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ADAMSON LAW HELD INVALID BY COURT

Unconstitutional, Rules Federal Judge Hook, of Kansas City.

HELPS HASTEN FINAL DECISION IN MATTER

Kansas City, Mo., Nov. 22.—The Adamson eight-hour law was held unconstitutional here today by Judge William C. Hook in United States district court.

Judge Hook directed the receivers of the Missouri, Oklahoma and Gulf railroad, which brought the original action in this case, to enjoin the law from going into effect, to assist the government in expediting the case to the supreme court of the United States for final decision and instructed them, through their attorneys, to invite the representatives of every railroad in this country to participate in the hearings before the highest court in the land. This was requested in the government's motion to dismiss the injunction petition of the railroad, the government desiring to avoid "prolonged, unnecessary and scattered litigation" through the hearing of countless similar suits filed by every railroad system in every federal district in the United States through which their lines run. It is expected that the ultimate decision as to whether the law will go into effect January 1 will be handed down before that time. A transcript of the present case will be filed at the supreme court before it reconvenes December 4.

Neither the attorneys for many large railroad systems, who were present in court, nor the government counsel present, would comment on the decree. Apparently both sides regarded the case only as a means of hastening a decision by the supreme court which is the final arbiter.

The text of Judge Hook's decree follows:

"This is an independent suit to enjoin the enforcement of a recent act of congress, commonly called the Adamson law, upon the ground that it is contrary to the constitution. In the plaintiff's bill of complaint is stated to be typical of a number recently filed by railroad companies in various district courts of the United States. A motion to dismiss has been presented on behalf of the defendant United States attorney. The sole question raised by it is that of the constitutionality of the law. The court is informed that the other cases stand on applications for temporary injunctions.

"An appeal from an organ granting or refusing a temporary injunction goes to the circuit court of appeals and not further by ordinary procedure, while an appeal from a final order or decree in such case would go directly to the supreme court of

the United States.

"The former decision would be inconclusive, the latter decision would settle definitely the question for the whole country. The motion to dismiss the case here, however, it is decided, will result promptly in a final decree from which an appeal will be taken to the supreme court.

"The assistance of this court has been invoked to facilitate a final and authoritative determination of the constitutional question. The case was presented but yesterday and a decision is due today. It is far from being an agreeable duty for a judge to record a judicial conclusion without the care and deliberation essential to a conviction that he would stand to in every circumstance. Upon the merits of a case the government neither asks nor receives, from a court greater consideration than is required by the settled rules and presumptions of law; but a request by the department of justice to aid the progress of a case consistently with the rights of every one cannot be declined, certainly not for personal considerations.

"Upon a consideration of the Adamson law and of what is said of its practical effect and what was intended to be accomplished by it, the judgment is that as the court construes the terms of the law, it cannot be sustained.

"Since both parties have said they would not plead further, whatever the decision might be, a decree will be entered for the plaintiff, reciting that the defendant prays and is allowed an appeal in open court. The case in which the plaintiffs were appointed receivers is in charge of the judge who is acting here. An order will be entered in that case directing plaintiffs and their counsel to co-operate with the department of justice in lodging the appeal in the supreme court by December 4 next and in then moving for the advancement thereof for such early hearing as that court may find it consistent to grant; also to invite counsel for all railroad companies and others similarly interested in the question involved to participate in the presentation of the motion to advance and in the arguments on the merits. Though the decree of the court in the case here will be final in form, yet because of the exceptional circumstances, the plaintiffs will be directed to keep their accounts and be prepared promptly to pay their employees on the basis of the Adamson law should the decree be not sustained."

CONDUCTOR LOSES FOOT IN ACCIDENT

Defective Step Said to Have Precipitated Man Beneath Moving Train.

PROMPTLY REMOVED TO EL PASO HOSPITAL

His train was taking the hole at Coyote to let number Four, The Golden State Limited have the main line and a defective step gave way with Mr. Schaeffer on it, thus throwing him under the wheels of his train with the aforementioned result. The unfortunate man was rushed here and after first aid by Doctors Lucas and Paden, He was transferred to the company hospital at El Paso where his condition is the best possible under the serious circumstances and extreme shock. This reminds us of the accident which William Chisholm suffered through the giving way of a defective hand-hold near Torrance one month ago and the consequent injury of hand rendering it practically worthless.

