### ROLLAND NOMINATED FOR TREASURER

The Lincoln County Republican Convention was held at Lincoln on Thesday of this week, and this important political gathering attracted a large number of participants and spectators to the quaint ex-county seat in the mountains. The convention was called to order after the usual preliminary flourishes and a permanent organization was effected after some time was consumed in the appointment and meeting of committees and other business of like nature. Some very active contests were staged throughout the course of the convention, but actual balloting on candidates did not begin until late in the day. In fact, it was not until eight until any nominations were effected, and some candidates were evenly enough matched with their respective followings that many ballots were required for nomination. The final outcome, however, was the following ticket:

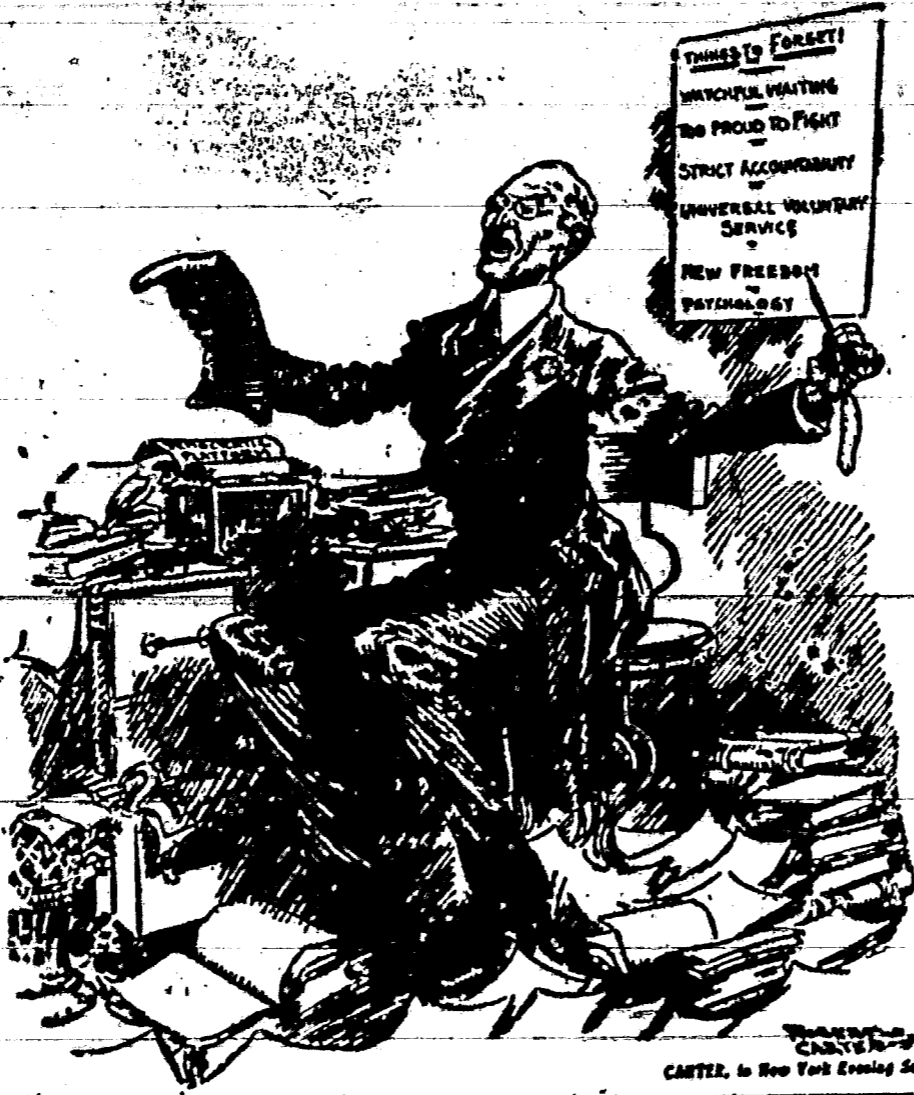
Just five weeks remain for campaigning before election day and these candidates are busy in the field, and will make a special effort to see each voter in his own behalf. They will present their claims with vigor.

The ticket from top to bottom is very strong and will no doubt meet with hearty approval by the voters.

During the course of the assembly, rousing speeches were made by J. Wight Giddings of Santa Fe, Seth F. Crews of Oscura and others. Enthusiasm was evident everywhere and much rousing applause according to the local champions of the Grand Old Party.

## GOV. KNEW BANK WAS INSOLVENT

**Did Nothing to Protect the Poor Widows and Orphans Who Were Depositors in State Bank at Las Cruces.**

### MANY POOR PEOPLE LOST LIFE SAVINGS

On January 30, 1914, Gov. Wm. C. McDonald, and his traveling auditor and bank examiner, Howell Ernest, went to Las Cruces, called there by accurate information which they had, that the First State Bank was in a failing condition.

