Local Bankers Doing Their Bit for Big War Loan

Liberty Bond Campaign Results in 21 Applications up to Tuesday.

Upon the shoulders of the bankers or every city and rural section of the United States rests the responsibility of interesting the people to the extent of investing in Liberty Loan bonds. Carrizozo bankers are all alive to this responsibility and doing their utmost to induce everyone to do his bit by buying a war bond.

The first war loan of the United States has not been over subscribed—in fact, it has not yet been subscribed in full. Germany has floated five successive loans, each almost as large as that being floated in this country.

Men and women are needed in large quantities if the United States would emerge victorious from its fight with Germany. Men will be forthcoming through a process of conscription; but if the same plan was used to secure money, it would be confiscation of property. It is therefore a matter of individual patriotism. The people must bring forth their wealth to the government.

In urging Carrizozo to do their share in taking up the Liberty Loan bond issue, the local bankers want them to understand distinctly that buying a bond is not giving money to the government, but investing in the best kind of security at 3-2 per cent interest. Further, the bonds are convertible into any subsequent bonds bearing interest at a greater rate.

Investing money in government paper may be done by almost every one, for even the smallest denominations may be purchased almost without sacrifice, but every man who goes to the front to fight is making the greatest possible sacrifice.

The windows of every bank in the city contain posters urging the citizenry to invest in the bond issue, and the banks express the hope that these urgings will continue to bear fruit.

Twenty-one applications for bonds had been received by the Lincoln county banks up to Monday night. Liberty bonds may be secured at any of the four banks in Lincoln county—Exchange Bank, First National Bank, Lincoln State Bank, Carrizozo, and Stockmens State Bank of Corona.

We attach a few questions and answers below by way of making the Liberty bond proposition entirely clear.

Any additional information may be had from your banker. **BUY A LIBERTY BOND TODAY!**

Q: What is a government bond?

A: It is a receipt given by the government for money loaned to them.

Q: Why do they call it a "Liberty" bond?

A: Because the money you lend the government will be used to make this world a safe place to live in, and to fight the Germans in Europe right now instead of having to do it in New Mexico a few years hence.

Q: Then we have to fight the Germans anyway?

A: Yes. They will crush us without mercy, if we ever give them a chance.

Q: Why should I lend the government this money?

A: Because money is more important than men. To send our boys to the front, without money to keep the big artillery going, is murder.

Q: Is my money safe if I lend it?

A: Uncle Sam's word and all his wealth is back of his bond.

A: How much does Uncle Sam want me to lend him?

A: What you can afford, even if it's only \$50.00

Q: Will I be paid any interest?

A: Sure. \$3.50 a year for every \$100 you lend.

Q: Will I have to pay taxes on the amount I lend?

A: No. And by escaping taxes the bond is as good as a 5 per cent investment.

Q: Suppose I need money later?

A: Take your bond to the bank and borrow money on it. It will be the best security in the world.

Q: Must I pay all of the money at once?

A: No. Only \$2.00 on every \$100 you decide to lend, and the balance on easy terms between now and August 30th.

Would Eliminate "Red Tape" in Homestead Law

Senator Fall Introduces Bill to Hasten Designation Formalities.

News of great interest to persons in New Mexico making homestead entries under the stockraising homestead act of last December has been received here in letters from Senator Albert B. Fall.

On May 25, Senator Fall introduced a bill in the senate for the purpose of eliminating the "red tape" which obstructs and delays the entryman from securing possession of the lands filed upon under the provisions of the stockraising homestead act. The bill is numbered S2357 and asks for an amendment to the 640-acre homestead law by adding the sections that all surveyed, unreserved lands within the State of New Mexico, be designated without further classification or action under the homestead law subject to the provisions of that act. The second section of the bill provides that within six months after the passage of the act, all entries are to be received by the respective land officials and approved by the proper officers of the land department, subject to individual contest.

Senator Fall's bill was read twice and referred to the committee on public lands.

Word of this innovation comes welcomed by the persons in New Mexico making entries under the new 640-acre homestead law. The geological survey, which has the power to designate the lands as to entry as section homesteads, is handicapped by the lack of funds to expedite carry on the work and it will likely be many months before the designations will finally be made.

