## Radio Will Bring Alaska In Close Touch With Us

When President Harding and his cabinet, accompanied by others of his party make their trip to Alaska this summer, they will not only be in touch with the government at Washington, but with the World at large. On this important trip of investigation, the most powerful and perfect methods so far known to the science of radio will be used not only to be of the most service to the distinguished party, but to demonstrate to the civilized World, what the radio has and can achieve in the line of scientific advancement.

Again: All existing facilities for telegraph and radio communications being owned by the government, it will readily be seen that on this event, aside from others of note, government radio men will exercise all knowledge of the latest research and if possible, they will break the record for service, with national pride as an incentive. The principal army radio stations are situated in such isolated but strategic points as Fort Egbert on the Canadian-Alaska border; Fort Yukon within the Arctic Circle; Nome on the Seward Peninsula separating the Bering Sea from the Arctic Ocean; St Michael on Norton Sound; Holy Cross, on the Yukon River and McGrath, on the Kuskokwim River.

In addition to these radio stations which furnish powerful communication to the outside World, our government maintains a cable. Pretty small World after all, isn't it?

## Women as Inventors

"Women's Contributions to the Field of Invention" is the title of a bulletin just issued by the Woman's Bureau of the Department of Labor at Washington. The bulletin is an interesting document from the fact that it shows that insofar as patents secured by women are concerned, practically all of them prove the old adage: "necessity is the mother of invention." It points out that the inventive spirit flares out in strong response to calls of emergency, necessity, human suffering and inconvenience. The nurse invents a device to facilitate the care of the bed-ridden; the washer woman invents a washboard that protects the hands and lightens the burden of rubbing. The impulse seems to follow in the vein of sympathy for the afflicted.

## Dawson Boy Scouts Make Record

The Boy Scouts of Dawson have distinguished themselves three times during the past two weeks. Twice they rendered great assistance in fighting forest fires near their home town and last week one of the boys, David Harding, plunged into the Cimarron river and brought out a little girl, who would have been swept down the stream, had it not been for his pluck and courage. The Dawson troop is said to be one of the best trained and experienced in the United States.

NOTICE

To the Sheep Owners of New Mexico: You are hereby notified that a law was enacted by the Sixth Legislature of New Mexico, a copy of which is attached hereto, requiring that the owners of all ear marks recorded in the office of the Sheep Sanitary Board are required to have the same re-recorded in the records of this office within three (3) months from the date of this notice. All ear marks not so re-recorded will, at the expiration of three (3) months, become the property of the public and will be available to the first applicant on the expiration of time required to elapse by this law.

A fee of one dollar is required to accompany the application for re-recording.

Copy of bill is as follows:  
"Section 1. The Sheep Sanitary Board of New Mexico shall have the power to and shall cause all marks and brands now in actual use to be re-recorded. For this purpose, the Sheep Sanitary Board shall issue and mail a circular letter through the United States Mail addressed to each owner of any marks and brands now of record with said board, to the postoffice address shown on the brand record, requiring the owner or owners of marks and brands to file with the Secretary of said board an exact facsimile of any mark or marks, brand or brands now being used or owned by such owners. In addition to the above notice the Sheep Sanitary Board shall cause to be published in either English or Spanish, or both, in at least one newspaper in each county in this State where there is a newspaper, a copy of this Act, said publication to continue for at least four (4) consecutive weeks.

Section 2. Within three months from date of the first publication of this Act as aforesaid, it shall be the duty of all owners of marks and brands now of record in the office of the Sheep Sanitary Board, to file with the Secretary of said Board, a fac-simile of the mark or marks, brand or brands now in actual use and owned by them. A fee for the re-recording of brands shall be one (\$1.00) Dollar for each mark or brand re-recorded, the proceeds to be used for the cost of notice given as provided by Section 1 of this act; provided, that any excess money from such fees shall be placed in the Sheep Sanitary Board fund.

Upon the receipt of the fee to be paid and the fac-simile of marks and brands heretofore provided for the Secretary of the said Board shall, as soon as said marks and brands have been re-recorded, mail to the owner or owners of said marks and brands, a certificate for each mark and brand so re-recorded and for which said fee has been paid, showing the date of the re-recording and also showing that the fee herein provided to be paid has been paid. A failure to make such payment shall forfeit the right to use any mark or brand now in use. When the right to use any mark or brand now of record shall have become forfeited for failure to comply with the provisions of this act, the said mark or brand shall not be recorded to any other person or persons until after the expiration of two years from the date of forfeiture; PROVIDED, that this Act shall not apply to those who have in compliance with Chapter 71 of the Laws of 1921 re-recorded their marks and brands, if the marks so re-recorded are the same as those used by them on sheep. Provided, this re-recording of marks and brands shall not be required oftener than once in five (5) years.

