

## UNCLE SAM'S BOYS TO BE PROTECTED WITH EMPLOYMENT

Questions Propounded by  
Red Cross to People of This  
Section Concerning Dis-  
abled Soldiers and Sailors

The After Care Bureau of the American Red Cross, which is assisting the government with its program of re-education for the nation's crippled and disabled war heroes, wants every one in this section of the state to be aware of the great, happy opportunities that await their soldier relatives and friends. The Red Cross has propounded the following queries to the people of this region:

"Does your disabled soldier or sailor boy know what Uncle Sam is ready and eager to do for him? Does he know that as an act of simple justice, urged by pride and gratitude, the American Government is determined that he shall have 'a fair shake' in the battle of life to which he is returning after being broken and maimed in the struggle with autoeracy? Does he know that to make it possible for our wounded heroes to take their places in the army of workers and to insure for them a self-supporting future the Federal Government will train them in a calling in which they can overcome their handicaps, whether that retraining involves a four-year college course or a few months' shop experience? And that Uncle Sam will foot all the bills?"

This is exactly what the Government wants to do and is doing. But there are thousands of crippled fighters who are not aware of their rights. To help them back to independence Congress has appropriated \$2,000,000 for their re-education if their disability prevents them from returning to their old jobs. Congress passed without a dissenting vote the law under which the Federal Board for Vocational Education is charged with getting him a job, if he will accept this help, for every disabled soldier or sailor entitled to compensation under the War Risk Insurance Act.

The Federal Board is already functioning, handicapped only by the difficulty of reaching all the men entitled to its assistance. To help in this phase of the work the Board is enlisting many agencies—The War Risk Insurance Bureau, the Surgeon-General's Department of the Army and Navy, and the American Red Cross. Now it calls upon the families and friends of disabled fighters to help. This they can do by telling the man what they are entitled to and encouraging them to accept the Government offer. A letter to the Federal Board for Vocational Training, Washington, D. C., will bring full information and advice.

**Banks and Liberty Bonds**

With approximately one subscriber in every five of the population of the United States to Liberty Loan Bonds, safeguarding the bonds owned by depositors is another and highly important service which the banks already render the people. If the Bonds are securely kept even in banks, the depository must be burglar as well as fire-proof. Numerous recent successful attacks on safety deposit boxes emphasize the necessity to keep these Bonds where crackers cannot penetrate. The same consideration should be given Liberty Bonds and War Saving Stamps as is accorded to cash. The public which has been educated to buy Bonds will seek some other form of investment unless the Bonds can be placed where they will not be a cause of constant anxiety and worry to the owners.

Nearly all banks are custodians of Bonds owned by their customers but the system of recording has not been made uniform. One of the best systems devised for the recording and safe-keeping of Bonds and War Saving Stamps is one used by the LINCOLN STATE BANK which is outlined in this week's issue.

