

BENJ. I. BERRY POST AMERICAN LEGION

Impressive Service To Be Held Over Grave Of De- parted Comrade At Ancho, August 17th.

Statement concerning the death of William E. Knowles, Co. A, 329th Inf., 83rd Division, member of the Benjamin I. Berry Post, American Legion, Carrizozo, N. M.

The death of William E. Knowles was not reported to the local Post until after he was buried and the local organization had no chance to send representatives to his funeral. The deceased soldier served his country well and faithfully overseas and the local Post of the Legion of which he was a member will show its respect by sending a detachment to decorate his grave, and fire a salute. The Post Commander has issued the following order:

The members of the Benjamin I. Berry Post of the American Legion, Carrizozo, Lincoln County, N. M., will assemble, all who conveniently can, at Ancho, N. M. Sunday Aug. 17, 1919, at 4:00 p. m. for the purpose of decorating the grave of Comrade William E. Knowles, all who are prepared to do so, are instructed to come in full uniform. The detachment will form in column of squads at Ancho and will march to the burying ground. The following men will come in the uniform of their organization provided with rifles of a calibre not less than a 30-30. In case any of the following named men cannot come they will provide a substitute; they are instructed not to fail to be present or be represented by a substitute. Each man will provide himself with three rounds of ammunition.

Cars will be provided to convey the soldiers and sailors from Carrizozo to Ancho and return and from Corona to Ancho and return.

The amount of merchandise taken from under the floor would fill an ordinary sized wagon bed, a list of which revealed everything from a shoe string to a lamp post, chewing and smoking tobacco, pipes, writing tablets, envelopes and application blanks from a correspondence school, sardines, chilli, jars of jelly, wood chisels, chewing gum, artificial flowers, porous plas ters, soothing syrup, a copy of "Good Advice to Young Men," a hog's head and a bottle of Peruna.

The men were arrested and brought to Carrizozo where they were arraigned for hearing at the Land Commissioner's office at 2 o'clock Tuesday, when they were remanded to jail to await the action of the Grand Jury. After true bills are found against them, proper punishment will follow. Bonds were fixed at \$4,000.00 which they failed to give.

NEW MEXICANS HONOR GEN. WOOD

Big Celebration In Honor Of Famous General, Marked With Interesting Program At Santa Fe Thursday.

Santa Fe did herself proud on Thursday, the occasion being the reception of Gen. Leonard Wood and presentation of medal by Maj. W. M. Llewellyn. All places of business were closed and all joined in the celebration. In presenting the medal Maj. Llewellyn said: "In the name of New Mexico, with no reference to race, creed or political belief, I present to you this medal for distinguished service. This medal which was awarded to you by our last legislature."

These words acted as a signal for an outburst of applause from the big crowd that spread out over the steps of the main entrance to the capitol building, on to the lawn and filled the streets adjoining the scene of the celebration.

Acting governor Benjamin F. Pankey, making the address of welcome, had aroused the big audience to a high pitch of enthusiasm when, in referring to the positions of trust and responsibility which Gen. Wood had held declared he might soon be called upon to accept a place of even higher honor.

In making his response, Gen. Wood said his first connection with New Mexico dated back to 1885, in the campaign against the Apaches. He spoke of a big celebration which he attended in Albuquerque at the close of that campaign and said that his first visit to Santa Fe was in 1887.

LEAGUE OR WAR DECLARES FORD

MANUFACTURER MAKES IT
CLEAR HE BELIEVES COVEN-
ANT IS A GREAT STEP.

DECLARES "WAR IS MURDER"

Whirlwind of Questions Fall to Shake
Composure of Man Who Sues for
Million Because He Was
Called "Anarchist."

Mr. Clemens, Mich.—The high idealism of Henry Ford has freshened the proceedings of the Ford-Tribune libel case and has brought into the wearisome arguments of counsel and the dull repetition of cross-examinations, a new quality.

For a week the man who has been described as everything from an "anarchist" to the greatest patriot of his day, has been on the stand facing a merciless fire of questions.

During the reading of an article written by John Reed on Henry Ford, and published in the Metropolitan Magazine, the audience in the court chamber violated all precedent by breaking into applause and Mr. Ford, visibly embarrassed, raised his hand in protest.

Tribune counsel had endeavored to quote paragraphs from the Reed article but had been compelled, by objection of Ford attorneys, to introduce the interview in its entirety. In the main it was highly complimentary to Mr. Ford.

"Make Farmer Independent."

"What I want to do," Mr. Ford was quoted as saying, "is to make the farmer as independent as I am; independent of the banks, independent of the trusts, independent of the railroads." The audience, many of them from the surrounding farms of this community, showed visible evidence of its appreciation of that ideal.

Twice Mr. Ford, wearying of the questions having to do with his knowledge of history, said "Oh, I'll admit that I'm an ignorant idealist if you wish."

"What is an idealist?" queried Tribune counsel.

The innate goodness of the man lighted up his kindly eyes with a new light, as he leaned forward and answered slowly, "I think an idealist is one who tries to make people happy and prosperous. I think I do that a little."

