

HOME SCHOOLS TO HAVE SPLENDID ARRAY OF TALENT

Facts about Schools And Teachers Who Will Conduct Affairs For Coming Term.—Dr. Cole, Supt.

The members of the Carrizozo School Board and all the parties interested in the school work have been continually questioned as to who will be the teachers, where they are from, what are their qualifications, etc. These questions are only natural and in fact necessary, as they show an interest in the schools and the work to be taken up by the teachers, who are to be the guardians of our children for the coming school term. The members of the Board of Education have been quietly working in order to secure the best of material for the new force of whom but four of the sixteen have taught here before.

An extra teacher has been added to the list of the last term in order to strengthen the work in general, all of the incoming teachers being provided with credentials of scholarship and ability. In order to make accredited work in these grades, a full four years' course will be given. Dr. C. C. Cole, the new Superintendent, comes to us with high recommendations as a scholar and leader. He interests himself in the children out of school as well as in and plans interesting work for them in the field of civic life. Dr. Cole will be assisted in the High School by the Misses Edith Luetton and Minnie Sullivan. Mrs. Margaret Burt will have the Spanish department while Mr. Bryan Cazier will be assigned to Manual Training and the Athletic department.

Miss Lois Tipton will be Principal of the grades and have the work of the eighth grade in charge. The teachers of the grades below the 8th will be as follows: Miss Carlisle, 7th grade; Miss Holland, 6th grade; Miss Humphrey, 5th grade; Miss Tipton, 4th grade; Miss Lucille Lindsay, 3rd grade; Mrs. Nora Massie, 2nd grade; Miss Ivy Lindsay, 1st grade, assisted by Miss Neff. Mrs. Elizabeth A. Gumm will be Principal of the South Side School, assisted by Miss Rachel Hughes. The Board of Education wishes to announce that with painstaking endeavor they now have a faculty in which they have the utmost confidence. Parents need not send their children to other places for with the teachers above mentioned none can give the people of Carrizozo and vicinity better service.

Institute Notes

From Roswell.

Roswell, N. M., July 29—Fully back to a pre-war basis, the New Mexico Military Institute will begin the next term with every prospect for an unusually successful year. The Institute will start with but little change in the faculty. Some of the strongest members of the teaching staff have returned to the United States after service in the battlefields of France and to resume their work in the Institute with renewed energy and vision.

The only difficulty the Institute expects to experience is that of accommodating all the cadets who desire to attend. The fame of the school has gone abroad throughout New Mexico and to far distant states, and applications for admission being received in great numbers. Preference is of course to be given to New Mexico boys and to cadets who attended last year or who left the school to join the service of their country.

An important announcement is that Major Eugene A. Lohman, a New Mexico boy, will return to the Institute as a special instructor under the direction of the United States War Department. Major Lohman is at present in charge of the big remount station at Camp Upton, N. Y. Great satisfaction is felt over the prospects for the early return of Major Lohman, who enjoys a very wide acquaintance with former students of the Institute and its numerous friends. He is a young officer of great ability and a splendid Spanish scholar.

Col. James W. Willson, for so many years superintendent of the Institute, has returned from a visit to the East. He was a guest at the Virginia Military Institute in Lexington, Va., his alma mater, and was given every opportunity to study the facilities and curriculum of that renowned institution, known as the West Point of the South. Col. Willson visited at the War Department in Washington and was given every assurance of continued assistance by the Department, which has repeatedly recognized the Institute as one of the few distinguished military schools of America. As a result of Col. Willson's visit to the national capital, arrangements are already under way for the organization of a cavalry unit of the R. O. T. C., and the indications are that a field artillery unit will be established in the corps. Securing these concessions from the Department is a matter of great importance to the Institute and to the people of New Mexico generally. It means that the federal government is to render valuable assistance to the school.

Prof. C. F. Schaeffer, M. A., University of Chicago, fifteen years' experience in teaching English, will report for duty September 1 and will occupy the chair of English.