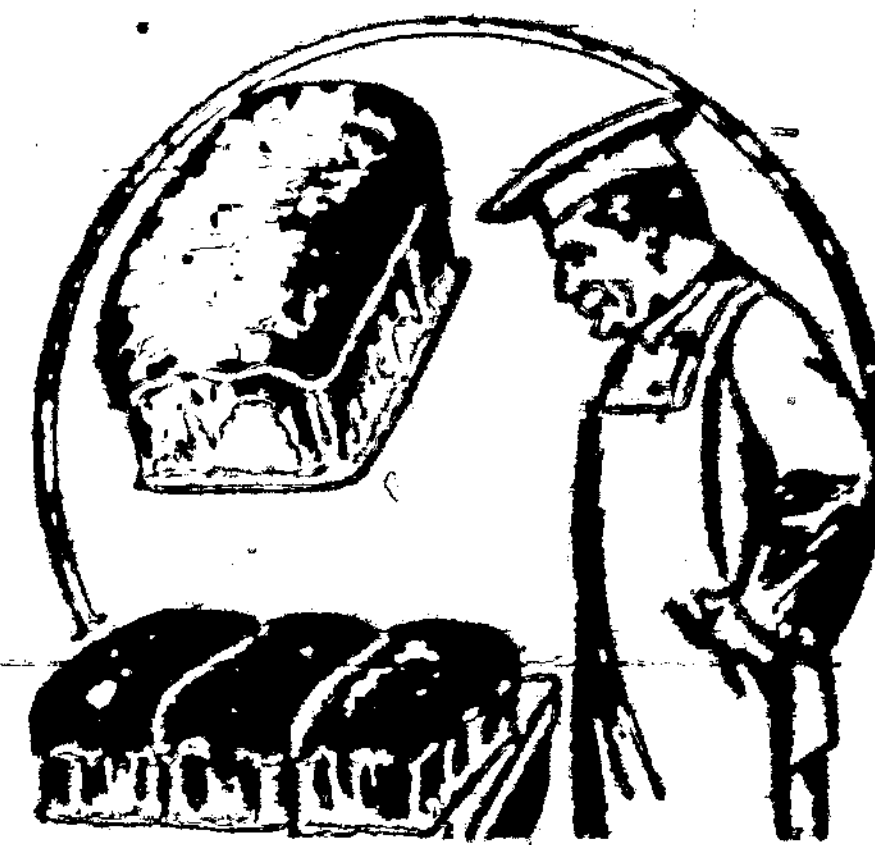

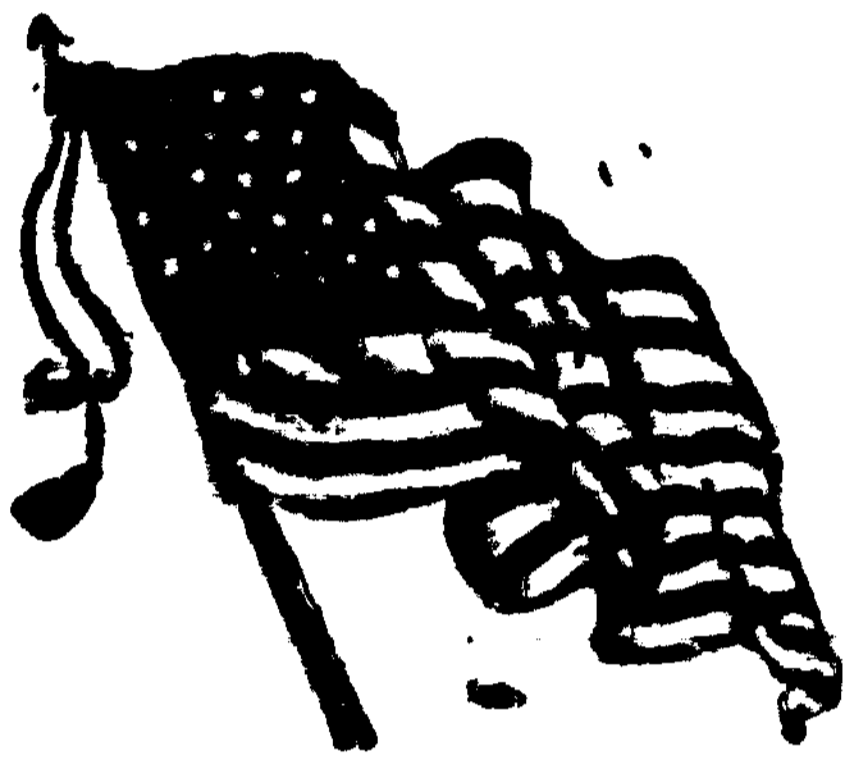

**Immigration From Europe**

Now that the war is over and we have again raised the sign "Welcome to Our Shores," we are confronted with a problem that should cause our law-makers to watch their step and move carefully lest they admit to our shores the blackest criminal class that has ever gained an entrance to the liberty we must at all hazards preserve.

