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MC'DONALD STANDS ON HIS RECORD

Some Interesting Facts taken From the Records of the First State Bank Failure at Las Cruces,

SOME TESTIMONY TAKEN AT TRIAL

If McDonald is to be made an issue in this election fight, the Democrats of the state welcome that issue. McDonald is willing to stand on his record. It is open to the world for investigation. The governor is able to take care of himself. He needs no vindication at the hands of the people.

—Albuquerque Evening Herald. The Record of McDonald's speech August 31, 1916, at the Democratic Convention shows that he said: "That this bank (First State Bank of Las Cruces) was ever used for the benefit of the Democratic party, I challenge any one to prove."

The Record of the investigation of that bank shows that Mr. Wooters testified as follows:

Q. Do you recall among the assets of the Las Cruces bank a certain note signed by M. O. Llewellyn, J. H. Paxton, Hugh Clary and T. H. R. Smith?

A. Yes, sir.

Q. That is known, — is generally referred to as a political note?

A. Yes, sir.

Q. Did you ever have any conversation with Mr. Smith or any persons down there regarding that note, the cause of it and so on.

A. After the bank failed I did, yes, sir.

Q. With whom?

A. Why, I don't remember just exactly who, there were four or five directors and interested parties in the bank and myself at the meeting, going over all the notes. The conversation regarding this note was between Smith and Llewellyn.

Q. What was that conversation?

A. When I hit the note, turned it over and read the amount, I asked how much, — asked what it was worth, if Mr. Llewellyn was good for it. Smith spoke up and said it wasn't Mr. Llewellyn's note, it was really a note that he had signed, that was to be paid, the understanding was it was to be paid out of interest that was credited to one of the college accounts.

Q. It was to be paid by that money?

A. Yes, sir.

Q. And what was the note given for, according to that statement, originally?

A. A political proposition — didn't say what.

Q. Supposed to have been for the campaign fund.

A. I think so; yes sir.

Q. And this note covered the campaign contribution —

A. Of the First State Bank; yes sir.

Q. And it was to be paid by crediting the interest on the college account?

A. Yes, sir. The same Record shows that Mr. Ernest testified as follows:

Q. Governor McDonald knew generally the conditions of that bank and of Smith that were known to you, did he not?

A. He knew as much as I did.

Q. You kept him perfectly informed all the time?

A. Yes, sir, all correspondence and everything was submitted to the Governor.

This Report shows that the bank made a Democratic campaign contribution, that it was the understanding the same was to be paid out of interest on public funds, that the traveling auditor's office knew of this note, that traveling auditor swore that McDonald knew as much about the bank as he did.

The Record of McDonald's speech of August 30, further shows that he said:

"I deny as absolutely false the statement that I ever knew at any time prior to the closing of the bank that it was in an insolvent condition."

The Record of McDonald's letter written January 19, 1914, more than ten months before the bank failed, in which he acknowledged receipt of the McCarty report showing the bank to be insolvent, shows that he then wrote:

"I quite well understand the importance of this case and have already taken it up with the Traveling Auditor. Some action will be taken very shortly toward an adjustment that will put the bank in better shape if it is possible to accomplish that purpose. I assure you I appreciate your full statement of the case, as it gives me a better understanding than I have ever had before. This matter has been up for some time and I hope for a satisfactory solution or arrangement very shortly."

And McDonald is willing to stand on his Record.

DEMOCRATIC EFFORTS FAIL IN FIVE COUNTIES

Efforts to Throw Republicans of Santa Fe County into Alignment Against State Ticket Meets Defeat.

PLOTS TO DISRUPT MORA COUNTY QUICKLY ABANDONED

Santa Fe, N. M. Sept. 20:—Tremendous efforts put forward by the Democratic campaign managers, to effect fusion line-ups in five New Mexico counties have failed in every case and failed with a completeness which has discouraged the democratic campaign managers from further serious attempts of the kind. The catastrophe to the democratic fusion scheme in Santa Fe county is now a matter of history. It was a wreck of plans laid at great care and with no little preliminary expense and the wrecking was spectacular in the extreme. By working on an aroused local sentiment concerning county affairs the democratic campaign managers brought about a strong alignment of independent Republican, progressives, etc., with the few democrats who live in Santa Fe county. They held a convention in the state capitol and nonominated a county ticket which is not without element of strength. Thus far the scheme went well.