CZozo MERCHANT MAKES BIG SHEEP DEAL AT ANCHO

Ex-Mayor Henry Lutz Buys Entire Holdings of Ancho Sheep Co. Deal Involves Much Stock and Money.

One of the largest deals in sheep was launched this week that has been pulled over the plate in this county for many years. The fortunate purchaser in this deal is Mr. Henry Lutz, who is President of the Carrizozo Trading Company and was at one time mayor of the town of Carrizozo. The former owners of these vast interests were known as the Ancho Sheep Co. The new firm will be known as the Henry Lutz & Son Sheep Co. In order to show how enormous this enterprise is, we will begin by saying that the firm has 15 square miles of good pasture ground, on which there are several large wind mills which pump water into huge tanks, the largest of which holds 127,000 gallons of water. From these tanks pipes are laid for a distance of five miles into the mountains, with watering places at every mile.

On this vast acreage, 12,000 sheep and 800 goats are now grazing. The sheep are all of the Ramboulette breed, the goats being angoras. The firm has two garages on the ranch to keep in repair the many autos and trucks which are being continually worked in different places over the plains and mountains. Dipping tanks made of solid concrete are arranged, each tank being large enough to hold 15 sheep at one time. There are many more features of interest and convenience connected with this ranch that cannot be mentioned at this writing, but we are safe in saying that on the whole it is the best equipped of any of its kind in the state of New Mexico. The handsome price paid by Henry Lutz & Son for this ranch was \$130,000.00. Lieut. Henry Lutz, who will shortly be released from duty in the army will be home by August 15th, which is the date on which the new company takes the reins and will from that time on, personally superintend the ranch.

Going And Coming

Oil Experts Working

Messrs. C. A. Ballreich and Ernest Blankinship of Gallup, N. M., were here Sunday looking over this section of the country for locations where there is a possibility of oil realizations. They have scoured every district between here and El Paso, also the regions north and east of here. These gentlemen are experienced locators and are possessed of a knowledge of geology gained through a long siege of practical experience which tells them that oil and plenty of it, is obtainable in this part of the Tularosa Basin.

They claim to have located ground between here and Corona on which they will begin the work of drilling within the next forty days. They are prepared to go down 4500 feet with one rigging and have another still in reserve with which to drill on other land in this locality. They

