cause of this section of the great state in particular and New Mexico in general. In Mr. Tully we have a successful combination of stockman, farmer, merchant and statesman. The people recognize his ability and will no doubt cast their vote in his behalf.

## WATSON AND BLANCHARD ENTER RACE

Dr. Watson Throws Hat in Ring for Treasurer Nomination While Mr. Blanchard Asks to be Sheriff Nominee

### "I AM IN THE RACE TO THE FINISH" SAYS BLANCHARD

Phil. Blanchard, who makes official announcement of his candidacy for the office of sheriff in this issue of the Outlook, needs no recommendation to those who know him, and are thoroughly acquainted with his principle of life and his substantiality as a citizen of this county. Mr. Blanchard was born in the state of Louisiana, but came to New Mexico with his parents when twelve years of age, and has resided here in Lincoln County for thirty-three years. He has been engaged in the business of cattle and sheep raising since 1886, at which business he has made a pronounced success. Mr. Blanchard has never asked for an office before, having preferred the private life, but his circle of friends knows no limit, and he stands pre-eminently fitted to combat all violators of the law of the commonwealth with a strong and unflinching hand. He is a brother of Hon. W. E. Blanchard who served in the first New Mexico legislature, has high ideals of civic control and principles which stand for order and justice to all people. We commend him to the voters without any reservation. When interviewed by the Outlook man and asked about the reports circulated that he had withdrawn from the race, Mr. Blanchard said, "I am in the race for sheriff of this county and have had no intention of making a withdrawal as has been rumored. This report was no doubt started by certain of my enemies to create a false impression on the public. I will stay in the campaign to the end. I leave the rest with my friends, the voters of Lincoln County."

## DR. WATSON FOR TREASURER

Dr. T. W. Watson is announcing in this issue for re-election to the office of treasurer which office he has held with rare credit for two terms. As was shown in a recent issue, through the publication of the state record as to percentage of taxes collected in the various counties, he has kept Lincoln County at the head of the list for a number of years past. Dr. Watson took up his residence at Lincoln a number of years ago where he was a practicing physician for about eight years. Although a practicing physician and registered druggist he has devoted his entire time to the duties of his office since his first election, and his careful attention has produced a record for efficiency of which the citizens of this county may well be proud. Moreover, Dr. Watson is a progressive booster of this county and was among the first to establish a substantial residence in Carrizozo. He stands for community betterment in every form and always accords generous support to all means of progress. He stands solely upon his record in office as a basis for investigation by the voters who will award the nomination for another term at the republican nominating convention.

