## How Do They Get That Way?

### Tucumcari News:

The National Editorial Association met in Oklahoma City last week and is touring Mexico this week. Editors from every state in the union attended the meeting and matters of interest to the profession, and that means to the public in general, were discussed at the sessions.

One of the outstanding features of the convention was the decided stand taken by the newspaper men for the enforcement of law and while some may possibly disagree with them, it was the consensus of opinion that laxity in the enforcement of all laws was from the class of men elected and appointed to enforce the laws.

One of the old heads in the association, an editor from New York, expressed the opinion that with the right class of men in office and the people behind them, it would be an easy matter to enforce all laws. He said that until the people themselves wished the laws enforced, the officers we should have would never be elected or appointed and went further, saying that an officer on every corner would not and could not, enforce our laws unless the people wished them enforced.

Another matter which came in for a lot of discussion was the number of newspapers stepping into the independent field—leaving both the old parties and, free-balancing it. Some said the politicians were responsible while others inferred it was because editors were becoming deeper thinkers and more studious, realizing that greater responsibilities rested on their shoulders than rest upon shoulders of the public servant.

Those claiming the politicians were responsible for the newspapers eschewing politics wanted to know "how the politician gets that way?" How it happens that he thinks the newspaper should support him, give him a space, advance his political interests, put him in office and not demand the same from the doctor, preacher and those in other callings. He seems to think that it is something due him and it is this thought which is causing newspaper men throughout the nation to enter the independent field.

The newspaper man cannot understand why he should always be the "rust" and according to present indications, he will not long be the "billy" for the office seeker. "How do you get that way" is having more hearing and receiving more thought all over the nation.