Injured When Car Collides With Truck

Word has been received here of the serious injuries which were sustained by Miss Nell Coomes at her home in Evansville, Indiana, several days ago, when a car in which she was a passenger collided with a heavy truck at one of the street crossings in that city.

Miss Coomes is well known in Carrizozo, having spent the past three or four summers here with her sister, Mrs. J. E. Bell. She is official court reporter for the Superior Court at Evansville, and in company with two or three other ladies were down town after supper attending a political rally, celebrating the news of President Wilson's reelection. It was while they were returning home in a taxicab that their driver allowed his car to collide with a motor truck, badly smashing the taxi and more or less seriously injuring its occupants. Miss Coomes was reported the most seriously injured and physicians state that it may be several weeks before she will be able to resume her duties as court reporter, according to word received here by Mrs. Bell.

Republicans to Keep Headquarters Open

Santa Fe, N. M.—Permanent Republican headquarters are to be retained in Santa Fe with W. H. Gillenwater in charge, in view that elections for state officers are now only two years apart, and that the next state primaries are only eighteen months away. Every effort will be made to strengthen the republican organization and press. Democratic state headquarters has been moved from the Renshan block to the Lahlun block and will be kept open until the official canvass on November 27, when both parties will have eminent legal talent at the count by the state canvassing board, which consists of Chief Justice C. J. Roberts, Governor McDonald and Secretary of State Antonio Lucero.

Farm Loan Board Mem- bers Visit New Mexico

Members of the Farm Loan Board appointed several months ago by President Wilson to put the provisions of the Farm Loan Act in operation, visited Albuquerque the first of the week for the purpose of studying the situation in New Mexico. The board is making an investigation of twelve feasible places in the United States to establish Farm Loan Banks.

The members of the commission are George W. Norris, Philadelphia; Judge Charles E. Lobdell, Kansas; Capt. W. S. Al Smith, Iowa; Herbert Quick, Secretary McAdoo is chairman of the commission, ex-officio.

All the members of the commission were present at the Albuquerque meeting with the exception of Secretary McAdoo, who had gone for a visit on the coast. There were a large number of men from different sections of New Mexico who attended to confer with the board.

Geo. W. Norris, of the commission, presided in the absence of Secretary McAdoo, and his address included the following remarks relative to the law and its purposes:

STATE WIDE MAY BE HERE IN SPRING

Probable That Prohibition Issue Will be Brought to Light.

LEGISLATIVE BODY TO CONSIDER ACT

The resolution to submit the question of statewide prohibition to the voters next year will be the first to be introduced at the legislative session. If present plans are successful, prohibitionists feel that the pledge of both parties to submit the question will be kept, especially since E. C. de Baca, elected governor, is a pronounced prohibitionist, as is also W. E. Lindsey, who, as lieutenant governor, will preside over the state senate and will act as governor whenever E. C. de Baca is out of the state. In fact prohibitionists assert that they threw several thousand votes to both men and elected them because of their unequivocal stand for prohibition.

They assert further that it was this factor which re-elected Chief Justice Clarence J. Roberts, J. H. Wagner, elected superintendent of public instruction, is also a prohibitionist. The fact that Antonio Lucero ran so far ahead of his ticket is ascribed to the same influence as is the close race that Attorney Patton gave such a popular veteran as Frank W. Clancy for the attorney generalship. Wherever a pronounced prohibitionist on the state ticket, the former won.

At the same time that the prohibition question is submitted to the voters, the woman's suffrage amendment to the constitution, pledged by both parties, will also be submitted, but because of the difficulty of amending the franchise section of the state constitution, will hardly succeed at the polls.—Clovis Journal.

Fined for Killing Doe.

The Supervisor of the Apache National Forest, Located in the White Mountains, has reported the arrest and conviction of Remidio Gonzales of Motcalf, Arizona for violating the game law. Gonzales was charged with illegally killing a doe and was fined \$50 and costs. Forest Ranger Warner apprehended the offender.

It is said to have been a long time since anyone has been convicted for breaking the game laws in this vicinity, and Forest officers and State officials are hoping that the conviction will have a salutary effect in checking illegal slaughter of game in the White Mountains, which ought to become one of the richest game countries in the southwest.

La Asociación de banqueros de Nuevo Mexico tuvo su mitin anual en Albuquerque.

La cosecha de frijoles del valle de Estancia esta estación ha dado a los agricultores hacia \$100,000.