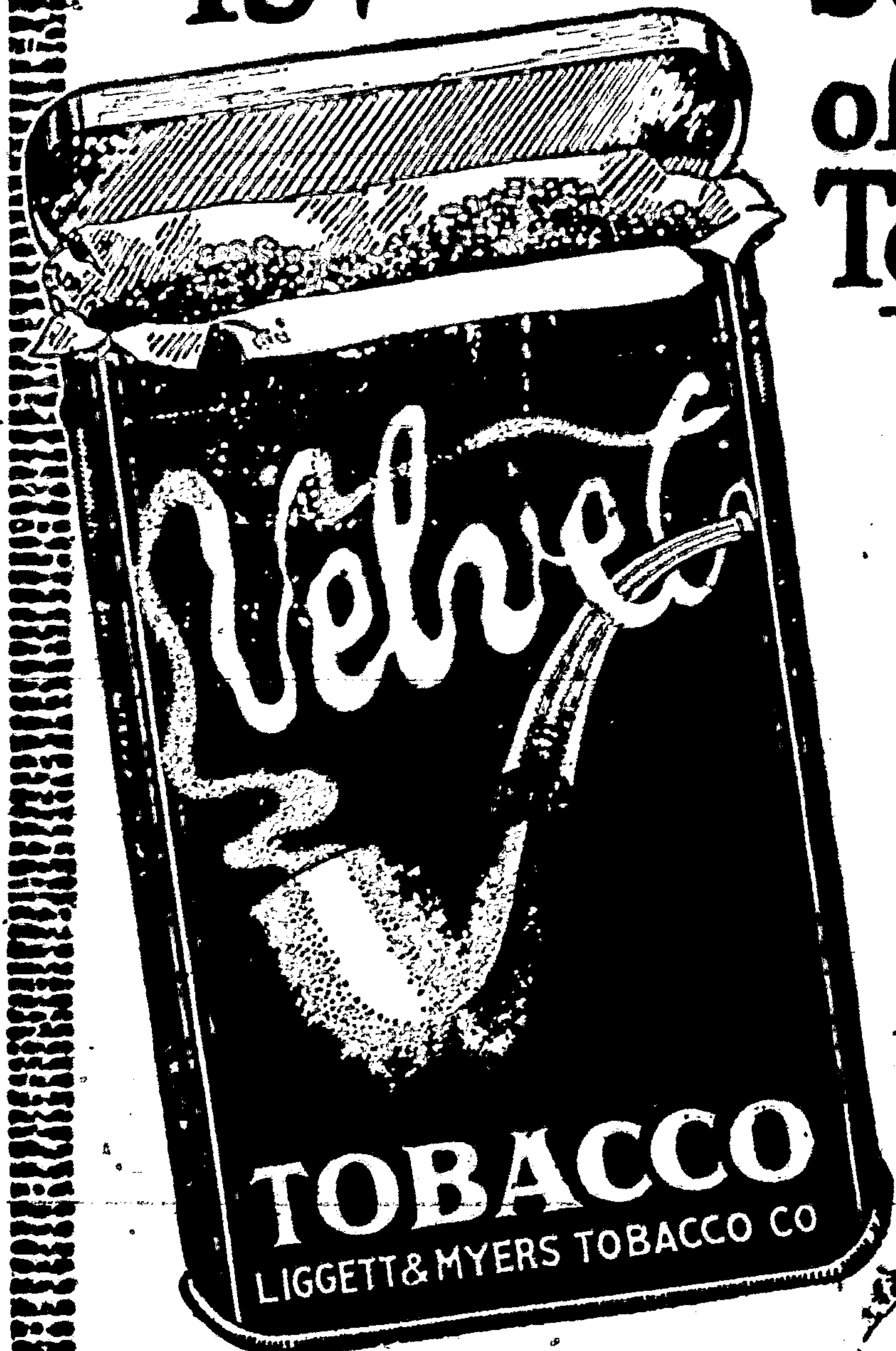

Nation Wide Stock Drive

This is the slogan of a national better live-stock crusade, to get actively in motion. October 1, that is announced by the United States Department of Agriculture, working in co-operation with the State agricultural colleges and other agencies interested in live-stock improvement. The campaign looks forward to the future food needs of this country's increasing population and results from long and careful observation of the live-stock industry in this country, and was planned after extensive consultation with specialists and breeders. The plan is to hasten the replacement of the multitude of scrub domestic animals in the United States with pure-bred and high-grade stock, and also to improve the quality of pure breeds themselves. The goal in view is greater efficiency in production.

The campaign will be first organized crusade in a large country to improve all live-stock simultaneously. It will interfere in no way with any work in live-stock improvement now being conducted, but makes all the work more definite and effective by providing official recognition for progressive breeders.

The campaign will be supervised from the Department of Agriculture in Washington, and in each State by the State Agricultural college. County agents and other field workers of the Department of Agriculture and the State colleges will handle the campaign locally. Every live-stock owner actively co-operating and keeping and using none but pure-bred sires of good quality will be given an emblem as an official recognition of meritorious effort.