Quiet, unassuming, courteous and patient, Henry Ford made a deep impression on the audience. Not once did he lose his temper under the heckling of opposing attorneys, even when their questions verged on the edge of insult. But when the examination touched on subjects which are close to his heart, the League of Nations, war and the happiness and prosperity of Humanity, counsel found him eagerly alert.

"A League of Nations, or preparedness up to the hilt."

That is the way he sees the situation today "We must either," he said, "accept the covenant of peace or democracy must arm and stand guard forever at the threshold of liberty."

"War is Murder."

He hammered that fact home and with it he always added, "War is murder."

"I was a murderer," he said, "I was a helper of murder. When the crisis came we all took a hand. But it is all the same. War is murder."

"What do you mean by murder?"

"I mean killing people."

"Killing people to protect the interests of the people?"

"Killing anybody or anything. I don't know what else war is. War is murder. There is a far better way."

"What is the better way?"

"Why, to educate people. To teach them to think for themselves."

A long examination was conducted which sought to quiz Mr. Ford concerning his views on history, based on a remark which he once made that "I wouldn't give five cents for all the history ever written."

"I don't think much more of it now than I did then," testified Mr. Ford.

"The war showed us that history didn't last a week. All the things they told us would happen didn't happen. They went ahead, knowing what war meant, and made the same mistakes all over again. The history we write today is the thing that counts. I'm not interested in yesterday."

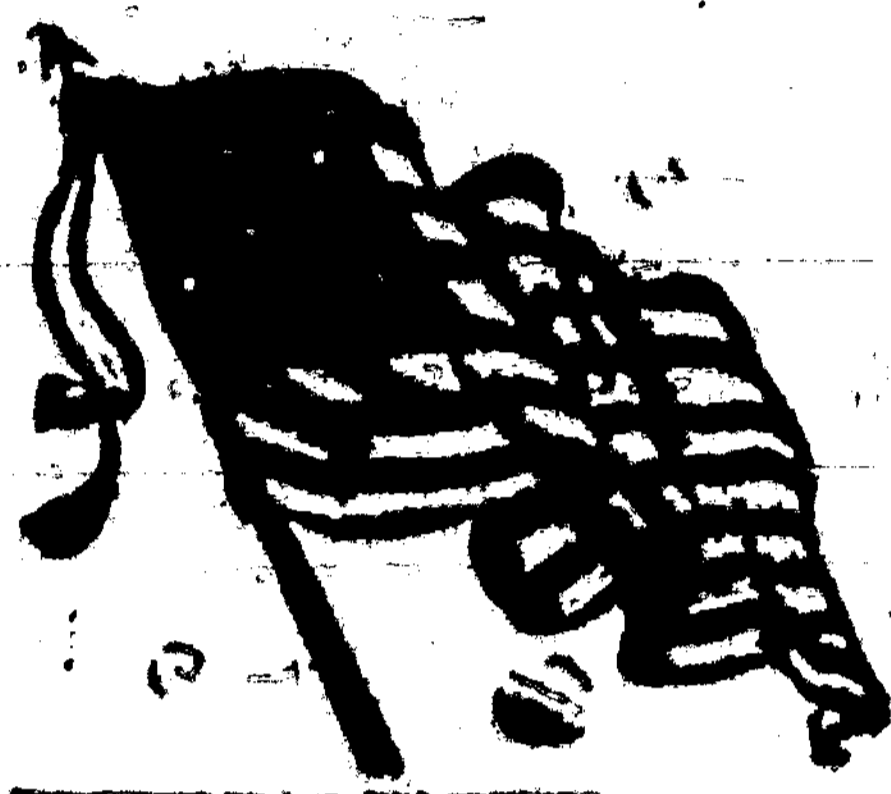

YOUR FLAG AND MY FLAG

Rails and Ships—One System

(Republican Publicity Association)
The great value of correlation of railroad and ocean transportation systems, as proposed by Jno. H. Rosseter, Director of the U. S. Shipping Board, will be readily apparent. Of course there are a few large shippers to whom a convenience of this kind is of relatively little importance. It would help them some, but if their business is large enough they can arrange their land and ocean transportation with but little loss. Large exporters of wheat, of steel, or of coal, for example, have their terminal facilities, their foreign agencies, and their regular customers. They would be materially helped by a correlation of the railroad and steamship lines, but they can get along under the systems heretofore prevailing.

"But the full development of American foreign trade, with greatest economy and efficiency, requires adoption and perfection of the Rosseter plan. Briefly stated, his idea is that the gov-

ernment should establish and later turn over to private enterprise a complete and comprehensive system of ocean transportation, comprising permanent and regular service between American ports and the ports of all nations with which we expect to build up a profitable trade. He would have the schedule of sailing so arranged as to be dependable and would have rates published and available in every railroad office, so that the producer of any community in any section of the United States could ascertain at what time, at what cost and under what conditions he could ship his goods to any important port on the face of the globe.

"With that transportation service in existence and dependable, our foreign consular service would assume new importance. The frequent reports of trade opportunities would then be of interest to a large proportion of our population. At present few people are interested in such announcements, for few can afford to undertake to establish a foreign trade if the transportation service is infrequent, slow, and uncertain of duration. Once assured that he can take his product to his local railroad freight office and get a shipping receipt which guarantees its transportation over land and sea to the final destination, the relatively small producer can hope to establish permanent, profitable business by forming connections with reliable firms in foreign lands.