They held a meeting with the Directors of the bank. They found the bank's capital was impaired to the extent of 15 per cent. They knew the bank had nearly 600 depositors, many poor people among them and in many cases the savings of a lifetime deposited in this bank. They knew that the controlling officer of the bank, one Smith, had wrecked other banks and that he was suspected of looting this one. They knew that state funds, to the extent of over 75,000 were deposited in the bank.

Gov. McDonald and Howell Ernest said nothing publicly. They did nothing publicly or privately to warn the depositors or to protect the state fund. They went back to Santa Fe and kept still—absolutely still, for nearly one year, or until December 8, 1914 when the bank blew up and the little fortunes of the depositors fell in ruin.

Why did William C. McDonald Gov. of the state, executive officer in charge of the banking department, and ex-officio regent of the state agricultural college whose funds were involved, and in direct authority over the bank examiner—why did not Gov. McDonald act to protect the widows and orphans, the life-time savings, the business interests involved in that rotten bank? Why did McDonald keep still?

**THE ANSWER TO THAT QUESTION IS THE MAIN ISSUE IN THIS CAMPAIGN IN WHICH McDONALD,** under the title of a candidate for Lieutenant governor, really is running to succeed himself in office. Mr. Lincoln county voter who voted for Gov. McDonald in 1911 are you going to vote for him in 1916 for Lieutenant Governor after being so familiar with his record as chief executive of this state?

### OFFERS A DENIAL

Governor McDonald denies that he asked Solomon Luna to resign from the Sheep sanitary board, where Mr. Luna had served with such great benefit to the wool growers of this state for many years. Mr. Luna, unfortunately for New Mexico, is dead. He cannot answer. It is McDonald's way to deny conversations held without witnesses and with dead men, but McDonald cannot deny that he has forced into the executive office of the sheep sanitary board, as secretary, a deserving young democrat, who is a lawyer by profession and who knows no more about the sheep business than McDonald knows about efficient government. No doubt this young man deserves some reward for serving the democratic party, and rewards for democratic political workers come high when paid at the expense of New Mexico's chief industry.

Hipólito Villa, hermano de Francisco Villa, y su agente financiero en los días en que Juárez era una ciudad abierta, fue soltado de la custodia federal y dejado en libertad. Atacando la prisión, cincuenta hombres armados lincharon a Bert Dudley, vengando la muerte brutal del Señor y la Señora Henry Miller, por la cual le condenaron en Olathe, Kans. En su rumbo para atender al funeral de su íntimo amigo, Nicholas Entringer, en St. Cloud, Daniel Kempf, de 92 años de edad, uno de los primeros habitantes del condado de Fond du Lac, Wis., fué golpeado e instantáneamente matado por un tren de mercancías.

Acercas de la guerra.

Algunas noticias no oficiales dicen que se ha establecido un gobierno revolucionario en la isla de Creta. Berlín estima que los ejércitos de los aliados en el Somme han perdido 600,000 en matados, heridos y prisioneros a resultas de su ofensiva en ese frente. La pelea sangrienta está continuando en Dobrudja, donde los ejércitos del centro están acometiendo sin cesar contra posiciones fuertemente fortificadas de los de Rusia y Rumania. Noventa mil Alemanes bajo el comando personal del mariscal de campo Von Hindenberg han sido cortados a pedazos por los Franceses en el Somme, según dice un reporte al periódico de París, La Liberté. Los Rusos son matados por millares atacando en formación compacta en Volhynia, donde fueron repulsados todos sus asaltos, según dice un reporte de Berlín. Los Alemanes han tomado la ofensiva al norte del río Stokhod mas son repulsados en todas partes por los Rusos, anuncia Petrograd.

Sport.

El primer accidente de la estación de pelota en Denver ha golpeado a un muchacho de la escuela superior del lado sud. Jack Salisbury está llevando el brazo en una banda a resultas de una de las primeras arboledas de la partida. Su brazo fué dislocado y es posible que esté fuera del juego durante el entero año.

Washington.

Una proposición por los ferrocarriles del oeste para poner jergones de paja en los carros de uno y dos pisos para animales y cobrar \$1 y \$2 respectivamente en el tráfico del sudoeste fué suspendida por la comisión de comercio interesado hasta el 20 de enero. El cónsul general Skinner en Londres notificó el departamento de estado que dos marinos americanos: William Wooton, de Harrison, N. J., y Bernard Sweeney de Bayonne, N. J., fueron salvados en el hundimiento del buque inglés Strathtay, torpedeado por un submarino el 6 de septiembre en la Mancha.

Extranjeros.

La esposa del Dr. Paul Samuel Reinsch, ministro de los Estados Unidos a China, dio luz a un hijo, en Peking. Las noticias de Constantinopla, sico la Overace News Agency, hablan de una insubordinación entre las tropas del ejército ruso del Caucaso debido a una carencia de viveres. Se presentó un veredicto de muerte accidental por el jurado de médico del crimen en Quebec en la investigación de la pérdida de trece vidas en el fracaso de la luz central del puente de Quebec el 11 de septiembre.

La crisis de ferrocarriles en Londres resultando de la demanda de hombres para un aumento de 10 shelines por semana en sus sueldos ha sido arreglada sobre la base de doblar la bonificación de guerra. Esto es un compromiso, dando a los hombres la mitad de los 10 shelines demandados.