Senator Fall no doubt will receive the support of Senator A. A. Jones and Congressman W. B. Walton, of New Mexico.

TEUTON HORDES BUTCHER SERBS

BULGARIANS, GERMANS AND AUSTRILIANS ROUND UP AND MASSACRE MEN, WOMEN, BABES.

GRAND DUKE ARRESTED

PETROGRAD IS TERRORIZED BY ARMED MOBS OF RELEASED PRISONERS AND ANARCHISTS.

Udine.—Fragmentary news has already been received here through neutral countries of widespread insurrectionary movements in Serbia. This news is now supplemented by the statements of Austrian prisoners captured in the recent Italian advance, giving details of the merciless methods of repression used to crush the uprising.

The insurgents were gradually surrounded by Austrian, German and Bulgarian regiments, and all who fell into their hands, chiefly old men, women and children, are declared to have been massacred.

In spite of this procedure fierce resistance was offered for three weeks and heavy losses inflicted on the invaders, especially the Bulgarians. The insurgents finally succumbed to superior numbers, and the Serbians were hanged by thousands.

According to the prisoners, the Bulgarians were guilty of such atrocities, especially against women and children, that even their Austro-German allies termed them barbaric.

London.—The arrest of Grand Duke Nicholas, former commander-in-chief of the Russian armies, in consequence of Royalist riots at Tiflis, is reported in an Exchange Telegraph dispatch quoting advices from Petrograd.

Reuter's says that a few score anarchists, accompanied by some soldiers and sailors, marched through the Nevsky Prospekt and other main thoroughfares carrying black banners inscribed "Down With Authority!" "Down With Capitalists!" "Long Live the Social Revolution and the Commune!" They were armed with rifles, revolvers, daggers and grenades.

Subsequently agitators went from one assemblage to another, inciting them to rob banks and declaring that the social revolution would be proclaimed on the occasion of the approaching municipal elections.

SENATE PASSES FOOD BILL.

Settlers Can Take Up Section of Land Under Fall Amendment.

Washington.—The first of the administration food bills, already passed by the House, passed the Senate without a record vote. Numerous amendments were attached to the measure. Among them was Senator Fall's amendment providing that all public and unreserved lands in New Mexico, Colorado, Utah and South Dakota be opened under the 640-acre homestead act. It was adopted, 31 to 12. It was opposed by Senators Walsh, Nelson and Husting. The amendment opens 17,000,000 acres of land in Colorado alone.

The bill carries a total appropriation of approximately \$11,000,000, compared with \$4,770,000 as it passed the House.

Bryan Buys \$1,000 Liberty Bond.
 Washington.—Wm. J. Bryan, former secretary of state, sent in a subscription of \$1,000 to the Liberty Loan.

U-BOAT WARFARE FAILING.

Germans Thrown Back Sixteen Times in Attacks on French Lines.

Copenhagen, June 4.—Private advices from Germany tell of growing dissatisfaction with the results of the ruthless submarine campaign and the absence of any indications that it has brought the desired peace near to hand.

Paris.—Sixteen times since May 20th, the Germans have attacked the positions taken from them on that day by the French at Mount Carnillet and the heights of the Teton and the Casque, south of Moronyillers in the Champagne and each time repulsed.

French official statement declares that the Germans lost more than 52,000 prisoners alone during the French and British drives against the German lines.

Germans announce they have captured a French position 1,000 yards in length northeast of Selous.

Italians take another position to a depth of 400 yards on a mountain-quarter front in their advance toward Trieste.

What is \$7,000,000,000?

A St. Louis man has figured out what 7 billion dollars is. According to him, there are more dollars in such amount than there have been seconds since the signing of the Declaration of Independence. If the United States mints began to turn out dollars they would work continuously day and night until 224 years had passed.

If you spent a dollar a minute it would only take you 13,318

years to spend your money. If you had it invested in the bank, without interest, and you drew a check for 1,000,000 a day for 22 years there would still be \$26,000,000 untouched. If it was invested at six percent, at the end of seventy years of spending \$1,000,000 a day there would be twice as much in the bank as when the account was started.

To count it would take fifty years work of 15 men if they worked eight hours a day and counted a bill a second but at the death of the last counter there would still be enough left to give every man, woman and child in St. Louis \$500 and leave a balance of \$12,000,000 to those who may come hereafter.