Autocratic dominion in the old countries has in the past caused a condition of unrest and discontent with its policy of oppression. A large percentage of the victims of this abusive policy have escaped the ravages of war and are now ready to embark for these shores, to add to the already surplus amount of undesirables working in our midst unapprehended.

These people, this element we speak of, regard all forms of government as their enemies. They mistake liberty for license; aided and encouraged by the material we now have on hand, will soon undermine our free government and institutions thereby "biting the hand that feeds them" and would abolish the very government that seeks to bless them. In an able article under the heading of "The Open Door," the Scottish Rites Bulletin for March says:

"One of the problems which our National Law-makers will have to confront, as an aftermath of this world war, will be immigration from Europe.

"This country has been called the 'melting pot,' but it is a matter of opinion whether 'dumping ground' would not be a more apt term to apply, when we consider the thousands upon thousands of un-fused lumps that we now have in our so-called citizenship.

"Autocratic dominion, with its policy of repression, has bred unrest and discontent in the oppressed people, and now that this Autocracy has been temporarily overthrown, the rebound has brought to light a situation little short of Anarchy in all

those countries. "The time is now for Americans to seriously consider these things, and as our law-makers are but the servants of their constituents, it is the province of the electors to make their views known to the delegated representatives in the Congress.

"The personal view of the editor of the Bulletin is that our Government should make all efforts to really Americanize the elements we now have, both the native and immigrant,--in other words melt up and make truly American the supply now on hand, before seeking or permitting the introduction of any but the most select extraneous material."

The Bulletin sounds the warning ahead, and it should be taken up by all papers and periodicals in the land; it should be discussed to such a length as to make it an issue for the coming National campaign. Let not the cloth of Uncle Sam be soiled by allowing his good-heartedness to get the upper hand of his better judgment and thereby jeopardize the best interests of the freedom of our country.

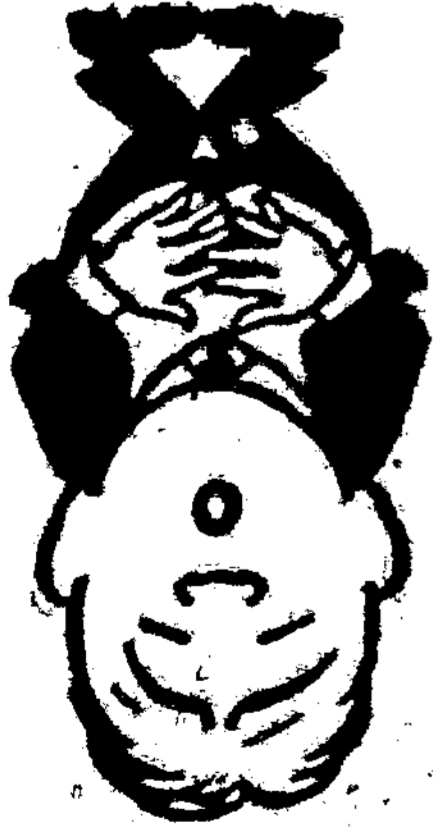

## FIX POLAND BOUNDARIES

GEOGRAPHY A BIG FEATURE IN DRAWING LINES FOR NEW STATE.

## WANTS OUTLET TO SEA

REPORTS MADE TO SUPREME ALLIED COUNCIL BY HEAD OF COMMISSION.

Paris, March 21.—In making his report to the supreme allied council on the Polish question, Jules Cambon, the head of the Peace Conference Commission on Polish affairs, set forth the purpose of the commission to create a Polish state which would have a firm foundation for its future welfare and at the same time to respect the principle of nationalities, despite the difficulties resulting from the geographical features of the problem.

Poland, M. Cambon pointed out, was half enclosed by German territory and had an imperative need of an independent outlet to the sea by a route easy of access, to insure her national autonomy. Therefore, he said, it was necessary to incorporate in the new state some German elements which, he reminded the council, had been introduced there by Germany herself with deliberateness and in conformity with her colonizing system.