"To accomplish all that is desired, a system such as this must be under the American flag, under the supervision of Americans, and assured of permanency by the American government. Such a service will expedite transportation of the American mail, thus aiding in the building up of foreign trade. Every American flag in a foreign port will be an advertisement for American goods. Every agent for an American firm will be a builder of business not only for the particular line of goods which his customers may desire to procure."

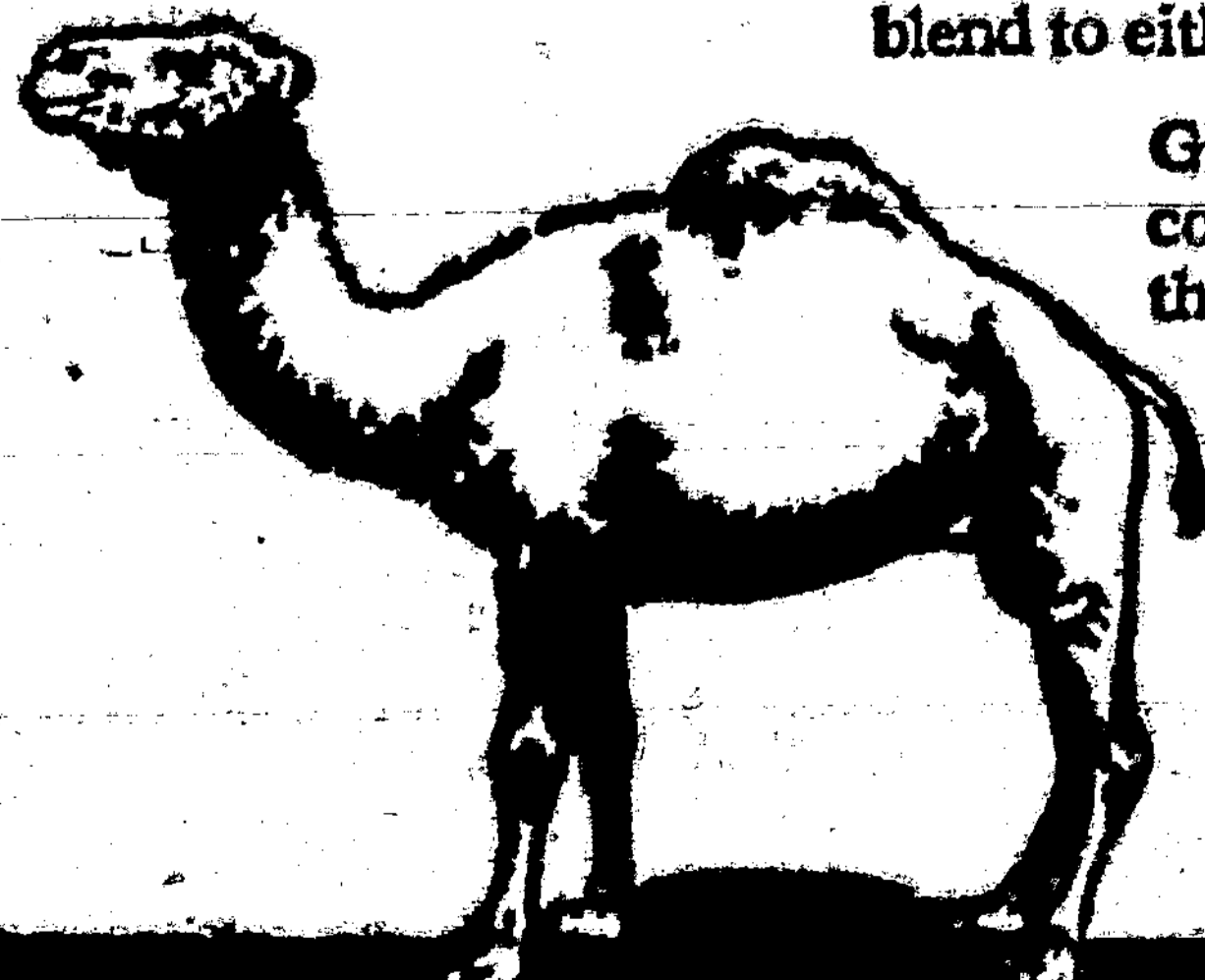

The wooden steamer Admiral Knight, 600 tons, of Seattle, was burned to the water's edge on the coast between Vancouver and Victoria. The twenty-three members of the crew were rescued.

The drought record for Boise and southwestern Idaho is broken, the weather bureau recorded the 107th successive day without rain. The previous record was in 1917 with 104 days.

Four miners were killed and three seriously injured at Burke, Idaho, when a cago in the shaft of the Hegla mine of the Hecla Mining Company shot into the sheaves instead of descending the shaft.

A replica of the log cabin in which Abraham Lincoln was born is being built at Richmond, Mo. The house, 26x38, with porch and chimney, is an exact reproduction of the famous cabin, even to the bark on the logs.

A bench warrant has been issued at Lincoln, Neb., by the clerk of the Supreme Court commanding Warden Fenton of the state penitentiary to electrocute Alton V. Grammer within the walls of the prison between the hours of 6 a. m. and 6 p. m. Sept. 19 next.