Samuel to Sow Seeds for Soldiers.

Further to insure the cultivation of all available land under reclamation projects Senator Jones, of the State of Washington, proposes that the Secretary of Agriculture shall take possession of such lands as are unoccupied and uncultivated and that were uncultivated last season, and keep them until one year after the war. During that time Senator Jones suggests that the Secretary make arrangements for the planting of the land and for furnishing water for irrigation. He advocates paying the owner a just compensation for the use of his property, and in case the owner gives satisfactory assurances that he intends to cultivate his land during the war, even though he has not done so heretofore, he should be allowed to retain it. A bill to this effect will be introduced by Mr. Jones at once.

What we must have now in the United States is a fiery evangel. We must carry the torch and light the fires on the hilltops. Village signals village and town warns town. The days of silken ease are over. The world is in turmoil and we are a part of the world, dedicated to its fate and devoted to a certain cause. We stand to make or abide event, and it is better to shape the event than to accept it. With a will to win we shall shape and not accept the outcome. Alan Seeger's spirit must be the spirit of America. Spartan mothers must know that their sons go out to take the one chance, as Seeger thought it, in ten, and in so going make conditions and prospects better for this American republic. There is no avoidance of the difficulty. It is upon us. We can have, now, only what we win, and we cannot think of accepting what another nation has imposed upon us. Not having the will to accept defeat, to pay tribute, to meet a conqueror's terms, to hear the sound of his feet in our streets, and to accept the humiliation of his feet in our streets, and to accept the humiliation of his presence, we must have the will to win. We must realize that this is a war of sacrifice for an end which must be attained. There cannot be a failure in it without a debasing humiliation, which would cause the children of another generation to wonder why they had to be born of such poor stock. There can be nothing but victory in the prospects of the American eagle. It must be as strong when peace is declared as it is now, when war is in its first stages.

Newspapers and War.

EVERY day hundreds of newspapers devote columns of news matter and editorial comment to the national needs and national welfare work. 
When the European war began Paris launched a few military styles. They were accepted at first with enthusiasm, but later on other styles superceded them.

CASE FOR PAPER PATTERNS

Handy Receptacle for This Purpose Can Be Made From Remnant of Fairly Strong Material.

Many women possess some favorite paper patterns that they frequently use, and if they are not taken great care of they are liable to become damaged and useless, or perhaps lost altogether, and they are sometimes rather difficult to obtain again. It is, therefore, well worth while to make a case in which different kinds can be kept separate from each other, so that any particular pattern can be selected without trouble.

The sketch shows a good type of case to prepare for this purpose. It can be carried out with a remnant of any fairly strong material and lined with thin silk or satin. It is bound where indicated with narrow ribbon and the back and front are stiffened with pieces of card sewn in between

the cover and the lining. The case inside is divided into three compartments, one for blouse patterns, one for skirt patterns and the other for patterns of underwear. The case fastens with two push studs, and in the small sketch on the right it is shown closed, and the word "patterns" can be worked upon the front of the flap where indicated.

BRIGHTENING UP THE FROCK

The girl who is clever at stenciling can brighten up an afternoon frock or outing costume by having the cravat, the sash and the cuffs finished with stenciled ends. A more elaborate effect may be gained by using fringes in conjunction with the stenciling, the two matching in color.

Also if one has the time and patience combined with the knowledge, the suit of crystal-colored shantung, or of satin georgette, may be over-spread with a deep border of some simple stenciled design. Usually it is correct to have the skirt plain and the decoration confined to the hem of the coat, the collar and the cuffs.

FOR THIRSTY GARDENS

Windmill Plays Important Part in Production of Food.

Lack of Timely Rainfall Is Often Doom of Otherwise Carefully Handled and Tended Patch—Conserve Water Pumped.

That the farm windmill should play an important part this year in the great food-production campaign, is the belief of H. B. Walker, drainage and irrigation engineer, Kansas State Agricultural college.

"The farm windmill should be no 'lacker' this year," said Professor Walker. "It should be ready day and night to absorb the energy of the wind to lift water for thirsty gardens. Lack of timely rainfall is often the doom of an otherwise carefully handled and tended vegetable garden."