Premier Lloyd George argued that Germany must not be given a pretext for organizing a sort of irredentist movement, especially east of the Vistula, where the Germans were rather numerous. The plan of the commission gives to Poland boundaries which render her territory more restricted than it was in 1772. It puts in her possession an outlet to the Baltic which along a considerable distance spans the Vistula to Danzig, but excludes the Allenstein territory, to determine the position of which a plebiscite is proposed.

Mr. Lloyd George also remarked that by connecting Danzig with Thorn and Warsaw by two independent railroads it probably would be possible to make Poland economically independent.

### Blames Agitators.

New York.—Postmaster General Burleson, in a letter made public to Secretary of Labor Wilson regarding the labor situation in connection with the government's control of telegraph and telephone wires, charges that a "few agitators" are continuously conducting propaganda which engenders unnecessary dissatisfaction among employees. The Postoffice Department's policies are misrepresented, Mr. Burleson declared, so that the impression is created that the government discriminates against employees who are members of labor unions.

### Sues U. S. for Damages.

Philadelphia.—The Atlantic Refining Company has entered suit in the United States Court here against the government for \$2,103,251, alleged to be due for fuel oil furnished to the navy. The oil company claims compensation on the basis of war prices charged for its product, while Secretary Daniels settled at the lower rate fixed by President Wilson. Other concerns, it is stated, will enter suit for large sums in the event the government losing in the present controversy.

### Japs Kill Koreans.

Philadelphia.—Ten thousand Koreans have been killed and 45,000 arrested by the Japanese in the demonstrations for Korean independence, according to a cablegram from Shanghai which has just reached Dr. Syngman Rhee, representative of the Korean National Association to the peace conference, who is now in this city. "Japan has cut all wire communication between Korea and the outer world." Couriers smuggled over the border into China have cabled Dr. Rhee this information.

### Considering Bond Issue.

Washington.—The war finance corporation is considering floating a large bond issue, probably of \$200,000,000 within a few weeks to provide funds for railroads and to meet any other demands on the corporation. The interest rate contemplated is 4% per cent. The bonds would run for a year or possibly a year and a half, according to tentative plans. They would be sold privately to banks and big business interests in order to minimize interference with the popular Victory Liberty loan campaign.

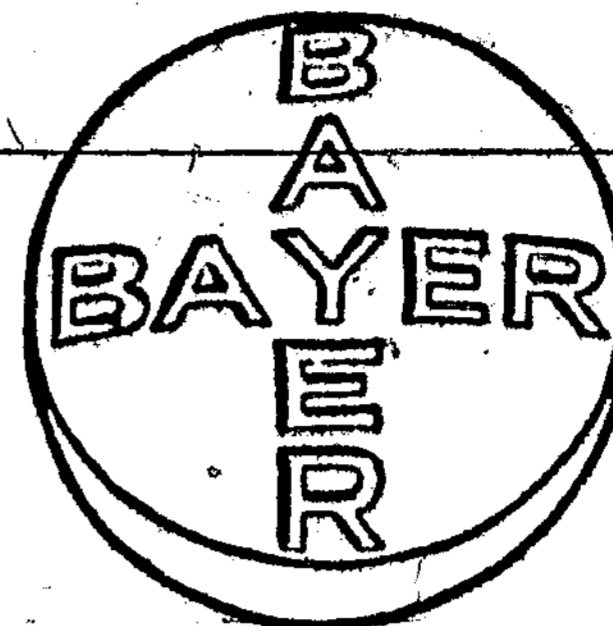

**Oil Excitement at Navajo Bend**

Word comes from Navajo Bend that the oil excitement is raging there at fever heat. It is said that a company has already been organized with a capital stock of a million dollars. Among the stockholders are Nigger Lassus, the old Needle Doctor, the Old Miser, the Merchant Prince, Rube White, Snakey Ed, Rocky Rivers, and Dish Faced Dan. A committee to sell stock has been appointed which is composed of Rube White, Dish Faced Dan and Snakey Ed. Nigger Lassus has been appointed a committee of one to go South and work among the colored people, while the old Miser has been unanimously named for Treasurer, on account of his inclination to hold fast to every dollar he gets his hands on.