General.

El tumulto se renovó el miércoles por la noche en conexión con la huelga de los obreros de tranvías de Nueva York, después de que los estrucos del alcalde Mitchell y otros hubieron sido vanos en efectuar un compromiso. Varas centenares de obreros que atacaron cuatro carros de la superficie entraron en una pelea corrida con reservas de policía, durante la cual varias personas, incluyendo a una mujer, fueron heridas. Se hicieron muchos arrestos.

Diez millas y media del nuevo camino siguiendo el curso del río de San Miguel, a partir de Naturita, han sido completadas. La Asociación Co-operativa de Dearfield, cerca de Wiggins, ha empleado a treinta hombres en los trabajos de camino. Dos mil quinientos pesos se gastarán por la comisión de caminos de estado sobre la vía de Omaha-Lincoln-Denver cerca de Fort Morgan.

La piedra de Turkey Creek probablemente será el material usado en la construcción de la nueva alcaldía y auditorium de Pueblo.

La compra de tungsteno en Boulder de nuevo está entrando en un período de gran actividad. Muchos mineros rehusan \$20 por unidad.

El parque nacional de Mesa Verde y las habitaciones en cuevas serán uno de los rasgos de vistas cinematográficas por todos los Estados Unidos este invierno.

Varios miembros del gabinete del presidente Wilson y otros jefes del partido democrático vendrán a Denver en octubre a prestar su concurso en la campaña presidencial.

Denver es la primera ciudad de América a donde se haya exportado el 'cyanocuprol', una nueva preparación para el tratamiento de la tuberculosis descubierta por el Dr. Koga del Japón.

La Junta de la ciudad de Pueblo formalmente ha aprobado los planes y especificaciones propuestos para la erección de la nueva casa de ayuntamiento y auditorium en Pueblo.

El campamento de Stevens, (ahora llamado Tungsteno), en el condado de Boulder, va a tener una oficina de correos. Será administrada por dicha oficina la Señorita Myrtle Hinds.

El Señor William A. Chamberlain, de 58 años de edad, murió en Chama, N. M., habia sido uno de los residentes de Denver desde el año 1851. Estaba interesado en los negocios mineros.

La compañía de Ophir Gold Mines y de Reducción presentó sus documentos de incorporación. El capital de acciones es de \$250,000. Las operaciones se conducirán en el condado de San Miguel.

El regimiento menor de las escuelas superiores de Denver se compondrá de 818 muchachos, según reportes presentados a la junta de escuelas por los principales de las cinco escuelas superiores de Denver.

Arthur F. Brown de Berthoud ha comprado el rancho de Antelope Springs al este de Wellington. La superficie consiste en 640 acres de tierra no irrigada. La suma interesada es de \$11,000, ó sea \$17.50 por acre.

Parte de una propiedad cuya cesión se está haciendo en Indianapolis está aguardando por la Señora Nora Naughton y Bridget, ó Delia, Naughton, a quienes están procurando encontrar los administradores de dicha propiedad.

Mientras W. H. George, que hizo una confesión voluntaria en Cheyenne de haber dado un tiro a su novia, la Señorita Evelyn Rodgers de Denver, todavía mantenía la historia de su hecho en Littleton, a donde le habían llevado, la Señorita Rodgers, en persona, visitaba al jefe de policía en Denver asegurándole que ella no era muerta.

La pospuesta venta del ferrocarril de la compañía de Denver, Larimer & Noroeste bajo procesos de ejecución hipotecaria ha sido fijada al 11 de octubre.

El segundo caso de muerte que resultó de la demolición de parte del stadium erigido para la pelea de Welsh, White en Colorado Springs se anunció cuando se ahogó Tom Allen, de 50 años, portero del edificio del Banco de ahorros de Colorado.

La comisión de elecciones de Denver parcialmente completó su obra de totalisar votos para los candidatos a la nominación democrática. El total indica ya que Benjamin C. Hilliard venció a H. B. Teller para la nominación de miembro del congreso por una mayoría de 76.

Otra vez el amor se burló de los abogados y procesos de manutención separada en la corte de distrito en Denver cuando la Señora Sarah Hayes Savage acompañó a su marido, el Señor John A. Deming ahora posee el mayor auditorium del estado que haya sido construido por intereses privados.

Roswell ha virtualmente completado un fondo de \$12,000 para hacer la publicidad del clima en el este.

La casa de la Señora Jennie Gallegos, de Albuquerque, fué destruida por un incendio, con todo su contenido.

Una discusión política fué uno de los acontecimientos del día de apertura de la feria de estado en Albuquerque.

El Señor y la Señora Geo. Price Watkins, en el rancho de Hollywood, cerca de Deming, celebraron sus bodas de plata.

Ya ha sido reguajto el terreno para los cimientos de la nueva escuela superior en Magdalena. El edificio costará \$22,000.

Tuscado, un indio de los Navajos, fué matado cerca del paradero de Defiance, habiéndole un tren abatido y pasado por encima.