"This year the farm garden will be an important factor in reducing the cost of living. Accordingly, every precaution should be taken to prevent a failure of the garden crops. In those areas where the natural rainfall is not dependable, some simple method of irrigation should be provided."

The farm windmill will serve faithfully and well in lifting water for irrigation if given an opportunity, Professor Walker pointed out. This faithful source of farm power, however, will not save the garden unless the owner co-operates in conserving the water pumped. The average windmill lifts water intermittently and at a slow rate. Consequently, if the water pumped is allowed to flow directly onto the warm, dry soil, a small area only can be satisfactorily covered. A small trickling flow does not spread laterally over the surface of the soil, but it percolates deeply into the soil beyond the reach of the shallow-rooted vegetables.


If the water lifted, on the other hand, is stored in tanks, barrels, or reservoirs, a volume sufficiently large can be secured in a surprisingly short time to effectively irrigate a much larger area. A barrel of water containing 3 1/2 gallons will cover a garden bed six feet wide by eight feet long, one inch deep. A quantity of water even as small as this, if properly applied, will greatly help the lettuce bed or the shallow-rooted radishes. It is advisable, therefore, to use even an ordinary barrel for storage, if nothing larger is available, in preference to direct pumping.

A reservoir sufficiently large to hold all of the water the average windmill can pump in three or four days is much more desirable.

HEAD GUARD IS EFFICACIOUS

Prevents Calf From Sucking Mother and Keeps Cow From Going Through Wire Fence.

A guard, consisting of two hooked bars pivoted in front of the nose and

attached by straps, is very handy to have around the dairy farm. It prevents a calf from sucking its mother; keeps the cow from going through, over or under a fence; prevents her eating stacked fodder or anything of that sort. They are very easily made.

MILK FROM INDIVIDUAL COW

In Making Test Whole Milking Should Be Used—First Drawn Not as Rich as Last.

When testing milk from individual cows, the milk from a whole milking should be used, because the first drawn is not nearly as rich as the last.

Before taking a sample for testing, the milk should be properly mixed, either by pouring from one vessel to another or by stirring it well by means of a dipper or ordinary stirring rod.

BALANCED RATION FOR HENS

Lack of Proper Feed Is Cause for Small Number of Eggs—Milk Will Increase Production.

On too many farms it is thought that the chickens can live on the waste grain about the barn lot and produce many eggs. But the reason such farms do not gather many eggs is that a balanced ration is lacking. On such farms the profit would be much greater if buttermilk or sour milk could be fed also.

HORSE-RADISH IS GOOD CROP

Excellent Variety Discovered by Explorer of United States Department of Agriculture.

An excellent new variety of horse-radish was discovered by the United States Agricultural Explorer David Fairchild in Bohemia, a few years ago. Cuttings from this planted in April will produce fine large roots for grating the following October, and if left in the ground until spring, will grow to very large size. It is white

and of excellent quality. Horse-radish grows on almost any kind of soil, and will stand the dry weather as well as potatoes. In planting horse-radish, fit the soil the same as for strawberries, and cultivate the same as any other garden crop.

Many persons plant horse-radish in some out-of-the-way spot and dig a piece of the root as often as needed, leaving the fragments of roots in the soil to grow for further use. This method results in having nothing but tough, stringy roots, very unlike the product of a properly planted and well cared for bed. The best roots are those planted in the spring at the time of setting early cabbage, and dug as late the same fall as the weather will permit. It becomes therefore, an annual crop.

INCREASE YIELD BY PRUNING

Pinch Off Center Buds, Thus Throwing Energy of Plants to Formation and Ripening of Fruit.

The yield and quality of many vegetables can be increased by pruning and pinching off center buds, thus throwing the energy of the plants to the formation and ripening of fruit.

With muskmelons and cantaloupes, always pinch off the center bud of the main vine when it reaches a length of four or five feet, says a writer. Cucumbers are treated in a like manner. Such treatment results in increased size of the fruit and a hastening of maturity. For the same reason the ends of pole and lima bean vines are pinched off when they reach a height of six feet.

Tomato vines expected to yield an early crop are pruned severely. But three stalks are allowed to develop, all side shoots being pinched off as soon as they begin to form. The three stalks are firmly supported by a stake four feet in height.