But the real object of the whole huge undertaking was to secure a repudiation by the Independents of the Republican state ticket. That is the main and only reason the convention was held. Thus the two hundred Republican delegates sitting in the convention flatly refused to do. Col. Bronson M. Cutting the ambitious young millionaire owner of the Santa Fe New Mexican, who asserts himself to be a supporter of Charles E. Hughes for president, and who is doing his utmost to defeat Hughes in New Mexico, made a vehement fight against the adoption of resolutions unequivocally endorsing both the national and state Republican tickets. He had but eight votes with him and the resolutions as adopted are as heart and as loyal to both state and national candidates as the most exacting among them could desire. The results of the convention will be a fight over the local county ticket, with the regular Republicans certain of victory and the normal or better than the normal Republican majorities for the national and state Republican tickets in Santa Fe county.

In San Miguel county democratic fusion plans have blown up without even a loud noise. A. A. Jones has used there, all his prayerful eloquence and persuasive powers and the whole box of democratic tricks has been unloosed. The democratic state organization has done its best. It has scored another flat and somewhat ignominious failure since it has been unable even to get a fair start. Some small encouragement had been held out to the fusion workers prior to the nomination of E. C. de Baca for Governor on Governor McDonald's understudy ticket. But since that time the bitter personal opposition to de Baca in his home county has solidified Republican lines and has brought about a democrat indifference which has rendered further efforts in San Miguel county.

Se ha reportado a los cuarteles generales americanos la captura de caballos y provisiones de la gente mejicana por la guarnición de tropas constitucionalistas en la región que la expedición punitiva limpió de bandidos. Se dice en Columbia, N. M., que sólo los mejicanos han padecido de esos métodos de nuevos bandidos habiendo, segun esos mismos reportes, seriamente impedido la restauración de la propiedad y el orden en esos distritos.

Extranjero.

M. Dimitracopoulos, a quien se le pidió formar un nuevo gabinete griego, es un partidario de la política del ex primer ministro Venizelos.

Algunas fuerzas constitucionalistas bajo comando del coronel Chapa encontraron y derrotaron un grupo villista en el distrito de Laguna, que es un partidario de la política del ex muertos y cierto número de caballos, segun reportes recibidos en la ciudad de Chihuahua del Gen. José Santos.

Los reportes recibidos en El Paso, Tex., por Americanos interesados en la industria minera de México dicen que los bandidos de Villa en la región oeste de Chihuahua han capturado un tren de carros automovilares americano, con toda su guardia y tomaron la suma de \$40,000 destinada para pagar los soldados americanos.

Washington.

RACE TO GET ON TICKET

CLOSE VOTE FOR CANDIDATES FOR ATTORNEY GENERAL.

Carlson Defeats Nicholson, Pulliam Ahead of Carringer, and Wheeler and Bailey Named for Supreme Court.

Denver, Sept. 18.—Primary election returns from practically all of the heavily populated counties, except Jefferson and Gunnison, pushed Samuel G. McMullin of Grand Junction back into first place in the race for attorney general. Totals of all votes received up to Sunday night gave the following: McMullin, 13,580; Robinson, 13,517; Rees, 13,139.

Governor Carlson's lead over Samuel D. Nicholson again leaped to where it was first claimed, following the close of the primaries by his supporters. The totals stood: Carlson 40,229; Nicholson, 36,701.

Wheeler last night was leading Bailey by 933 votes, and Musser trailed Bailey by 941 for Judges of the Supreme Court on the Democratic ticket.

James A. Pulliam of Durango is increasing his lead over Franklin E. Carringer of Jefferson county for the Democratic nomination for lieutenant governor. The totals last night stood: Pulliam, 17,121; Carringer, 15,402. This gives Pulliam a lead of 1,719.

Chief Justice William H. Gabbert of the Supreme Court undoubtedly has been renominated.

The board will begin the canvass Tuesday at the capitol, and it will probably be several days before they conclude the count on the Republican attorney generalship.

LOWDEN WINS IN ILLINOIS. Edward F. Dunn Renominated for Governor.

Chicago.—Frank O. Lowden is the Republican nominee for governor of Illinois with an estimated 120,000 votes to the good over Morton D. Hull, his nearest competitor. Frank L. Smith is third, not far behind Hull.