New Picture Show

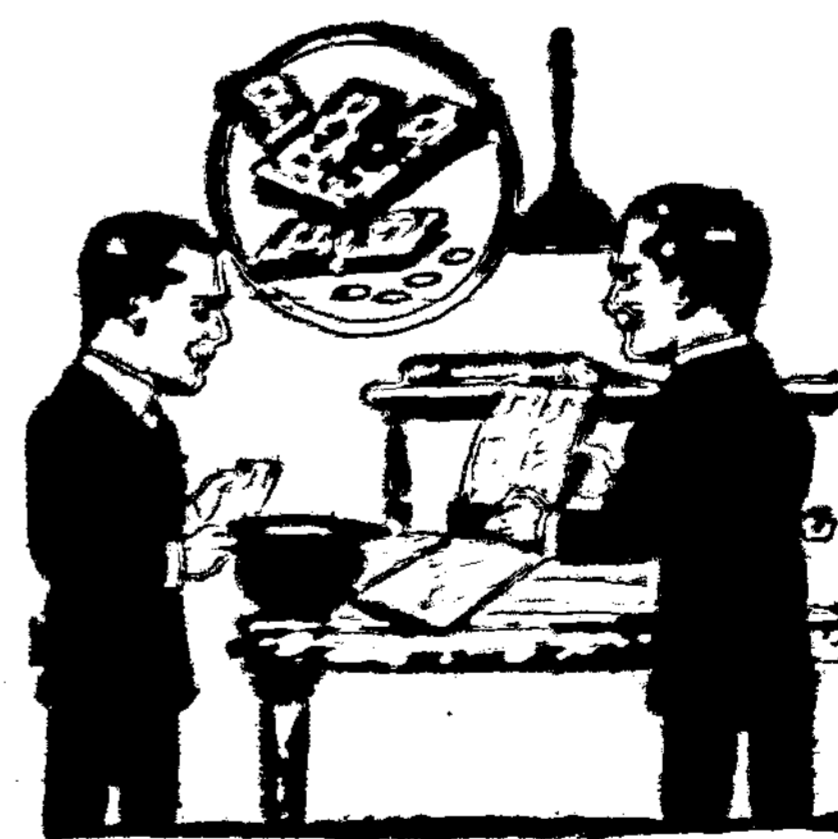

NO SWIVEL CHAIR FOR FORD'S SON

STAYED AT HOME DURING WAR TO HELP IN PLANT—REFUSED TO TAKE UNIFORM.

FATHER WAS RESPONSIBLE

Declares He Told Edsel That War Work in Factory Needed Him—Would Not Accept Safety First Commission.

Mr. Clemens, Mich.—Henry Ford, during the last hour of his seven days on the witness stand, took occasion to claim full responsibility for his son, Edsel Ford's, claim for exemption from the selective draft. "He wanted to enlist," said Mr. Ford, "but I told him that he could do more good where he was. He was offered several commissions which would have permitted him to wear a uniform and stay right in the factory, but he wouldn't accept them."

Having made their decision, it was shown, both Mr. Ford and his son refused to camouflage it behind a swivel chair commission carrying boots and spurs.

This subject, the introduction of which has been awaited ever since the trial opened, did not develop along the lines which had been generally expected. Mr. Ford's inclination to shoulder full responsibility, his statement that his son was absolutely essential to the war work being done in the factory and his revelation of the fact that Edsel Ford turned down several offers of a commission, disarmed criticism. The charges, spread during a political campaign, and recently repeated on the floor of the United States senate, to the effect that the young president of the Ford Motor company had shirked his duty were so fully refuted that Tribune counsel did not pursue the point.

It was the first time that a full explanation of the facts in connection with Edsel Ford's war work has been made public and it was easily the feature of the eleventh week of the trial.

Henry Ford spent seven days on the witness stand and of this time he gave less than two hours to his own lawyers. As long as counsel for The Tribune was hammering him Mr. Ford sat quietly in the witness chair answering the constant fire of questions with great patience. But the instant his own lawyers took him in hand his attitude changed. He became self-conscious and diffident. He would not accept the efforts of his counsel to provide him with an opportunity to reveal the full extent of his patriotic work during the war, his humanitarian views, or his advanced ideas of the relations which should exist between capital and labor.