La lista de casos criminales para la sesión de noviembre de la corte de distrito en Roswell es corta.



COUPLE STRIVE TO DEATH

Out of Work, Husband and Wife Give Up Fight—Woman Dies Days Before Man.

Passaic, N. J.—With nothing to eat and after they had searched for weeks for employment, Steven Farley and his wife gave up their struggle. They were found by Policeman Vander Hoven, who broke into their home. They lay in each other's arms in bed.

The woman had been dead for days. Farley died as he was being rushed to St. Mary's hospital. He was about fifty years old and his wife forty-eight. The Farleys were old residents here. Farley was born in New York City. Mrs. Farley, it is believed, also came from New York.

They had not attempted suicide, the authorities at the hospital say. Death in each case was caused by starvation.



Farm Loan Board Members Visit New Mexico

(Continued From Front Page.)

"The loan plan is not for the benefit of the speculator," said Mr. Norris, "but the assistance of men who are now engaged in the cultivation of lands. The money will be loaned to pay off any debt or to make any improvement on the lands.

"We find that in a great number of sections there is a great misunderstanding of the law, and we want to make clear what this act provides. This is purely a business proposition. It is to help men who are doing farm work and to make their loans more easily secured.

"It is not to benefit the speculator, but is for the purpose of men who are engaged in the cultivation of land. They will be able to borrow under this act up to one-half the value of their land, the loan not to be less \$100 nor more than \$10,000, and the money may be borrowed from five to forty years.

"They will be able to borrow to pay off any debt or to make any improvement on the land. These improvements include not only the buildings on the farm but the fencing of the ground, purchasing of livestock, or in fact anything that adds to the productivity of the property.

"Those who want to borrow must become members of some one of these farm loan associations. A farm loan association must consist of at least ten men and must have a board of directors.

"No association is responsible for the debts of another association. It is a system to give capital development and equal-

ize the interest rates of farm loans.

"One of the advantages of this act is to encourage thrift in the farmer and help them to get out of debt.

In answer to some of the questions that were brought up

the board stated that in sparsely settled regions an association may cover more than one community, and the borrower does not have to be living on the land in order to borrow. He will not be restricted in borrowing because of his location if his land is at all valuable.



Thanksgiving a Day for all the People

Of all the religious festivals of the year, Thanksgiving is the only one that is for all the people. Christmas and Easter and the whole series of Christian festivals are for Christians only. The Jews have their Rosh Hoshona and their Passover. The Mohammedans among us have their Ramadan, and even the Chinese have their feast days, which they observe in their own peculiar manner.

Each religion has its own, but there is one Thanksgiving Day for all, when all, of whatever faith, can in their own way, call on God and praise Jesus or Mohammed or Budha. November 18, 1787, was our first national Thanksgiving Day ordained by the act of Continental Congress, and proclaimed by George Washington. The day was set apart in the words of the resolution, to express gratitude that God had been pleased to 'smile on us in the prosecution of a just and necessary war for the defense and establishment of our unalienable rights and liberty.'

The constitution had just been adopted and before the act setting aside this day of thanksgiving had been finally passed, there had been not a little discussion in Congress about the propriety of the presidents' asking the people to give thanks for a constitution for which some of them were not thankful.

It was later that the last Thursday in November came to be the day chosen, when no marked event indicated another day, and the thanks of the nation united under the constitution were expressed on November 28, 1789.

Since that day the custom has never been omitted entirely, although until the Civil War it was only occasionally observed, except in New England. It was our Civil War which brought the people to a sense of national oneness and since 1863 the President of the United States has annually issued a proclamation of thanksgiving. But what president or prophet or sage in 1861 could have dreamed that half a century later the lines of such a proclamation would go out to all the world?



O'Brien tried to arrest Pleasant Pruitt of Edinburg for intoxication and got into trouble on the same charge himself. Pruitt was inclined to admit that the charge was true, and officer and prisoner started to the jail

together. O'Brien was drunk himself and fell down before the jail was reached.

"Looky here," said Pruitt, who was holding O'Brien up, "you're liable to drag me down in the mud and get me all dirty. I'm goin' to take you back here and let you sit down."

So Pruitt took charge of the constable and returned him to the waiting room of the Indianapolis, Columbus and Southern Traction company. There O'Brien went to sleep and his prisoner boarded a car for Edinburg. Two policemen came along and found O'Brien sleeping. They placed him in jail. In the city court he pleaded guilty to the charge of intoxication and Mayor Volland fined him \$1 and costs. In default of payment he went to jail for eleven days.