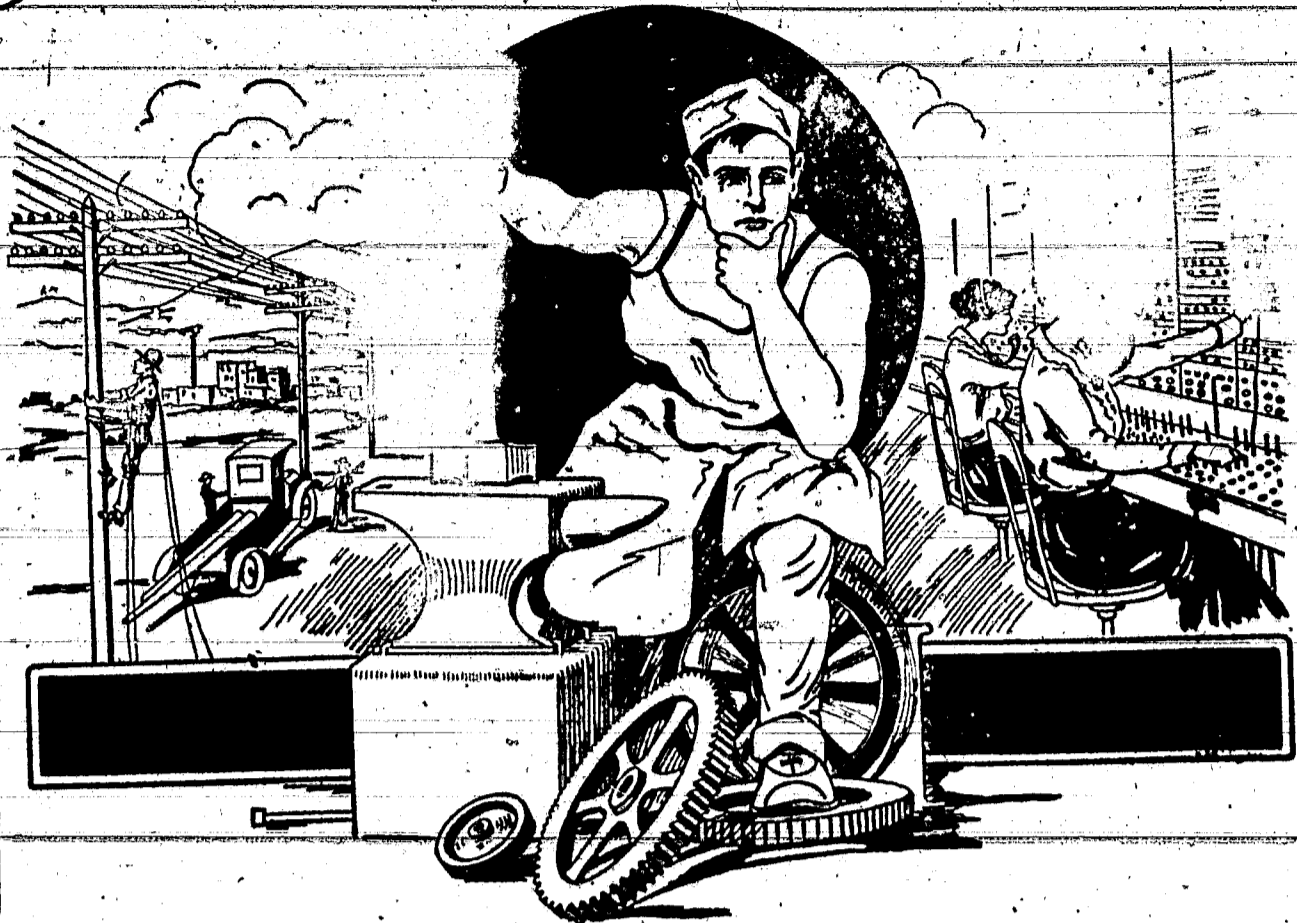

has as rich soil as the sun ever shone on. Large areas of that land is water logged. It is deteriorating day by day. It is in need of drainage and a proper system of irrigation. It needs the aid of capital expended under the supervision of competent and expert minds. It needs the aid of the state in providing adequate and proper legislation which will, with the aid and encouragement of the state authorities, reclaim this great valley and make it an asset of the state to the extent of millions of dollars, not only in taxable value, but in annual production; and thereby substitute prosperity in lieu of poverty.

**LACK OF HARMONY**

One of the great obstacles of a commensurate industrial growth in keeping with our valuable resources and possibilities is the lack of harmonious action throughout the whole state. We lean too much towards sectionalism, the north and the south, and the east and the west do not present a united front. We have need of providing such legislation as will encourage the mobilization of the resources over the whole state of New Mexico in the shape of an annual exhibition. To that end the north, the east, the south and the west must all be reckoned with and encouraged in such a manner and by such means as will make it possible to have a united spirit in behalf of industrial growth and a greater New Mexico.

If I am elected governor, it shall be my purpose to increase the efficiency of our state institutions. The present system is top heavy. It is one that makes possible the practice of peanut politics.

**TO BETTER CITIZENSHIP**

If I am elected governor it shall be my purpose to do all within my power to elevate the standard of citizenship. Abraham Lincoln once said that a Republic spelled opportunity. I shall favor the granting of further opportunity to the youth of this state, whereby every girl, whether poor or rich, influential or unimportant, shall have an equal chance to obtain at least an education which will benefit them in after life and equip each one as an American citizen in every sense that the word implies. I would favor a plan whereby the young men of New Mexico should gain a proper training for the defence of our country. With the general movement for preparedness we should be ready to lead among the states in our share of the work. Such preparation would be beneficial to our young men in after life and would place us in a proper relation with our Federal government.

**FARMING INTERESTS**

Our agricultural interests should be encouraged. No county should be without a county agricultural agent. The state should see to it that this is done and that the science of proper cultivation and farming are made available to the farmers of the state.

**GOOD ROADS**

We should have good roads and more of them. We cannot expect to construct boulevards within the immediate future, but our state owes it to every county to have such road facilities as will permit citizens to travel and transact business without undue hardships. One flagrant case in point is the county of San Juan. One of the richest counties in natural resources, more water than any other county, and as good land as the sun ever shone on, her citizens are compelled on account of lack of road facilities to do nearly all their business with the state of Colorado. This condition of affairs must be rectified, else the state is not doing its duty to its citizens. The road laws, as they stand, need modification. There is a lack of system, conflict of authority, lack of harmony in their administration, a lack of proper cooperation with the direct re-

NEWS TO DATE IN PARAGRAPHS

CAUGHT FROM THE NETWORK OF WIRES ROUND ABOUT THE WORLD.