"It is all in the records," said Mr. Ford. "I have told it all here once." He avoided, with care, anything that verged on boasting. He would not even describe the extent of the war work which his factories did and when record breaking performances in the production of munitions was mentioned he declared, "we did all we could, let it go at that. I want to forget all about it. I feel just as the soldiers feel. I don't want to talk about my war work."

The witness did, however, after being pressed, explain that his son had bought out the minority stockholders of the Ford Motor company because these interests had insisted on Mr. Ford squeezing the last dollar out of the public, the government; the workers and the product. He wanted to cut loose from his associates, he said, so that he could carry out his ideas of the distribution of profits to employees through increased wages and to the public through lower prices. It was either buy or sell and Mr. Ford had considered selling and organizing a new company. His son, however, took up the task of buying out the minority stockholders and succeeded, despite the general belief in the financial world that this stock could not be purchased.

One of the most interesting developments of Mr. Ford's testimony came out when it was testified that the only legislation he has ever sought was that for the protection of birds. Other men of millions, it was shown, keep lobbyists in the national and state capitol to urge and work for special privileges, but the one favor that Mr. Ford has ever asked from the lawmakers had nothing to do with his own interests. It was a curious bit of testimony and left a deep impression on the audience in the court chamber.

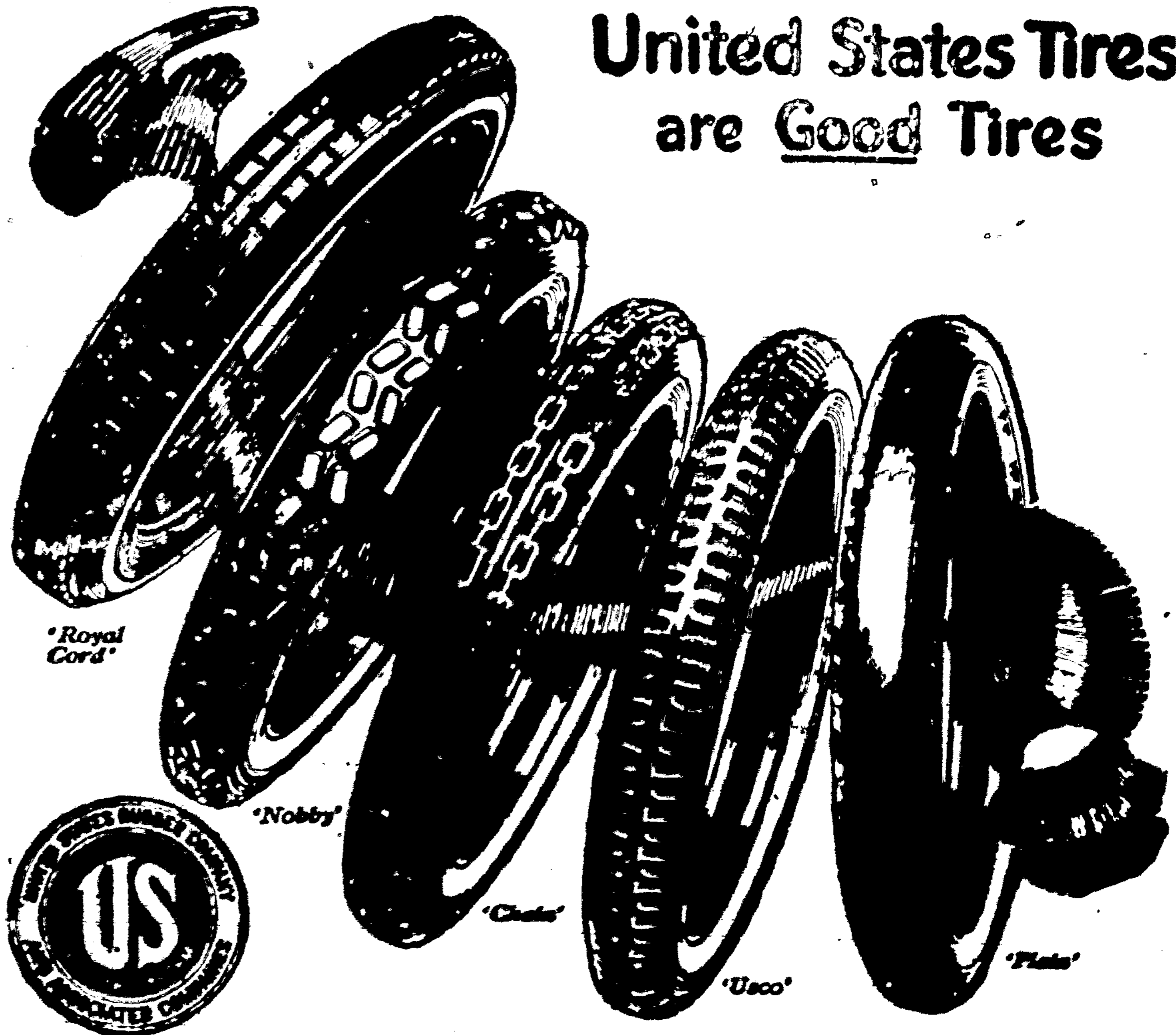

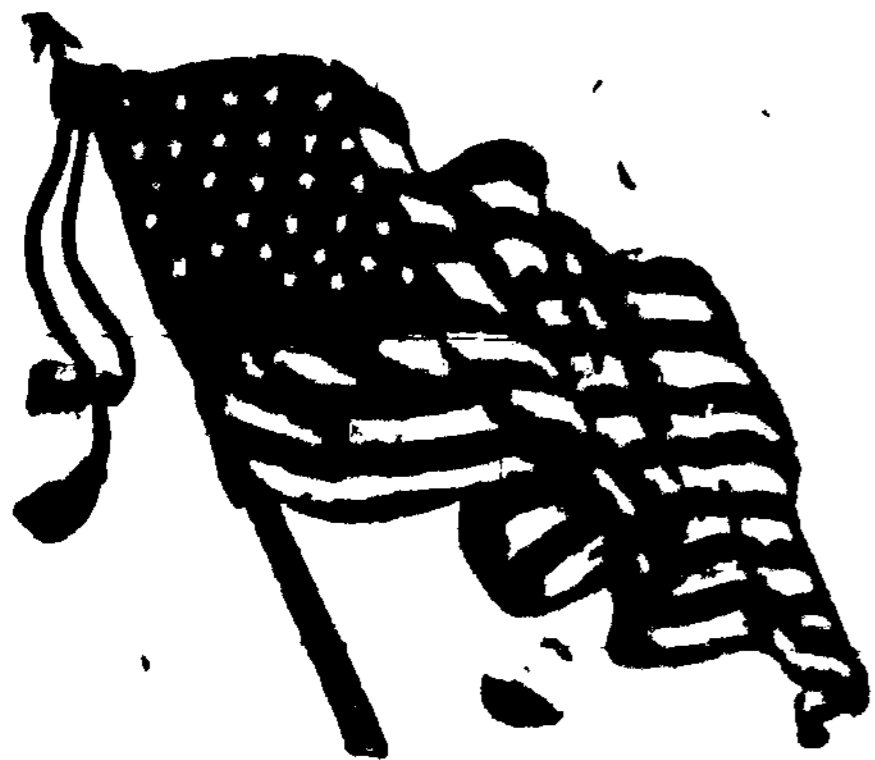

If Shantung or War Then War, Says Borah

Washington, July 31, 1919—Following upon the revelation of barbaric atrocities of the Japanese autocracy in Korea by the Presbyterian Church, and an assault upon American troops there for which reparation has not been made, Senator Borah of Idaho has thrown down the gauntlet to those who advocate the ratification of the treaty and league covenant as it stands by declaring that if the rejection of the provision which permits the enslavement of forty millions of Chinese on the Shantung peninsula Japan means war with that power, "we might as well have it now as later."

