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POTASH BEARING BEDS OF NEW MEXICO

"Southwestern Trail" Tells of Valuable Resource of the Sunshine State That was Recently Discovered

MUCH EXCITEMENT AMONG SCIENTIFIC INVESTIGATORS

Potash beds of unheard of extent are believed to be located in the Permian strata of eastern New Mexico. Water from both deep and shallow wells when analyzed was found to contain in some instances as high as 14 per cent available potash and creating considerable excitement among scientific investigators. The great war has shut off the chief supply of potash from Germany which reaches the United States as kali one of the most important ingredients in fertilizers, explosives and many other products. American imports in 1913 totalled more than \$12,000,000. The discovery of potash beds in large quantity would transform agricultural conditions on the North American continent. Potash also is used for chemical purposes, gunpowder, matches, soap and dyes. Their value could not be determined in dollars and cents. Indications are that the Permian red beds, which abound in Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico in that great empire known as the Panhandle contain potash in undreamed quantities. Both state and government scientists are giving the matter their attention. The German kalis mines employ 35,000 men. The world's demand of potash annually exceeds 11,000,000 tons.

What actually has been found are salt beds 500 and 600 feet in thickness in widely separated wells in New Mexico and Texas containing potash in varying quantities. At Leslie, N. M. large salt beds were penetrated at a depth of 700 feet. Before reaching these immense salt deposits a peculiar red shale, sandstone and potash bearing deposit is penetrated. The dip of the earth's surface in parts of Western Texas and Eastern Oklahoma makes it certain that these potash beds are very near the surface and can be worked in a practical manner.

The same strata was familiar to geologists years ago, but the deposits of potash were at such depth and in such small quantities that it seemed hopeless to speak of commercial development. All this is changed now, as may be seen from the official report of Prof. J. A. Udden, geologist of the University of Texas, who believes that the "red salt horizon," as shown in the Miller and Boden borings and discussed later in detail, will lie between 800 and 1700 feet below the surface of the surrounding country or from 200 to 2400 feet above sea level.

In most of the wells bored, no special preparation was made to keep accurate track of the potash bearing strata. However, the one great fact was established that the salt beds of several hundred feet thickness undoubtedly bear relation to each other in the different wells bored, and that enough potash bear-

ing strata has been penetrated to warrant careful scientific exploration of the territory over which the various wells are scattered. It is believed that a potash mineral, such as carnalite, has been found in several of the borings. This is a bright red substance, containing about 14 per cent of potassium chloride. In one case this was found at a depth of 900 feet in a 50-foot vein of rock salt. In another instance the mineral in question was found at a depth of 1700 feet in an immense bed of rock salt. It is this presence of potash mineral which warrants further exploration, says Prof. Udden. The wells which showed potash bearing salt lie roughly between the Canadian and Pecos rivers on the plains or in the breaks of these at an average elevation of 3500 to 5500 feet. Geologically the country in which they are located is exceedingly interesting. Indications everywhere point to the existence of a prehistoric ocean which once covered that entire part of the world.

J. D. Tunnell an architect of Texas, Tex., who has spent twenty six years in New Mexico and Texas, is one of the men who is responsible for the investigations now being conducted as regards potash in the Southwest. Fourteen years ago Mr. Tunnell prospected for coal in the valley of the Canadian river almost from its source to within a few miles of Tucuman. The Permian sandstone deposits which throughout the course of this river are ever in evidence attracted his attention. He concluded that these beds because of their appearance and color must contain large quantities of valuable minerals. Mr. Tunnell asserts that in his twenty-six years' experience with deep wells throughout Texas and New Mexico he has become well satisfied that potash deposits in large quantities exist in that territory. He was present when several of the deepest wells were being drilled and personally helped keep the log and gathered samples for analysis at varying depths. Several of his samples were later brought to the attention of Prof. Udden, whose report was most favorable.—Southwestern Trail.

FORMER LINCOLN COUNTY MAN DIES

John J. H. Riley, a pioneer of the southwest and early resident of Las Cruces died at Colorado Springs last week. Mr. Riley was well known among the early residents of Silver City. He was aged 65 years and is survived by his widow, two sons and a daughter. Mr. Riley was the owner of immense cattle interests in Lincoln county in the eighties and through his receiving a large cattle and beef contract from the government he became the butt of a bitter feud and figured prominently in what is remembered among the old-timers as the "Lincoln County War," in which he and his friends were victors. He left a fortune estimated at \$250,000.—Silver City Enterprise.

