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## HUGHES AND FAIRBANKS NOMINATED

By Republican National Convention for President and Vice President at Chicago Saturday

### HUGHES SENDS MESSAGE TO CHAIRMAN AND DELEGATES

The Republican National Convention, which convened June 7, completed its labors Saturday by nominating Associate Justice Charles Evans Hughes of the U. S. Supreme Court, for President, and Charles Fairbanks of Indiana for vice president.

The count on the third and final ballot showed: Hughes, 940 1-2; Roosevelt, 18 1-2; Lodge, 7; Du-Roi, 5; LaFollette, 3; Weeks, 3; absent, 1, Total, 987.

The vote for vice president was: Fairbanks, 863, Burckett of Nebraska, 108, with scattering votes for others.

Mr. Hughes telegram to Chairman Harding who had notified him of his nomination and extended congratulations, was in part as follows:

"Mr. Chairman and Delegates: I have not desired the nomination, I have wished to remain on the bench. But in this critical period of our national history I recognize that it is your right to summon, and that it is my paramount duty to respond. You speak at a time of national exigency, transcending merely partisan considerations. You voice the demand for a dominant, thoroughgoing Americanism, with firm protective upbuilding policies essential to our peace and security, and to that call, in this crisis I cannot fail to answer with the pledge of all that is in me to the success of the country. Therefore I accept the nomination.

"I stand for the firm and unflinching maintenance of all the rights of American citizens on land and sea. I neither impugn motives nor underestimate difficulties. But it is most regrettably true in our foreign relations we have suffered incalculably from the weak and vacillating course which has been taken with regard to Mexico—of course lamentably wrong with regard both to our rights and our duties. We interfered without consistency, and while seeking to dictate when we were not concerned, we utterly failed to appreciate and discharge our plain duty to our own citizens.

"At the outset of the administration the high responsibilities of our diplomatic intercourse with foreign nations were subordinated to a conception of partisan requirements, and we presented to the world a humiliating spectacle of inaptitude. Belated, efforts have not availed to recover the influence and prestige so unfortunately sacrificed, and brave words have been stripped of their force by indecision.

"I desire to see our diplomacy restored to its best standards and to have these advanced; to have no sacrifice of the national interest to partisan expediencies; to have the first ability of the country always at its command here and abroad in diplomatic intercourse, to maintain firmly our rights under international law; insisting steadfastly upon all our rights as neutral and fully performing our international obligations; and by the clear correctness and justness of our position and our manifest ability and disposition to sustain them to dignify our place among the nations.

"I stand for an Americanism that knows no ulterior purpose, and for a patriotism that is single and com-

plete. Whether native or naturalized, of whatever race or creed, we have but one country and we do not for an instant tolerate any division of allegiance. I believe in making prompt provision to secure absolutely our national security. I believe in preparedness, not only entirely adequate for our defense with respect to numbers and equipment in both army and navy, but with all thoroughness to the end that in each branch of the service there may be the utmost efficiency under the most competent administrative heads.

"But we are devoted to the ideals of honorable peace. We wish to promote all wise and practical measures for the just settlement of international disputes. In view of our abiding ideal, there is no danger of militarism in this country. We have no policy of aggression; no lust for territory; no zeal for strife. It is in this spirit that we demand adequate provision for national defense and we condemn the inexcusable neglect that has been shown in this matter of first national importance. We must have the strength which self-respect demands, the strength of an efficient nation ready for every emergency.

"Our preparation must be industrial and economic as well as military. Our severest tests will come after war is over. We must make a fair and wise readjustment of the tariff, in accordance with sound protective principles, to insure our economic independence and to maintain American standards of living. We must conserve the just interests of labor, realizing that in democracy, patriotism and national strength must be rooted in even-handed justice. In preventing, as we must, unjust discriminations and monopolistic practices, we must still be zealous to assure the foundations of honest business. Particularly should we seek the expansion of foreign trade. We must not throttle American enterprise here and abroad, but rather promote it and take pride in honorable achievements."