La silla del General Eugene A. Carr, usada durante su carrera militar, ha sido presentada a la sociedad histórica del estado.

Geo. Anderson, quien vivía al sudoeste de Tucumcari, recibió un tiro mortal de su cuñado, Lee Anderson, según confesión hecha por éste.

Según los reportes recibidos en Santa Fe, los ganaderos del valle de Mesilla aboga en interés en el cultivo de la remolacha de azúcar.

Los comerciantes de Roswell han topiado las medidas necesarias para un voto sobre una emisión de bonos de \$100,000 para buenos caminos en el condado de Chaves.

Louis Carreto, acusado de seducción en Gallup, fué arrestado en Albuquerque por el jefe de policía J. R. Galusha y el alguacil de la ciudad Chris Christian de Gallup.

Una petición en bancarria voluntaria fué presentada en corte federal por Austin Hugh Ullin de Clovis, que declara ser jornalero, siendo su débito de \$463.81 y su crédito de \$82.

Una queja legal por \$5,000 en un caso de injurias personales fué presentada en la corte federal en Santa Fe por R. T. Holton, del condado de Curry, en contra de John N. Janes.

El mes de agosto salvó la situación para las cosechas de Nuevo Mexico, según los reportes climatológicos del pasado mes presentados por la oficina de meteorología de los Estados Unidos.

"Se necesita la centralización de los intereses ganaderos en Nuevo Mexico," dice el senador H. F. Ranney de Lamoy, uno del consejo ejecutivo de la asociación de criadores de caballos y ganado de Nuevo Mexico.

W. O. Van Arsdale, de Wichita, Kas., estuvo a Clovis unos días hace, y anunció que su compañía estaba sembrando 3,500 acres de trigo en su gran superficie, veinte y siete millas al noreste de Clovis.

RATON DOCTOR KILLED

HURRYING TO DENVER IN AUTO TO MEET FAMILY.

Crushed Body of Well-Known Specialist Found by Tourists on Road South of Pueblo, Colo.

Raton, N. M.—Dr. W. S. Connett, 45, of this city, a specialist in children's diseases, was killed almost instantly eighteen miles south of Pueblo, Colo., on the north and south highway when his touring car crashed from the road and turned turtle. Dr. Connett's body was found by tourists crushed beneath the engine shortly after the accident. Dr. Connett, alone, was driving toward Denver to meet his wife and daughter. The roadway is an almost perfect boulevard where the accident occurred and people who had passed him a few minutes before he turned over say that he was driving at a very moderate rate of speed. Dr. Connet was one of the most widely known physicians in New Mexico. He was a thirty-second degree Mason and stood high in his profession. He is survived by a widow and one daughter.

Geronimo Festival at Taos.

Taos—It is evident that this year Taos will celebrate its typical annual feast of San Geronimo as never before in the history of Taos. The business men and other residents of Taos have contributed very liberally so that the feast may be given all the importance possible, and that the visitors from the different parts of the union Sept. 30 will have a good time. The program will be as follows: Foot races and barrel races around the park, band concert, masquerade carnival, Indian dances, relay races by the Indians, chifonettes, pugilistic encounters, matachines by the Indians, the grandest Indian spectacle in America; horse races, 600 yards; broncho "busting," etc.

Tax Board Makes \$10,000,000 Raise.

Santa Fe—After a nine-day session the State Tax Commission has adjourned. The commission found \$304,690,372 of taxable property on the rolls. It is estimated that about \$10,000,000 in increases has been put on the rolls, bringing the assessable property to about \$315,000,000.

Scottish Rite Reunion at Santa Fe.

Santa Fe—The Twenty-second Reunion of the Scottish Rite bodies in this valley will be held Oct. 5, 6 and 7, at which time all of the Scottish Rite degrees up to and including the Thirty-second degree will be conferred in the well equipped Scottish Rite Cathedral in this city.

Of Interest to Women.

Santa Fe—Attorney General Frank W. Clancy ruled upon request of Mrs. Laura Wilson Johnson, of Palomas Hot Spring, Sierra county, that women are not eligible to any offices except those specifically enumerated in the state constitution: county school superintendent or school director.

Sugar Beet Acreage Signed Up.

Las Cruces—The result of over a month's steady work by public spirited citizens of the Mesilla Valley was brought to a whirlwind finish, when all of the necessary acreage to locate a sugar beet factory at Las Cruces had been signed up.

To Resume Surveys.

Santa Fe—United State Surveyors F. E. Joy and Basil C. Perkins have arrived to resume under the direction of Surveyor General Lucius Dills, the survey of the Pueblo grants, beginning with Tesuque, nine miles north of Santa Fe.

Three Arrested for Killing Brakeman.

Deming—Jose Murillo, Romulo Martinez and Paul Carrillo are under arrest charged with the murder of G. C. Stevenson, Southern Pacific brakeman, shot to death west of Wilma. Murillo and Martinez were captured at Gage and Carrillo was arrested at Separ. Carrillo speaks good English and tallies with Brakeman Wilson's description of the man who had no part in the attack. Carrillo's story does not agree with that told here by Brakeman Wilson before the coroner's jury. Carrillo declared the railroad men were the aggressors.