**Home Protection League**

The following article has been received at this office for publication:

Roswell, N. M., March 25—Diversion of water out of the Hondo drainage basin in southeastern New Mexico will be made an issue by the people, who depend upon irrigation water. This was decided at a mass meeting of the people of Lincoln and Chavez counties held in Roswell and the Home Protection League of Ruidoso, Hondo and Pecos Valley was formed. E. A. Cahoon is president, John W. Poe is vice-president. Each member is signing the following pledge: "I hereby enter into covenant with other residents of the Pecos Slope to resist by every legitimate means any further diversion of water out of the Hondo drainage system. To this end I pledge myself for a period of four years to support no candidate for the legislature, for governor or for congress who will not pledge himself to oppose any such diversion."

It is estimated that 3000 voters will sign that pledge. Business men as well as stockmen and farmers are signing this pledge. It is the result of the fight of

the Rock Island Railway to obtain the north-fork of the Ruidoso for their pipe line—already taking the streams from the basin. During the war they obtained a permit from the government urging it as a war necessity. After the armistice was signed, the people sent Dr. S. M. Johnson to Washington, proved that the emergency had passed and that the farms producing \$15,000,000 worth of agricultural products would suffer permanent injury. The permit was revoked. The fight was then carried to the New Mexico Legislature. The water users attempted to get a bill through preventing the diversion of any stream which had a bearing on artesian area. The railroad put up a strong fight, and it was the result of this that the new league was formed. The people are determined to fight to the last ditch to save the water on which property values in the entire basin depend.

**Died at 115 Years of Age**

(Otero County News)  
Senor Agapito Madrid died at his home in La Luz canyon March 12th and was buried the 14th.

Senor Madrid was nearly 115 years of age at the time of his death, the family claiming authentic documents showing his birth August 6th, 1804 at Rial de San Lorenzo, three miles east of Juarez, Mexico.

In his younger days he was a soldier for the Mexican government and campaigned against the Apache and other Indians. He was never known to be ill, says his son, S. M. Madrid, and the only time he remembers of his father refusing to eat at meal time was on the morning of his death.

Mr. Madrid was 83 years of age before his first child was born to him.