Abalton Bigue No. 2, who, with his brother, was accused of the murder of Charles Hubbel at his Indian trading post on the Navajo reservation, pleaded guilty in Superior Court at Flagstaff. His brother, Abalton Bigue No. 1, was convicted and sentenced to life imprisonment.

Sale of beer containing 2 1/2 per cent alcohol was permitted in a decision by Judge William H. Sawtelle of Arizona in the United States District Court at San Francisco, sustaining a demurrer of the Rainier Brewing Company, which asked that a government action to prohibit the sale of such beer be dismissed.

Gov. Andrea Orta of the state of Chihuahua has offered a reward of \$25,000 gold for the capture, dead or alive, of Francisco Villa, according to a Mexico merchant, who arrived in El Paso from Chihuahua City. He said the offer appeared in an advertisement in one of the Chihuahua City newspapers.

WASHINGTON

Representative J. W. Ragsdale of South Carolina dropped dead at the office of Dr. Hoos in Washington.

Without a record vote the Senate passed and sent to the House the administration bill authorizing an increase from 9,600 to 18,000 in the number of commissioned officers to be retained in the army this year.

Carter Glass, secretary of the treasury, in a letter to all banks and trust companies, states that he anticipates the revenues of the government in the fiscal year ending June 30, 1920, will amount to at least \$6,500,000,000 and that he has no reason to believe the expenditures of the government will exceed that amount.

A new credit of \$157,549,000 for France was established by the treasury, making a total of \$3,010,020,500 advanced to that country and a total of \$9,815,400,927 advanced to the allies.

After nearly two hours' debate and while the temperature in the chamber was hovering around the 100 mark, the House voted to repeal the 10 per cent tax on ice cream and soda water.

After brief debate the Senate adopted a resolution by Senator Poindexter of Washington, authorizing the federal trade commission to investigate recent increases in the market price of fuel oil in the United States, and especially on the Pacific coast.

Organization of the extra cavalry division provided for in the War Department plans for the National Guard will be pushed vigorously, it was said at the department. There is no anticipation that sixteen divisions of infantry, corresponding to the war organization of the state forces, will be completed this year but efforts will be made to get the cavalry unit, six regiments of which will be raised in Texas, in condition to be mobilized against any emergency.

FOREIGN

France may again be put on bread rations in September, it is said, because of a possible wheat shortage.

Premier Paderewski has arrived in Warsaw from Paris. He was given an enthusiastic reception by the populace.

Regular airplane service between Berlin, Paris and Copenhagen will begin this summer. French machines will be used.

Demolition of the forts of Helgoland, once Germany's "Gibraltar in the North Sea," is under way. In a few days no fortifications will be left.

The Third division of the American army has been ordered home from the occupied area of Germany. It will begin entraining for Brest Aug. 5.

The Hungarian soviet have been thrown back in disorder across the Theiss river by the Rumanians, at Szolnok and other points, according to reports.

Socialist motions to hasten the bill establishing a state tribunal to investigate the cause of the war and the guilt for it, has passed the national assembly at Weimar.

Premier Nitti of Italy is organizing a new mission to the United States. Its purpose will be to present Italy's financial and industrial needs, the establishment of credit, and the facilitation of exports and imports.

The Polish advance into Galicia was made so rapidly that the Ukrainians had no time to destroy the railways or bridges as they retired. The Poles, according to this announcement, took 6,500 prisoners and forty-one guns as well as vast quantities of munitions.

An American loan of \$100,000,000 has been obtained by Martin Nordegg, representing the Deutsche Bank of Berlin, according to an exchange telegraph dispatch from Berlin. It was said 10 per cent of the loan would be deposited in foreign bonds to the German bank's credit.

The Philippine legislature purposes the enactment of a prohibition measure for the islands in the event it is held that the national prohibition amendment recently ratified in the United States does not apply to the Philippines. This announcement was made by legislative leaders. The proposed measure, it was said would be an exact copy of the act of the American government.

SPORT

Leo Houck of Seattle and "Young" Cyclone" Brown of San Francisco fought ten rounds to a draw at Phoenix. They are lightweights.

Frank Barriou of San Francisco was given the decision after a twelve-round boxing match at Boise, Ida., with Al Sommers, a fighter recently released from the army.

Tommy Carter, lightweight champion of the Southern department, United States army, won the decision over Otto Wallace of Milwaukee in a fifteen-round bout staged at Fort Bliss. The fight was just all the way and the decision a close one.

GENERAL

Both houses of the Arkansas Legislature ratified the federal woman suffrage amendment. Arkansas is the twelfth state to ratify the proposed amendment.

Thirteen thousand ounces of platinum have been sold by the ordnance department of the army. It was announced in New York. The mineral sold at \$103 an ounce.

Four persons were killed and fourteen injured in a head-on street car collision on the outskirts of Minneapolis. The motorman on one of the cars was among those killed.

William H. Reap, a sports writer, has brought suit against George L. (Tex) Rickard to recover \$3,000 damages for alleged slander and defamation of character. The action is based on a statement said to have been made by Rickard on July 5, the day after the Willard-Dempsey fight which Rickard promoted.

