All persons who shall fail or neglect to perform any duty required of him in the execution of this act shall, if not subject to military law, be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction in the District Court of the United States having jurisdiction thereof, be punished by imprisonment for not more than one year, or if subject to military law, shall be tried by court martial and suffer such punishment as a court martial may direct.

declared your intention to become a citizen (specify which)?

(1) If you were born in the U. S., including Alaska and Hawaii, you are a natural-born citizen, no matter what may have been the citizenship or nationality of your parents. If you were born abroad, you are still a citizen of the U. S. if your father was a citizen of the U. S. at the time you were born unless you have expatriated yourself. (2) You are a naturalized citizen if you have completed your naturalization; that is, if you have taken "final papers." But you are not a citizen if you have only declared your intention to become a citizen (that is if you have only taken out "first papers") in the latter case you are only a "declarant." You are also a naturalized citizen if, altho foreign born, your father or surviving parent became fully naturalized while you were under 21 years of age, and if you came to the U. S. under 21. (3) You are a declarant if, altho a citizen or subject of some foreign country, you have declared on oath before a naturalization court your intention to become a citizen of the U. S. Receipt from the clerk of the court of the certified copy of such declaration is often called "taking out first papers." You are not a declarant if your first paper was taken out after Sept. 26, 1906, and is more than 7 years old. (4) You are an alien if you do not fall within one of the three classes above mentioned.

5. Where were you born? First name the town, then the

state, then the county, as "Columbus, Ohio."

6. If not a citizen, of what country are you a citizen, or subject?

This need be answered only by aliens and declarants.

7. What is your present trade, occupation or office?

This does not ask what you once did, not what you have done most of the time, nor what you are best fitted to do. It asks what your job is right now. State briefly, as "Farmer," "Miner," "Student," "Laborer (on farm, in rolling mill, in automobile, wagon, or other factory), etc. If you hold an office under state or federal government, name the office.

8. By whom employed? Where employed?

If you are working for an individual, firm, corporation, or association, state its name, or employment for yourself, so state. If you are an officer of the state or federal government, say whether your office is under the U. S., the state, the county, or a municipality.

9. Have you a father, mother, wife, child under 12, or a sister or brother under 12 solely dependent upon you for support (specify which)?

Consider your answer thoughtfully. If it is true that there is another mouth than your own which you alone have a duty to feed, do not let your military ardor interfere with the wish of the nation to reduce war's misery to a minimum. On the other hand, unless the person you

Mayor Lutz Proclaims June 5th Holiday

Every Place of Business Will Be Asked to Close Registration Day.

National Registration Day, Tuesday, June 5th, will be observed in Carrizozo, Mayor Henry Lutz having this week issued his proclamation, asking that suggestions made by the Governor and Council of Defense be carried out as far as practicable, as follows:

To the Loyal and Patriotic People of New Mexico:

The President has, by proclamation designated Tuesday, June 5th, as Registration Day, "the day upon which the manhood of the country shall step forward in one solid rank in defense of the ideals to which this nation is consecrated."

1. In order that there be perfected in each community in the quickest possible time; a working unit, it is suggested that a Registration Day-Celebration committee composed of the following be organized at once: The Mayor as Chairman, and the representatives of the local War Committee, the Chamber of Commerce, the schools, where existing Women's Auxiliary of the Council of Defense, otherwise some woman selected by Registration Day Committee,

Government Issues Instructions for Guidance of Those Who Must Register Under Selective Draft Provisions.

In order that all persons coming within the provisions of the selective draft law may be fully informed as to what information they will be called upon to furnish when they present themselves for registration on June 5, the Government has prepared a set of instructions. These instructions should be studied in advance so that all will know just what questions will be put to them when they appear at the registrar's office.

Questions will be asked in the order in which they appear below:

1. Name in full. Age in years—This means all your names spelled out in full. State your age today in years only. Disregard additional months or days.