DURING THE PAST WEEK

RECORD OF IMPORTANT EVENTS CONDENSED FOR BUSY PEOPLE.

Western Newspaper Union News Service.

ABOUT THE WAR

The Deutschland has reached her home port.

Weather hampers efforts of Italians in the Dolomites.

Dispatches from Geneva, Switzerland, say the appearance of English Zeppelins is causing much anxiety in Germany.

The sinking of the Italian steamer Erik, of 885 tons gross, and the Italian sailing vessel Dea of 167 tons gross, is announced.

Passage of Wami river, an important strategic feat, reported by Gen. Smuts from the British front in German East Africa.

Two British light cruisers sunk by German submarines in an encounter in the North sea, London admitting the loss, but claiming that at least one submarine was sent down also.

The Turkish attempt to encircle the left flank of the Russian Caucasian army appears to have received a crushing blow from the troops of Grand Duke Nicholas in the region of Lake Van.

The Twenty-second battalion, Sonora infantry, was practically annihilated after it had been ambushed by Yaquis near Batamonte; in the Alamos district, according to reports brought to Douglas, Ariz., by arrivals from Sahuaripa, 250 miles south of the frontier.

The British and French, striking simultaneously, have made substantial advances on the Somme front. The British report a 300-yard advance south of Thiepval and the capture of many prisoners, while Maurepas has fallen to the French, who have pushed forward more than 200 yards beyond the town on a front of a mile and a quarter.

The Serbians Friday made appreciable progress on the left wing of the Saloniki front and have taken several hundred prisoners, according to the official statement issued by Paris war office. German assaults at St. Mihiel, on the Somme front, repulsed, Maurepas captured by French. British lines advance several hundred yards on the Somme front.

WESTERN

A committee of women who voted in 1872 participated in the reception to Charles E. Hughes at Laramie, Wyo.

Twelve persons were injured, one perhaps fatally, when a large oil tank belonging to the Standard Oil Company exploded at Charles City Ia.

New Mexico Republicans nominated H. O. Bursum for governor and Frank A. Hubbel for U. S. Senator. Congressman B. C. Hernandez was re-nominated.

Capt. Edgar J. Sprattling of Company E, Fifth regiment, National Guard of Georgia, was shot and killed in his tent at the state mobilization camp near Macon, Ga., by Mrs. H. C. Adams of Atlanta.

Archbishop John Lancaster Spalding, noted prelate of the Catholic church in Illinois and a resident of Peoria continuously since 1877, when he was elected bishop of the newly created Peoria diocese, is dead.

Plans for the submission of proposed amendments to the constitution providing for state-wide prohibition and votes for women, part of the Republican platform, were adopted at Santa Fe, N. M., by the party's state convention.

WASHINGTON

Senator Hitchcock proposed a tax on news print paper sold for more than \$45 a ton.

Since the establishment nearly two years ago, the bureau of war risk insurance has brought a net profit to the Treasury Department of \$2,237,859.

The House passed bills permitting use of special stamp cancelling dies at Springfield, Ill., and Gulfport, Miss., postoffices to commemorate local celebrations.

Secretary Lansing will attend the first meeting of the American-Mexican commission to adjust border difficulties which will be held in New York on Sept. 4

FOREIGN

The execution of a woman as a spy is reported in a Havas dispatch from Marseilles.

The Danish landsting has rejected the proposal to sell the Danish West Indies to the United States.

Germany's sugar production this year will exceed that of 1915, according to statistics now available, by about 300,000 tons.

Both Houses of Parliament adjourned until Oct. 10, after adopting a bill extending the present parliament another seven months.

King Ludwig III of Bavaria has been stricken with apoplexy and his condition is grave, according to a report from Switzerland.

Parliament has unanimously approved the appointment by President Li Yuan Hung of Tuan Chi Jul as permanent premier of the Chinese republic.

A Japanese physician by the name of Nodko claims to have brought about the death of Villa by slow poison given under the guise of medical treatment, according to the Chihyushua local papers.

The Austrians, according to a special dispatch from Innsbruck, have found the famous treasures of the Detchani monastery, near Cetinje, Montenegro, which the monks had buried upon the approach of the invaders.

