Sheep Men Will Be Concerned In These Methods

More Scientific Lambing Methods Essential To Successful Sheep Raising.

Albuquerque, N. M., Feb. 12.-That more scientific lambing methods are essential to the greatest productiveness in the sheepraising industry is the gist of the conclusions arrived at after long study by a grazing specialist of the Forest Service. The manner in which this improvement can be brought about is described in the following article.

The time was when the sheep industry in Arizona and New Mexico, did not justify the extra expense necessary to properly care for ewes and their young during the lambing period; but suddenly conditions have changed. Prices are high for both mutton and wool. The open range is gone. Sheep men must make more money from smaller herds, and must run their sheep on more restricted range. This means that instead of lambing wherever feed and water happen to be good they must lamb on practically the same. range each year, and they must provide feed and water not only for the favorable seasons, but for those dry and backward springs which came all too often in the Southwest. In addition, they must reckon with one or more severe storms each month during the epring until the last of May. The three important items in successful lambing are; plenty of feed and water, and protection against storms and predatory animalsu mammoo muu

The Forest Service has been interested in working out in cooperation with stockmen a method of lambing which would most successfully meet the conditions that prevail on the open ranges of the higher mesas and mountains in the Southwest,

RADIUM CURES CANCER CASES Report of London Institute Shows Suc-

cess in Treatment of Many Patients in Past Two Years.

In the years 1915 and 1916 the Radium institute of London handled 1,400 cases, giving 12,831 separate treatments. These were of many forms of cancer and of skin diseases. Of these, 87 were not treated, 123 were treated too recently to record results, 83 received irradiation merely as a precautionary measure. Of the remaining 1,157, the official report says, 172 were "apparently cured," 52 were "cured," 498 "Improved," 215 "not improved," 147 abandoned treatment and 76 were dead.

There were 186 cases of rodent ulcer, which of all forms of malignant disease is most amenable to the action of radium. Lesions which do not affect mucous membrane, bone or cartilage and which have not previously been treatment with Xray, CO2, ionization, snow, etc., "can almost invariably be cured by one treatment," says the




Amusing Little Trivialities That Will Tend to Take invalid's Mind Off His Sufferings.

Walton on Land Committee

Congressman W. B. Walton, notwithstanding his selection as a member on the two important committees of Public Lands and Indian affairs, to which he was named on the assembling of Congress less than a year ago, has just been elected to the Committee on Irrigation of Arid Lands, an assignment which means more hard work for him but increases his power for usefulness to the people of New Mexico.

Clayton, N. M. Feb. 28.—The first sale of state land in 1918 in Union county, held here on St. Valentine's day, has demonstrated that last year's record breaking state land sales in this county were not based on boom prices, but were fairly standardized values for farming and grazing lands owned by the state in this section. A total of 69 tracts were offered by State Land Commissioner R. P Ervien at last week's auction in the county court house. They totaled \$1.00 92, 108. 64 acres and brought a total purchase price of \$578, 157. 52 or an average price per acre of \$6:27: The average is not as high as that of the April, 1917 sale when an average of \$7.50 was reached: but the lands offered last week were largely grazing, with little agricultural land included, while in the 1917 sale large tracts of farm land were offered.

The tracts sold last week ranged in acreage from 40 to 28,500 acres, but the total 53 tracts were 640 acres while only two were of above 5, 000 acres one being for 28,500 acres and the other for 8,900 acres. Both of these tracts were bought by New Mexico stockmen for the minimum price of \$5 per acre.






"It will, fair nymph," the man replied, joining whimsically in her pleasure. "With no habitation within many weary miles of walking, may I ask where is your abode?"





(Special Information Service, United States Department of Agriculture.) ROAD CONSTRUCTION POLICY FOR WAR TIME



Food Transportation Needs as Well as Military Necessity to Be Considered in Nation's War Time Road Building.

MAINTAIN ROADS ALREADY BUILT

Military and Economic Needs Must Govern 1918 Construction.

BUILDING PUT ON WAR BASIS

How the Federal Ald Road is Administered-Improved State Laws One Result-Annual Expenditure of \$800,000,000 Involved.

That is the policy which David F. Houston, secretary of agriculture, believes should be followed in highway continuation during the resp. It means construction during the war. It means that road building in the United States will be put on a war basis; that highway which is vitally important is a standard of the stand movement of commodities will receive priority of consideration in projecting programs of construction.