Gustav Fahst, president of the Pabst Brewing Company, has purchased for the company securities of the company with a par value of \$2,539,900, the property of alien enemies sold at auction by the government, for \$1,470,917.

Less than one-half of 1 per cent of the American soldiers who died on the battlefields of France were buried unidentified, according to Col. Joseph S. Herrod of Cincinnati, commander of the 15,000 troops who interred the fallen Americans.

Jack Britton of Chicago, welterweight boxing champion, and Mike O'Dowd of St. Paul, the middleweight title holder, will meet in an eight-round contest at Newark, N. J., Aug. 22. The men are to weigh in at 155 pounds.

The death of Patrick Cudahy, millionaire packer of Milwaukee, brother of Edward A. Cudahy, president of the Cudahy Packing Company, one of the five great packing firms of Chicago, removed the third of the Cudahy brothers whose rise to great wealth and influence made one of the remarkable chapters of the history of Western business.

AVERT PLOT TO DYNAMITE

DE LA SALLE INSTITUTE MARKED FOR DESTRUCTION IN CHICAGO.

RACE RIOT COOLS DOWN

THIRTY-TWO KILLED AND SEVERAL HUNDRED HURT, IS RIOT TOLL.

Chicago, Aug. 1.—A well-defined plot to blow up De la Salle Institute, a Catholic institution at Wabash avenue and Thirty-fifth street, with dynamite and start a series of fires and bomb outrages that might have led to a city-wide conflagration, was asserted by Mayor Thompson to have been responsible for his action in calling out the troops during the race rioting here. As evidence of the plot, he pointed out, the information that came to the mayor and his aids was to the effect that attempts would be made to shut out police and firemen from the threatened areas. Guy wires removed from trolley poles were to be stretched across the streets at a height above the ground where they would sweep police and firemen responding to alarms out of their apparatus or vehicles, it was declared.

The plotters, knowing the trolley wires carried no current on account of the street car strike, removed some guy wires and fixed them across several streets.

Thus far the race feud that has killed thirty-two men and beaten, kicked, stoned, stabbed and shot more than 300 others, still smolders.

With 6,000 state troops, reinforced by hundreds of police, patrolling the riot centers, the district was calm, with the exception of disturbances in the stockyards region. There the first serious clash occurred between rioters and the militia. Other districts which heretofore have been the center of stirring battle scenes were orderly, but the battle between troops and white rioters at the yards promised serious consequences until the soldiers cowed the mob with bayonets.

Two companies of the Third infantry, awaiting orders at Garfield boulevard and Winthrop avenue, dispersed a mob of whites attacking colored residents near Garfield boulevard and Normal avenue shortly before noon. Two mounted policemen, discovering whites stoning negro homes and fearing arson, galloped down Garfield boulevard to the soldier post, asking aid.

The troops piled into motor trucks, made a quick run down the boulevard, posted their machine guns and their lookouts—but the white rioters had fled.

Machine guns, with their crews posted and belts filled with ammunition ready for action, were placed today at four street intersections by officers and men of the Eleventh regiment of reserve militia.

Despite the vigilance of the soldiers, however, a number of clashes occurred between whites and negroes. Three white men were shot down in revolver battles, receiving critical wounds. A white man and a colored man were sent to the county hospital when they were severely beaten. There were a number of arrests made. The troops have done excellent work. Adjutant General Dickson said he was proud of them. Their commanders said they acted like veterans. They saved many lives, protected property; and they were cool and steady facing angry mobs that outnumbered them many times.

Postal Cuts Rates.

New York.—When control of the telegraph systems of the country was formally relinquished by the government Aug. 1 a reduction of 20 per cent in rates was announced on the lines of the Postal company, but the Western Union will retain the schedule put into effect after Postmaster General Burleson took control April 1.

Plane Crosses South America.

Santiago, Calif.—Lieutenant Locatelli, a member of the Italian aviation mission now in Argentina, has just completed an airplane flight from Buenos Aires to Valparaiso, his trip marking the first crossing by air of the South American continent from the Atlantic to the Pacific.

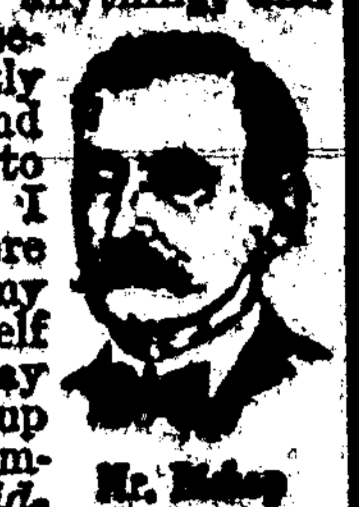
Interest in Farms for Soldiers.

