## COUNTY TEACHERS' ASSOCIATION TO BE HELD APRIL 6-7

Pedagogues of Lincoln County to Enjoy Hospitality of Capitan During Two Days of Interesting Session.

### PROMINENT EDUCATORS TO BE PRESENT

The Lincoln County Teachers' Association will convene at Capitan Friday, April 6th, for a highly interesting two days' session, and every teacher in the county is being impressed with the importance of attending and enjoying a rare intellectual treat. Exhibits will be made by all the schools of the county prepared to give such, and prominent educators from nearly all the state educational institutions have promised to be present and address the teachers on various important subjects.

Among those who have arranged to be present are: Editor Journal of Education, Santa Fe; Major J. Ross Thomas, instructor Military Institute, Roswell; Professor Conway, head of the Boy's and Girl's Club department U. S. Department of Agriculture, A. & M. College, Las Cruces; Dr. Enlowe, of the Silver City Normal, and Assistant State Superintendent John V. Conway, of Santa Fe. The subject assigned to Major Thomas is "Military Training in the Public Schools." Assistant Superintendent Conway will address the teachers in the Spanish tongue.

The town of Capitan has arranged to entertain all teachers who attend free of charge. Prof. C. Y. Belknap is president of the association.

The Domestic Science classes of the high school will give a dinner to the visitors Friday night and the ladies of the town will repeat the dinner Saturday night.

### April is War Month of the United States

With the exception of the war with Great Britain in 1812, every big war in which the United States has been involved started during the month of April. The war of the Revolution began April 19, 1775, at Concord and Lexington. The war with Mexico was declared April 24, 1846.

The Black Hawk war, the greatest conflict with Indian forces, began April 21, 1831.

The civil war began with an attack on Fort Sumter April 12, 1861.

War with Spain was declared April 21, 1898.

## RECRUITING PARTY TO TOUR DISTRICT

In order that the advantages of the navy may be brought to the attention of the young men of this section of the United States, the navy department has authorized a traveling and recruiting party for the El Paso district. The party left El Paso Thursday and before its tour is completed will visit nearly every town and city in New Mexico and Arizona.

The procedure will be as follows: Anyone wishing to be examined will apply at the office, make out an application, when he will be given the preliminary examination. If he passes this physical examination he will be given a ticket to El Paso and told to report to the navy recruiting station for final physical examination. If applicant passes he will be enlisted and sent to the training station at San Francisco. If he fails to pass, he will be given a ticket good for his return home.

The special train carrying this party will not reach Carrizozo until September 8 and will remain until the 11th. The party will then return on the 22nd.

### New Bank Opens.

The First National bank of Carrizozo opened for business Wednesday morning and Cashier E. M. Brickley reports a very satisfactory showing in the way of deposits received, and business transacted. The deposits received on first day were slightly in excess of \$5,000.00, while at the close of the second day, yesterday, the deposits received were nearly \$25,000.00. The new bank is one of the strongest financial institutions in this section. Its officers are: President, H. B. Jones; Vice-President, Paul Mayer; Cashier, E. M. Brickley; Assistant Cashier, T. F. Wright. H. B. Jones, David T. Bruns, Paul Mayer, Dr. J. W. Laws and O. Z. Finley are its directors.

### Home from Convention.

T. E. Kelley returned Monday morning from Phoenix, Arizona, where he went the week previous to be present at the meeting of the Ari-Mex convention of the W. O. W. lodge. Mr. Kelley was a delegate from the local lodge, and reports an excellent meeting and good attendance. The next convention will be held at Santa Fe two years hence. Learning that Mr. Kelley was in Phoenix, his brother, Jerry Kelley, and wife, of Los Angeles, came over and spent a day or two in the Arizona town.

### Roosevelt is Active.

Colonel Theodore Roosevelt is making preliminary arrangements, according to reports, to raise a brigade of Rough Riders to take the field in the event of war with Germany. He expects to make up his brigade from the states of New Mexico, Arizona, Colorado and Texas.

