**Government Issues Patent
Only to Surface Rights—
Restraints Also Placed Up-
on Bodies of Water.**

**SECRETARY OF INTERIOR
MAY MAKE SPECIAL RULES**

(Continued From Last Week.)

Sec. 9. That all entries made and patents issued under the provisions of this act shall be subject to and contain reservation to the United States of all the coal and other minerals in the lands so entered and patented, together with the right to prospect for, mine and remove the same. The coal and other mineral deposits in such lands shall be subject to disposal by the United States in accordance with the provisions of the coal and mineral kind laws in force at the time of such disposal. Any person qualified to locate and enter the coal or other mineral deposits, or having the right to mine and remove the same under the laws of the United States, shall have the right at all times to enter upon the lands entered or patented, as provided by this act, for the purpose of prospecting for coal or other mineral therein, provided he shall not injure, damage, or destroy the permanent improvements of the entryman or patentee and shall be liable to and shall compensate the entryman or patentee for all damages to the crops on such lands by reason of such prospecting. Any person who has acquired from the United States the coal or other mineral deposits in any such land, or the right to mine and remove the same, may re-enter and occupy so much of the surface thereof as may be required for all purposes reasonably incident to the mining or removal of the coal or other minerals, first, upon securing the written consent or waiver of the homestead entryman or patentee; second, upon payment of the damages to crops or other tangible improvements to the owner thereof, where agreement may be had of to the amount thereof; or, third, in lieu of either of the foregoing provisions, upon the execution of a good and sufficient bond or undertaking to the United States for the use and benefit of the entryman or owner of the land, to secure the payment of such damages to the crops or tangible improvements of the entryman or owner, as may be determined and fixed in an action brought upon the bond or undertaking in a court of competent jurisdiction against the principal and sureties thereon, such bond or undertaking to be in form and in accordance with rules and regulations prescribed by the secretary of the interior and to be filed with and approved

by the register and receiver of the local land office of the district wherein the land is situate, subject for appeal to the commissioner of the general office: Provided, That all patents issued for the coal or other mineral deposits herein reserved shall contain appropriate notations declaring them to be subject to the provisions of this act with reference to the disposition, occupancy, and use of the land as permitted to an entryman under this act.

Sec. 19. That lands containing water holes or other bodies of water needed or used by the public for watering purposes shall not be designated under this act but may be reserved under the provisions of the act of June 25, 1910, and such lands heretofore or here after reserved shall, while so reserved be kept and held open to the public use for such purposes under such general rules and regulations as the secretary of the interior may prescribe: Provided, That the secretary may, in his discretion, also withdraw from entry lands necessary to insure access by the public to watering places reserved hereunder and needed for use in the movement of stock to summer and winter ranges or to shipping points, and may prescribe such rules and regulations as may be necessary for the proper administration and use of such lands: Provided further, That such driveways shall not be of greater number or width than shall be clearly necessary for the purpose proposed and in no event shall be more than one mile in width for a driveway less than 20 miles in length, not more than two miles in width for driveways over 200 and not over 25 miles in length and not over five miles in width for driveways over 35 miles in length: Provided further, That all stock so transported over such driveways shall be moved an average of not less than three miles per day for sheep and goats and an average of not less than six miles per day for cattle and horses.

Sec. 11. That the secretary of the interior is hereby authorized to make all necessary rules and regulations in harmony with the provision and purposes of this act for the purpose of carrying the same into effect.

Wright to be Assistant.

Announcement is made that T. F. Wright, assistant cashier of the First National bank, of Guymon, Okla., has been chosen to fill a similar position with the First National of Carrizozo.

Luster, arrived Thursday morning to be present at the funeral of Mr. Luster which was held Friday. They expect to remain here several days.

THOS. O. LUSTER

Thos. O. Luster, for the past two years editor and publisher of the Carrizozo Outlook, died at his home here Tuesday afternoon at 12:50 o'clock following a lingering illness extending over a period of five months.

Although for some time it had been realized that Mr. Luster was in a precarious condition and that his recovery was very doubtful, it was not until the past two weeks that it became apparent his departure from this earth was so near. Everything that a devoted, faithful and untiring wife and staunch and true friends could do for him was done, but to no avail. He was hopeful until the very last and bore his sufferings patiently.

Thos. O. Luster was born in Benton, Illinois, July 28, 1886, and was the youngest son of Mr. and Mrs. A. J. Luster of that city. On November 20th 1911 he was united in marriage to Miss Hannah Duncan, of Murphysboro, Illinois, and soon thereafter he came to Carrizozo, then the typical young man, to grow up with the great West. About six months later Mrs. Luster joined him and they have since been numbered among our most enterprising and worthy citizens. Mr. Luster was employed in the local newspaper offices until February, 1915, when he purchased the Outlook and since that time the name of Thos. O. Luster has been appended at the masthead of this popular publication as its editor and publisher. He has made hundreds of friends since locating here and in the departure of Editor Luster the town feels the loss of one of its strongest boosters and most uplifting citizens.

Funeral services were held at the Baptist church, of which deceased was a member, Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock, conducted by Rev. J. M. Gardner, assisted by Rev. Arthur Marston. Services were in charge of the I. O. O. F. and K. of P. lodges, deceased being a member in good standing of both orders. Many were the beautiful floral offerings which evidenced the high esteem in which he was held by the people of Carrizozo. All business houses were closed from 1:30 until 3.

He leaves, beside the sorrowing wife, his father and mother and one brother and one sister, all of whom reside in Benton, Illinois. Interment was made in the local cemetery.

