EDUCATIONAL COSTS HIGH

Santa Fe, Dec. 29.—Tax officials and others interested in the improvement of the present system of taxation, gathered from all over New Mexico are here attending the annual conference, under call of the state tax commission.

It is the opinion of the commission that this conference will be the most important held thus far, since a great many new matters, under the revised revenue code, will have to be taken up and a definite policy decided upon.

Extravagance in management of state affairs, together with unfavorable range conditions and insufficient markets, has resulted in the livestock industry in New Mexico being in bad condition.

Gov. M. C. McChesney, in a brief address, declared that educational costs are much too high.

Ascertains Revenue First.  
He said he favored ascertaining accurately the total of revenue available there, making the appropriations to fit, rather than first making the appropriations and afterward trying to raise the revenue.

Verifying under oath, Frank Boyd, of Espanola; Fred Hunn, of Valencia county; and Eugene Miller, president of the Wool Growers' association, and a member of the sheep and wool board, declared it is impossible for any sheep raiser to make expenses at present.

Chairman read to the conference a telegram from W. R. Morley, of Magdalena, describing the situation as bad. "Unless tax values are cut accordingly, stockmen cannot pay their taxes," he said.

Outline Position.  
Position of the commission was outlined at the first session in a paper carefully prepared by J. E. Saint, chief commissioner.

The last legislature authorized \$1200 in compensation and \$1500 in traveling expenses for deputy assessors in each county.

COLLECTOR OF INTERNAL REVENUE ISSUES STATEMENT

With the approach of the period for filing income tax returns, Jan. 1 to March 15, 1922, the taxpayers are advised to lose no time in the completion of their accounts for the year 1921.

Net income is gross income, less certain deductions for business expenses, losses, taxes, etc. Gross income includes practically all income received by the taxpayer during the year.

What were your profits from your business, trade, profession or vocation?  
Did you receive any interest on bank deposits?  
Have you any property from which you received income?

Did you receive any income in the form of dividend or interest from stocks or bonds?  
Did you receive any business during the year?  
Did you make any profit on the sale of stocks, bonds, or other property, real or personal?

Did you act as a broker in any transaction from which you received compensation?  
Are you interested in any partnership or other firm from which you received any income?

Have you any income from royalties or patents?  
Do you appropriate, or have the right to appropriate, the earnings of such children? If so, the amount must be included in the return of income.

Has your wife any income from any source, whatever? If so, it must be included in your return or reported in a separate return of income.  
Did you receive any director's, trustee's fees in the course of the year?

Do you hold any office in a benefit society from which you receive income?  
Answers to all of these questions are necessary to determine whether a person has an income sufficiently large to require that a return be filed, and may be the means of avoiding the heavy penalties imposed for failure to do so within the time specified.