Edward F. Dunne was renominated for governor in the Democratic primary over William B. Brinton of Dixon, the Roger Sullivan entry, by a vote of avalanche proportions. He has carried Cook county by nearly three to one over Brinton, and he rolled up an even larger percentage of votes out in the state. In Sangamon county, of which Springfield is the county seat, Dunne beat his rival about five to one.

On the face of incomplete returns, William Lorimer is defeated by about 1,000 votes by Arthur W. Fulton for nomination for congressman from the Sixth district. Returns indicate Congressman Mann easily won the renomination over the Rev. Melbourn E. Boynton, candidate of the Anti-Saloon League.



ENTHUSIASM RUNS HIGH AS HEADS OF REPUBLICAN TICKET TOUR MORA COUNTY

Every Precinct in County Turns Out En Masse to Hear Addresses by Hubbell, Hernandez and Bursum—Eight Hundred Pack Court House at Mora.

Young Republicans Form Clubs All Over State

Ralph E. Twitchell, Orator, Historian and Publicist, Accepts Presidency of State Organization and Will Take Active Charge of Work.

(By Guthrie Smith.)

Taos, N. M., Sept. 21.—If the reception given to the heads of the Republican state ticket this week in their all-week tour of Mora county, is any indication of sentiment in New Mexico, the whole Republican ticket is on the way to election on a wave of popular favor that will produce a new record in majorities in the state. Frank A. Hubbell, candidate for the United States Senate, B. C. Hernandez, candidate for Congress to succeed himself, and Holm O. Bursum, candidate for governor form the party which began the week of Monday night with a meeting at Wagon Mound, when the whole population of the town and our bounding country turned out to hear the speakers. Thereafter the week was spent in a steady round of meetings, two and often three each day, ending with a grand meeting and demonstration at Mora, the county seat on Friday night when 800 people packed the Mora county court room to its doors while the candidates talked in detail upon the issues of the campaign. Mr. Hubbell and Mr. Hernandez devoting themselves to national issues and Mr. Bursum to the issues directly of concern to the state. It is said by some of the older residents of Mora county that this was one of the most remarkable meetings ever held in the county. The speaking began at 7:30 and ended at 11:45 and during that time not a man left the hall, nor for that matter a woman, of whom there were many. In fact a feature of this tour, which has been a revelation to the of the deep interest the people of New Mexico are taking in their public affairs, has been the large number of women in every audience.

Parade Half Mile Long.

The meeting at Mora ended an eventful day. Following a third day meeting at the little village of Cleaveland the candidates started on their way to the county seat. When three miles out from Mora they were met by a procession of Mora people fully half a mile long. At the head was a string band, then eight gaily decorated automobiles, twenty-two horse-drawn vehicles and about a hundred horsemen, each carrying an American flag. Behind these trailed a crowd of men, women and children on foot. The children carried baskets of flowers and as the parade reformed with the candidates at the head, they ran alongside the automobiles showering the visitors with flowers until the bodies of the cars were half filled. Mora county seems to be solid in its old time Republican strength. There is no evidence anywhere of disaffection among the voters. They approve of the Republican ticket. They know the men who form it and they are going to vote it with a record breaking total.

After a night's rest at Mora the party left Sunday morning for Taos county, where beginning with a big meeting at the county seat almost the same procedure and fully as enthusiastic a welcome has been accorded.

Fusion Efforts Fail.

Rumors have been spread industriously by Democratic campaign managers about alleged dissension among Republicans in Taos and Mora counties. No such thing exists. In Mora county the people are more solid in their adherence to the Republican state ticket than ever before. In Taos the stories of trouble in the ranks are purely fiction. From the

HUGHES FOR ARBITRATION.

He Would Be First to Accord to Labor All Rights Found Just After Consideration.

In his Maine speeches Mr. Hughes made it plain that he was not attacking labor or the equity of the proposed increase of wages for the railroad men. He was simply contending for the all important principle of arbitration as the right means of settlement of such questions. Speaking at different places in Maine, Mr. Hughes dwelt upon this question, saying:

"I deeply deplore, in the name of labor, in the name of justice, in the name of American ideals, the surrender of the Executive and of Congress to force, instead of permitting reason to reign.

"The measure to which I have alluded was not, properly speaking, an eight-hour measure. It was a wage measure. It was a plain proposition for a change in the wage scale. I do not speak of the equity of that. That is a matter to be fairly considered. I want what is just and right with respect to wages. I am for the arbitration and the peaceful settlement of these industrial controversies. We can settle everything in this country if we approach those matters with a fair and open mind and an examination of the facts.