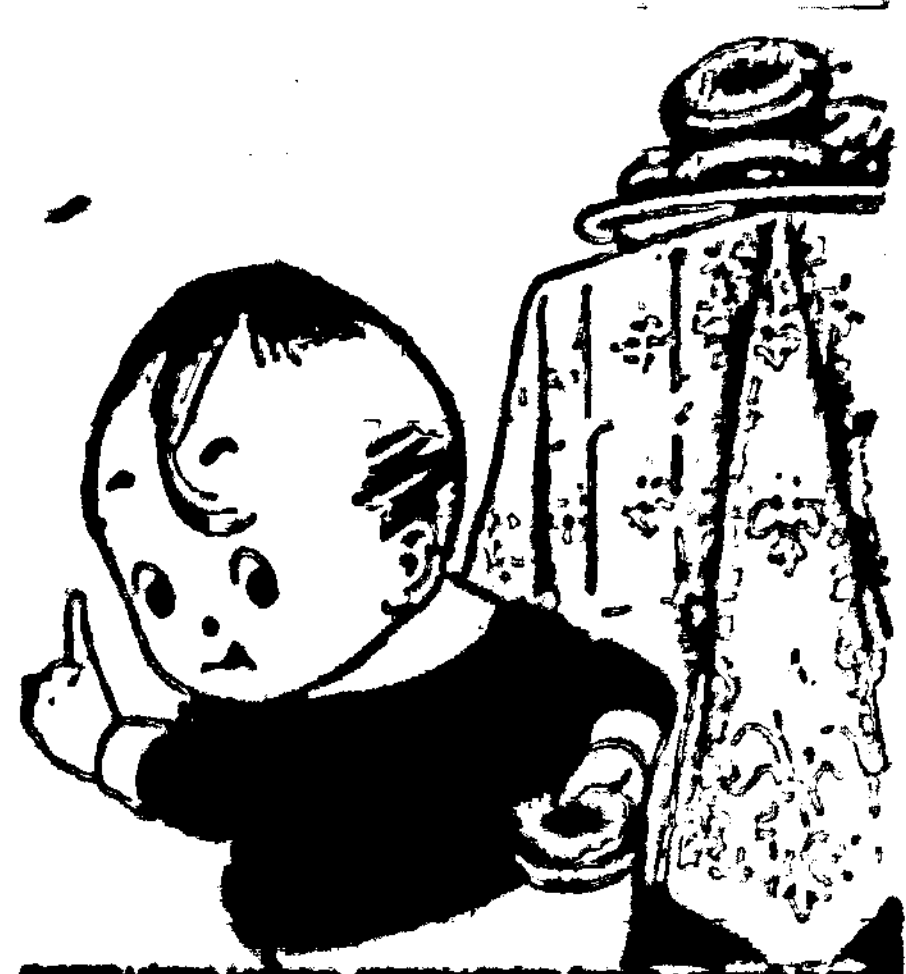

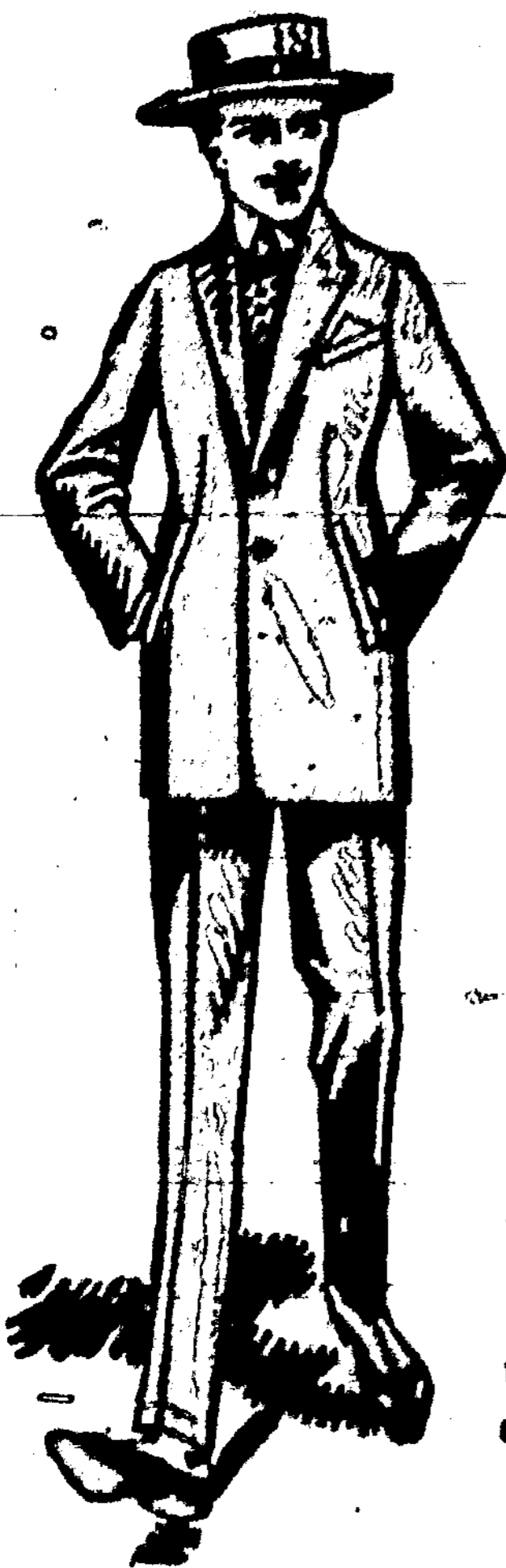