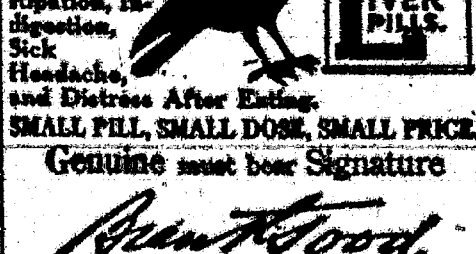

## WILSON'S PERU PROTEGE IS WORSE THAN HUERTA

Recognized Benavides as President After He Had Obtained Power in a Sister Republic by Treachery and Violence.

### ACT DOES NOT SQUARE WITH SMUG DICTUM IN HIS SPEECH

Latin American Diplomats Amazed When They Read the President's Explanation of His Mexican Policy—Informed Their Governments That Mr. Wilson's Personal Whims Doubtless Were to Be His Guides in Conducting This Government's Latin-American Policy.

Latin American diplomats are amazed at the statement in President Wilson's speech of acceptance: "So long as the power of recognition rests with me the Government of the United States will refuse to extend the hand of welcome to any one who obtains power in a sister republic by treachery and violence."

This is the President's explanation of his refusal to recognize Huerta and of his Mexican policy. Yet the records show that President Wilson has deliberately violated this dictum in several instances since the case of Huerta arose.

The most flagrant example was the President's recognition extended to Col. Benavides, head of the revolutionary government in Peru, in February, 1914. His Government was founded on assassination, established by assassination and had no vestige of constitutional authority back of it. It came into power on February 4, 1914, when Col. Benavides led the garrison troops against the national palace at Lima, imprisoned President Billinghurst and assassinated the Minister of War and all others who opposed the coup d'etat.

More flagrant than Mexico: Minister McMillin reported these facts fully to Washington and assumed that this Government would decline to sanction the newly established regime. The case was identical with the Huerta case in Mexico, except a much more flagrant violation of the spirit of popular government. Huerta had Madero and Vice-President Suarez imprisoned, but he became President of Mexico under provisions of the constitution providing for the succession of the Minister of Foreign Affairs upon the disability of the President. Huerta's accession to the Presidency was confirmed by the Mexican Congress.

Benavides came into power, simply by killing those who opposed him. His acts had no basis whatever in the constitution of his country and were not confirmed by the Peruvian Congress. His sole backing was a junta of conspirators who forced their will on the unapproving people by means of ready rifle bullets. Under these circumstances Minister McMillin naturally assumed that President Wilson would have nothing to do with Benavides and his junta. The President shortly before this had stated in a speech at Mobile, Ala.: "We must follow the course of high principle, not expediency, no matter what the pressure. To do otherwise would be untrue to ourselves."

Envoy Is Surprised.  
Mr. McMillin was therefore, mildly surprised when he was instructed by President Wilson to call on the newly established Benavides and graciously confer the recognition of the United States Government upon him.

In explaining this the President simply said that "expediency dictated the recognition of the revolutionary government of Peru." He told his advisers that he had not liked the personality of Billinghurst. He was chagrined also with the news that Billinghurst had intended to dissolve the Peruvian Congress, which the President said would have been an unconstitutional act.

Latin American diplomats at the time were astonished to learn of the President's action in Peru. They found that it was impossible to know where the President stood on any matter of principle, and informed their governments that the President's personal whims doubtless were to be his guidance in conducting this Government's Latin-American policy.

### Political Jottings

### "A DESERVING DEMOCRAT"

The democrats propose to make one of their main issues the taxation legislation which was enacted by the legislature of 1915. They

enter into this program facing the fact that the leading democrats in both houses of the legislature voted for the legislation and that the democratic governor approved it with his signature. They face the further fact that Governor McDonald forced upon his tax commission as its chief executive officer a hopeless incompetent, because he was "a deserving democrat". Watch for the record of "deserving democrats" under the McDonald administration. You will encounter an amazing bit of political history—history which has cost this state a lot of cash.

### THE McDONALD RECORD

Immediately after the democratic state convention and the nomination of E. C. de Baca of Las Vegas for governorship, democratic leaders announced that reports of Mr. De Baca's precarious health had been exaggerated, that he was not a sick man, and that he would make the campaign. The Governor by exercise of his considerable gift as a convention manipulator, forced his party to assume his defense. It is not a pleasant job and it is not surprising that hundreds of the ablest men in the democratic party are openly rebelling against the necessity that has been forced upon them.

Seasoned workers in the democratic ranks understand that with Governor McDonald the nominal candidate for lieutenant governor, and generally regarded as the actual candidate for governor, it will be necessary to defend the record of the disastrous Las Cruces bank failure in which literally hundreds of small depositors lost their savings, through the deliberate "carelessness" of the governor and his political banking department. No records have been lost in this miserable outrage. The facts are all available. They will be layed frankly and fully before the people in all their sordid detail.