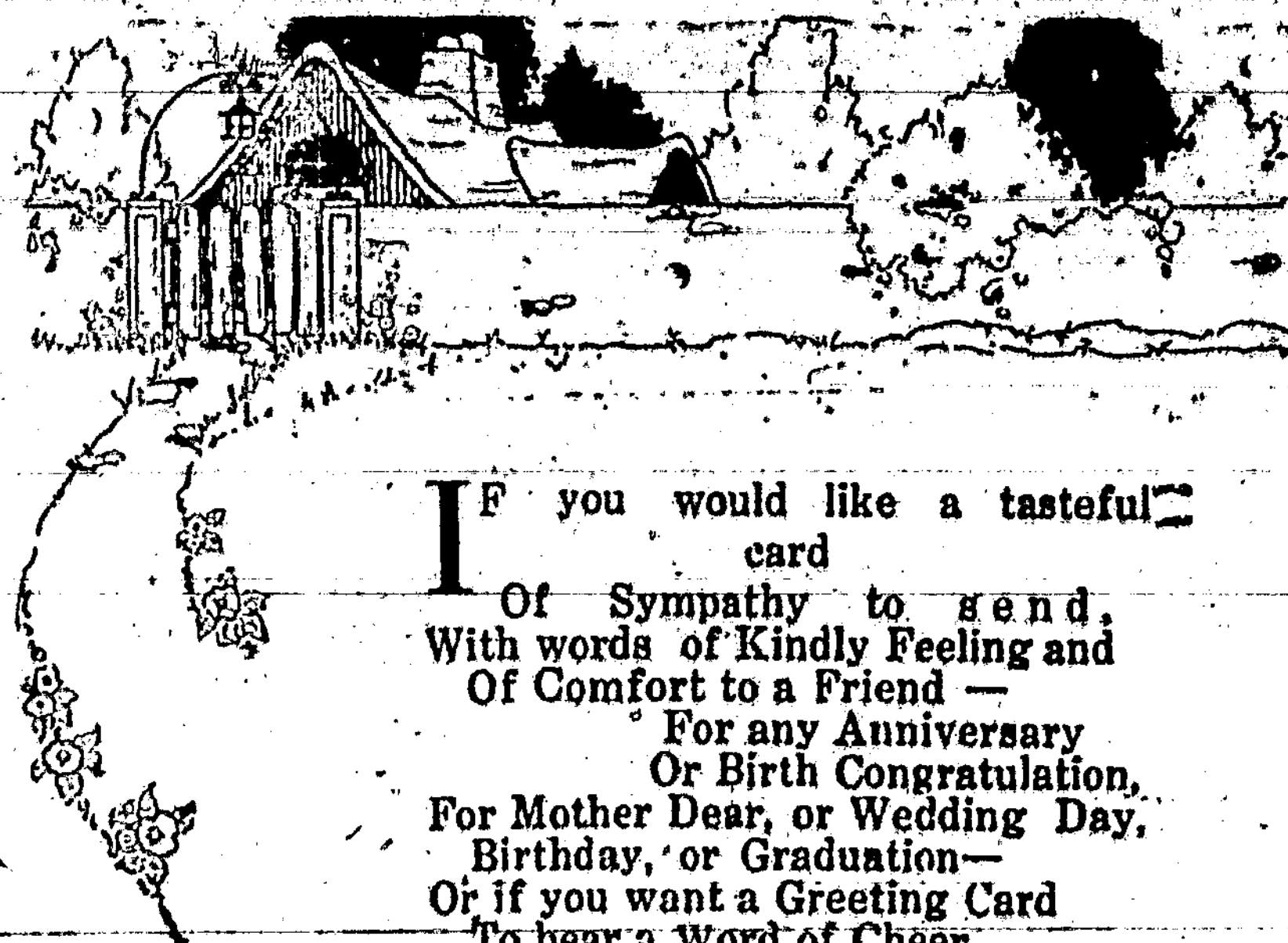

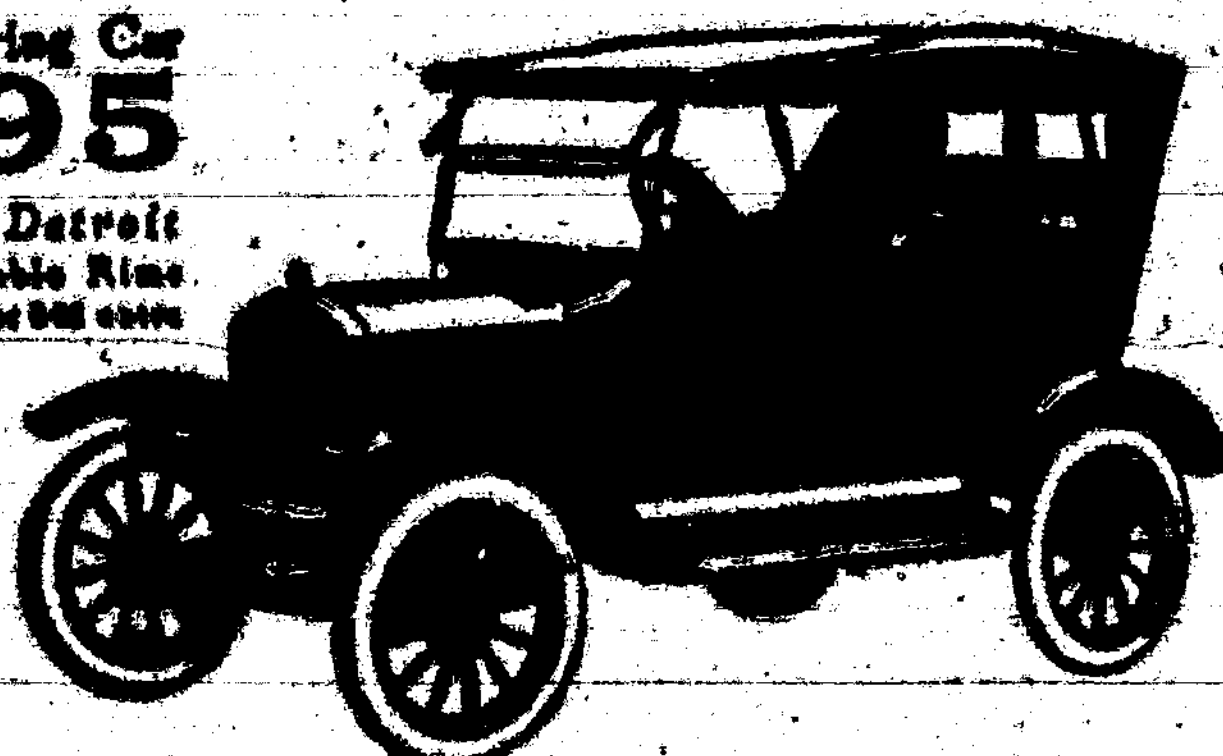

**USES HIS RADIO SET TO GET MARKET TIPS**

**Farmer in Ohio Realizes Tidy Profit by Picking Up Wireless Market News Out of the Air.**  
Most radio fans find that their radio sets pay dividends in entertainment and instruction, but the farmer who tunes in WGY and other stations sending out produce market reports is in a preferred position. The farmer on occasion may turn radio market information into cash and make such information pay him dividends on his set. One such farmer is reported by