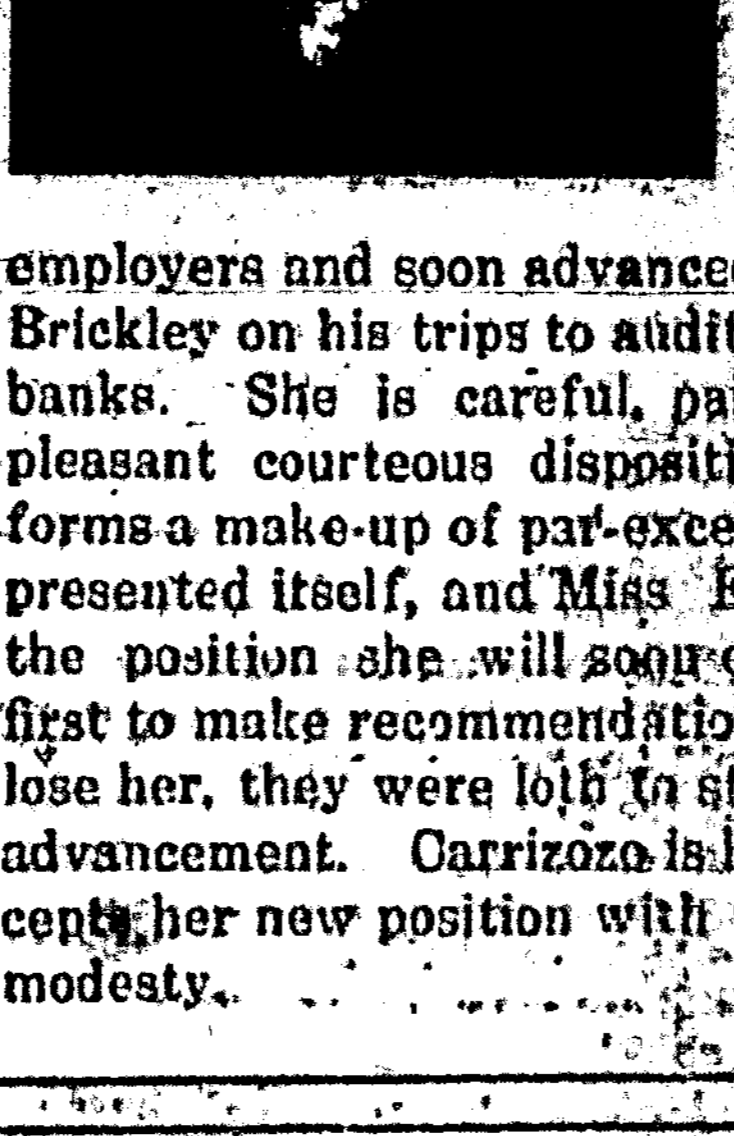

HOOVER OUTLINES HIS PLANS FOR COLORADO RIVER

Development by Private or Government Capital First Problem.  
Washington, Dec. 21.—Whether the construction of dams along the Colorado river for the development of power and irrigation projects shall be undertaken by the federal government or by private interests will be one of the first questions to be decided by the interstate commission authorized by congress.

The statement announced the designation by President Harding of Secretary Hoover as chairman of the commission, which is to be known as the Colorado River Commission and on which California, Arizona, Nevada, Utah, Colorado, Wyoming and Montana are interested in the irrigation and power to be derived from the river and considerable conflict has developed.

"The land under irrigation in 1920 from the river and its tributaries amounted to about 2,464,000 acres in the United States and 120,000 acres in Mexico. If the river were equipped with proper storage dams the amount of irrigated land could be increased to about 6,123,000 acres in the United States and 800,000 in Mexico.

Refuse to Retract From Livestock Figures in Face of Stockmen's Protests.  
Santa Fe, Dec. 28.—Grazing land valuations were slashed by the county assessors, in conference here, late yesterday afternoon.

The assessors stood pat on their livestock valuations in the face of strong protests from the Cattle and Horse Growers' association and the Wool Growers' association, after announcing the grazing land figures, closed the conference.

YOUTHS MUST GO TO GALLOWS FOR MURDER OF JAILER  
Penitentiary Official Finds Killers, Files in Cell Where Court Decries Appeal.  
Elaustrio Corral, 16 years old, and Rumaldo Lozano, 17, will be hanged for the slaying of Ventura Belmont, jailer at the Grant county jail, Silver City, on the night of April 1, 1921, unless Governor McChesney interveives.

THE SUPREME COURT LATE YESTERDAY affirmed their conviction on the charge of first-degree murder, but at the same time reversed the conviction of Jesus Rocha, 25, who was found guilty on the same charge.

When José D. Sims, supreme court clerk, reported the decision to Dugan the deputy warden said he had searched the cell occupied by them in the death row and found knives, files and hacksaws hidden in their mattresses.

Another account is that Corral, after escaping, went back to the jail to get money, went in by another entrance, argued the jailer, who reached for his revolver, and Corral then hit him with the axe. Both testified to this.

Before leaving the jail the two had tried to unlock Rocha's cell, but failed. When caught they accused Rocha of being a party to the plan to escape, but when brought to trial denied this.

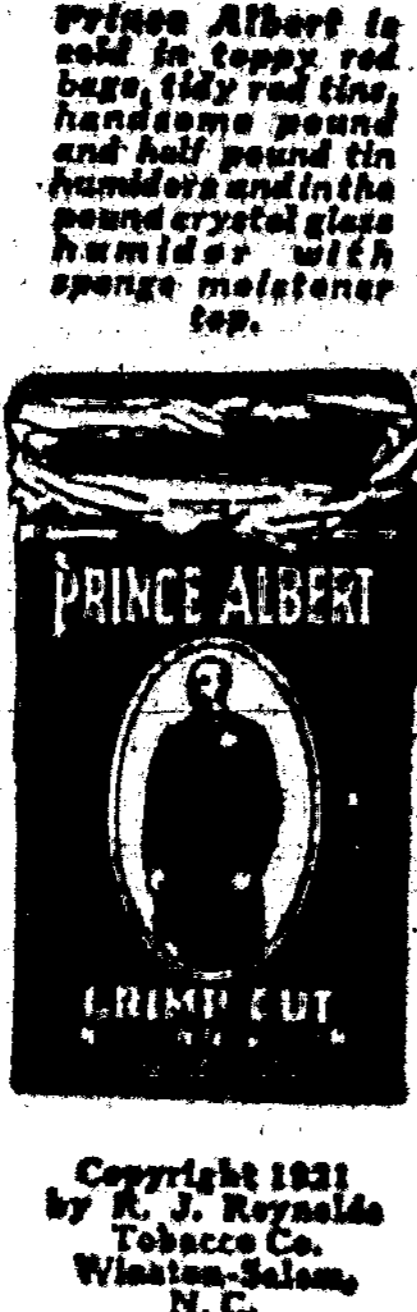