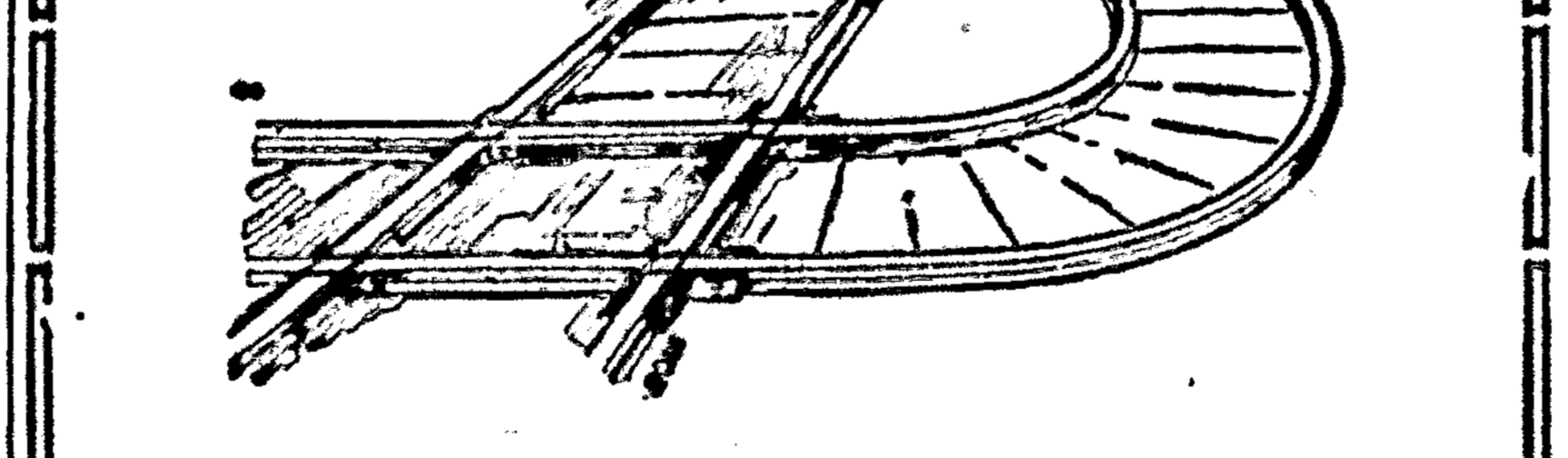

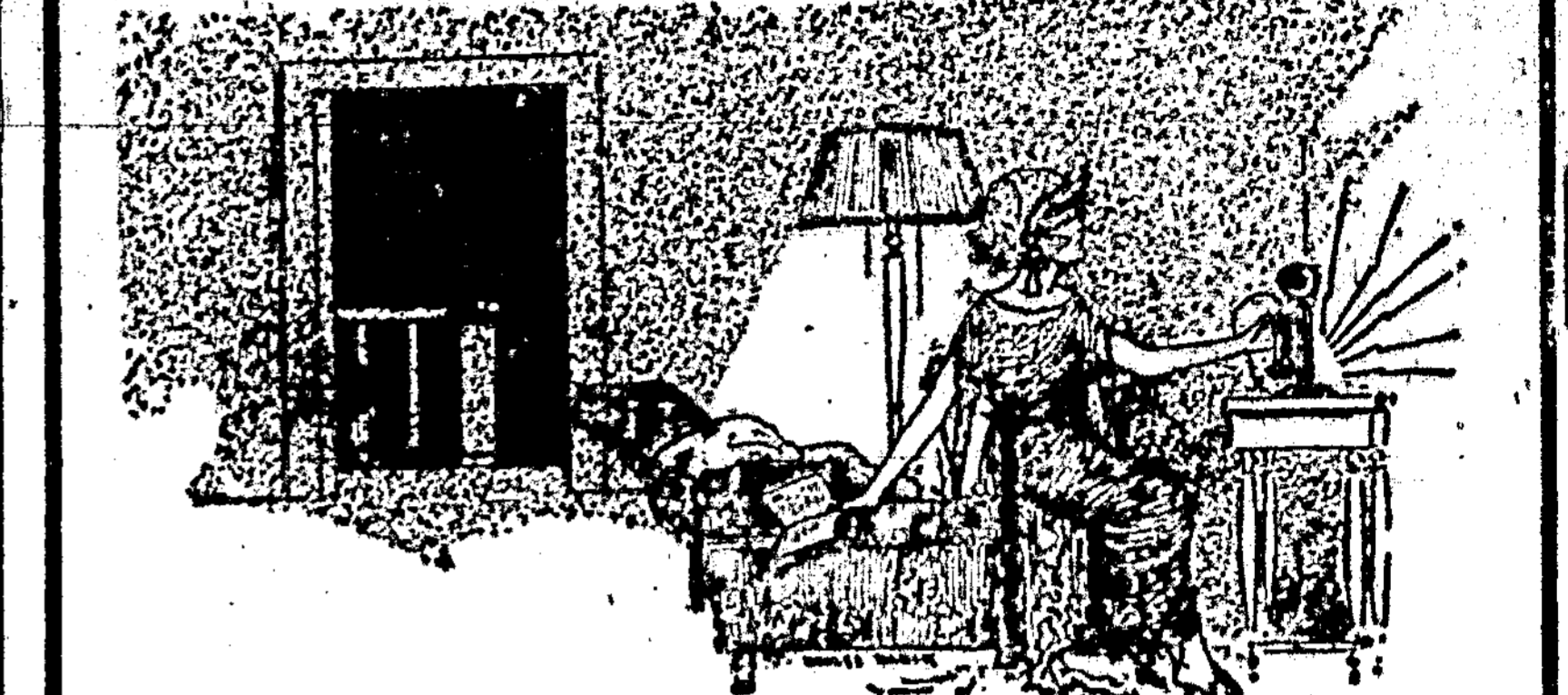

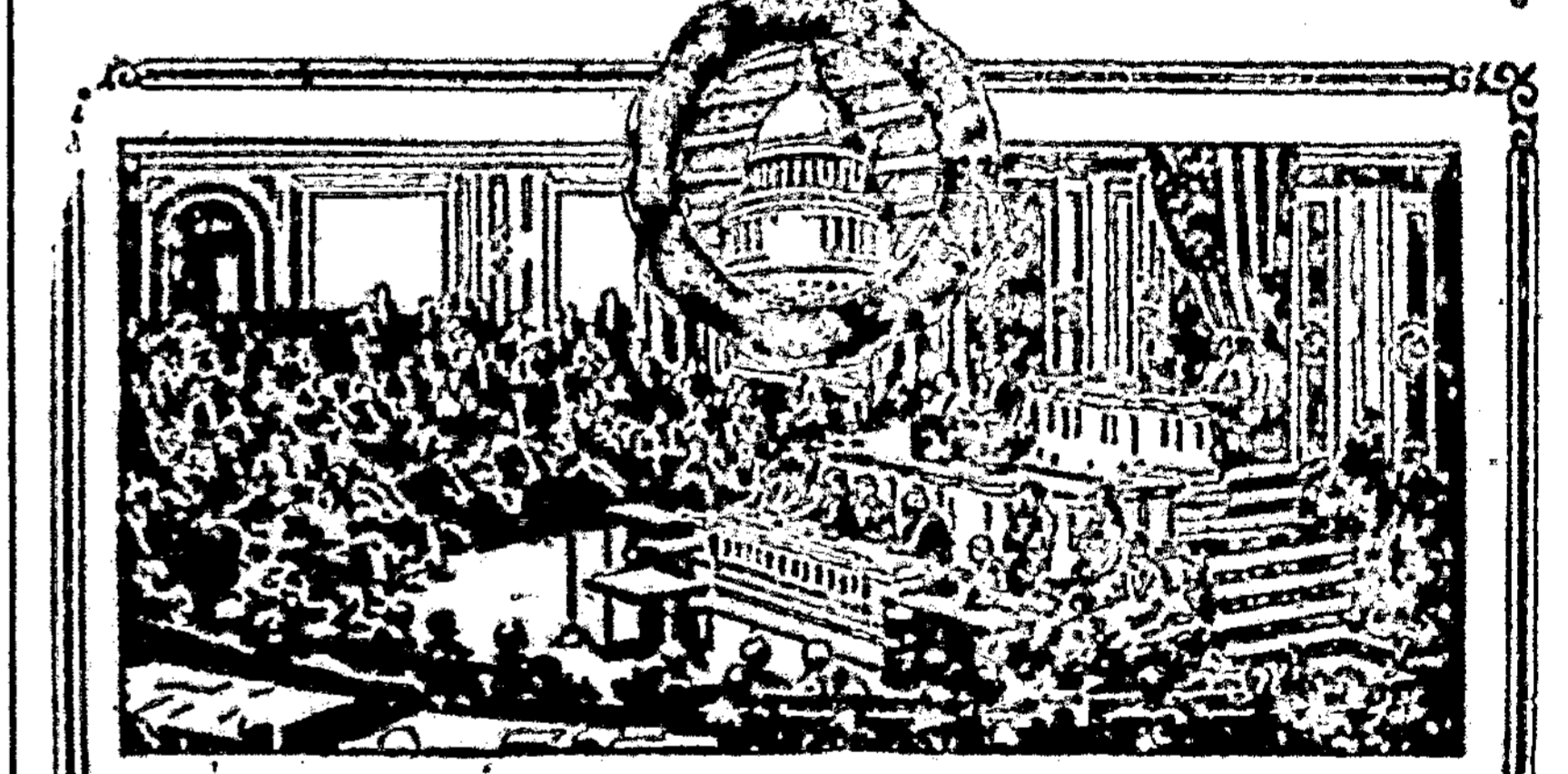

**Another Milestone  
for the N. M. I. B.**

With the commencement ex-  
ercises at the high school Tues-  
day night the New Mexico In-  
stitute for the Blind passed an-  
other milestone in its work for  
the helpless wards of the state.  
A great work is being done out  
at the Institute which is done so  
quietly and efficiently that many  
of the people do not realize the  
great results that are accom-  
plished.

As an instance of what the  
work is and as showing its worth-  
while nature, we may only have  
to refer to the graduate from  
the high school course. As a  
boy this graduate of Tuesday  
night was brought a few years  
ago from a cow ranch in the  
Pecos valley. While the parents  
were as well-to-do as the aver-  
age family over there they had  
a task they were not equal to—  
there was a little blind boy in  
the home who was a problem as  
to his education. He was brought  
to the Institute by his father.  
After showing the little fellow  
about and explaining the school  
he came to go home, at which  
time the young man kicked up a  
merry time that he had to re-  
main behind at the school.

However, it was not long until  
he settled down to the routine  
and while he was a little like a  
wild broncho for a time he soon  
became tame and susceptible  
to discipline. We can easily  
picture what the young man's  
mature years of life would have  
been had he never been taken  
to the N. M. I. B. As it is he  
has a trade—he has a high school  
education—he can read in the  
characters provided for the  
blind.

The New Mexico Institute for  
Blind is one of the state's in-  
stitution that should be dealt  
with generously by the official  
and legislators of the state. The  
State owes a debt to its unfor-  
tunate citizens who are blind  
that it is not paying in full at  
all. It is a work that will pay,  
even in dollars and cents, as the  
years go by, for it is a great  
work to make these wards inde-  
pendent and to a degree capable  
of enjoying life, rather than as-  
sisting to maintain them in par-  
tial helplessness in later years.