"No nation," he said, "has ever played its diplomatic game with greater ingenuity and greater ability and foresight than did Japan at Versailles. The treaty means that she is not only in possession of Shantung, but that she now controls the three great gateways to China. This means as every student of eastern af-

fairs frankly says it means, the dismemberment of China. It means the rupture and breaking up of the Chinese republic and the Chinese nation. When China undertakes to get back her stolen territory and her bartered peoples it will be necessary for us to go to war under Article X in order to prevent it.

"What will we do about it? Shall we refuse to recognize the demand of Japan? If so, as those who are for the treaty as it is contended, shall we transfer our fleet to the Pacific and stand ready for war. I do not anticipate that because we refuse to underwrite the rape of Shantung we shall be challenged to war. But, assuming for the sake of argument that something of the kind stares us in the face, then I beg you to contemplate the position we are in in this entangling alliance affair. The United States for the first time in its history must underwrite the slavery and oppression of forty millions of people under threat. We have stood for 150 years with a clean record, but now we are told that we must have war if we do not perpetuate the transfer of forty millions of souls to an alien power. If the time has come when we must violate our solemn treaties which we have with China to respect her territorial integrity, or face the challenge of another power, we will face the challenge of another power. Whatever else happens, we will not sacrifice our honor. One thing the American people will never submit to when the facts are known—they will never remain a party to a treaty which has the effect of oppressing millions of people. When the true facts are known the American people will refuse to sanction the dismembering of the territory and people of the Chinese republic."