In carrying out the policy thus announced there has been sent out by the office of public roads of the department of agriculture, schedule forms on which the states are requested to set forth their proposed federal aid work for the 1918 working season. These schedules call for a description of each road, the character, quantity and rail haul of the materials to be used, the probable cost, the amount of federal funds desired, the specific purpose of the improvement, its bearing upon the war situation, and what effect a delay of the work until 1919 or later would have. With the information thus assembled and classified, an efficient rond-construction program is assured. While it is impossible to make any definite statement regarding the transportation of road materials, the expectations are that the transportation situation will be improved and in the course of preparation in the case that the shipment of such materials for essential projects can be made.

Expenditure of \$300,000,000.

Road construction and maintenance in the United States involve an annual expenditure of some \$300,000,000, and there is scarcely a section of the country that is not seriously affected by a marked disturbance in road work.

In the administration of the federal aid road act of July 11, 1916, which provides for co-operation between the federal government and the states in the construction of rural post roads and of roads and trails within and partly within the national forests, very satisfactory progress has been made by the department of agriculture, according to a recent report of Secretary Houston. The office of public roads and rural-engineering, which is intrusted with the burden of admisistering the act, has extended its organization to provide the requisite machinery. Ten district officers with an engineer in chargo have been established in as many areas.

Forty State Projects

Under the provisions of the act 40 states have submitted 183 projects involving a total of approximately 1,780 miles, according to the secretary's rehave been approved. These projects has always been the practice.

STATES SPEED OP-**ERATION OF FEDERAL** AID ROAD ACT.

Probably the most significant result thus far of the operation of the federal aid road net has been the enactment by a number of stato legislatures of effective road laws. Legislative action in some states was necessary to meet the requirements of the federal act, but many of the states have gone further and have recast their highway policies. All the states have assented to the provisions of the act-42 by their legislatures and six by their governors. Thirty-three had a highway department within the meaning of the act upon the date of its approval; the remaining 15 have since enacted legislation creating highway departments which comply with the terms of the law. The highway departments In 18 states have been greatly strengthened, specific appropriations to meet the federal funds have been made by ten, and comprehensive maintenance leg-Islation has been enacted in nine states. Forty-two states now have satisfactory maintenance laws. Nearly all the states have submitted definite schemes or programs of work for the entire five-year period covered by the act, or for the greater portion of it. The formulation of carefully prepared plans for the full period in advance of construction tends to prevent wasteful and haphazard undertak-

********** involve federal funds to the extent of \$3,455,573.76, or 23.75 per cent of the total allotment, \$14,550,000 to the various states for the fiscal year 1917 and 1918. Six projects covering 40 miles have been disapproved. Agreements have been entered into or are of 34 projects, aggregating 197.74 miles and involving \$190,000.84 of federal funds and a total of \$2,225,914.74.

The full effect of the federal aid road act cannot be measured by any comparison of funds expended in 1916 and made available for 1917, as many of the legislatures did not meet until early in the calendar year 1917. It is significant, however, says the secretary, that while the expenditure of state funds in 1916 aggregated \$40,-909,000 it is estimated that the expenditure of state funds in 1917 will reach approximately \$00,000,000, or an increase of nearly 50 per cent. These funds are distinct from local expenditures and indicate an advance in state participation in highway work. .

Transport of Farm Products.

Farm products will not be denied transportation facilities, according to a statement of the director general of ratiroads, issued after a conference with representatives of the United States department of agriculture. No list of "non-essential" agricultural products has been issued, nor is such an order contemplated. The director general believes that under the plan now being formulated it will be possiport. TESTING SEED CORN IS STRONGLY URGED


Of Greater Importance to Farmer Than Ever Before.

Department of Agriculture Urges That Farmers Do Not Feed Corn That Would Be Valuable if Used for Seeding.

(Prepared by the United States Depart-ment of Agriculture.)

The germination test of seed corn is more important this year than ever before because good seed corn is scarce, and because the best seed is needed in order to produce the large crop which this nation will need. Even where seed corn has been carefully gathered and stored it should be thoroughly tested in the spring before planting. The best way to do this is to make a seed corn testing box and test one hundred ears separately.

Each kernel that is tested must be perfect, and not injured at the tip when it was removed from the ear. Hand shelling will give much fewer

injured tips than machine shelling, and should be used with all seed corn. If three or more kernels out of ten from any one car fail to grow it will be wise to test every ear in the entire supply of seed. If the 100 tested cars show no poor ones, further testing of the supply is unnecessary.

Prevention is Best. It must not be thought that good results from the germination tests are a sure index of high productivity. Ears slightly damaged by poor preservation, as in damp storage places, may germinate well, but will produce less than if they had got better care. Prevention is better than cure; and in the case of poor storage, according to seedcorn specialists, a cure is impossible.

Corn that was selected wisely in the field where it grew, that matured normally and has been preserved properly in mouse and insect proof storages will grow and produce satisfactorily.