F. R. Cozzes of Roxbury, O., in the Southern Ruralist recently:  
John Weldon, a farmer of my vicinity, recently got a tip from the air which yielded him \$18.60. The "tip" was an unexpected rise in the live stock market, coming at a time when Weldon was preparing to sell a shipment of hogs to a local buyer.  
As a result he got in touch with the city market, and \$18.60 was his profit over the local buyer's quotations after all shipping expenses were paid.  
This was not a streak of luck, however, for Weldon gets such tips frequently, and they are a part of his plan for making his radio pay its way.  
Keeps Market Ledger by Air  
"When I installed my outfit in 1922 I determined to get something from the air besides music," Weldon told me recently. "I could receive reports from two large city markets and a number of smaller ones, and to keep tabs on these I bought a ledger."  
"At the top of each blank page I wrote down the city where the market was located and names of the principal dealers therein with their addresses. This book is kept on the table where the radio is located, and when I have something to market I get in touch with one of these cities and write down quotations as I receive them. Then I 'tune-in' for another city and get their prices. Afterward I go over these reports and compare them."  
"It is a simple matter then to estimate distance, shipping cost, and so forth, and from this I can select my market."  
"Dealers in these cities are aware of my method, and I have made ar-

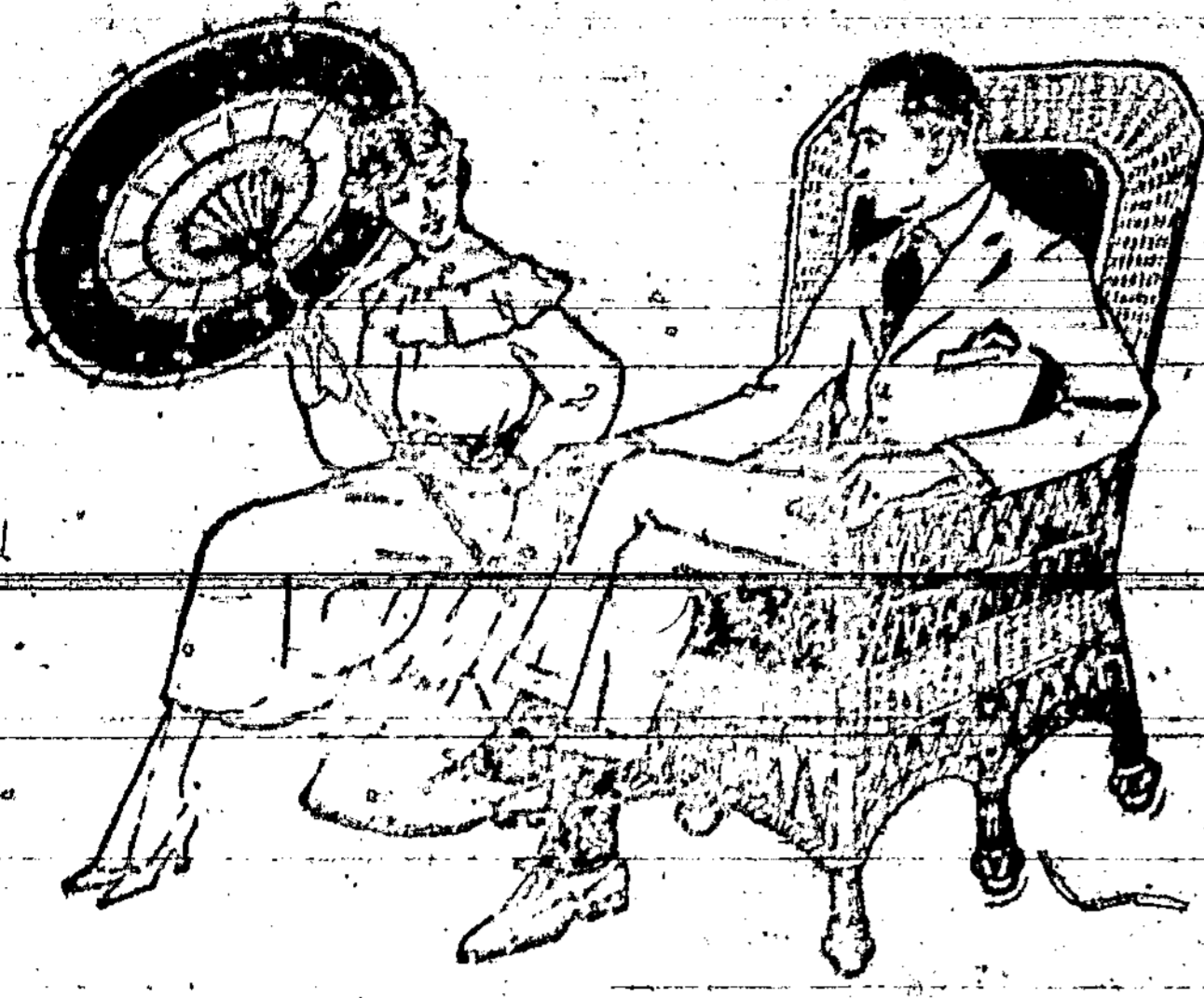