2. Home address. This means the place, where you have your permanent home; not the place where you work.

3. Date of birth. Write your birthday (month, day, and year) on a piece of paper before going to the registrar, and give the paper to him the first thing. Example: "May 5, 1894."

4. Are you (1) a natural-born citizen; (2) a naturalized citizen; (3) an alien; (4) or have you de-

The Stars and Stripes are Calling—How Have You Answered the Call?

New Mexico looks to all her sons and daughters to do their full duty in this time of stress, when the greatest nations of the earth are involved in a gigantic struggle to keep the barbarians from strangling liberty. It is a time when all patriotic men and all loyal women ought to be so intent upon their several duties that no time would be left to spend in criticising the efforts of others. It was this condition which the legislature had in mind in preparing the Public Defense bill, which was designed to aid the individual, the State, the Nation and the allied powers, in every way practicable; that was in the governor's mind and heart when he created the council of defense to relieve him of the major part of the details; that the members of the council kept steadily in view in building the plans which they are working night and day to put into effect, so that in this state and in all the countries of the allies, no one shall be without food.

Here is an all-important fact which ought to be borne constantly in mind: While the legislature appropriated \$750,000, only the sum of \$75,000 will be available for use before the end of the present season for planting. Furthermore, the total amount appropriated must be stretched to include all the needs incident to a state of war, which takes in the cost of recruiting the regiment of infantry and the battery of artillery of the New Mexico National Guard.

Now to spend money available so as to produce the greatest return has been the thought uppermost in planning to increase the acreage in food and feed-stuffs. The council has been convinced from the beginning that the farmers and ranchmen of this great state are self-reliant and self-supporting in the main; that they are self-respecting on the whole; and that they would scorn any state aid which bore the taint of alms.

It is not possible to draft working plans which will be best adapted to the peculiar needs of all the communities, nor of all the people, of so large a state. Human power has not been developed to such a state of perfection. Naturally and inevitably some mistakes have been made, and it is too much to hope that others will not follow. But such mistakes as have been made have been of the mind, never of the heart. The plans which have been worked out represent the

best thought and the soundest judgement of New Mexico; they are suited to the majority, who are making the best of existing conditions, planting with might and main, and will cultivate and harvest with the same energy and fortitude.

The least that every man owes to his country is the best that is in him. Your liberty is threatened, and the liberty of coming generations. How about you, neighbor? Have you rushed to the defense by criticising the workers and the makers of plans, or by putting your shoulder to the wheel and striving in perfect accord with every man and woman who works for the common good, for the safety of civilization?

The Stars and Stripes are calling today—calling you, calling all of us! How have you answered the call?

That is not as it should be and not as it will be when the country is properly aroused, but just now it seems to be pretty well true in most cases.

The Runaway Daughter.

Columbia is the runaway daughter of Spain. She is twice

as large as her mother—and many times as promising. And it may be surprising to learn that the most progressive element in Columbia is not the Spanish population, or natives, but a Jewish people called Anti-Quians who have Old Testament names, raise families of 20 to 30 children and are fast becoming the dominant power in the land, both in numbers and influence. Columbia is said to be the great Jewish republic of the future.

Many Secrets in Waste Basket.

If The Outlook should print the contents of its waste basket there would likely be a riot in the home of every reader. There would be arrests in many directions, shotguns in others and trouble all around. Does War Mean Socialism After All?

"Germany, the most aristocratic and autocratic of all governments, has set the pace in having the government take over complete control of industries and activities previously handled by private interests, and England and France have followed this example," declares one financier in an important confession of economic faith in Hearst's Magazine for May.

"The first thing England did was to take over the running of the railroads, guaranteeing the maintenance of the current divided rates. She has now placed her coal mines under governmental control; the Government has become a partner in the production of chemicals on a large scale; the law is laid down with the iron hand to shipping companies and there is hardly an industry in which the Government has not a hand. The Government has also fixed wages in many lines, including agriculture. It has named the prices that must be paid farmers for their wheat and oats and other

have in mind is solely dependent on you, do not hide behind petticoats or children.