Governor McDonald's unwilling defenders must explain the McDonald record in the county salary legislation and when the facts are made known, it will be no small undertaking. The Governor's record on highway work, the favoritism shown to one county as against another and to localities in given counties, will require some definite explaining. McDonald must explain why he vetoed a county road law which the people wanted, which his own party in the legislature demanded and which he himself had promised to support. He pocket voted it. He must tell the people why. The McDonald record in dealing with state lands in transactions between Governor McDonald and Mr. McDonald will have to be thoroughly explained. It is an interesting example of how the Governor in his zeal to serve his state, has been forced to "neglect" the interests of the foreign

stockholders of his cattle company.

These and a long list of other matters, almost equally serious have been written into the record of the McDonald administration. The Governor, his campaign managers, and the whole democratic state ticket on which he forced himself, must now unite in the task of defending the McDonald record.

Every voter will find that record of direct, personal interest to him. It should be studied in detail as chapter after chapter is laid before the people.

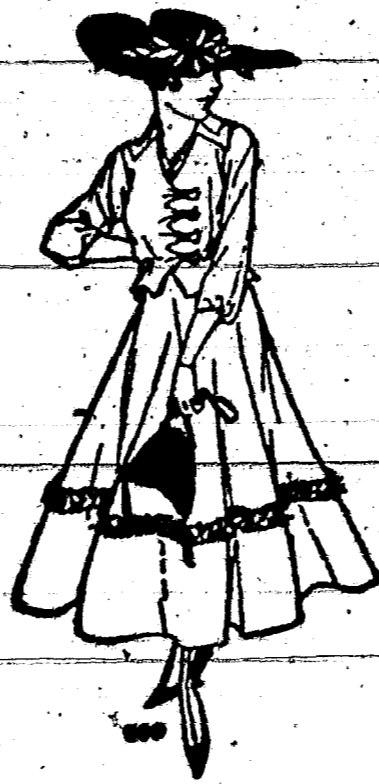

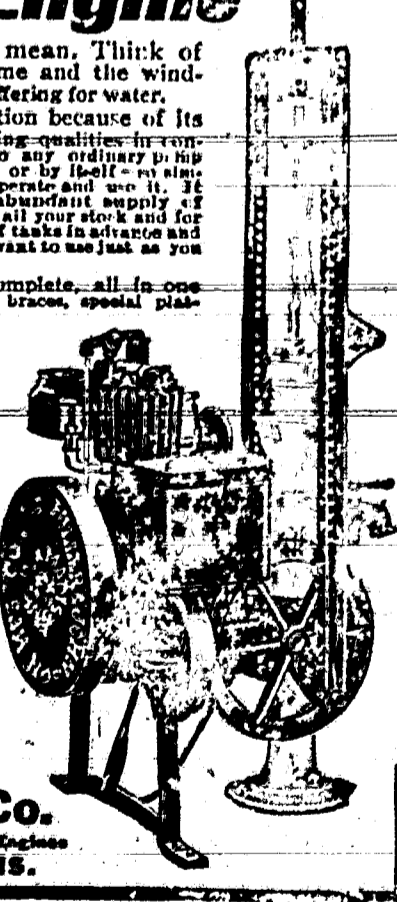

## REPUBLICANS IN CHEERFUL SPIRITS AFTER CAMPAIGN IN FOUR BIG COUNTIES

Albuquerque, N. M., Sept. 23.—The heads of the Republican state ticket, Frank A. Hubbell for the Senate, Ben C. Hernandez for Congress and H. O. Bursum for governor, reached Albuquerque Sunday night, after the first big round of their statewide campaign and are spending the week of the State Fair in this city, holding conferences on campaign detail and meeting the people. They were joined here Tuesday by W. E. Lindsey of Peralta, candidate for lieutenant governor, who has been making a notably successful campaign in the Pecos valley, by Robert P. Ervies, commissioner of public lands, by J. H. Wagner, candidate for state superintendent of public instruction, and others of the state ticket, and by the state chairman and almost all of the state committeemen and county chairmen.

An advisory conference is being held from day to day among the Republicans upon details of the campaign and the state chairman and the candidates have been making reports of progress.

People Want Republican Government. The heads of the ticket have covered San Juan, Taos, Mora and Guadalupe counties. They have been received everywhere with hearty welcome and cordial approval. Their meetings have been attended by great crowds and the people have shown in emphatic ways that New Mexico demands restoration of the Republican party in both state and national administrations.

"It may be said with some assurance that the Republican party of New Mexico is united as it has never been before," said Mr. Hubbell today in discussing the trip and the situation in the state. "All of the reports coming to headquarters are satisfactory and we have been deeply impressed, first by the unanimity of sentiment among Republicans and second by their activity in behalf of success for Hughes and Fairbank and for our state ticket. State committeemen, county chairmen, precinct chairmen, and the whole rank and file of our party are taking an active, working interest such as we have never known before at this early stage of a long campaign. In Taos, Mora and Guadalupe counties, where we have been for the past sixteen days, the people are with us. They are for our candidates individually, but more important than that, they are convinced that this nation needs a Republican president in the White House and a Republican Congress behind him. New Mexico is absolutely safe. I should say, for the national ticket by a great majority."