COUNTY TEACHERS' ASSOCIATION TO MEET

At Capitan Friday and Saturday, March 10th and 11th. Preparations are Made for Entertainment of Visitors

MANY PROMINENT EDUCATORS WILL BE PRESENT

The Lincoln County Teachers' Association will meet in Capitan Friday and Saturday March 10th and 11th. Elaborate preparations are being made, by the people of Capitan, for the entertainment of all visiting teachers of the County and educational heads and speakers from over the State of which a large number have been invited. Among the well known educators expected are State Superintendent Alvan N. White, Assistant State Supt. Filadelfo Baca, Industrial Supt. L. C. Mersfelder, Pres. E. L. Enloe of the Silver City Normal, Pres. F. H. H. Roberts of the Las Vegas Normal, President Ladd of the State A & M. College of Las Cruces and Prof. W. T. Conway from this institution, the last named having charge of the Boys' and Girls' Industrial Clubs which are making such a splendid showing in rural districts.

A feature of the meeting will be the various contests in arithmetic, spelling and kindred subjects, awards of prizes and ribbons for the best specimens of school work, both industrial and literary, and a debate between the County High School and the Carrizozo High School. The question to be debated is Resolved:—That an illiteracy test should be employed to restrict immigration. As there is a great deal to be said on both sides, a lively debate is expected. Capitan takes the affirmative and Carrizozo defends the negative side. This feature will be full of genuine merit and foster a spirit of investigation and exhaustive research.

It is expected to have a number of musical selections rendered by school talent, and the Carrizozo school has been invited to furnish several choruses. It is encouraging to see the interest being manifested in music wherever it is possible to obtain a teacher with qualifications along these lines, and the services of those who apply themselves faithfully to the mastery of the ins and outs of music are always welcome and in demand at public functions and gatherings.

The Capitan Commercial club is supporting the project in no uncertain manner and will award a number of gold medals to successful students in the various contest features. Much credit is due Supt. C. Y. Belnap of the Capitan School for his work in organizing the work of the Association, in securing so much splendid talent for this occasion. Mr. Belnap is secretary of the Association, and is endeavoring at this time to make every number practical and of genuine interest to the rural teachers.

Accordingly the program as prepared will deal, in one way or the other, almost exclusively with such industrial work as can be done in the average rural school. The manual training and domestic science work of the larger schools will also be on display for their encouragement in undertaking this practically new problem of education in the schools of the country districts.

The first program of the convention will be Friday afternoon, and the last session will be held Saturday afternoon. The homes of Capitan will be open for the entertainment of visiting teachers and the number expected will probably tax their hospitality to the utmost. These meetings should be encourag-

ed, since they constitute one of the most effective means of keeping up the proper spirit among the teachers of the county and prove a source of mutual benefit to all concerned.

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

READ THE OUTLOOK

MARKETING SYSTEM

The Texas Farmers' Union registered its opposition to this character of legislation at the last annual meeting held in Fort Worth, Tex., August 4, 1914, by resolution, which we quote, as follows:

"The matter of prime importance to the farmers of this state is an adequate and efficient marketing system; and we recognize that such a system is impossible without adequate railroad facilities, embracing the greatest amount of service at the least possible cost. We further recognize that the farmers and producers in the end pay approximately 95 per cent of the expenses of operating the railroads, and it is therefore to the interest of the producers that the expenses of the common carriers be as small as is possible, consistent with good service and safety. We, therefore, call upon our law-makers, courts and juries to bear the foregoing facts in mind when dealing with the common carriers of this state, and we do especially reaffirm the declarations of the last annual convention of our State Union, opposing the passage of the so-called 'full-crew' bill before the thirty-third legislature of Texas."

The farmers of Missouri in the last election, by an overwhelming majority, swept this law off the statute book of that state, and it should come off of all statute books where it appears and no legislature of this nation should pass such a law or similar legislation which requires unnecessary expenditures.

The same rule applies to all regulatory measures which increase the expenses of industry without giving corresponding benefits to the public. There is oftentimes a body of men assembled at legislatures—and they have a right to be there—who, in their zeal for rendering their fellow-associates a service, sometimes favor an increase in the expenses of industry without due regard for the men who bow their backs to the summer's sun to meet the payroll, but these committees, while making a record for themselves, rub the skin off the shoulders of the farmer by urging the legislature to lay another burden upon his heavy load and under the lash of "be it enacted" goad him on to pull and surge at the traces of civilization, no matter how he may sweat, foam and gall at the task. When legislatures "cut a melon" for labor

the farmers of the United States are not financially able to carry "dead heads" on their payrolls. Our own hired hands are not paid unless we have something for them to do and we are not willing to carry the hired help of dependent industries unless there is work for them. We must therefore insist upon the most rigid economy.

Legislative House-Cleaning Needed.

While the war is on and there is a full in business, we want all legislative bodies to take an inventory of the statute books and wipe off all extravagant and useless laws. A good house-cleaning is needed and economies can be instituted here and there that will patch the clothes of indigent children, rest tired mothers and lift mortgages from despondent homes. Unnecessary workmen taken off and useless expenses chopped down all along the line will add to the prosperity of the farmer and encourage him in his mighty effort to feed and clothe the world.