Eugene Brieux, member of the Academy of France, with a view to encouraging marriage after the war, urges the establishment throughout France of official matrimonial bureaus under the direction of the mayors of towns and villages.

Most of the buildings at Berlin were decked with flags in celebration of the return of the merchant submarine Deutschland. The newspapers give the exploit of Capt. Koenig the prominent place in their editorial comments and discuss the possibility of the empire getting certain much needed materials through merchant submarines. Capt. Koenig and his crew have been feted as heroes. The press gives liberal praise to the fair and neutral conduct of the United States government.

GERMANY AND ITALY AT WAR

ANOMALOUS SITUATION ENDS WITH DECLARATION TRANSMITTED THROUGH SWISS.

FIGHTING ON ALL LINES

PARIS ADMITS BULGARS HAVE TAKEN ALL BUT ONE OF FORTS AT KAVALA.

Western Newspaper Union News Service.

London, Aug. 28.—Germany and Italy are at war. Italy has ended the anomalous situation that has existed for months by declaring that from Monday she considers herself the enemy of her former ally. Heavy fighting continues between entente and Teutonic allies in the Macedonian theater from the region of Lake Ochrida eastward to Kavala. Berlin reports that Bulgarian forces operating to the west of Lake Ochrida have captured Mallik in Albania and that along the Struma King Ferdinand's men are approaching the mouth of the river. Paris admits the Bulgars have taken all except one of the forts at Kavala, on the Aegean, but says they have come under the fire of British warships.

Paris says also that along the Struma, French artillery is bombarding the enemy, while west of the Vardar and near Lake Ostrovo the Serbs have put down vigorous attacks by the Bulgars.

German attacks in the Thlaumont and Fleury sectors repulsed, says Paris.

Petrograd gives details of successful operations on the Stokhod. Berlin reports defeat of Russian attempts to cross the Dvina river.

London reports capture of several hundred yards of a German trench north of Bazentin le Petit and gains near Ghinchy.

Hard fighting in progress between Turks and Russians in Caucasus sector near Diarbekr.

UNIONS PREPARE FOR BREAK.

Railroad Presidents Standing Pat in Refusal of Brotherhood Demands.

Washington, Aug. 28.—While 150 brotherhood leaders were leaving Washington last night to prepare for the organization of the impending general railroad strike, President Wilson, facing a rejection of his demands by the railroads, postponed the show-down between the carriers and the unions until today. The departing district chairmen of the brotherhoods carried with them the plans for putting the strike into effect and left with the union presidents power of attorney to order the walkout unless the railroads accept substantially the settlement plan proposed by President Wilson.

Advised that there was no hope of dissuading the railroads from their rejection of his demands, the President turned to Congress for legislation designed to make the eight-hour day and a wage advance palatable to the carriers.

representatives of the people. These laws need modifying. They were modified at the last legislature and it was generally understood that Governor McDonald had agreed to sign the bill. The bill passed during the latter days and the pocket veto was taken advantage of by Governor McDonald, presumably in the interest of increasing Democratic patronage throughout the state.

I regard the judicial building of Tohache as a profitable investment and road building in New Mexico will be fostered and encouraged by a Republican administration.

### APPROPRIATIONS

Our system of appropriations by the legislature is unscientific. It is a haphazard way of doing business. We should have a budget system. Competent authority should investigate necessity prior to consideration of appropriations. I am also a believer in the short ballot. I believe in the short ballot because it fixes responsibility. These matters, however, would require constitutional amendments. I shall favor such amendments.

The question of taxation is one that is always with us. It is a very complicated question. Some improvements were made during the last session of the legislature. We have in this state a public spirited tax association. It shall be my desire to promote equality and efficiency with reference to taxation and to that end I shall be glad at all times to advise and consult not only with the taxpayers' association, but all others who may be sufficiently interested to lend advice in the premises.

If I am elected governor I shall act at all times for that which I believe to be right in accordance with the best judgment that the Almighty has endowed me with. I shall undertake to be open and frank, and assume responsibility. I shall undertake at proper times to suggest to the legislature in definite form, such policies with reference to legislation which I deem best for the welfare of the state. I shall always feel that it is my duty to cooperate with the chosen representatives of the people. I shall always be glad to advise with any citizens who have the interest and welfare of the state at heart with reference to public questions, without regard to race or political creed, and any reputable citizen, whether he be rich or poor, will always be welcome at the governor's office.