"I have been deeply impressed by the reception given to Mr. Bursum and Mr. Hernandez, my companions on this first campaign trip. The people welcome them both with an enthusiasm which is so genuine that it cannot be mistaken. Both will be elected and elected by convincing majorities. No campaign of mud and lies can change the sentiment of a people who know who and what they need and want."

Campaign Now Starts in Earnest. When they leave Albuquerque tomorrow the Republican candidates, thoroughly organized their plans, met and their field parties made up, will begin the campaign in earnest. They will branch out from Albuquerque into northern New Mexico, to the northern New Mexico fair at Raton, to the Cowboys' Reunion at Tucuman, to the Pecos valley and to southwest New Mexico. At the same time the Speakers' Bureau, under direction of Judge Reed Holloway, will get into active operation. Republican platform speakers of New Mexico have volunteered almost unanimously, for service in this campaign.

"I have seldom seen anything like the response to our call for speakers," said Judge Holloway today. We asked quite a number of men to speak in this campaign during the state convention period. They all consented. Recently I sent a letter to thirty men who have marked ability on the platform. Every one responded with his consent not only to speak, but to give his whole time to our disposal for the period of the campaign. We will be ready, therefore, on the first of next week, to formulate our speaking campaign for the whole of October, and to carry it through without a hitch. We shall be able to give the people of New Mexico a thorough speaking campaign."

Democrats Meet With Difficulties. Republican campaign managers here express considerable interest in the progress of the Democratic candidate thus far in their campaign. Reports, they say, show that Governor McDonald has met with a cool, if not a frigid reception in the Pecos valley, where he has been the past week with De Baca and Miguel A. Otero, who at this early stage in the campaign, has earned by the character of his speeches in the Pecos valley the sticking title of "Gills, the Mud stuck."

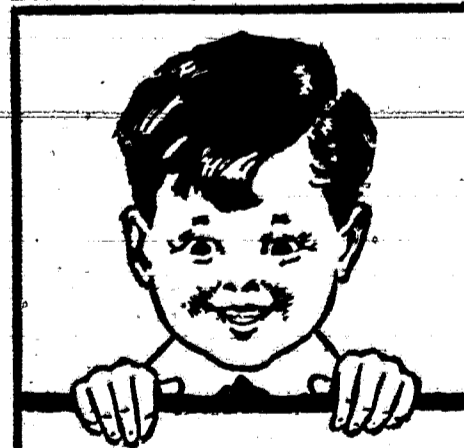

# ZEPPELINS SHOT DOWN IN FLAMES

TWO FLYERS DESTROYED IN NIGHT RAID ON LONDON—CREW OF ONE SLAIN.

## 30 KILLED, 116 INJURED

FRENCH DRIVE BACK GERMAN ASSAULTS NORTH OF SOMME.

Western Newspaper Union News Service.  
London, Sept. 26.—Of the twelve Zeppelins which invaded the British Isles Saturday night to deal death and destruction from the skies, two lay stark and black masses of steel and aluminum in a little village in Essex county.

One came down a flaming torch, while the second, disabled by gunfire, effected a landing, which saved the lives of the crew, who are prisoners in England. The crew of the first raider died in the consuming flames of their own ship.

The death and burning of the first Zeppelin was witnessed by tens of thousands of London residents, but the wounding and descent of the second raider was a matter of doubt until the official statements were given out.

Many aeroplanes were aloft and attacked the Zeppelins from all sides. The raiders took a heavy toll of lives before their destruction, twenty-eight persons being killed and ninety-nine wounded in the metropolitan district of London. Eleven women and children were killed. Two persons were killed, probably four, and seventeen wounded in the province. In numerous air battles, Berlin states, German pilots shot down twenty-four entente aeroplanes, the Germans losing six.

London.—German troops attacked French positions on the farm of L'Abbe wood, north of the Somme, but were repulsed, says the French official statement issued from Paris.

In Galicia a Russian attack on the upper Dniester resulted in a general engagement. North of Zborow attacked entered trenches of the Teutonic allies, but later, according to both Berlin and Vienna, were driven out, leaving 700 prisoners.

Petrograd, however, says that the Russians took prisoner 1,600 Austrians and Germans. In the Carpathians several positions have been retaken by the Teutonic allies.

British troops have crossed the Struma at three points and taken the town of Jenmita from the Bulgarians, while the Serbs have made additional progress northwest of Kamalkelan, and the French northwest of Florina. Sofia reports the capture by Bulgarians of a mountain crest south of Popla.

Violent Austrian attacks in the Carso region failed, according to Rome, but the Italian war office admits the blowing up of a part of Mount Cimone by an Austrian mine and the relinquishment of the position by the Italians. Vienna says that 427 prisoners fell into the hands of the Austrians as a result of this operation and that an entire Italian company was buried in the explosion.