### CHARLES E. HUGHES BOWMAN HOUSES BURN

What came near being a very disastrous fire occurred yesterday afternoon about 3 o'clock when the five little frame houses located opposite the Outlook building and belonging to John Bowman of Las Cruces went up in flames. These houses were among the first to be erected in Carrizozo and only two of the number were habitable. The fire is said to have originated in one of these vacant houses caused by some small Mexican children shooting fire crackers. By the heroic work of the bucket brigade the Gurney cottages on the corner of Tularens avenue, which adjoined these houses, were saved. It was a calm day and the flames did not spread to any nearby property. The occupants of the burned houses succeeded in saving all their household goods. It is said that none of the houses were insured. It might not be out of place to mention the fact that Carrizozo should have a little better fire protection than an irrigation ditch and a tin bucket.

### NEW INDUSTRY MAKING GOOD

The Carrizozo Ice plant which began operations a few weeks ago is putting out a very fine grade of ice and unable to supply the local demand. Fred Andree, the proprietor, has spent about twenty years in this business and is an expert in his line. He has managed some of the largest ice plants in the country. The local plant has been equipped throughout with new and modern machinery and is an enterprise Carrizozo has long felt the need of.

## PARSONS CO. TO TAKE OVER LIGHT PLANT

Parsons Mines to be Worked on a Large Scale as Soon as Power Plant is Transferred to New Owners

### PLANT WILL STILL FURNISH WHITE OAKS MINES POWER

The Parsons Gold Mining Co., located at Parsons which was recently taken over by J. H. Fulmer, of Mishawaka, Ind., and which also recently purchased the Alto Light and Power Company together with other holdings including a coal mine located at White Oaks, will take charge July 1. The new owners contemplate opening the Parsons property and working it on a larger scale than it has ever been worked before, just as soon as they take charge of the power plant. The former owners of the plant had contracted and built a line from White Oaks to Parsons to furnish power for their mines and mill and shortly after its completion sold out to them. In addition to furnishing the power for the Parsons mines it will continue to supply the power for the White Oaks mines, and also for the town of Carrizozo. The new owners are now preparing the foundation for the new 500 K. W. turbine generator set to be installed. The power company will continue to be operated under the corporate name of Alto Light & Power Co. The Parsons mines are among the best properties in the Southwest and contain a mammoth deposit of low grade ore from milling gold quartz, several hundred feet wide.

## DISTRICT COURT RECONVENES

District Court for Lincoln County which has been in recess for the past three weeks was reconvened yesterday afternoon, with Judge M. C. Metchum of Socorro on the bench, sitting in place of Judge Medler, and after disposing of a few cases adjourned to reconvene on July 17.

J. D. Murchison who was arrested here a few weeks ago for forgery plead guilty and was given from one to two years in the penitentiary at Santa Fe. The amount involved was \$10. Murchison will be taken to Santa Fe tomorrow by Sheriff Chavez.

H. H. and W. R. Newberry, plead guilty to stealing ore from the White Oaks Mines Consolidated Company and were each given a three years' penitentiary sentence, sentence suspended with the provision that they leave the state at once. The amount of ore recovered by the authorities on the Newberry premises and to which they plead guilty to stealing, was valued at \$2,000, the ore being high grade tungsten.

The Harper-Keeln case was again postponed and has been set for trial July 17.

## MUCH ROAD IMPROVEMENT BEING DONE

Lincoln and Chavez Counties are Spending Neat Sum on Road from Carrizozo to Roswell

### THREE LARGE FORCES ARE NOW AT WORK

The counties of Chaves and Lincoln are spending a great part of their share of the proceeds of the state bond issue of \$500,000 upon the mail road between Carrizozo and Roswell. The state engineer's department now has three big forces at work on the road between Roswell and the 35 mile post, in this county. The work is in charge of Capt. M. O. Chadbourne.

