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THE MUCH "DESERVING" DEMOCRATS

Gov. McDonald's Record as Appointing Incompetent Men to Office Would Put Woodrow to Shame.

HIS HOBBY TO AWARD JOBS TO 'DESERVING DEMOCRATS'

Howell Ernest was removed from office by legislative act because he was unfit to hold the position of an auditor. When he had been ousted it was found and proven that he could not keep his own accounts straight. He made a settlement of his accounts upon demand of the state. Yet McDonald forced this man into what is probably the most important position in the state under present conditions; that of secretary of the state tax commission; a post where every interest of New Mexico, public and private, demands a man of intelligence, of financial experience and of sound judgement. It is not Ernest who is to blame for the unhappy events which have occurred in the departments with which he has been connected. It is the fault of the man who appointed him.

Trinidad C. de Baca was McDonald's selection for state game warden out of a large field of candidates, many of them competent men. Since he took office in 1913 De Baca has spent \$43,500 of money paid into his office by the sportsmen of this state. He has put back into fish, game animals and birds less than \$2500. The sportsmen have not failed to protest to McDonald. They have told the Governor what they think of his game warden—and they have been laughed at for their pains and thereafter ignored. De Baca is another "deserving" democrat.

Robert H. Crews of Albuquerque is secretary of the sheep sanitary board, the most important official board of this state, because it has charge of the state's most important industry. Crews is a competent lawyer; and he is a "deserving" democrat; but he couldn't tell an Angora goat from Shropshire dam if he met them in the road. The sheep men have protested to McDonald against the grave injury being done the industry. But McDonald, serenely indifferent, has told them to forget it—and let his official favorites alone.

McDonald was warned when he picked his board of regents for the state agricultural college that he might go outside the immediate circle of his favorite ring, and do much better. But at least two of the boys McDonald picked were "deserving democrats" and they paid off one of the McDonald campaign obligations by applying on their note the interest on the college funds.

A fine collection of incompetents, all "deserving Democrats" have found their way into what should be responsible offices in this state under William C. McDonald. The man who promised New Mexico "a clean, business administration" whose heads in his own party warned him and argued with him and even plead-

McDonald has set a standard in awarding jobs to "deserving democrats" that put the record of the Wilson administration into the discard.

THE RIGHT MAN FOR CLERK

Orville T. Nye, the Republican standard bearer in the running for the office of County Clerk, is out to win with flying colors on election day. His candidacy received an enormous impetus on the occasion of the Republican Convention in Lincoln last week when he was nominated without opposition the unanimous choice of his party. The party thus recognizes in Mr. Nye the one man to make the winning race for this important office in the county's administration of affairs, he has shown his ability to handle the duties of official matters in the close connection he has had with Lincoln County interests in the office of Assessor. INTERNATIONAL SOIL PRODUCTS EXPOSITION

Most Interesting Soil Products Exposition Ever Held in United States Will Take Place in El Paso Oct. 14-24

SPECIAL BUILDING ERECTED FOR OCCASION

One of the biggest and most substantial shows which was ever held in this part of the United States is the International Soil Products Exposition which will be held in El Paso beginning October 14, and lasting through the 24th

This big exhibit is held every year under the auspices of the International Farm Congress and delegates from a majority of the states of the Union, from all the Canadian provinces, and from twenty foreign countries, will be attracted to this display of products to study the exhibits which will represent practically every line of human industry. El Paso will necessarily see that the live stock phase of the big show is duly emphasized, and all breeders who desire to exhibit their choice stock are urged to make arrangements for their display at an early date. Special buildings are being erected near the business center of the city, and several acres will be occupied with the various agricultural, commercial and educational exhibits. One large building will be devoted exclusively to the exhibit of automobiles, and this one feature bids fair to be the most elaborate show of motor cars which residents of this section have ever seen. A special grand stand is being erected and a large amusement stage is being provided. May other details too numerous to mention here are being worked out, that this big opportunity for El Paso to entertain visitors from every land may be taken advantage of in every respect, making it an exposition which visitors will never forget. The greatest single exhibit will naturally be that of the United States, and the government has provided already more than One Hundred Thousand Dollars, and additional special features will be provided to the extent of \$20,000. The International Farm Congress will hold its annual sessions the 19th, 20th, and 21st, and the program will comprise lectures, addresses and reports from farm experts, and heads of agricultural colleges, concerning important projects and experiments in farm and ranch improvement. The International Irrigation Congress will convene in the Pass City immediately after the formal opening of the Elephant Butte Dam on October 4th. This is a big time for El Paso and this section, low rates will be in force on all railroads, and everybody ought to attend as the opportunity of a life-time.

The First State Bank of Las Cruces

WAS CLOSED DECEMBER 8, 1914

It Had Been Hopelessly Insolvent for
More Than a Year. During
Nearly All of That Time

The Bank Failed

NEARLY 600 INDIVIDUAL DEPOSITORS LOST THEIR MONEY. AMONG THEM WERE MORE THAN 90 WOMEN. THERE WERE WIDOWS, ORPHANS, THE AGED, THE SICK. IN SOME INSTANCES SAVINGS OF A LIFETIME WERE INVOLVED.