10. Married or single (which)? Race (which)?

This does not ask whether you were once married, but if you are married NOW. In answer to the question as to your race, state briefly whether Caucasian, Mongolian, Negro, Malayan or Indian.

11. What military service have you had? Rank? Branch? Years? Nation or State?

No matter what country you served, you must give complete information.

12. Do you claim exemption from draft? Specify grounds.

Because you claim exemption, it by no means follows that you are exempt. From the information of the war department you should make a claim now if you intend to prosecute it. Some persons will be exempted on account of their occupations or offices, some on account of the fact that they have relatives dependent upon them for support. Your answer touching these things will be important in supporting the claim you now intend to make in your answer to the present questions. Be sure therefore that the grounds you now state are in conformity with your an-

swers to questions 7 and 8. In stating grounds you claim as exempting you, use one of the following terms: If you claim to be an executive, legislative, or judicial officer of the state or nation, name your office and say whether it is an office of the state or nation. If you claim to be a member of a religious sect whose creed forbids its members to participate in war in any form, simply name the sect. If you are employed in the transmission of the United States mails or as an artificer or workman in an armory, arsenal, or navy yard of the United States, or if you are a mariner employed in the sea service of any citizen or merchant within the United States, so state. If you are a felon or otherwise morally deficient and desire to claim exemption on that ground state your ground briefly. If you claim exemption on any other ground, state your ground briefly.

the Press, the G. A. R., and the Clergy. (Where any or all officials or representatives above mentioned are not available it may be left to the discretion of the people of each community to form such a committee from the persons present who, in their judgment, can best perform the required service.) It is further suggested that the county school superintendent, county clerk and the sheriff be a part of this committee and charged with the responsibility of organizing Registration Day celebrations and distributing honor badges, in the outlying districts. These badges of honor are now in the hands of your county clerk.

2. Registration Day should be celebrated as a consecration of the American people to service and to sacrifice. It should be a welcome to those registering. It should be a public expression by each community of willingness to offer its sons to the country for the service they are each best fitted to render.

3. Registration Day should be celebrated in a serious spirit and kept as Registration Day ONLY. It must be distinguished from the ordinary holiday. No other objects should be allowed to intrude thereon.

4. It is suggested that the committee see to it that every eligible young man presents himself for registration. A large number of auto owners have signified their intention of loaning their machines for any war business. These should be pressed into service.

5. It is suggested that all stores and saloons be closed on Registration Day.

6. Elaborate and costly decorations should be discouraged. The spirit of volunteer service in all preparations for and activities of the day should be foremost.

7. Where possible the celebration should center around the registration places, and those registered should be especially distinguished.

8. The registration places should be decorated with the National colors.

9. At seven in the morning, the hour of the opening of the registration booths, church and fire bells should be rung and whistles blown.

10. Bands, where procurable, should be playing near the registration places and the parades should make a feature of stopping thereat. The men of registration age should occupy the place of honor in the parades and should be escorted where practical, to the registration places with patriotic music, by their kinsfolk, neighbors and friends. At the registration place public speakers should read to the eligible young men assembled in a body, appropriate portions of the President's proclamation and explain the purpose of and regulations governing the registrations.

11. To each man registering a badge of honor will be given having thereon the words "The Colors Call; I Have Answered!" It is suggested that a committee

of girls, women and G. A. R., men have this honor task. In each community the local committee is asked to furnish suitable red, white and blue ribbon to tie on the badges.

12. At a suitable time and place, preferably in the afternoon, where the parade is held in the morning and near the registration place, during the hours of registration, should be held large public gatherings with patriotic speeches, songs, music and the reading of the proclamation and message of the President.

13. On Sunday June 3rd, the churches should conduct special patriotic services. In fact it is earnestly requested that from the pulpit and press, the school room and in all public gatherings, every effort be exerted to impress upon all citizens their duty at this vital crisis in the history of OUR COUNTRY. Let the words ring forth: "THE WORLD MUST BE MADE SAFE FOR DEMOCRACY."

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
