Relative to the Testing of Dairy Herds and Town Cows

The ordinance under which the testing is to be done particularly specifies that only a qualified Veterinarian, Commissioned by the Cattle Sanitary Board, can be permitted to conduct the test.

In view of the fact that the tubercular test is a delicate scientific method of diagnosis one in which mistakes and errors can readily occur, the Cattle Sanitary Board can not recognize a test conducted by any person other than a qualified Veterinarian.

It is readily seen that if the dairy cows of this neighborhood are to be tested, the consumer is entitled to know that the test will be unquestionable in thoroughness and such that will disclose any and all cows infected.

Save National Forests

Senator McNary of Oregon, has voiced a plea for the preservation of the great forests of the country by fire protection.

Over 50 per cent of the standing timber today is found in the three Pacific coast states and 61 per cent is found in that great western country lying west of the Mississippi river.

The greatest cause of this situation is forest fires. We have enough land left for agriculture to grow all the timber which this country requires.

by a reduction in rates. Ultimately a readjustment of basic wages will be required. Meantime it is to the interests of all concerned, including labor, that the rules and working conditions shall be made conducive to the highest efficiency in output per man. Losses in Income Irreparable When wages have been too low the harm done has been offset by retroactive increases. Losses of railway net operating income are irreparable. You cannot make retroactive tomorrow the savings that should have been made today. The board cannot possibly write the rules and working conditions of every railroad in this country and adjust them equitably to varying geographical, operating and social conditions. It rests entirely with the board to determine whether this whole situation shall drift into chaos, and orderly procedure become impossible except at the price of railroad bankruptcy, financial shock and still wider unemployment. The Labor Board can prevent this catastrophe by declaring that the National agreements, rules and working conditions coming over from the war period are terminated at once; that the question of reasonable and economical rules and working conditions shall be remanded to negotiations between each carrier and its own employees; and that as the basis for such negotiations, the agreements, rules and working conditions in effect on each railroad as of December 31, 1917, shall be re-established.

Urging emergency action by the United States Railroad Labor Board to end "gross waste and inefficiency" prevailing under present working rules and conditions, General W. W. Atterbury, vice president of the Pennsylvania railroad, in a statement to the board in session at Chicago said in part: Many railroads are not now earning, and with present operating costs and traffic have no prospect of earnings, even their bare operating expenses, leaving them without any net return and unable to meet their fixed charges. The emergency presented can be met either by an advance in freight and passenger rates, or by a reduction in operating expenses. With declining prices and wages in industry and agriculture, the country demands that the advocacy of the railroads must be secured by a reduction in operating expenses, and not by a further advance of rates. The National Agreements, rules and working conditions forced on the railroads as war measures cause gross waste and inefficiency. Would Save \$300,000,000 I estimate that the elimination of this waste would reduce railway operating expenses at least \$300,000,000. It would be far better to save this sum by restoring conditions of efficient and economical operation than to reduce wages. We believe that as the wages of railroad employees were the last to go up they should also be the last to come down, but we do insist that for an ample wage on honest day's work shall be given. The public has the right to insist that this must be obtained. The public has also the right to expect that the railway agreement, with the co-operation of the regulatory bodies and the employees, will so reduce and possibly reduce the cost of railway operation as to insure constant

I also wish to record myself with the Republicans of Lincoln county as having personally written the Governor recommending the appointment of H. O. Bursum for U. S. Senator successor to Senator A. B. Fall. I honestly believe that Senator Bursum is capable, able and will give us and administration that will be a credit to himself and the people of the Great State of New Mexico. I will further state that I am pleased to have been a member of this legislature and a part of their record and that I went to Santa Fe to represent my constituents as fairly and impartially as was in my power, which duty I performed and am willing to stand on my record. Most of the bills mentioned were in committees to which I belonged and I voted for all of them, if I am not mistaken. The most important issues coming before the Legislature were those of appropriations and later on I will answer the News where it condemns the administration.

LABOR RULES BURDEN COSTS OF R. R. SERVICE

U. S. Railroad Labor Board Asked to Stop Payments for Work Not Done. WOULD SAVE \$300,000,000 Lower Cost of Service Can Be Secured Only by Cutting Expense, Atterbury Says.

The foregoing is not a complete list of the bills passed, but is a resume of the most important legislation of the session. It is also undisputable evidence, that it places the Fifth State Legislature on record as having more completely fulfilled the pledges made by the Republican members of that body, to their constituents, and the executive's program, than any legislative body of this state heretofore.

