## TEACHERS' INSTITUTE TO BEGIN HERE JUNE 4

County Superintendent J. E. Koonce has announced that the Lincoln County Teachers' Institute will be held in Carrizozo, June 4th to 16th, with Superintendent J. B. Taylor, of Deming, as conductor. Mr. Taylor is one of the foremost educators of the state and needs no recommendation to the people of Lincoln county inasmuch as he has successfully conducted two institutes in this county.

As assistant instructors the services of the following three efficient teachers has been secured: Mrs. George Dixon, of Hondo, but formerly of Magdalena, and at one time president of the Spanish-American Normal at El Rito, and who also a few years ago conducted an institute at Carrizozo; Mrs. E. V. Jewett, principal of the Carrizozo High School, who taught in the institute last summer; and Miss Ida Schimpff, principal of the Oscuro schools and who is the holder of a life certificate granted by the State Board of Education of this state.

At the close of the institute there will be an examination to accommodate all wishing certificates to teach. Another feature that may be of interest to some is an opportunity to take lessons in Spanish, so that those who have never studied this language may enjoy the privilege of learning some of the fundamentals underlying the study of this much needed language. No effort will be spared to make the institute meet the demands of those attending. Any information desired will be cheerfully and promptly given by Mr. Koonce upon request.

## "BOYS' WORKING RESERVE" TO ORGANIZE

The following proclamation has been issued by Governor Lindsey:

"Whereas the Department of Labor for the United States has organized the 'U. S. Boys' Working Reserve'; and,

"Whereas, the Commissioner of Labor has requested the governors of the several states to co-operate in the matter of securing members for the said 'U. S. Boys' Working Reserve'; and,

"Whereas it is the purpose of the said organization to employ its members in food production, primarily in the state of their residence, under State and Federal protection;

"Now Therefore, I, W. E. Lindsey, governor of the State of New Mexico, in order to extend the benefits of the said 'United States - Boys' working Reserve' organization into the State of New Mexico, do hereby commission and appoint the County Superintendent of Schools in each county of the State of New Mexico, an organizer for the said 'United States Boy's Working Reserve' in his or her respective county. That in order to facilitate the work of enrolling the boys of proper age in the State of New Mexico in the said organization, I have, at the request of the Secretary of Labor, forwarded the names and addresses of the County Superintendents of Schools to him at Washington, D. C., upon the understanding that upon the receipt of such names and addresses, proper blanks for enrolling would at once be forwarded to said superintendents.

"I, therefore, recommend that immediately upon the receipt of such blanks by the said Superintendents, they begin at once the enrollment of the boys of this state into the said organization, and that they proceed with the said enrollment with all convenient dispatch. I also earnestly request that the parents of boys in this state lend countenance, aid and assistance in the matter of the said enrollment of their boys.

W. E. LINDSEY, Governor."

The kaiser says Germany will be a democracy after the war, and it is a safe bet that the German people will agree with the kaiser and make it unanimous.

Several of the newspapers of the state last week ran a two-column likeness of William Jennings Bryan. It looked as natural and familiar as does that of our long since deceased friend, Lydia E. Pinkham.

The Roosevelt plan for sending a volunteer army into France, while the regular machinery provided in the conscription bill is raising the 500,000 men, has met with popular approval, in spite of the war department's disapproval, and it is possible that it may yet prevail. Force has been added to the former president's plea by his statement that he is willing to serve anywhere, and his speeches in support of the government. The war department is not to be criticized for its attitude, for untrained soldiers in large bodies are not desired in France, as they would only increase the food problem. But the idea of a quickly organized and trained force sent with all possible haste to the battle front will be one way of showing America's desire to do its part in the war, and it is probably that spirit among the people that is winning support for the Roosevelt army.

During these times of war the weather may be a tame and unattractive subject, but we pause to state that the first part of this week was a reminder that things are not what they seem. Just as we were beginning to congratulate ourselves upon the arrival of spring, and were in the act of donning our summer apparel, the shock of the season, that unrelenting exhibit of the frown of the elements in the shape of wind and piercing chill swept the land in matchless fury. Let us meet the situation with stolid determination, with all due sympathy for the sheep man and the fruit grower, and find in the refreshing showers encouragement to plant those gardens and do our part in feeding ourselves and leave the store-bought food, to as large a degree as possible, for those who have no other alternative.