"This particular measure shows on its face that it was legislation in advance of the investigation, instead of investigation in advance of legislation. It is said that there was in its favor the judgment of society. The judgment of society in this country has never been passed in favor of legislation without knowledge of the equity and regardless of the facts of the case. There was no judgment of society in favor of the roads which were exempted from its provisions. If there was a judgment of society, why not apply the rule to electric or other kinds of roads or roads less than 100 miles in length? I say, away with such pretense! It was a surrender to force instead of a clear, candid, faithful framed examination of the facts, and then action in accordance with American principles.

"Autocracy represents force; tyranny represents force. Democracy represents the rule of the common judgment after discussion, after an opportunity to know the facts."

NO ONE WAS AFRAID OF HAITI.

Haiti did not behave as badly to us as Mexico behaved; but Mr. Wilson intervened, fought the Haitians, shedding their blood and the blood of our troops, took possession and now has our armed forces in control of Haiti and directing its government. His course of action in Haiti can be defended only if his course of action in Mexico is unqualifiedly condemned; for such action was far more needed in Mexico than in Haiti. But there was a difference in the two cases; and to Mr. Wilson it was a vital difference. Haiti was weaker than Mexico. No one was afraid of Haiti.—From the speech of Colonel Roosevelt delivered at Lewiston, Maine, in behalf of Charles E. Hughes.

DR. HARVEY W. WILEY TO VOTE FOR HUGHES.

He Says Wilson Has Failed to Enforce Pure Food Law.

"I favor the election of Mr. Hughes to the Presidency for entirely different reasons than those held by most of his supporters. It is not because of the Mexican policy nor the foreign policy of the Administration nor by reason of its domestic policies. It is because of the apparent indifference of the Administration of President Wilson to the cause of pure food and drugs. Practically all of the abuses which were injected into the Pure Food Law by the preceding Administrations are still in force. Benzene of soda is still rampant. The fumes of burning sulphur are marching along undisturbed. There is evidently a lull in the activities of the Administration of the law. A well-known beverage, declared by the Supreme Court misbranded and amenable to the Food Law has not been molested. No attempt has been made to enforce the law in regard to the bleaching of flour. The repeal of the mixed flour law, that splendid safeguard to the purity of our bread, has been tacitly approved by the Treasury Department.

"Mr. Hughes in his activities on the Supreme Court has stood like a stone wall for the proper Administration of the Food Law. I believe his election would see a radical change

Sometimes you hear men, sensible men, too, say, "I'm going to vote for Wilson this year because he kept us out of war."

Ask such men a short question. Ask them, "Out of what war?"

Did Mr. Wilson keep us out of the European war? No. He has himself in a formal address to congress spoken of the European war as "a war with which we have nothing to do, a war whose causes do not touch us." How could Mr. Wilson keep us out of a war with which we have nothing to do and whose causes do not touch us?

Did he keep the rest of the western hemisphere out of the European war? No independent nation on this side of the world is involved in it; the only people in it are the colonies of European powers and they had no voice in their fate, for they were automatically at war when their mother governments went to war. Who kept Argentina, Brazil, Chile, Peru, out of the European war? Did Mr. Wilson?

Did Mr. Wilson keep us out of war with Mexico? No. In his term more Americans have been killed by Mexicans and more American property has been destroyed by Mexicans than by Spaniards during the whole Spanish war. In his term we have seized a Mexican port and have sent our entire regular army and militia to fight Mexicans. In his term Mexican armed forces have invaded American soil and fought battles against our people within our boundaries.

President Taft went through two Mexican revolutions during his term, the revolution against Diaz and the revolution against Madero. American lives were safe in Mexico during that time. No Mexican cities were seized by Americans and no armed Mexicans

invaded the United States while Mr. Taft was in the White House. Yet Mr. Taft never thought of asking the American people to vote for him because he kept us out of war with Mexico. He put an embargo on arms so that American weapons would not be sent across the boundary, and he refused to interfere in Mexican affairs. When he left office Mexicans liked Americans and Americans were safe in Mexico. Since he left office Mexicans hate Americans and Americans dare not remain in Mexico. Did Mr. Wilson keep us out of war with Mexico? Not if words mean anything.