If any of these industries have surplus employees we can use them on the farm. We have no regular schedule of wages, but we pay good farm hands on an average of \$1.50 per day of thirteen hours when they board themselves; work usually runs about nine months of the year and the three months dead time, they can do the chores for their board. If they prefer to farm on their own account, there are more than 14,000,000,000 acres of idle land on the earth's surface awaiting the magic touch of the plow. The compensation is easily obtainable from Federal Agricultural Department statistics. The total average annual sales of a farm in the continental United States amounts to \$516.00; the cost of operation is \$340.00; leaving the farmer \$176 per annum to live on and educate his family.

There is no occasion for the legislatures making a position for surplus employees of industry. Let them come "back to the soil" and share with us the prosperity of the farm.

FREE TRADE HURTS EXPORT BUSINESS

A new school of economists has suddenly sprung up, declaring, "that a tariff can effect exports may be classed as a new discovery in political economy". But it is axiomatic that when a Democratic tariff law permits the invasion of our domestic market by the foreigner, to such an extent as to cripple the American producer he can not carry that handicap and extend his foreign market. Hence our export trade declines with the increase of our import trade under a Democratic administration.

This is proven by study of statistics of trade with all those sections of the world not involved in the war. Our export trade with countries other than Europe fell off \$189,000,000 during the first eleven months of 1914, under the operation of the Democratic tariff law, compared with the similar period in 1913, nine months of which was under the Republican protective tariff. The record for the first eleven months of 1915, with Germany and Austria out of the foreign fields, was still \$29,000,000 short of the 1913 record. The same eleven months periods considered, our imports from these countries increased \$101,000,000 in 1914, over 1913, and nearly \$280,000,000 in 1915, over 1913.

Eliminating Europe from the calculation for these eleven months periods and we have North and South America, Asia, Oceania, and Africa to consider. While all these divisions are more or less affected by the European war, their activities are not paralyzed to such an extent as are those of the nations which make up the division of Europe.

During the eleven months of 1913, nine months of which was under a Republican law, we exported to these five grand divisions, goods to the value of \$808,000,000. For the same period, 1914, under Democratic law, exports fell to \$719,000,000, or a loss of 21 per cent. For 1915, they were \$808,000,000.

Imports from these countries, on the other hand, for the same periods, amounted to \$835,000,000 in 1913, \$935,000,000 in 1914, and \$1,114,000,000 in 1915. We balked up

a favorable balance of trade in our business with these divisions in 1913 of \$73,000,000. In 1914 they reversed the situation and in eleven months their balance against us was \$217,000,000, rising to \$235,000,000 in 1915.

The stimulus to home industry caused by the immense war orders has distracted our attention from a situation which will be felt acutely if the cessation of the war finds us with a Democratic Administration to stagger under.

OUR "PSYCHOLOGICAL" TREASURY BALANCE

The "Financial Statement of the United States Government", published the 15th of each month as of the close of the previous month, for December, is at hand. This statement gives the amount of outstanding Treasury Warrants, an item which, for reasons best known of Secretary McAdoo has, since September 30, 1915, been omitted from the Daily Treasury Statement. The appearance of the monthly statement containing this item makes it possible to ascertain, by the simple process of addition and subtraction, what was the real Treasury net balance on the last day of the calendar year 1915. A "net" balance means a free balance after all obligations have been provided for. The available (or "net") balance, according to Secretary McAdoo's definition for political purposes, was given by him on December 31, 1915, as \$110,681,973.39.

From this sum should be deducted the following items, improperly included by Mr. McAdoo.

- (1) Balance to credit of disbursing officer (representing outstanding valid claim against the Gov. a/m't) \$59,250,309.44
- (2) National Bank Notes Redemption fund (Payable from the general cash) 20,759,535.50
- (3) Limited tender or unavailable assets (subsidiary silver coin, fractional currency, minor coin, silver bullion) 25,048,633.42
- (4) Deposits in Philippine Treasury always before October 1, 1915, considered unavailable 3,448,008.25
- (5) Treasury warrants outstanding (reported in "Financial Statement" issued January 15th) 1,074,018.21

Total am't of deductions \$110,491,705.62

Total deficiency \$5,799,732.23

Therefore the outstanding obligations of the Government, together with the unavailable assets, were \$5,800,000 greater than the net balance reported on December 31, 1915. Inasmuch as Secretary McAdoo carries as his leading item in the monthly "Financial Statement" for December 31, 1915, this "net balance", of \$110,681,973.39, which is here shown to be "purely psychological" the monthly statement is to that extent, at least, completely misleading.