Because there is such a scarcity of seed corn in some sections of the corn belt, the United States department of agriculture urges that farmers in this and other sections be careful not to feed corn that would be more valuable if used for seed. To the detriment of the 1918 crop some corn suitable for seed is being used to some extent by farmers who have enough seed for themselves. This is especially regrettable because the corn is frequently adapted to conditions and is not a great distance from where it will be sadly needed for spring planting.

Get Seed Best Adapted. Ordinarily seed corn should not be obtained from a distance. The nicestlooking seed may be entirely unadapted and cause the loss of a crop. As there is but little "hold over" the WHOLE OATS ARE DANGEROUS frost-stricken and drought-stricken areas must get their seed from other points. It should be obtained from a locality having a similar climate, and obtained now.

If you have a large amount, or but a few bushels of a 90-day corn which germinates well, let your county agent, your state experiment station and the United States department of agriculture know about it.

VALUE OF GOOD IMPLEMENTS

NITRATE OF SODA BENEFITS

Highly Valuable for Early Crops Where Rapid Maturity is Desired-Helps in Orchards.

Dr. William S. Myers says that nitrate of sode is of high value for early crops, where rapid maturity is desirable, such as peas, corn, beets, and cabbage. It is a special help to hay, grain, rye, wheat, timothy, cereals, and orchards, all of which are unable to obtain sufficient nitrogen from the soil just when they need it. It is a great specific in the production of sugar beets, potatoes, cotton and cane,

Small fruits, such as blackberries, currents, raspberries, and gooseberries, which need a steady, even growth, are greatly benefited by nitrate of soda, which can be furnished all ready for digestion when the plants require it.

BUSINESS METHODS IN NEED

Many of Farm Failures Doubtless Due to Lack of Science-Farmer Would Produce More.

Much emphasis is being placed upon science in farming. We are often told that if we would use more science we would produce more. There is much truth in this. Many of our failures doubtless could be traced to a lack of science—that is, lack of classified knowledge.

Business methods are indispensable to profitable farming. Without sound business judgment, correct business habits and safe business practice, it will be a very difficult matter to use science for profitable farming.

USE WOOD INSTEAD OF COAL

Good Feed for Poultry, but Hulls May Cause Impacted Crops and Recuit Fatally.

Oats is a good poultry food. There is some risk, however, in feeding whole oats. The hulls may cause impacted crops and death. The best way to feed oats is to crush them, sift the hulls out, and feed in the mash.

IMPORTANCE OF GREEN FEED

Highly Concentrated Ration Will Ruin Flock Unless Given Sprouted Oats or Some Roots.

No matter how much exercise the chickens have, a highly concentrated ration such as table scraps and mill stuffs will ruin a flock unless they are given green food. Sprouted oats, clover or alfalfa hay, mangels, cabbage and small potatoes are good greens.

Cement Floor for Horses. Cement floors are used, for horses, but it is considered better to have plank on the cement in the stalls. It is all right to have the forward part of the stall of earth.

Early Lambs. At from twelve to sixteen weeks of age early lambs should weigh about mixty pounds.

Furnish Creep for Lambe. Sheep feeders usually have a creep for the lambs so the ewes cannot est the feed intended for the lambs.

HOW FRENCH WOMEN SAVE

Their Natural Talent for Economy Has Done Much to Help Withstand Hardships of War.

The French housewife, with her native talent for economy, has saved France up to the present time fully as much as have those fighting in the trenches. Good advice has been liven to Americans, if they will only take it.

Rich women who have had many servants now have few. Expenses are cut all along the line. Simple meals and simple habits replace elaborate ones. A lady buys clothes, but for orphans and refugees, not for herself.

Poor women, who must reduce simplicity to frugality—what do they do? They make one sou buy two sous' worth by watching every centime. This, for countless women in Paris, means getting up at five o'clock in the morning to get a choice of things at the great market, Les Halles; walking long distances to go where things cost not so much as nearer home; walking instead of riding; keeping vigilant watch on the venders' carts along the street for good values; turning plain foods into attractive dishes by a well-flavored sauce and a garnishing which costs nothing.

In the old residential quarters of Paris there are hundreds of women of aristocratic connections and moderate means who before the war had several servants and who now have none, or perhaps one. And to women of all degrees of wealth there could scarcely be a more interesting study than to see how these gentlewomen and their humble helpers give a charming touch to hard economy.

A representative household is one where the regular income has suddenly stopped, but leaving a little more than the small government allowance. The ingenuity of housekeeper and cook accomplishes wonders. In many a home butter, may now be served once a week and perhaps with only one course.


