Albuquerque Morning Journal Must Account For the many Slanderous Things it has said Concerning Bursum

JOURNAL HAS ASSAILED BURSUM FOR YEARS

The Albuquerque Morning Journal has been lying about honorable men for years. It has slandered almost every man who has come into prominence in New Mexico within the past ten years. Its friend of today has been made the victim of vile libel tomorrow. It has been on all sides of all questions and all things to all men.

The Journal has been utterly ruthless. It has slandered honest men of all political faiths. It has appeared to believe itself unaccountable to any principle or any law. It has sneered at the truth and snapped its fingers at decency.

The Journal has assailed H. O. Bursum for years. Knowing that its statements are untrue, it has repeated them over and over, with deliberate malice. It has been wholly reckless and has seemed to dare truth and justice to punish it.

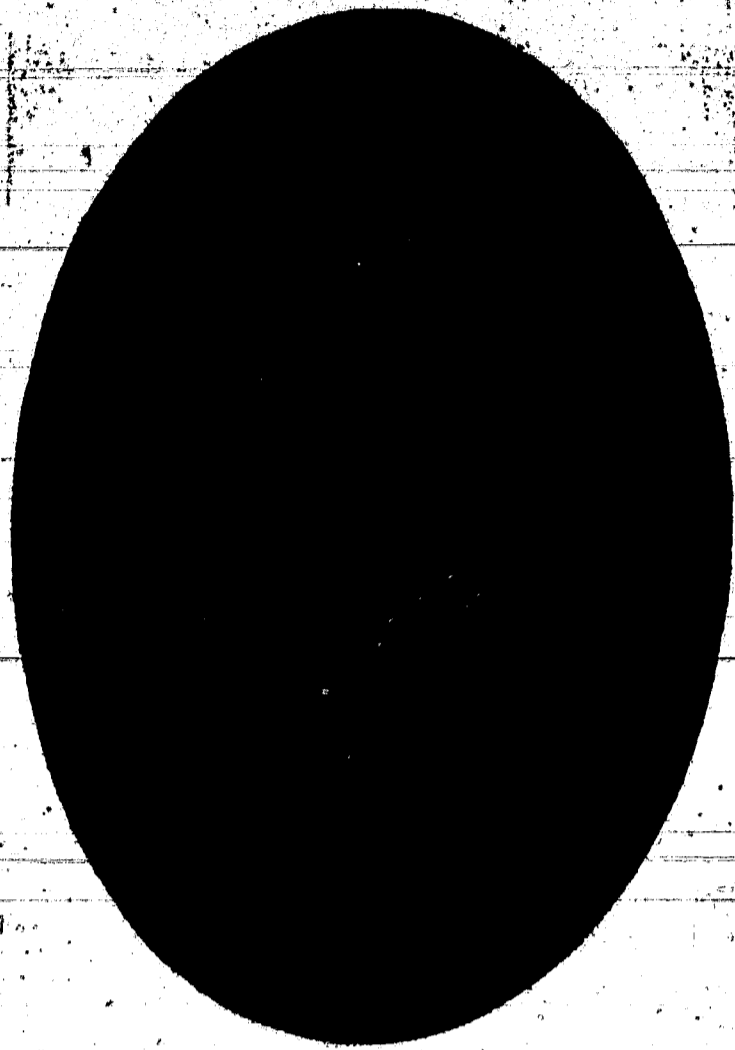
Mr. Bursum should have sued the Journal for libel five years ago when it first poured out its streams of slander against him.

Una breve relación de acontecimientos en curso en este país y en el extranjero.

Western Newspaper Union News Service. Acerca de la Guerra.

Las tropas inglesas han llegado a los suburbios de la ciudad griega de Seres en Macedonia griega.

Los Rumanos se retiraron al largo de toda la frontera de Transylvania, y también en el norte. Los ataques son repulsados dice Bucharest.

Los buques de guerra de los aliados capturan toda la marina de Grecia, con la excepción de tres buques, para protegerse de la posible traición de ese país.