British attacked strong Bulgarian forces north of Kopriva, in Greek Macedonia, says an official Paris statement. The Serbians made progress northwest of Kaimakalan and took some prisoners.

Northwest of Florina, French forces advanced and repulsed a Bulgarian attack on Hill 1550.

## WEALTH IN SMELTER GASES.

Expert Informs Engineers at Meeting in Globe, Arizona.

Phoenix, Ariz.—Two hundred members of the American Institute of Mining Engineers arrived in Phoenix, coming over the Apache trail via Roosevelt from Globe, where they visited the mines and plants of the Old Dominion Copper Company. The engineers have completed their sessions and are devoting their time in Arizona to sightseeing. They left here for the Grand Cañon. During the technical session at Globe, F. G. Cotrell of the United States Bureau of Mines created a sensation when he stated that in the near future the mining companies of the United States would save millions of dollars through the conserving of gases now escaping from the smelters and reduction works. He also announced the successful completion of experiments whereby the escaping gases had been rendered harmless to vegetation.

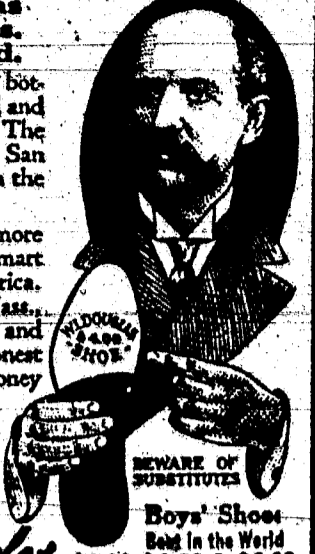

## WASTE INVOLVED IN ILLNESS

Serious Matter to Which Far Too Little Attention Has Been Given by the Country.

A spectacular event often attracts public attention, while routine matters of large magnitude go unnoticed. For instance, the whole country was recently acutely conscious of a question of wages amounting to \$50,000,000. It was an important question and the sum involved was vast.

But take another question involving wages—the question of the illness of workers. Public health bulletin No. 79 of the public health service of the United States estimates on the basis of inquiries here and abroad that the average industrial worker loses about nine days a year on account of illness. This amounts to a loss to the workers of the country, it is estimated, of \$800,000,000 a year. If by better sanitation and safety devices the time could be reduced one-half, there would be a saving of \$400,000,000. Yet it is exceedingly difficult for health authorities to arouse interest in the question, simply because it concerns everyday matters that lack the excitement of a threatened steep of transportation.

## Decimal System for England

According to the British and Colonial Printer and Stationer, there is now a well-organized movement in Great Britain to secure the immediate adoption in that country of the decimal system of coinage and weights and measures.

The handicap in securing new foreign trade, with nine-tenths of the world on the decimal basis, is the prime argument in the propaganda, and it is pointed out that in the even keener trade competition after the war this added handicap may prove ruinous.

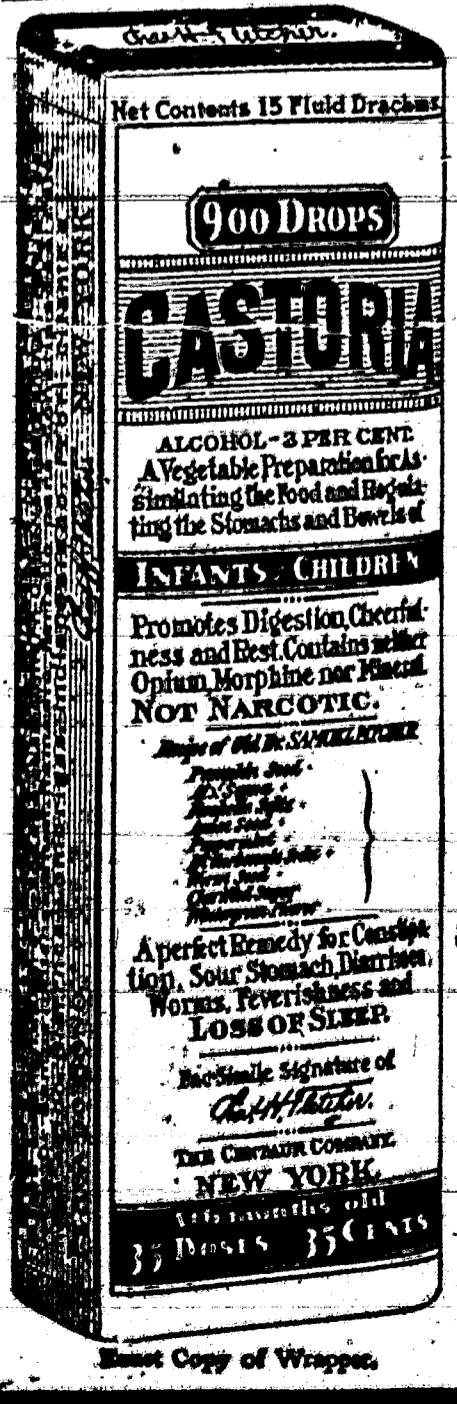