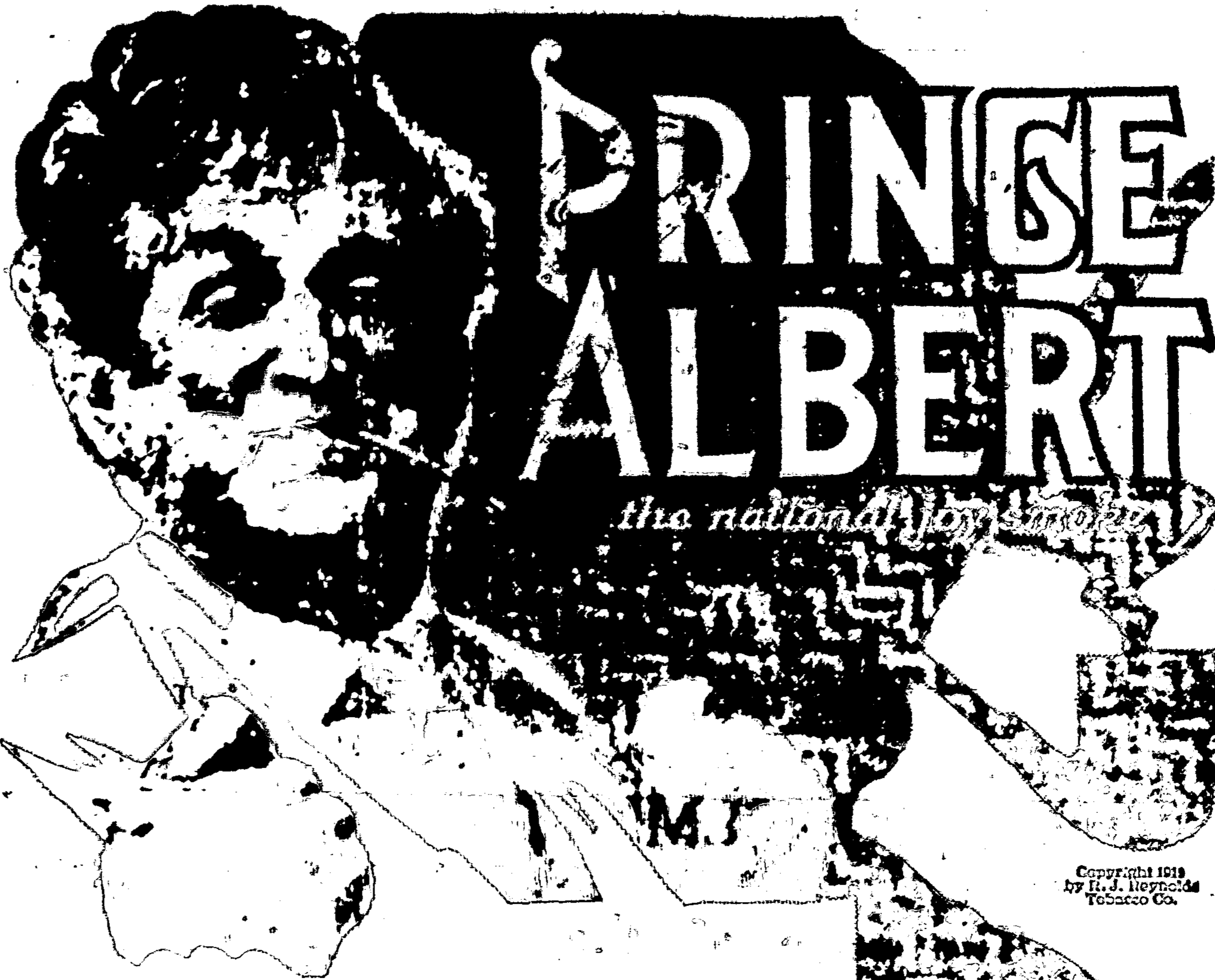

A rifle."—Letter in New York Times.

The Freemans in Arizona

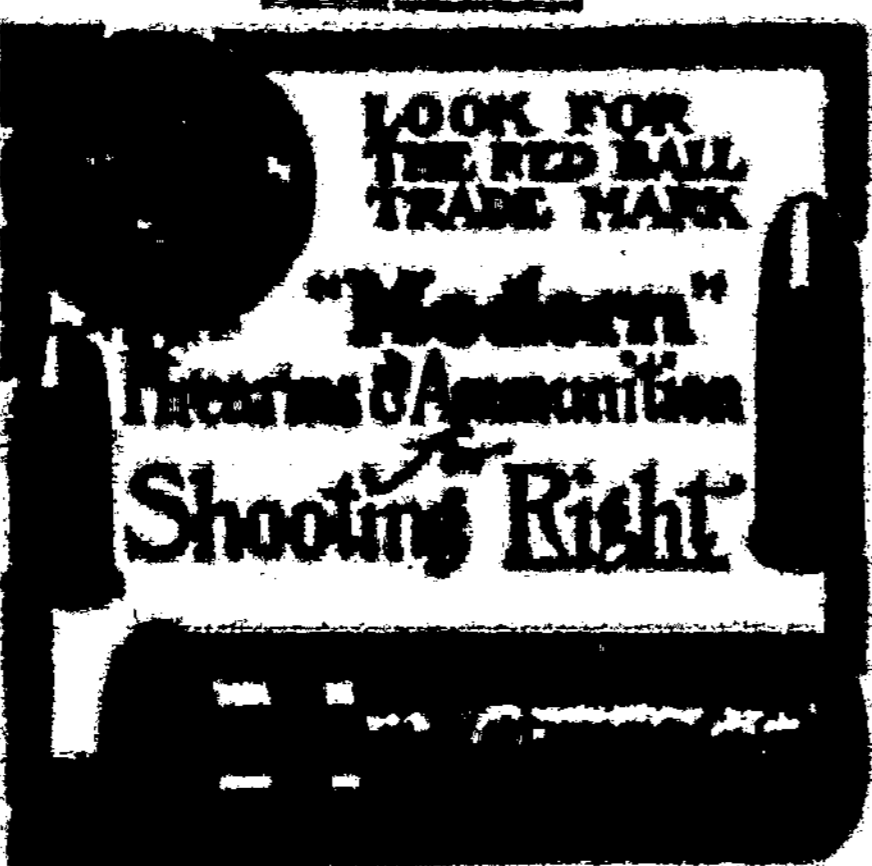