Las pérdidas alemanas desde el principio de la guerra hasta el fin de septiembre han sido de 3,556,018, según una compilación oficial inglesa publicada en Londres.

Los Italianos reportan un progreso importante en la región de Gorizia, con la captura de 1,771 prisioneros austríacos. Se ha tomado un total de 30,881 prisioneros austríacos desde que empezó la ofensiva, el 6 de agosto.

General.

La marina americana está tomando todas las medidas necesarias para que no se instale en la costa americana ninguna base submarina de las potencias europeas.

El conde Von Bernstorff, embajador alemán, declaró que no habrá más nueva actividad de guerra con submarinos. Alemania no quiere de ninguna manera violar la promesa que hizo a este país.

Un hombre fué matado y al menos unos veinte fueron heridos, dos tan seriamente que no se espera que vivan, en una pelea en Bayonne, N. J., entre empleados en huelga de la Standard Oil Company y la policía.

Dos hombres fueron matados al instante y diez y seis otros fueron heridos cuando un tren de placer del Western Maryland en su rumbo para Hagerstown se dirigió de frente en el tren del "labor" en los patios de Knob Mount.

El primer aviso recibido por el vapor de la Cruz Roja Stephano del submarino U-53 fué un tiro fuerte que dió contra el buque en la proa. Esa fué la declaración hecha en Nueva York por Clifton Smith en el consulado británico.

Occidente.

La necesidad de conectar varias secciones de los Estados Unidos a fin de obtener un desarrollo completo fué el tema del discurso del Presidente Wilson en el lunch ofrecido en su honor en Indianapolis, Ind.

Los dividendos pagados en los últimos nueve meses por las compañías mineras son superiores a cualquier otro reporte del pasado. La cantidad desembolsada para los accionistas de 146 minas americanas con planta de reducción se elevó al total de \$78,772,612.

Warren K. Billings, condenado por el asesinato de la Señora Myrtle Van Loo en conexión con la parada, del "Día de Preparación" en que se hizo la explosión de una bomba en San Francisco, el 22 de Julio, que causó la muerte de diez personas, fué sentenciado a la cárcel por la vida.

Diez y nueve Mexicanos que están retenidos por las autoridades militares en Colonia Dublin, sospechados de ser unos de los villistas que atacaron a Columbus, N. M., el 9 de marzo, han sido condenados por el gran jurado del condado de Luna, se auto en Deming, N. M. Todos son acusados de asesinato.

Washington.

La comisión de comercio inter-estado tendrá una sesión el 23 de octubre sobre petición de las compañías de express para la autorización de mantener las tarifas sobre la base del valor declarado de las expediciones.

La bolsa nacional del ganado presentó a la comisión de comercio inter-estado una queja declarando que ochenta y seis ferrocarriles principales cobran tarifas no razonables, no equitativas, y que las tarifas sobre el ganado mayor y menor no engorradado no deberían ser superiores al 75 por ciento de las tarifas sobre el ganado engordado y destinado para la carnicería.

El consul americano, el Sr. Payne, en Santo Thomas, D. W. I. reportó al departamento de estado que la tormenta que abatió tanto en esas islas causó por \$2,000,000 de daños, dejando las dos terceras partes de la población sin alimentos suficientes y sin vestimenta, destruyendo también la tercera parte de las chozas de los nativos. El consul demandó que se le envíe la suma de \$50,000 para una asistencia inmediata.

Las expediciones de ganado de Steamboat Springs se elevaron a 244 carros en ocho días.

J. Hamilton Lewis, senador de los Estados Unidos para Illinois, pronunció un discurso en Denver.

La compañía de teléfono está dispuesta a gastar \$4,000,000 para mejoramiento del servicio en Colorado.

Ha comenzado la entrada a Fort Collins de los carneros para engordar. Los animales proceden de Wyoming.

Más de 600 mineros del condado de Weld están ahora afiliados con la organización de los trabajadores unidos de minas.

La Sarvis Timber Company en Steamboat Springs cortará 4,000,000 pies de troncos durante el invierno que viene.