One of the forces of 12 teams and 30 men, in charge of Foreman C. R. Wyland, is building 10.7 miles of new road, commencing at the county line and running southwest to the top of the ridge, thence through the valley east of the border hill, and will tie into the old road at the top of Peacho hill, 35 miles from Carrizozo. This road will be 20 feet, shoulder to shoulder, and will have a maximum grade of 5 percent.

Another force, under the immediate supervision of Foreman George Marlow, composed of 10 teams and 35 men is cutting through the 6 mile hill in Chaves county. A 6 foot cut is being blasted through the solid rock, and the arroyo is being filled to a height of 5 feet. About 50 pounds of dynamite a day is being used in blasting out this cut. This reconstructed road will also have a width of 20 feet, no grade over 4 per cent and the greater part of it only about 2 per cent.

A third force is graveling 8 mile draw, making the road a width of 20 feet. There are 40 teams and 40 men distributing the gravel on this stretch, which is without heavy grades. A 6-ton roller is ready to be put on the work, but will not be put into commission until rain has fallen. Capt. Chadbourne says it would be a waste of money and time to undertake to pack the gravel until it has been thoroughly saturated.

The completion of this big work will place Roswell materially closer to the central part of the state, from which good railroad and highway facilities are available. The big mail cars on the run frequently make the run of 100 miles between Roswell and Carrizozo in a little more than six hours. The road betterment will lessen the time substantially.

### FRANKS-THOMPSON

Melvin Franks and Miss Callie Thompson of Corona came to Carrizozo Tuesday secured a marriage license and slipped quietly away to White Oaks where they were married by Justice of the Peace William F. Jones. As soon as the nuptials were tied the happy couple left for the Franks home near Corona. Mr. Franks is a well known stockman of the county and is at present chairman of the board of county commissioners. The bride has been postmistress at Corona for the past few years where she has many friends. The newly-weds are among the county's best young people and we predict for them a long and happy wedded life.

### WAR BROUGHT BIG DEMAND FOR AUTOS

One hundred and sixty five mil-  
lion dollars worth of automobiles  
and parts, engines and tires, were  
exported from this country during  
the last 19 months of the European  
war, August, 1914 to February,  
1916, inclusive, easily 80 per cent  
of which went to the belligerents.  
Our normal exports of these articles  
run about \$35,000,000 annually, al-  
though there was a falling off in  
their value just prior to the outbreak  
of the war. During the calendar  
year 1915 England took more than  
our total normal export of these  
products. A large percentage of  
the total consisted of commercial  
automobiles, or trucks, etc.

No single factor is of more im-  
portance in conducting modern war-  
fare than that of sufficient and quick  
transportation. How many de-  
fects have been directly attributable  
to the fact that supplies were de-  
layed for lack of carriage facilities?  
No sooner was the European war  
declared than every motor car avail-  
able was commandeered, the owner  
given a receipt, and his car pressed  
into service. An American army  
officer who returned from Europe  
some time ago estimated the average  
life of a car operated behind the  
lines at from 10 to 20 days. The  
first three products sought by the  
belligerents from the United States  
were breadstuffs, horses, and auto-  
mobiles, and a steady stream of  
those commodities has been flow-  
ing to Europe since the war began.  
But the prosperity which war  
orders for automobiles has brought  
to Detroit, for instance, is by no  
means confined to that city. It  
is distributed in countless ways.  
From the man who works out the  
ore in the ground to the boy who

packs the grease in the crutch, every  
employee engaged in turning out  
the finished product, or part, reaps  
a benefit from Europe's unfortunate  
quarrel. Steel, leather, rubber, cop-  
per, glass—a score of products go  
into the manufacture of these cars,  
and all supply a profit to someone.  
And the profits and the wages are  
invested, or hoarded, or spun on  
the counters of the merchant.  
Charlie Chaplin gets a chunk of it;  
Billy Sunday gets a bit. Consider  
the number of times a dollar  
changes hands, and multiply that  
by \$165,000,000. And then you  
have considered but one commodity  
which is going in Europe from this  
country, though we have sent bil-  
lions of dollars worth of goods there  
to be used in conducting the war.  
This is the sort of "unexampled  
prosperity" of which the Democratic  
party boasts, and on which it will  
go to the country in the coming  
campaign. But the people of the  
United States have a high contempt  
for a party whose chief argument  
for a continuance in power is bed-  
rocked on the murder of millions of  
mankind.