I also wish to state, for the information of your readers, that to the Republican members of the legislature belongs the credit for the achievements of the Fifth State Legislature. The Democrats vigorously opposed most of our party pledges in the house, after agreeing to support them. However, the house of representatives stands on record as having passed all of their program and as having introduced the major part of the pledges and the Governor's program of this session.

Acts for the relief of the Depleted Live Stock Industry, such as: Regulating rental by classification of the state lands and creating the commissioner power to give extensions on payments, but not beyond Oct. 1st, 1922. Preventing the Commissioner cancelling leases in lieu of application to purchase, or without purchase cash payment on State Land will be one twentieth of the purchase price. Providing that State Land Contracts may be canceled upon violation. Providing that State Lands can only be assessed for the amount of equity therein contained, including improvements. Regarding the killing of livestock by Railroads. Shipment and inspection of hides. Regarding buying of hides. Larceny of animals and providing penalties therefore. Re-recording of brands; An Act, Regulating employments hours of labor for children. Just pay for School Teachers; An Act, "Establishing a State Game Commission; Constitutional Amendments; (to be voted on by the people) "Granting the Legislature power to abolish the office of Public Land Commissioner, and Substitute therefore;"

"Abolishing the Corporation Commission; Permitting the Continued re-election of School Superintendents, etc." Providing that women may hold office; "Increasing the powers of the Corporation Commissioner;" See other constitutional amendments and insert here; An Act, protecting the waters of the Pecos. 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An Open Letter

Dear Senator Chas. Gray, Ocurro, N. M. March, 27, 1921

In behalf of the Republican party, I would like to use your columns to correct the erroneous statements made in the Carrizozo News, dated March, 19th, regarding the actions of the Republican members of the Fifth Legislature. First the Primary Law Pledge: My memorandom shows that six primary bills were introduced, any of which would have fulfilled the Republican platform pledge, as far as the mere pledge goes, but only two of these were workable; these the Democrats fought vigorously in the Honorable Senate, and defeated, an unfair process, to say the least. The House then introduced, House Bill No. 276, of which I was one of the framers, fulfilling both our pledge and the Governor's campaign pledges, A State Wide Direct Primary. The Democrats then pointedly advocated, "Let the People rule and decide."

When the bill came before the House, I offered an amendment as follows, "The provisions of this act shall not be Law until submitted to a vote by the people." and the Democrats with a few of the majority prevented the adoption of the amendment. We then called the Bill up for third reading, and passed it to the Senate as drafted. The Honorable Senate, then tried the grave yard process with this, as had heretofore been done with the other Primary bills. But, on the last day of the session, Mr. Sellers, a democrat loyal to his pledge, moved that the bill be called from committee, which motion carried. Now in the News, they say, "Republicans break Primary Law Pledge," but as a matter of fact the Democrats blocked this Legislator as well, four of them voting against its passage, they were, Senators Brickley, Zinn, Lee and I think Hull. This was not the bill the Republican Platform pledged but I believe that it did set forth the advocations of the Democratic Platform, yet many Democrats descended with a few Republicans and defeated H. B. No. 276. The passage of this bill would also have cost the State over \$100,000, and necessitated a double campaign, which from a financial standpoint would have disqualified a man of moderate means from running for office.

One duel party pledge failed as against about twenty-five Republican party pledges carried out, which are as follows: Constitutional Amendment, Providing equal rights to Women, Public Health Dept., and Childs Welfare Board, consolidated the two, and passed bills giving more power and providing for a commission administration. An Act, "To provide Equal Powers, Rights and duties in the Parents of Minor Children ect.;" Committee substitute for House Bill No. 100, "codifying and revising the Taxation and Revenue Laws;" An Act, "Placing Husband and Wife on equal footing as to inheritance of community property;" Acts, To prevent fire and other damage to forests, and causing the State of New Mexico, to reserve its forests; An Act, "To regulate and limit the hours of employment of Females;" An Act, "To regulate and limit the hours of Labor of Children;" An Act, "Providing for Flood Protection, ect.;" An Act, "Memorializing Congress to cede all the Public Lands to the Public Land Bureau for Schools, Highways and Roads;" An Act, To preserve parks of elections; An Act, "Providing for the supervision of road work, ect., and providing three optional plans;"