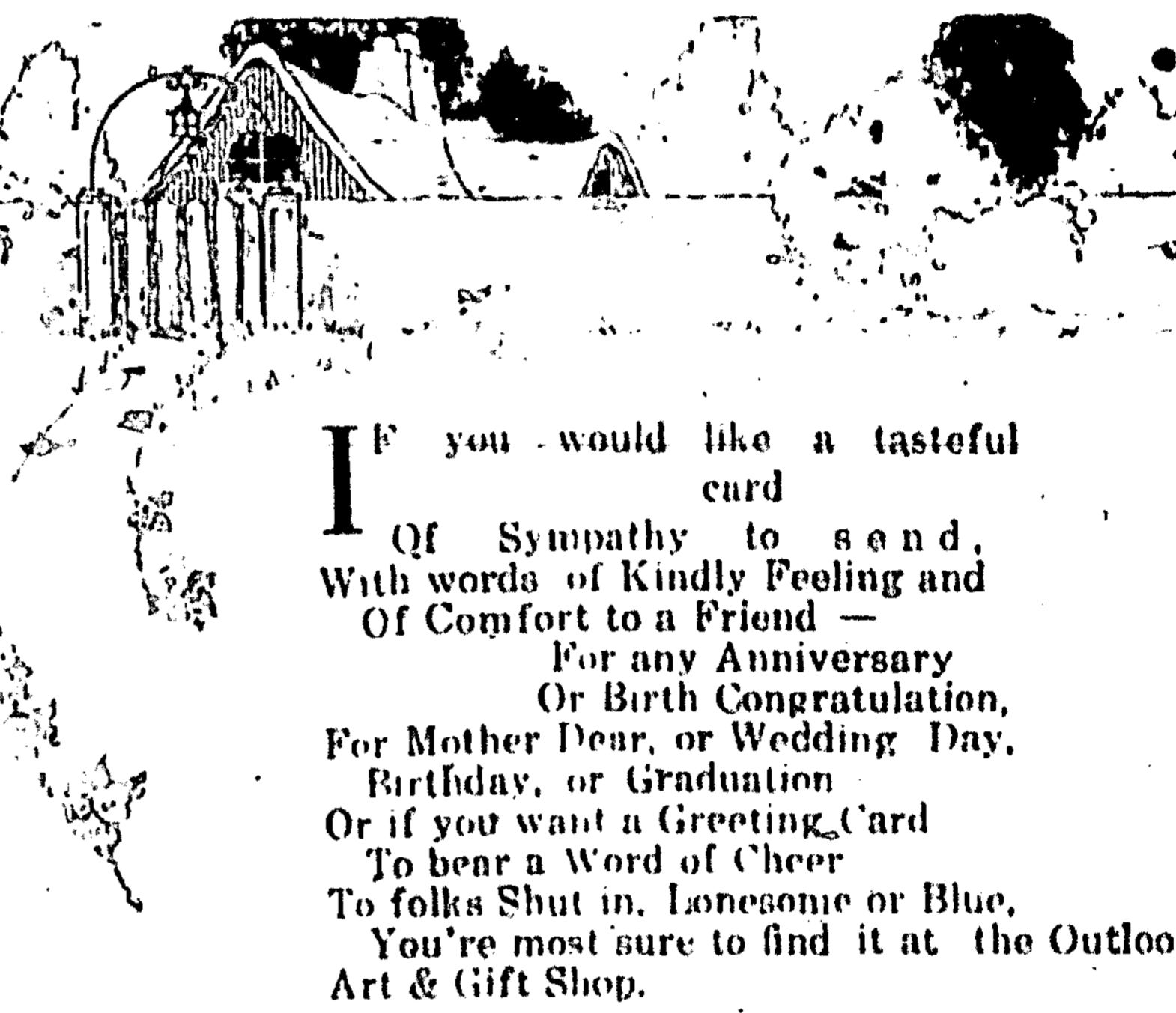

**WIFE ALWAYS AT HIS SIDE**

Garibaldi's Life Companion as Brave in Battle as Was the Military Hero of Italy.

"Among the many sufferings of my stormy life," says Giuseppe Garibaldi, the military hero of modern Italy, in his "Recollections," "I have not been without happy moments, and among them I count that in which, at the head of the few men remaining to me after numerous conflicts, who had gained the character of bravery, I first mounted and began my march, with my wife at my side, in a career that always had attractions for me, even greater than that of the sea. It seemed to me of little importance that my entire property, was that which I carried, and that I was in the service of a poor republic, unable to pay, anybody, I had a saber and a carbine, which I carried on the front of my saddle. My wife was my treasure, and no less fervent in the cause of the people than I; and she looked upon battles as an amusement, and the inconveniences of a life in the field as a pastime. Then, whatever might happen, I was looked upon with smiles, and the more wild the extensive desert plains appeared, the more beautiful and delightful they seemed to our eyes."

While he was an exile from his native country in 1849, Garibaldi came to the United States, and in 1850 worked in a candle factory on Staten Island. He died in June, 1882.

Although his taste for candy seems to be acquired, the craving for salt is inborn and never satisfied. Dr. George Burbank, in charge of a missionary expedition to the Pygmies wrote: "When our mission boys found the Pygmies and told them we were bringing 'mannu' they awaited our arrival with eagerness. Those pygmies devoured that salt as if it were sugar. When satisfied, they produced some enormous green bananas, 15 inches in length, and roasted them over a tiny fire. There was no art in such primitive cookery. The fruit was simply placed on the smoldering coals and, when heated through, was peeled and eaten."