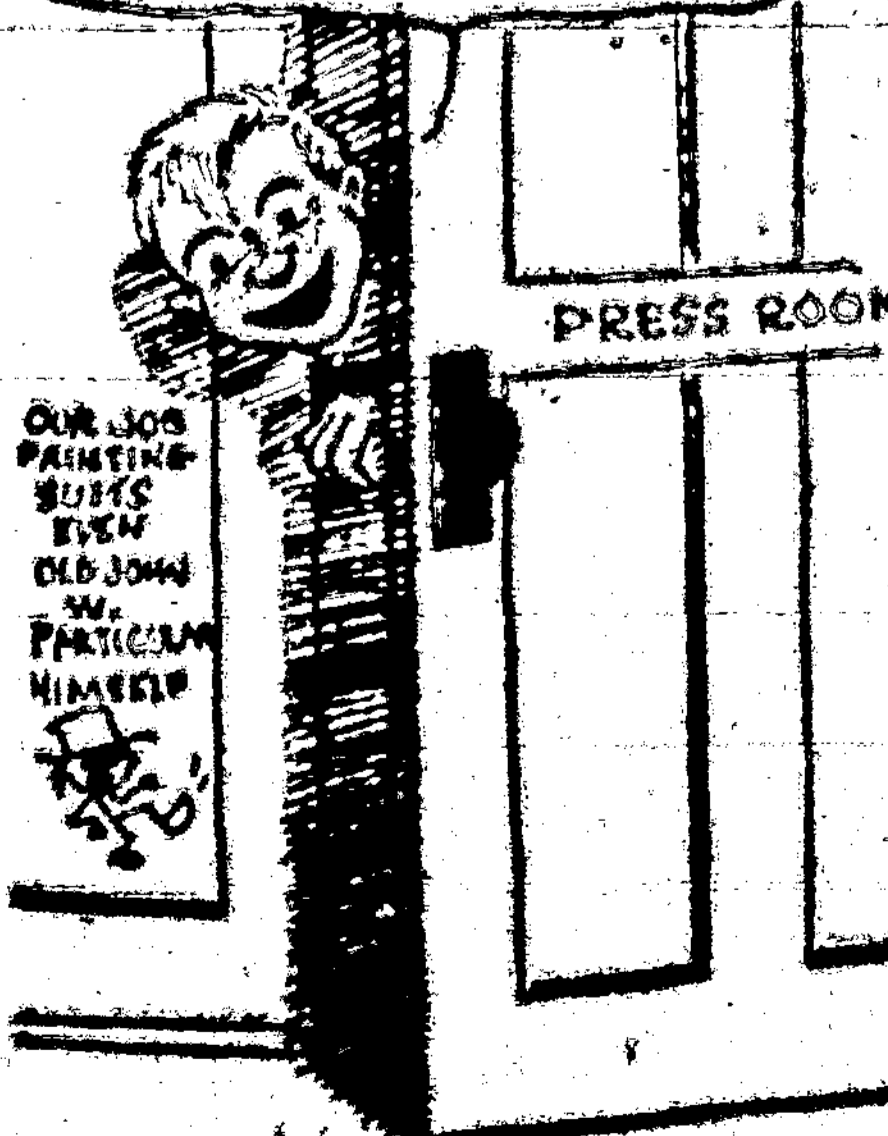

COAL FAMINE IS THREATENED

GREAT BRITAIN FORBIDS EXPORT
—FACTORIES ARE CLOSING
—TRAINS STOP.

LIMIT COAL DELIVERY

HOPE THAT STRIKE WILL BE
ENDED SHORTLY, SAYS
LLOYD GEORGE.

London, July 25.—In addition to an embargo on the export of coal the British government is attempting to meet the seriousness of the domestic situation by allowing no deliveries of amounts of more than 200 pounds.

With train service curtailed, factories shutting down everywhere for lack of fuel, Belgium, France and Italy, all dependent on English and Welsh coalleries, face serious disaster through the stoppage of shipments.

The gravity of the European situation can be understood when it is realized that only a maximum output through the entire summer can begin to accumulate the stores without which there must be the greatest suffering in the coming winter.

London coal dealers are frantic over the 200-pound order, claiming that twenty trips will be required to deliver the usual load.

London.—The whole force of the British government "will be exerted to protect the people from any undue pressure," Andrew Bonar Law, government leader, told the House of Commons when asked what was being done regarding the confusion and disorder resulting from dock workers' and miners' strikes. "The government is well aware that there are a number of people—not a very large number, fortunately—who are aiming at the destruction of our whole social and political situation," Mr. Bonar Law added. As to the agitators, he said, "the government is not overlooking these people, and will do whatever it thinks effective for that purpose."

One result of a conference between the premier and the miners' executive was a new piece rate offer on the part of the government, which the miners' federation appointed a subcommittee to consider.

The subcommittee held a conference with the coal controller. No official report of this conference has been issued, but it was unofficially stated that when the miners' federation meets to consider the subcommittee's report, there is every prospect that a settlement will be reached.

In the event of the government's offer being accepted it involves the appointment of a small committee representing the coal mines department and the miners' federation to adjust a formula adopted to the requirements of the different districts.

The settlement will come none too soon. Evidence is accumulating hourly of how heavy the coal shortage is pressing on all industries and public services. The government has already stopped the export of coal from Cardiff, and the railways have plans laid for a severe restriction of their services, if the strike is not settled.

George Primrose Dead.

San Diego, Calif.—George Primrose, famous minstrel, is dead in San Diego, following a severe illness that began some time ago. He was born in London, Ont., 60 years ago. A widow and brother survive him here.