## Masked Men Tie and Scare Aged "Miser"

Nicolas Silva, an aged Spaniard who lives alone on a farm near San Patricio, this county, was attacked in his own home late Wednesday by two masked men and roughly treated, according to word received here. Silva, who is said to be past 75 years of age, had been to the home of his brother and returned late in the afternoon. During his absence two young Mexicans gained entrance to his house and when the aged man opened the door he was confronted by the two bandits who threatened him with a drawn pistol and rope. In the scuffle that ensued the masks worn by both robbers came off and Silva asserts that he will be able to positively identify his assailants. Silva was said to have been bound head and foot and half dragged to the Hondo river several rods distant and threatened with hanging, drowning and various other modes of punishment unless he would reveal the whereabouts of a large sum of money it is alleged he had buried about his premises.

The robbers secured about \$50 which Silva had in his pockets but were unable to induce him to divulge the location of his other savings if he possessed any more. Silva exhibited a place on his neck where the skin was bruised and lacerated which he said was caused by a knot in the rope which they placed about his neck and forced him to walk rather hurriedly to the banks of the river at the point of a pistol. Two Mexicans, accused by Silva, were arrested by Constable Willie Brady and charged with the crime. District Attorney H. B. Hamilton was called to San Patricio Wednesday night and a sort of preliminary hearing was given the men under arrest in Justice Frank Randolph's court.

For many years it has been supposed that Silva knew the whereabouts of a huge sum of gold and silver said to have been buried near his home by his forefathers, the early Spanish settlers, who were traveling thru the country and attacked by Indians.

## 55 PUPILS TAKE 8TH GRADE EXAMINATIONS

Fifty-five Lincoln county pupils applied for eighth grade certificates, taking the examination held in the various districts March 22 and 23, according to information received by County Superintendent Koonce. Nine took the prescribed seventh grade examination. The next date set for holding the examinations is April 19 and 20 at which time all those failing to make the required grade will be permitted to try again, and in case of failure following the second trial, another or third trial will be accorded the applicants. The date of the last examination period is May 17 and 18. Every encouragement possible and every advantage allowed under the laws will be given the pupils in order to enable them to pass the required examinations.

## WARNING IS ISSUED TO 640 ACRE LATE LAW SETTLERS

Editor of Colorado Paper Calls Particular Attention to Oath Sworn to—Uncle Sam is Serious in Dealings.

### SAYS COWMAN MAKES V E R B A L PROMISES

The following story is taken from the Great Divide, a weekly newspaper published in Denver, Colorado:

"Jess Jenkins, millionaire cowman of Dalhart, Texas, has a big cattle ranch near Corona, N. M., joining the Lincoln forest reserve. Complaints are coming in to the Great Divide, both by mail and in person, of the unlawful gobbling up of hundreds of acres of 640-acre stock-raising homestead lands thru dummy entries. Here is the scheme, old as the homestead laws:

"Thru verbal promises it is claimed that Jenkins agrees with the homesteader that he will dig wells and furnish them domestic water. When they make their final proof Mr. Jenkins agrees to pay the homesteaders \$5 an acre for their land. The field division of the interior department should investigate such procedure at once. Jenkins or any person and the homesteader who enter into such undertaking would violate the criminal laws of the U. S. The homesteader who goes onto a tract of government land with an intention of residing on this land, expecting to sell out when he obtains title, either to Mr. Jenkins in accordance with a previous agreement or files on a tract of government land not for his own use and not for the purpose of a home and farm, violates the federal law and is liable to conviction under the federal laws.

"Here is what every homesteader must first swear to:

"I do solemnly swear that I (Continued on Page Three.)

decided in a case brought before him that a woman had a legal right to go thru her husband's pockets for money. This decision has already had a widespread effect, causing several wellknown Carrizozoans much embarrassment when they reach for the price of a cigar or drink, particularly if they failed to make an inspection of their clothes when they first dress.