A very ingenious and practical device for assuring the trees on city sidewalks a sufficient supply of water, no matter how dry the season and how hard baked the earth, has recently been put in operation in Strassburg by Mr. Bauer, the city tree inspector. It consists of a tube of iron or lead bent into the form of a ring large enough to encircle the stem of the tree. The earth is removed so that this ring may be placed just above the roots, and is then filled in again, leaving the end of a pipe connecting with the ring projecting above the surface of the ground. The top of the ring is pierced with a large number of small holes, and a tin cover or shield prevents these from becoming stopped up with earth. By means of a funnel in the protruding end of the pipe any desired amount of water may be supplied to the roots without waste or loss of time. A further advantage, according to Promethus, is the ventilation thus secured of the earth in the vicinity of the roots.

# BRITISH CLAIM NAVAL VICTORY

## DECLARE TEUTONS LOST EIGHTEEN WAR SHIPS IN JUTLAND BATTLE IN NORTH SEA.

# HALT FRENCH AT YPRES

## GERMAN TROOPS Routed BY THE CANADIANS WITH BAYONETS ON TWO-MILE TRENCH LINE.

Western Newspaper Union News Service.

London, June 6.—The British admiralty issued a statement saying there was the strongest grounds for the belief that the British navy in the battle with the Germans off Jutland May 31 had accounted for a total of eighteen German men-of-war, and that there was nothing to add to or subtract from the original announcement of British losses.

The statement gave the German losses as two battleships, two dreadnought battle cruisers, four light cruisers, nine torpedo boat destroyers and a submarine.

It is feared that the loss of life will exceed 5,000 officers and men. The German loss must have been almost as great as that of the British.

London.—The Canadian troops and the Germans have been battling fiercely on the Ypres salient. The German guns opened up several days ago, deluging the Canadian positions and the surrounding territory with shells. Then the German infantry advanced along an extended front of almost two miles, capturing trenches. In a series of counter-attacks in which bombs and bayonets played an important part the Canadians regained most of the lost ground and have reorganized their positions.

The region of Vaux and Damloup, northeast of Verdun, has been the scene of further futile attempts of the Germans to pierce the French lines. All the attacks were set to naught by the French fire except a night attack between Damloup and Fort Vaux, where the Germans obtained a foothold in French trenches. From these, however, they were immediately driven out by a counter attack.

The German drive on the Verdun front between the Callette wood and Damloup, northeast of the fortress, is progressing favorably for the attacking forces, the German war-office announced. The capture of more than 500 prisoners and four machine guns was reported.

West of the Meuse a French attack near Hill 304 was repulsed. Attempts by the British to regain the ground they recently lost to the Germans near Ypres on the Flanders front were fruitless, Berlin reports.

## EXPECT HUGHES TO LEAD.

Statement of Votes Claimed for Different Candidates on First Ballot.

Chicago, June 6.—Republican organization leaders asserted Monday that Charles E. Hughes would get more votes on the first ballot for the presidential nomination than any of his competitors. They estimate his strength on the initial ballot at between 175 and 225. The organization forces estimate Roosevelt's first ballot strength at less than 150, but say his vote will grow when the favorite son candidates begin to drop out of the race. This situation, it is said, may lead to a temporary combination between the organization and friends of Roosevelt to fight Hughes in the early hours of the voting.

What will happen after the first few ballots are taken and the favorite son candidates begin quitting the race nobody seems able to predict at this time.

Perkins that the Progressive convention indorse Roosevelt and delay making any nominations until after the Republicans have taken action found favor among Progressive leaders here and it was considered probable such an arrangement will be made.