La estimación de entradas durante la estación de frutas en el distrito de Pallasades es de casi tres cuartos de un millón de pesos.

La Victor Consolidated Gold Mining Company pagará su dividendo trimestral el 25 de octubre. Irá a los accionistas la suma de \$90,000.

John L. Moore, un agricultor de la vecindad de Longmont, ha perdido nueve de sus parientes en la guerra. Eran miembros de un regimiento escocés.

La Señora Mary Andrews, un residente de Colorado por veintidós años, murió en su casa en Denver. La muerte resultó de un ataque de apoplejía.

La manufactura de azúcar de Fort Morgan está empleando a 359 hombres. El pago total de salarios se elevará a \$30,000 por mes durante la campaña de cuatro meses.

El Capitán Carlos Christy, de 73 años de edad, peleador de Indios y uno de los exploradores del estado, falleció en la casa de los Viejos Soldados en Monte Vista.

En Colorado Springs se están haciendo los preparativos para asistir en la campaña en favor de los nuevos colonos, que ha principiado la junta de inmigración de estado.

El equipo de telegrafía sin alambre que se está instalando en la universidad de Denver está casi listo para el uso. El aparato tiene bastante poder para recibir mensajes procedentes de Honolulu.

Los administradores del condado de Larimer han aprobado un proyecto para la construcción de un camino de trece millas desde Pingree Park hasta el camino de Poudre Cañon cerca de Loveland.

En el distrito de Montezuma, grupo de San Juan, hay 6,000 toneladas de "stope-filling" en la superficie, listo para el tratamiento. Esto es parte de 30,000 toneladas vueltas utilizables por desarrollo.

El reporte de la Asociación de Enfermeras Visitadoras de Denver para el año p. pasado muestra que se hicieron 6,000 visitas más este que el año pasado. La asociación comprende ocho enfermeras.

Una arcilla industrial—clase de marga, de la mejor especie, y varias otras formas de marga se producen en Colorado, especialmente en el condado de Jefferson, a unas quince millas oeste de Denver.

Se recibieron en Denver las noticias del nombramiento de Lucius Lisk Moore, para sargento mayor del colegio militar de Pennsylvania para el año escolar que principia el 4 de octubre.

Los abogados de Edward L. Selwald, encarcelado en Cañon City por el asesinato del policía William McPherson de Denver, han pedido a la corte suprema de suspender una condena por asesinato sufrida por Andrew J. Loyd, un cantinero.

A partir del primero de diciembre Golden tendrá un servicio urbano de distribución de correo. Se acaba de dar la orden para este mejoramiento público. Se nombrarán a dos carteros y a un asistente, y se harán dos distribuciones por día excepto el domingo.

El gran jurado del condado de Curry se separó después de haber condenado a veinticuatro personas.

Un matrimonio mejicano en un carro de ferrocarril en Wilma, una estación cerca de Deming, fué descubierto padeciendo del tifo.

El dormitorio de los muchachos y muchachas en la misión de Rehoboth, a seis millas este de Gallup, fué destruido por un incendio.

Los mercaderes de Santa Fé están ideando medidas para el entretenimiento de la asociación educacional durante la semana de dar gracias.

La conferencia regional de la Asociación Nacional para el Estudio y Prevención de la Tuberculosis atrajo a Albuquerque algunas autoridades de fama.

Rupert F. Asplund de la comisión de tasaciones de estado ha empezado la investigación detallada y sistemática de las finanzas de escuela en Nuevo Mexico.

El Rev. Duncan Matheson de Langdon, North Dakota ha aceptado la convocación para el puesto al púlpito de la Iglesia presbiteriana en Mesilla Park y al Colegio de Estado.

New Kite Balloon.

A military kite balloon, observed by thousands of persons, landed near Washington Court House, O., after a trip from Akron, O., a distance of about 120 miles. The balloon was piloted by C. H. Roth and C. A. Wollen of Akron, and made the trip in three hours and 45 minutes.

As a paper which has done and is doing its utmost to bring home the same truths to its readers, the Journal hopes the eminent doctors will continue their campaign of publicity.