A dispatch from Indianapolis, Indiana, says, "Of three evils—the corset, white plague and whiskey—the corset is the greatest." This is the declaration of Mrs. Anna Lee, who has drafted for introduction in the Indiana legislature a bill prohibiting the manufacture of corsets. "There is more tuberculosis in children of corset deformed mothers than in whisky drinking fathers," she declared. "Intoxicants have been in general use for centuries; tubercular children were never known until the corset was invented. Thousands of deformed children are the result of the wearing of corsets by mothers."

The Department of Commerce has issued a bulletin entitled, "American Remedies for Chinese Ailments." As Dr. Woodrow Wilson's Watchful Waiting Soothing Syrup is not mentioned it is surmised that the soporific is banned by the Chinese as a habit-forming drug.

It took the Russian people a good many years to get to the point where they could have a

voice in the affairs of their government. They have tried often enough, and at the cost of hundreds and thousands of lives. But now they seem to have really accomplished something. Russia has been the most backward of nations, because she has for years and years been under the worst possible form of government. The rule of the Czar has been supreme; the people had no rights he was bound to respect. Life and liberty rested with him and his infamous secret police. The people have suffered thru generations, always hoping, sometimes fighting for a better, happier time. Let us hope that the time has come, and that a republic will result from the revolution which has swept Nicholas II. from his throne.

The rose of Florida, the most beautiful of flowers, emits no fragrance; the bird of Paradise, the most beautiful of birds, gives no song; the cypress of Greece, the finest of trees, yields no fruit; dandies, the shiniest of men, generally have no sense; and some ball room belles, the loveliest of creatures, are very often—ditto.

For revolutionists who do the job with neatness and dispatch, the Russians are to be commended. They accomplished in three days what the Mexicans have been unable to accomplish in six years.

Germany is finding a great echo of the Russian abdication among her people. It would be too bad for the Kaiser to be subjected to the same little bit of humiliation that the Czar underwent. Such an act would mark the beginning of the end in the European conflict for the deposition of the Kaiser would bring peace into the ascendancy among the German people. They are tired of war, and are hungry, therefore we might expect most anything to happen since the spark has been applied.

Germany's statement that it is retreating to victory, is but an admission of defeat. That the imperial armies, which two years ago undertook to march into Paris, are now reduced to the extremity of claiming a victory out of their ability to fall back to new lines shows how the fortunes of war have changed since that time, and how the positions of the combatants have been altered. There is a great deal of difference between the Germany which was going to dictate terms in the French capital, and the Germany which congratulates itself on a master stroke in being able to fall back without having its armies demoralized.

am not the proprietor of more than 160 acres of land in any state or territory; that I am a citizen of the U. S., or have declared my intention to become such; that this application is honestly and in good faith made for the purpose of actual settlement, use, and improvement by the applicant, and not for the benefit of any other person, persons, or corporation; that I will faithfully and honestly endeavor to comply with all the requirements of law as to settlement and improvements necessary to acquire title to the land applied for; that I am not acting as agent for any person, corporation, or syndicate in making this entry, nor in collusion with any person, corporation or syndicate to give them the benefit of the land entered or any part thereof or the timber thereon; that I do apply to enter the same for the purpose of speculation, but in good faith to obtain a home for myself, and that I have not, directly or indirectly, made, and will not make any agreement or contracts, in any way or manner, with any person, corporation or syndicate, whatsoever, by which the title which I may acquire from the government will insure in whole or in part to the benefit of any person except myself."

## ENORMOUS QUANTITY OF BEANS IMPORTED

Four solid train loads of beans from the Orient, valued at over a million dollars and constituting the largest single movement of this commodity ever coming to the United States have arrived in San Francisco to be shipped to eastern markets. The Southern Pacific has already started one train of 29 cars over its Ogden route to New York. Three others will be required for the total shipment which amounts to 65,000 bags. The consignment is being handled by the Western Import Co., which has been working for the last seven years to introduce them in America. They were brought here from Japan on the steamship Kotsu Maru. The beans are of all varieties and their appearance here is one of the new developments that the European war has brought about in this country.