Mr. Wilson did not keep us out of the European war and he did not keep us out of war with Mexico.

Out of what war, then?—Detroit Free Press.

400,000 MEN IN SOMME ATTACK

BRITISH TAKE 4,000 PRISONERS IN THRUST AT GERMANS SOUTH OF ANCRE.

SERBIANS VICTORIOUS

BULGAR-TEUTONS SEIZE GROUND WON BY RUMANIANS IN THE SECOND BALKAN WAR.

Western Newspaper Union News Service.

London, Sept. 19.—Gen. Haig, commander of the British forces on the Somme front, reports the capture of additional German prisoners to the number of 1,700, making the total captured for two days more than 4,000.

Continuation of the battle is reported in the British official statement south of the Ancre river. The British proceeded methodically with their attack begun Friday, and Germans responded with heavy counter attacks both against British and French. Comparative quiet, however, reigned along the French section of the Somme front although the French report some progress north of Bouchavesnes and the capture of a trench northeast of Bery.

The advance of the British in France apparently has halted momentarily, while Gen. Haig's men consolidate the ground gained and withstand German counter attacks. Crown Prince Rupprecht of Bavaria launched futile attacks against the new positions. Berlin admits the loss of Courcellette, Martinpuich and Fiers, but declares that strong British attacks against Combles were ineffective.

It is estimated by the Germans that twenty divisions, or about 400,000 men, took part in the Anglo-French drive Friday. Berlin says the British made progress, and that the French assaults south of the Somme were repulsed.

German positions exceeding four miles in length were captured Saturday night and Sunday by the British and French armies in the Somme region. War material and many prisoners were captured. German counter attacks were repulsed with large losses to the Germans, according to London.

Bulgarian troops assisted by Germans and Turks have regained virtually all that part of Dobrudja taken by Rumania during the second Balkan war. Forces of the central powers have driven Russians and Rumanians back to the line running north of Silistria on the Danube to Mangalia on the Black Sea coast.

The Rumanian advance in Transylvania is meeting with stiff resistance from the Austro-German forces. Attempts of the Rumanians to cross the Alt river were checked. At Hatzeg, Rumanian positions were taken.

Italian troops are succeeding in their new offensive toward Trieste, Rome says. Several important positions on the line of the Vallone were taken from the Austrians, and the Italians also captured more than 1,000 prisoners.

According to the entente capitals, the advance of the French, British and Serbians in Macedonia against the German and Bulgarian forces continues successfully.

The most violent fighting is taking place west of Lake Ostrovo, where the Serbians are said to have routed the troops of the central powers. The Serbians have advanced northeast of Florina and have captured thirty-two cannon.

TWENTY-SEVEN VILLISTAS SLAIN

Bandit Attack on Chihuahua City is Repulsed by Carranza Troops.
El Paso, Tex., Sept. 18.—Francisco Villa and forces numbering upwards of 1,000 men attacked Chihuahua City, Mexico, according to a government official statement by Gen. Gonzales in Juarez. The statement says Villa was repulsed, losing twenty-seven dead and more than 100 prisoners, all of whom were shot. The government casualties were not stated.

Because of the simultaneous outbreak of Villa's sympathizers in Chihuahua City the state capital was placed under martial law and the decree was extended to embrace the state.

The battle, according to details made public by Gen. Gonzales, lasted thirteen hours. Villa had previously given warning he would attack on Mexican Independence Day, Sept. 16, but no weight was attached to the declaration. At 4 o'clock in the morning, however, the capital was attacked from three sides—the west, east and north. The defending troops consisted of about 2,000 men.

"Ball Lightning."

Some progress is reported in solving the mystery of "ball lightning." An investigator enumerates three significant characteristics of the phenomenon: The body or ball itself, which is able to retain its individuality as it moves through the air, appears to be composed of gas or matter in some novel luminous condition. The balls appear to exist independently of any large electrical intensity, for they have been observed within closed rooms where large electrical fields are impossible, to have also been observed to pass in and out of parallel telegraph wires. They appear to be associated directly or indirectly with large quantities of energy, for they have been observed to explode with violence and have also been seen to fuse the overhead wire of an electric railway. Dr. G. C. Simpson is inclined to connect the phenomenon of ball lightning with the fact that a mass of nitrogen can be put, by means of an electric discharge, into a state in which it continues to glow for some time after being removed from the electrical field.