Diphtheria ought to be as rare as smallpox in every civilized community. Antitoxin is not only an almost perfect cure when given in time, but is likewise a sure preventive, yet diphtheria ranks fourth among causes of deaths of children under ten years of age. Puerperal sepsis, or child-bed fever, is almost unknown in any well managed maternity hospital, and ought to be a stranger everywhere, yet it kills almost as many women of child-bearing age as does cancer. Typhoid is a filthy disease, to be banished by effective sanitation; tuberculosis is a disease of bad housing and poor nutrition, but up to date our knowledge of these facts has availed only to check these ailments, not to abolish them.

ALLIES LOSSES 2,000,000 MEN

STAGGERING FIGURES GIVEN BY BERLIN CRITIC INCLUDE ONLY CASUALTIES.

KING PLANS TO LEAD

ALLIES RUSH TROOPS TO HALT GERMAN INVASION OF RUMANIA.

Western Newspaper Union News Service. Berlin.—British and French divisions with a total of more than 1,000,000 men have been virtually annihilated in the Somme battle, says the military critic of the Overseas News Agency.

According to figures from Swiss sources as given by the news agency, the Russians' losses from June 1 to October 2 were about 1,000,000 men.

London.—Although Rumanians in northeast Transylvania continue to retreat before the Austro-Germans from this region all along the battle-line to the vicinity of Orsova they at several points by violent counter-attacks have gained an advantage. Bucharest admits retirement of the Rumanian forces in the Kallman mountains but says farther south infantry of the Teutonic allies were put to flight. Successes also were obtained by the Rumanians in the Oltuz and Jul valleys. On both sides of the Szurdok pass, Rumanians continue on the offensive but Berlin says their attacks have been repelled. Russian reinforcements are being rushed to their aid. It is announced that King Ferdinand will take the field at the head of his harassed troops.

In the Carpathians the Austro-Germans have recaptured the height of Smotrec. In Volhynia violent fighting has broken out. Petrograd says that north of Korytniza the Russians captured a German trench. Along the Stokhod, says Berlin, Russian attacks were repulsed.

German trenches in the neighborhood of the Stuff and Schwaben redoubts in the Thiepval region of France have been captured by the British and with them more than 300 prisoners. Near Guedecourt the British also have slightly advanced their line.

Berlin admits that the British north of Thiepval gained a firm hold on the German trenches and that the French south of the Somme have won a footing in the sugar refinery at Genermont.

The French in Saturday's fighting in the Ablaincourt-Belloy sector made 1,100 German prisoners.

DIVORCE CANON REJECTED.

Episcopal House of Deputies Votes Down Proposition Against Remarriage.

St. Louis.—The house of deputies of the general convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church here rejected the proposal to embody in its canons a provision forbidding its clergy-men to solemnize marriage for a person divorced from a living spouse.

The six hours' debate which preceded the action indicated wide difference of opinion among members of the church. The recommendation was contained in the report of a joint committee, composed of five bishops, five clergymen and five laymen, appointed three years ago to study matters relating to matrimony.

By its action the lower house of the convention placed in abeyance for at least three years further consideration of any such amendment.

Allies Claim Right to Seize Mails. Washington.—In their latest reply to American protests against interference with neutral mails the allied governments reiterate their right to intercept and search all genuine mail found on neutral vessels on the high seas or in allied ports, but they promise to remedy "any faults, abuses or serious mistakes" in censorship that may be brought to their attention. They declare unjustified by facts the American charge that illegal jurisdiction has been gained by diversion of neutral ships.

Death Relieves Burned Baby Girl. Longmont.—The five-year-old daughter of Robert Earl died from burns received when she fell into the ash-pit in the rear of the Earl residence.

Berlin Population Decreases. Berlin.—During the fiscal year ending with July, 1918, the population of Berlin declined to 1,790,821 from the 1916 total of 1,860,484.

Many of the fine monumental structures, such as the "Arch of the Rising Sun," surmounted by a group entitled "The Nations of the East," were thrown to the ground by exploding charges of dynamite under them.—Popular Mechanics Magazine.