When the vines reach the top of the stake the center bud is pinched out. This stops height growth and throws all the energy of the vine to the developing and ripening of fruit already set. By following this method I have obtained as high as 40 fine, perfect tomatoes from a single plant.

MISSOURI PLAN BEST

Carl Vrooman, assistant secretary of the United States department of agriculture, has commended the organization plan adopted by the Missouri College of Agriculture for war-crop production. Mr. Vrooman said recently, after he had visited a number of states, that the plan was the best that had come to his attention.

COWS SHOULD BE KEPT CLEAN

Milk Should Be Drawn Into Covered Pail Which is Washed and Scalded After Each Milking.

To keep dirt and bacteria out of milk, the cows must be kept clean, especially in the region of the udder. The milk should be drawn into a covered pail which is thoroughly washed and scalded after each milking. Only good clean water should be used for this purpose.

Changes for Prosperity.

No kind of farming offers better chances for prosperity than by turning alfalfa and alfalfa hay into gilded-butter and selling it direct to discriminating consumers.

7-Million-Ton Pyramid.

The greatest monument in the world is the Great Pyramid of Egypt, which was built nearly 6,000 years ago. It was built by Cheops, King of Egypt, who, following the example of previous kings, wished to have a magnificent tombstone, so that he would be remembered. It is certain that the thousands of men who were engaged in building it worked under the lash. The result is, Cheops is always put down as a tyrant.

According to Herodotus, the ancient Greek historian, 100,000 men were at work on it for 20 years. It covers an area of 13 1/2 acres, and contains 7 million tons of masonry. It was built in layers, over 200 in number, and then the edges were filled in to make the sides smooth. The stone used varied in weight from two tons to sixty tons. When it was built it was about 480 feet high, and the sides were each 775 feet long.

Austrian war office says Italian casualties have been very heavy. More than 13,000 un wounded Italians have been captured up to Sunday, says the statement.

Following reports of increase in Russian artillery activity against Austrians, comes a statement of renewal of activity of the Russo-Rumanian forces against the Teutonic allies in Rumania.

Seventy-six persons were killed and 174 injured in Dover or Folkestone, England, in the most ambitious raid upon England yet made by German aircraft. Of the killed, 27 were women and 23 children.

In Champagne region of France, Germans launch fierce attacks, but are driven off with great loss of men. French recapture all ground lost. Big artillery action continues between Solsons and Rheims. South of Berry-au-Bac, Germans carry out successful mining operations, seizing a few trench elements.

Germans gained a foothold in advanced trenches near Moulin de Lafaux. French artillery fire checked German efforts against hill 304, Germans suffering heavy losses. Increased artillery firing in the Ypres sector in Belgium. London and Berlin comment on activity of heavy guns in that region. British capture during May 3,412 Germans and one large German gun. In April the British took more than 19,000 prisoners and 257 large guns and howitzers.

WESTERN

Funeral of George W. Guthrie, American ambassador to Japan, was held in Pittsburg, Pa.

Government urges union officials to end strike of 2,500 coal miners in Pittsburg, Kans., district as soon as possible.

A leak in the San Francisco post-office building, from which government secrets reached outside sources, was admitted by John W. Preston, United States district attorney.

According to information from Senator John F. Shafroth in Washington, Colorado will not get one of the sixteen army cantonments to be located by the government throughout the country. According to Senator Shafroth the camp which will serve Colorado will be located at Fort D. A. Russell, near Cheyenne, Wyo.

WASHINGTON

The first actual draft of America's citizen soldiery will probably be Sept. 5.

The conference report on the \$3,000,000,000 war budget was accepted by the House.

Prof. L. W. Rowe nominated by President Wilson to be assistant secretary of the treasury.

William Martin Williams of Montgomery, Ala., appointed solicitor of the Department of Agriculture.

Leasing of 150 acres of Osage Indian oil lands for a bonus of \$1,997,000 and royalties of one-sixth was reported to Secretary Lane by the federal agents in charge. The bonus is the largest ever paid for undeveloped Indian lands.

FOREIGN

Baron Devonport has resigned as British food controller because of ill health.

Dr. Joel E. Goldwaite and party arrived safe in England for duty in military hospitals.

Every courtesy was extended to Ambassador Elkus and his party leaving Constantinople.