A subcommittee of the London Board of Trade has just submitted a report favoring a protective tariff as a means of building up British industries. President Wilson says that although he has changed his mind and now favors a tariff commission, yet he has not yielded his opposition to the principle of a protective tariff. Won't somebody please call his attention to the London report. Perhaps he'll change his mind some more. But it does not make much difference whether he does or not. After March 4, 1917, we will have a man in the White House who doesn't have to change his mind on everything in order to be right on something.

It is noticeable that in his speech declaring that the American Navy ought to be "incomparable the greatest navy in the world", President Wilson neglected to say one word about the Treasury deficit and his plans for raising revenue.

KNOW THY COUNTRY

II—Railroads

In discussing the commercial achievements of this great age, we shall approach the subject as the historian chronicling events. This series will endeavor to record in writing the supremacy of American men and industries in the world's affairs and perpetuate an appreciation of our marvelous industrial achievements by presenting simple facts, figures and comparisons that are overpowering in their convictions.

America holds her proud place among the nations of the earth today on account of her supremacy in transportation facilities. The mighty minds of the age are engaged in the problems of transportation, and the greatest men in the history of the world's commerce are at the head of the transportation systems of the United States.

In the discussion of transportation, let us consider separately our Railways, Telegraph and Telephones, Express, Public Highways, Steamships, Street Railways, Interurban and other forms of transportation, and this article will deal with railways.

The United States has the largest mileage, the best service, the cheapest rates, pays labor the highest wages, and we have the most efficiently managed of the railways of the world. They stand as a monument to the native genius of our marvelous builders, and most of the railroads in other countries have been built under American orders.

The railroads represent a larger investment of capital than any other branch of human activity. The mileage in the United States exceeds

the accepted distance from the earth to the moon. We had in 1911, the last year in which figures for all countries are available, on the earth's surface, 639,981 miles of railway divided as follows: United States 241,199, Europe 207,432 and other countries 191,350. The United States has 38 per cent of the world's mileage, seven per cent of the estimated population and about five per cent of the area. The total capital invested in the railways of the world is \$50,000,000,000, divided as follows: United States \$13,000,000,000, Europe \$25,650,000,000 and other countries \$11,350,000,000. Reduced to a mileage basis the capitalization is as follows: The world \$78,000, United States \$54,000, Europe \$124,000, and other countries \$59,000.

A comparison of rates is equally as interesting and the United States takes the lead in economy and service. The average rate per ton per hundred mile haul is as follows: United States 76c, Great Britain \$2.53, France \$1.44, Germany \$1.44, Russia 92c, Austria-Hungary \$1.30, Italy \$2.30 and Switzerland \$2.82.

The average yearly pay of all railroad employes in the principal countries is as follows: United States \$757, Germany \$332, Italy \$345, Austria \$322, Great Britain \$279, France \$260 and Russia \$204.

About 30 per cent, or 188,000 miles, of the railways of the world are government owned. About half the railway mileage of Europe is government owned.

A comparison of the economy, in time and money and the convenience in travel, will be made in a later article.

Berlin reporta que el crucero inglés Caroline y dos destructores fueron hundidos por las bombas caídas de un Zeppelin en la última incursión sobre Inglaterra.

Los Alemanes capturan una gran sección de trincheras de los Franceses al noreste de Vimy. Los Franceses dicen que han ganado repulsando dos fuertes ataques tontónicos al suroeste de Vimy.

Oeste.

Dos muertes y el retorno en toda seguridad de un hombre que se había reportado ahogado llevaron a diez y ocho el número de los que perecieron en las inundaciones de Arkansas. Se cree que dos otras personas perecieron cerca de Arkansas City.

Los Indios de la tribu de Navajos están bailando su baile de guerra y amenazando de un ataque a los colonos blancos en la región noreste de Arizona, por vía de represalias por el asesinato de las manos de la policía, de uno de sus miembros, según dicen Frank McNeill y R. C. Jones, cowboys, que han llegado a Flagstaff, Ariz., de Utah.

Extranjero.

Sport.

Johnny Ertie, campeón de peso bantam, firmó para una pelea a puñaladas con Roy Moore en Minneapolis el 17 de marzo.

Los documentos de un arreglo para la más importante de todas las peleas que se hicieron jamás en Nueva York fueron firmados en esa ciudad cuando se cerraron de manera formal las negociaciones en curso entre Jess Willard y Frank Moran. En conformidad con dicho arreglo los dos hombres se encontrarán el 8 de marzo para una bolsa de \$70,000. Willard se aseguró la garantía de \$40,000 como parte suya de la pelea y recibirá una suma extra de \$5,000 por firmar y por gastos de preparación. Moran recibirá un total de \$25,000. De esta suma \$2,500 es un bonus por la firma.

Washington.

El Presidente Wilson aceptó la dimisión de Lindley M. Garrison como secretario de la guerra.