APPROXIMATELY \$75,000 OF STATE AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE MONEY WAS TIED UP AND IS STILL TIED UP, PROTECTED ONLY BY THE COLLEGE TREASURER'S DISPUTED BOND.

Problem With Which Mr.
Wilson Has Paltered.

CRAZY CHAPTER OF BLUNDERS

No One Can Hear Him Speak Without Seeing the Reality of His Indignation Over the Heartless Policy of the Democratic Administration Toward American Men, Women and Children—American Citizens, Soldiers and Sailors Along and Across the Rio Grande.

Soon after Mr. Hughes was nominated a friend said to him: "Governor, if the American people forget the Mexican disgrace they do not deserve to have you for President." Quick as a flash he replied: "The candidate who dodges the Mexican disgrace does not deserve to be President." He did not pass around his address of acceptance for compliment or criticism in advance of its delivery but the amount of space he devoted to the Mexican disgrace—that confused chapter of blunders—surprised no one who had talked with him since his nomination. It has been in his mind and on his mind more than any other single problem with which Mr. Wilson has paltered. To talk with him is to see at once the reality of his indignation over the heartless manner in which American men, women and children, American citizens, soldiers and sailors have been abandoned by the Administration along and across the Rio Grande, the victims of Mexican armed forces, outfitted with American ammunition and American rifles, Mexicans whom Mr. Wilson has coldly one day as patriots only to chase the next as bandits.

It is apparently the belief of Mr. Wilson that the people of the United States are not interested in Mexico. His defenders have declared that it was an "old story and out of date." Mr. Hughes has a better opinion of his fellow countrymen. He has proved himself a better judge of their feelings. He has made "the Mexican disgrace" a foremost issue of his campaign. He has assailed the record of the Administration in that respect in almost every speech he has made. He has never failed to strike a responsive chord in the hearts of his audience, whether speaking in Carnegie Hall, New York,

from the platform of his train at Grand Forks, North Dakota, to a vast audience at Portland, at the Exposition at San Diego or in the prairie states of the Middle West. He has refuted the slander, sometimes heard in the effete East, that the people of the great West do not care what happens to their fellow citizens in Mexico or to the flag beyond the border. No man born in the West has a firmer faith in the fundamental patriotism and "dominant Americanism" of the people of that section than Mr. Hughes. He holds them responsible in large measure for the encouragement and support he received while Governor of New York in his war upon political graft and political bossism. He thinks they had much to do with conscripting him as the champion of nationalism in the current campaign. He showed his confidence in their practical idealism when he made "the Mexican disgrace" an uppermost issue of his campaign. He has been vindicated by the response his arraignment of the Administration on this score has everywhere evoked. From Maine to California "the Mexican disgrace" is a sore subject with red-blooded Americans today. But nowhere between the oceans are the outrages inflicted in Mexico upon American honor, life and property more keenly resented than around the firesides of the great West. Mr. Hughes is no stranger to the West. His straightforward talk on Mexico proves it.

WILD HYSTERIA

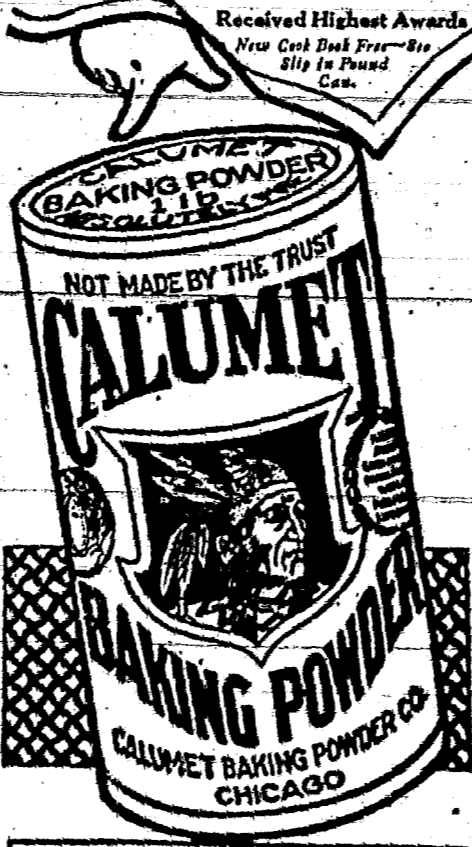

THE UNHAPPY "N. W. MEXICAN"

The Santa Fe New Mexican is passing through a series of nervous chills. Since long before the state conversions it has been pouring out streams of slander, abuse and plain, or garden lies about every Republican in the state of any prominence or of any position of leadership. Since the conventions were held its exertions have been put forward to the utmost limit of libel production.