Western Newspaper Union News Service.
Acercas de la Guerra.

Los Austro-Alemanes reportan un progreso en Transylvania, forzando la retirada de los Rumanos en los valles de Alt yallul.

Los Rusos continúan persiguiendo a los derrotados Alemanes en Dobrudja, quemando Von Falkenhayn las aldeas en su retirada.

Londres anuncia que 5,678 prisioneros han sido capturados en el frente del Ancre, en tres días, en ataques contra los Alemanes.

Los Alemanes sufren pérdidas tremendas en determinados contrataques en el Somme. París dice que todos los ataques han sido en vano.

Berlin declara que todos los ataques británicos excepto los que resultaron en la captura de Beaucourt fueron repulsados con pérdidas grandes.

Los Italianos han sido obligados salir de una posición atrincherada en la región del este de Gorizia a causa de un gran bombardeo por los Austriacos.

Washington.

La Casa Blanca oficialmente anunció que el Presidente Wilson había designado el 30 de noviembre para día de dar gracias.

Probablemente el Presidente Wilson se alejará un poco de los precedentes y prestará juramento en su oficina de presidente de los Estados Unidos el domingo 3 de marzo. Según el presente plan la inauguración tendrá lugar el 5 de marzo.

El Presidente Wilson expresó su gratitud al pueblo del oeste de los Estados Unidos por su apoyo en las elecciones. Envió sus gracias en mensajes contestando a las invitaciones para que viniera al oeste a visitar sus electores antes de la apertura del congreso. Dijo que le sería imposible al presente hacer el viaje debido a unos deberes críticos, pero dió su promesa de visitar el oeste tan pronto como le fuesen posible.

Extranjero.

El rey Jorge en Londres firmó las energías medidas que pondrán debajo del poder de un solo hombre todos los viveres de la nación.

Treinta y tres vapores han sido hundidos sin previo aviso por los submarinos teutones desde el 15 de mayo hasta el 3 de noviembre. Según anuncia en Londres el almirantazgo, diciendo que de este hecho se perdieron 140 vidas.

tions of the United States.

Several times California in a stubborn and belligerent mood has almost put the alternative of war or humiliation up to the rest of the nation. Some day, when Japan is ready, a California offense will result in the seizure of the Philippines and Hawaii.

California makes the trouble and expects the rest of the country to protect it. It may make a war and drag the rest of the country into it. California is our junker state in all except willingness to strengthen the ability of the federal government to meet the trouble it may make and is perfectly willing to make.

California ought to have given the Republican ticket a great majority. A state which demands the privilege of making trouble ought to be willing to meet it. It ought to be willing to take ordinary precautions against consequences.

California now seems to be concerned chiefly for the right to bluster. The moral condition of some little rotten spot in the

interior of the United States can be understood. But California presents a long coast line which it demands that the United States shall defend. It wants a Pacific navy. It seems to have voted for a Pacific navy.

How a state which when it is not scared to death itself is scaring the rest of the nation to death could have given two votes in a precinct to the administration which maintains Josephus Daniels as schoolmaster of the American navy is a question beyond normal intelligence.

By giving Wilson the vote it did, California, with its record and Wilson's record, presented itself as the champion boob state of the American republic.

The only thing needed for the perfection of the irony was that the workers who want Japs excluded in order that American standards of comfort shall not be lowered, should have tried to deliver the state to the administration which has tried to break down national courage.

California, which wants everything for itself, is inclined in the direction of an administration which blandly says that it does not demand for the rest of humanity. What a sweet vaporing of humanity for California to snuff up eagerly—California, which wants nothing more for itself than it wants for the Japanese!

The state which has put the nation on the edge of war several times kept it in suspense for forty-eight hours in this election when the issue was one which should have been decided in this outpost state in two hours.

Some day California may have a Japanese governor—for a while. The rest of the nation eventually

will annul his commission, but he may be there for awhile.

If California gets its Japanese governor there may be men who will recall that in a time of national emergency they voted for the party which wishes to be just as sweet to the rest of humanity as it is to California.

One of Kipling's characters, a chaplain with a burr under his tongue, quoted: "Quem Deus volt perdere, prius dementat," which, translated, means, "When people insist upon getting it in the neck, they are first made dead from the neck up." Chicago Tribune.