He still retains his position with the Stockmen's State bank of Corona and will probably spend a day or two each week at that place looking after the affairs of this bank which is under the same management.

TULLY WOULD HAVE LAWS HARMONIZED

**Introduces Bill Which Would
Conform State Laws to
Terms of Now Existing
Federal Road Laws.**

**WOULD MAKE POSSIBLE
RECEIPT OF \$5,000,000**

State Senator J. V. Tully is another of the state's good road boosters, having last week introduced a bill in the upper house, Senate Bill No. 38, the terms of which conforms our state laws to the Federal road laws, and by virtue of which New Mexico stands a chance to receive about five million dollars in five years as her share of the appropriation.

Full text of the bill introduced by Mr. Tully follows:

"AN ACT authorizing the New Mexico State Highway Department to enter into contracts and agreement with the United States Government relating to the construction and maintenance of rural post roads:

"Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of New Mexico:

"Section 1. That the legislature of the State of New Mexico hereby assents to the provisions of the act of Congress, approved July 11, 1916, entitled, "An Act to provide that the United States shall aid the states in the construction of rural post roads, and for other purposes." The State Highway Department is hereby authorized to enter into all contracts and agreements with the United States Government relating to the construction and maintenance of rural post roads under the provisions of the said Act of Congress, to submit such scheme or program of construction and maintenance as may be required by the Secretary of Agriculture and do all other things necessary fully to carry out the cooperation contemplated and provided for by the said Act. The good faith of the State is hereby pledged to make available funds sufficient to equal the sums apportioned to this state by the United States Government during each of the five years for which federal funds are appropriated by the said Act and to maintain the roads constructed under the provisions of said Act, and to make adequate provision for carrying out such maintenance. All moneys accruing to the State Highway Fund and available for expenditure in the construction and maintenance of highways, and all federal funds apportioned to this state under the said Act of Congress, shall be expended upon the highways comprising the system of state roads."

IN MEMORIUM

Clustering about the flowers that are blooming there, mingling with the oppressive silence that shrouds the revered spot, and quivering amidst the gloom of the grave, the holiest memories speak in tones that reverberate from crag to crag and fill the ear and thrill the sorrowing heart. All that there was of the life that has faded slowly into the night of endless sleep; its lights and its shadows; its nobility; its power and its purity, pass before us like a rapidly moving panorama. It is under such influences, with such a thrilling picture of days gone by and of worthy deeds recorded in letters of gold, that we pause for a space of time to speak to and of the beloved dead.

Thomas O. Luster, for the past two years editor and publisher of the Carrizozo Outlook, has departed this life. It is with a heavy heart that it becomes our sad duty to chronicle his untimely death; for truly a noble man yet in the beautiful bloom of youth has fallen—has fallen before the cruel sickle of destruction. The end was as peaceful as the close of the beautiful summer day, when daylight fades into night with increasing loveliness.

The writer regrets that it was not his good fortune to have known him longer and more intimately, but since our coming to Carrizozo about the middle of November we have only known him to esteem him more highly as the days passed slowly by. Today we miss his kindly smile and friendly greeting; we long in vain to hear his jovial laughter and to feel again his genial presence. Only yesterday we sat before his bier in the church. Only yesterday we stood by his open grave as the last sad rites were performed, and as the clay of earth closed above his silent resting place, we said with the poet:

"Cold in the dust that perished heart
may lie
But that which warmed it once can
never die."

As we stood beside his grave
on yesterday when the sky was

trimmed with her gorgeous rosy hue, in fancy we could see him—not in death's cold shroud of sorrow and despair, but smiling upon us from the sunset halo that marks God's farewell to the day—smiling with all the well remembered grace of his manhood, love and devotion; and saying to us:

"The sunset speaks but feebly of the
glories of
Another day. All is well."

His last words were expressive of peace in God and a willingness to depart and be at rest with Him. His cheerful, helpful life; his devotion to his faithful and excellent wife whose never dying kindnesses were lavished upon him, and his goodness to everybody will long linger as a fragrant memory in the home which his presence brightened and which death has now darkened. His death has brought the bitter cup of sorrow to the lips of friends and relatives. Verily, his was a heart of gold. He was one of nature's noblemen in its truest sense—brave, generous, manly. His was a soul of honor and his friends and friendships were sacred to him. He was a devoted husband and to his innumerable friends he was the soul of fellowship. But the greatest of all was, he was a man. And as a man it is that those who knew him best most loved to contemplate him. He believed in the Fatherhood of God and the Brotherhood of Man. He believed that the man who scatters flowers in the pathway of his fellowmen, who lets into the dark places of life the sunshine of human sympathy and human happiness, is following in the footsteps of his Master. Though he is gone, his record has been made and will remain with us as a lasting treasure. His life was gentle, but like the still waters it was deep. In his heart of hearts he carried those he loved, and his hand was never weary, his step never faltered in caring for and ministering to those who were in any way dependent upon him.

We can only remind those who mourn that he sleepeth—sleepeth only until the glorious resurrection morn when all the dead in Christ shall rise, resting after a brief but well-spent life here. Behind the storm clouds always lurks the rainbow and when the storm is past it weeps upon the flowers of the land and the pearls of the sea. Darkness precedes the dawning and out of the blackness of night comes the sunshine and joy of the day. And so from the beauty of his life we should all take an inspiration and go forth to live as he lived, so that when the summons comes we may say as did he—

"All is well."

Nature's Great Hoedoo Temple.