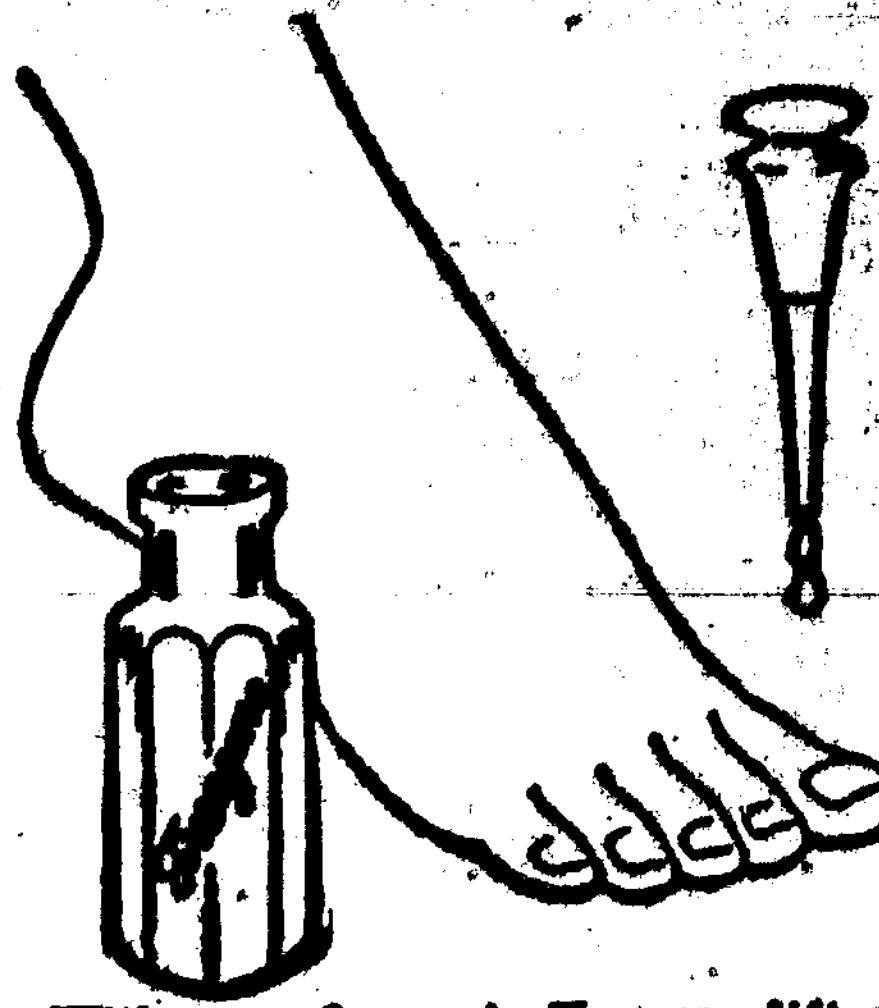
Two-Cent Postage on Airplanes.

Washington.—Postmaster Gen. Burleson reduced postage rate on airplane mail to 2 cents an ounce, the regular rate for first class mail matter, and placed the air mail service on the same footing with all other means of mail transportation. The effect of the order, Second Assistant Postmaster General Otto Prager explained, is to place all first-class mail on the same basis and the question of time in mailing will determine whether or not a letter will go by airplane instead of by train. Postmaster General Burleson, in making the announcement of the reduction of air post mail, said: "The success of the airship in carrying the mail, in quantity of mail that can be carried and certainty of operation make it improbable that the air transportation of mail will ever be stopped, but will increase from year to year by leaps and bounds, especially over long distances."

57,513 U. S. Graves in France.
Washington.—There had been registered in Europe 57,513 graves of American soldiers on June 25 last, the War Department announced in Washington.