The opening of the reichstrat in the grand hall of ceremonies in the imperial Hofburg at Vienna was solemn and brilliant.

A dispatch from Constantinople, via Berlin, states that Ambassador Elkus, his wife and twenty-six attaches of the American embassy and consular service in Turkey left for Berlin en route to America.

Mutario Soto, formerly a major in the Villa army, was executed at Juarez following conviction by court-martial on the charge of buying ammunition for the purpose of turning it over to the rebels.

Strikes or other measures to paralyze production have been decided upon in more than 120 of the largest factories in Petrograd, most of which are engaged in war work, according to Reuter's Petrograd correspondent.

From an article in the Vossische Zeitung of Berlin, it appears that Germany has reconciled herself to the loss of Kiaoo Chow, her former Chinese possession and the South Sea Island colonies, which were captured by Japan.

A Vienna dispatch forwarded from Amsterdam by the Exchange Telegraph says that at the annual meeting of the Austrian Lloyd Shipping Company it was stated that the company's losses in 1916 were more than 3,000,000 kronen.

Immediate peace on the basis of no annexations and no indemnities and complete political restoration of occupied territories is advocated by the delegation of Hungarian Socialists at Stockholm to attend the meeting of Socialists from various belligerent countries who are holding group conferences.

According to Vienna dispatches, the Austrian newspapers greeted the speech from the throne of Emperor Charles as a historic utterance of extraordinary significance and laying the foundation for the erection of a new and rejuvenated Austria. The newspapers particularly pay attention to the emperor's concession to constitutionalism and approvingly dwell on the peace passages in the address.

A \$75,000,000 subscription to the Liberty loan by an unnamed New York bank.



Oklahoma this year will produce between 25,000,000 and 30,000,000 bushels of wheat, virtually a normal crop from a production standpoint, according to the monthly crop report by the State Board of Agriculture.

Thousands of lambs in northeastern Utah have died as a result of the extremely cold weather, according to Thomas Redmond of the State Livestock Commission, who stated that the total loss to sheepmen would reach \$100,000.

Members of the boiler-makers' Union went on strike at the United Verde smelter at Clarksdale, Ariz. The men were ordered out in the third sympathetic strike since about 1,500 copper miners went out May 24 at Jerome. The miners' principal demands are for recognition of the union.

stand why the El Paso & Southwestern should take the lead for the other companies. When the first war board was organized by Governor W. E. Lindsey, W. A. Hawkins, one of the general attorneys for the El Paso & Southwestern, was in Santa Fe, having just returned from an extended stay in Washington and other cities. He brought to the governor and his counsellors much information which they would not have been able to secure otherwise. He was made a member of the war board, and was sent back to Washington as New Mexico's delegate to the national conference. After the special session of the legislature had definitely authorized a Council of Defense, he was appointed a member of the new body. It was at his suggestion that the other two companies gladly agreed to furnish passes for the council and its agents.

Other officers and employes have aided. When the first board was organized and making its plans to make a big increase in the acreage in food and feedstuffs R. S. Trumbull, agricultural agent for this company, came to Santa Fe and spent several days in the conferences out of which grew the plans that are now in use.

Prior to the time the special session passed an appropriation bill to finance the agricultural work of the state, 14 of the officers of the El Paso & Southwestern headed by G. F. Hawks, general manager, agreed to make a donation of 10 per cent. of their salaries to be used to buy seeds for farmers to plant. They agreed to give this "tithe" that so often is mentioned in the scriptures, so long as might be necessary for the combined "tithes" to reach a total of \$2,000. Even after the legislature financed the business of providing seeds, these officers carried out their original agreement.

The total that they have distributed in seeds up to this time is \$1,685.52, of which \$1,027.30 was for potatoes, the balance being for beans. The council has a list of the 80 farmers who have received seeds through this fund. The smallest amount received by anyone was \$5.00, the largest \$97.50.

Institute Progressing Nicely.

The Lincoln County Teachers' Institute which began here Monday morning has reached a high tension of interest and teachers from all over the county have enrolled. The attendance now numbers about 24. Superintendent Taylor, of Deming, has charge of the institute, his assistants being Mrs. George Dixon of Hondo; Miss Ida Schimpff, of Oscuro, and Mrs. E. V. Jewett, of Carrizozo.