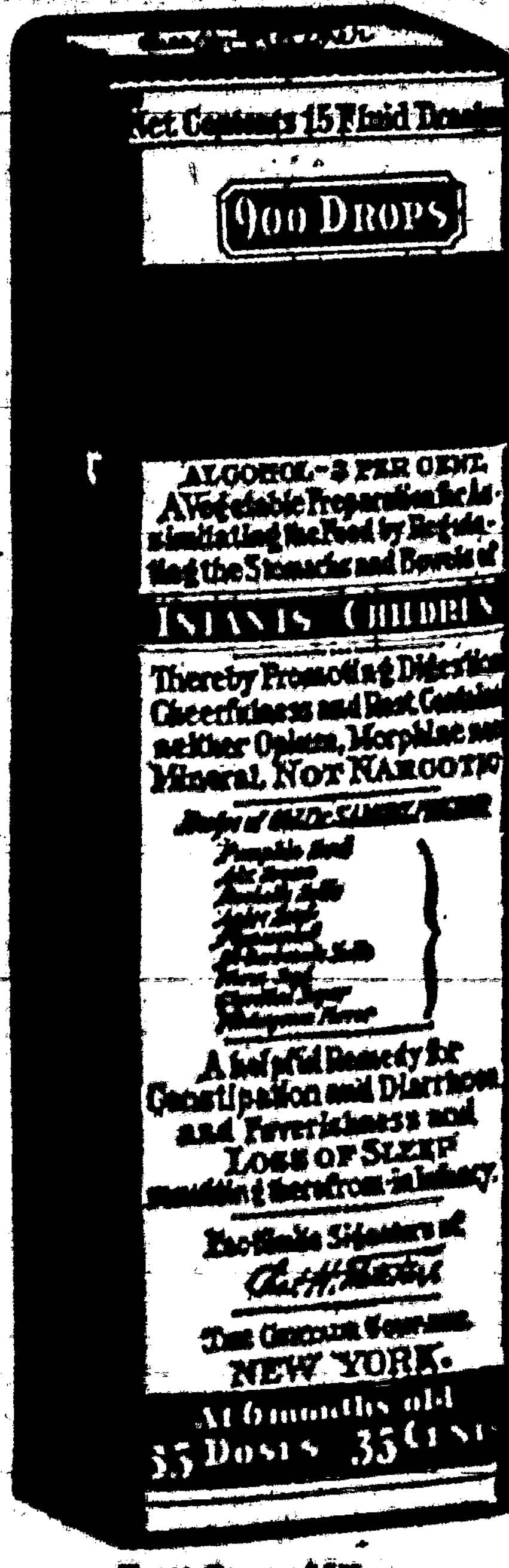

Southwest News From All Over New Mexico and Arizona

Western Newspaper Union News Service.

COMING EVENTS.

Arizona State Fair—Nov. 3 to 8, 1919.

The assessed valuation of all mining property being operated in Arizona this year is \$417,704,615, according to a statement issued by the State Tax Commission. This total, it was announced, is more than a million dollars higher than last year's valuation, which was placed at \$416,080,000.

Sandoval county, New Mexico, will open its first high school this fall in Bernalillo, thus making it possible for the eighth grade graduates to obtain a high school education in their own county. Sandoval county is fortunate in having a young and very progressive superintendent at the head of their schools.

Lieutenant Howell Ervien, just returned from two years overseas, where he was in almost continuous active service, has been elected superintendent of the New Mexico Reform School, located at Springer, New Mexico. The appointment was made by the board of trustees at a meeting at Springer.

The Santa Fe Forest, under the management of Supervisor Joseph C. Kirchor, passed a prosperous year ending June 30, 1919, for the receipts show an increase of over 43 per cent over the fiscal year ending June 30, 1918. The total receipts for 1919 were \$83,260.20, a gain of \$20,541.47 over 1918, when they totaled \$61,124.73.

A disastrous fire swept a portion of the business district of Fort Sumner, New Mexico, in which the store belonging to Dr. Lovelace, the picture show owned by Bigley Brothers, and buildings belonging to J. R. Law, Tom Murphy, Ben Riddle and Tom Riddle were destroyed. Several other buildings were damaged.

Plans for a county demonstration farm to be connected with the state college or the federal Department of Agriculture is the project that the Luna County Farm Bureau is now considering. The bureau expects to work out a uniform system of irrigation equipment, farm methods and crop standards and to put these into practice on a large demonstration farm.

Of great interest to the sportsmen of the state is the stocking and restocking of the streams and lakes of Arizona with game fish by the state game warden, Joe V. Proclianska. Three million young fish have been ordered from the federal hatcheries to be planted in Arizona waters, including such varieties as black bass, rainbow trout, salmon trout, mountain trout, Eastern brook trout, speckled trout, and many other varieties.

Miners working on the Globe-Miami district have received an increase of 75 cents per day. The new scale is based on 24-cent copper and means that miners will receive a minimum of \$5.65 per day. Underground machine men will receive an additional 50 cents per day increase; underground timbermen will receive 25 cents additional, and all journeymen mechanics will receive 25 cents per day in addition to the 75 cents raise.

At the regular luncheon of the Kiwanis Club at Albuquerque, New Mexico, it was agreed to go 50-50 with the Rotary Club in raising \$10,000 towards the building of a new structure for the Department of Hygiene at the university. Six thousand, five hundred dollars has already been appropriated by the federal government for the maintenance of the department. It is expected that work on the new building will start in a short time.

A mining drill invented by an Arizona man recently won first place in a drilling contest in Nevada against a field of all other makes.

A total of 272 suits have been filed at Tombstone, Arizona, in the Bisbee deportation cases. The total amount of damages asked for by the plaintiffs is \$5,505,000. Damages are sought on the ground of alleged assault, bruising, beating and wounding by the plaintiffs; 166 cases ask for \$20,000 each, one-half of which amount is for actual damages and the remainder for punitive damages; 75 of the cases ask for \$25,000 each, and 31 ask for \$10,000 each.

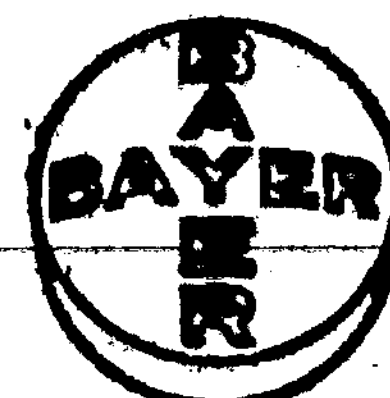

The woman's death was declared due to self-inflicted strychnine poisoning at the time by a physician who examined the body. Recently the parents of the dead woman, Mr. and Mrs. H. H. Whipple of Kansas City, instituted proceedings to have the husband arrested.
