Ranger J. A. Work of the Fairchild Ranger Station was in the local office several days this week on timber sale matters.

G. A. Pearson, director of the Fort Valley Experiment Station at Flagstaff, Arizona will arrive in Alamogordo today. He will spend several days on the Forest.

Ranger Lee Beall of the White Mountain District will start a round-up of stray horses on the Nogal Lake and Indian Divide cattle allotments within a few days. The horses will be impounded in accordance with Regulation T-12, a Regulation providing for the impounding of domestic livestock found trespassing on National Forest land if not removed upon reasonable notice.

The County Election

THE ELECTION, as far as the County was concerned, resulted in a victory for the Democrats in the election of treasurer, assessor, clerk, county school superintendent, one commissioner, and probate judge, while the Republicans elected the sheriff, two county commissioners, and county surveyor.

A hard fight was made on Mr. Chas. Felton Grey in Carrizozo and Capitan to capture the third district, but his many friends in both parties who realized the necessity of having him as a member of the Board, rallied to his support and brought about his election.

Much credit is due the heads of the Republican County organization. Their never-failing efforts in behalf of the full ticket, state, district and county made with unselfish interest was commendable.

The defeated candidates on the Republican ticket have nothing to regret—they made a clean fight, and with the exception of little stories which never fail to creep into campaigns by over-zealous supporters which really caused but a small amount of concern, was done without their knowledge and approval.

Mr. Kelsey had the Democratic machine decidedly against him, that was naturally to be expected, but strong as it might have seemed to some, it did him little damage from the fact that he was the first Republican candidate for sheriff to carry Carrizozo as far back as 1911.

The election is over, four out of nine officials are elected.

Mr. Warden's position in the campaign was much different from that of Mr. Grey's. He was better known in certain parts of the county than his co-worker — but aside from the Capitan locality, where a hard fight was made on Mr. Grey, they ran pretty well together.

They all wish to thank the people for their support.

Blackbeard Takes to Piracy IN 1716 a certain Captain Teach, who had served an apprenticeship in lawlessness as a privateer out of Jamaica, "went on account."

His first capture was a big ship named the Great Allen, which he plundered and burned. Attacked by H. M. S. Scarborough, the pirate drove off the man-of-war after a sharp engagement and continued on his way.

Blackbeard's captures were numerous. One of them was a ship bearing the curious name of the Protestant Caesar which Teach burned, not because of her name but because she was from Boston where a number of pirates had lately been hanged.

He capped the climax by sailing his fleet—he had three ships by this time—outside the port of Charleston, S. C., and capturing every vessel that tried to enter or leave port.

Despite his many successes, Teach's life was not a bed of roses. He had unruly men for his crews, and he had to rule them with an iron hand. There has been preserved from his journal (he was a somewhat literary pirate, too, it seems) the following entries: "1718—Such a Day. Hum all out—Our Company somewhat sober—A d-d Confusion amongst us—Rogues a-plottin'—great Talk of Separation—so I took'd Sharp for a Prize. 1718—Such a Day. Took one with a Great deal of Liquor on Board; so kept the Company hot, it d-d hot, then all Things went well again."

Such a day, indeed! And these only two of many in his infamous career.

EDITORIAL COLUMN

Chevrolets Used in Making Motion Pictures

Sometimes only one car will do! Out in the motion picture sanctuaries of California, where money, genius and picturesque country unite to provide romantic and thrilling screen stories, the automobile is handed most strenuous assignments.

The motor car frequently gives its star performance behind the screen-unknown to the millions of movie-goers, who are often unaware of the vital contribution which the automobile has made to the taking of the picture.

When the motion picture director sets out to make a western film, the transportation department is confronted with the gigantic task of getting the entire company with all of their paraphernalia out to the great open spaces.

Use of motor cars and trucks has made possible filming pictures in backgrounds that have the authentic atmosphere of the Old West. Year by year, motion picture men declare, it is becoming necessary to go farther afield to secure new and unspoiled scenic effects.

Hal Roach, of the studios which bear his name, recently established a permanent camp at the Big Horn ranch near Moapa, Nev., as a headquarters for the use of his production companies when engaged in making western pictures.

A marked absence of roads is one of the chief beauties of the surrounding country from the standpoint of the directors but the transportation department found it very difficult to establish communication to many of the localities chosen, where the dry bed of sand was the best possible substitute for a highway to be found.

"After various types of motor vehicles had been tried," says Hal Roach, "a Chevrolet truck was purchased. It proved so completely satisfactory that four more were added and the fleet of five has since, time and again, proved its ability to go anywhere and back again through the roadless desert around the Big Horn Ranch.

"For personal transportation I invariably use a Chevrolet. On my first trip to the Big Horn ranch, I set out in a larger car. In the first heavy sand encountered the larger car tore out the rear axle and I finished the trip in a Chevrolet.

"Now many of the other executives of the Roach studios employ Chevrolets for their excursions into the country where men are men and automobiles must be real cars."

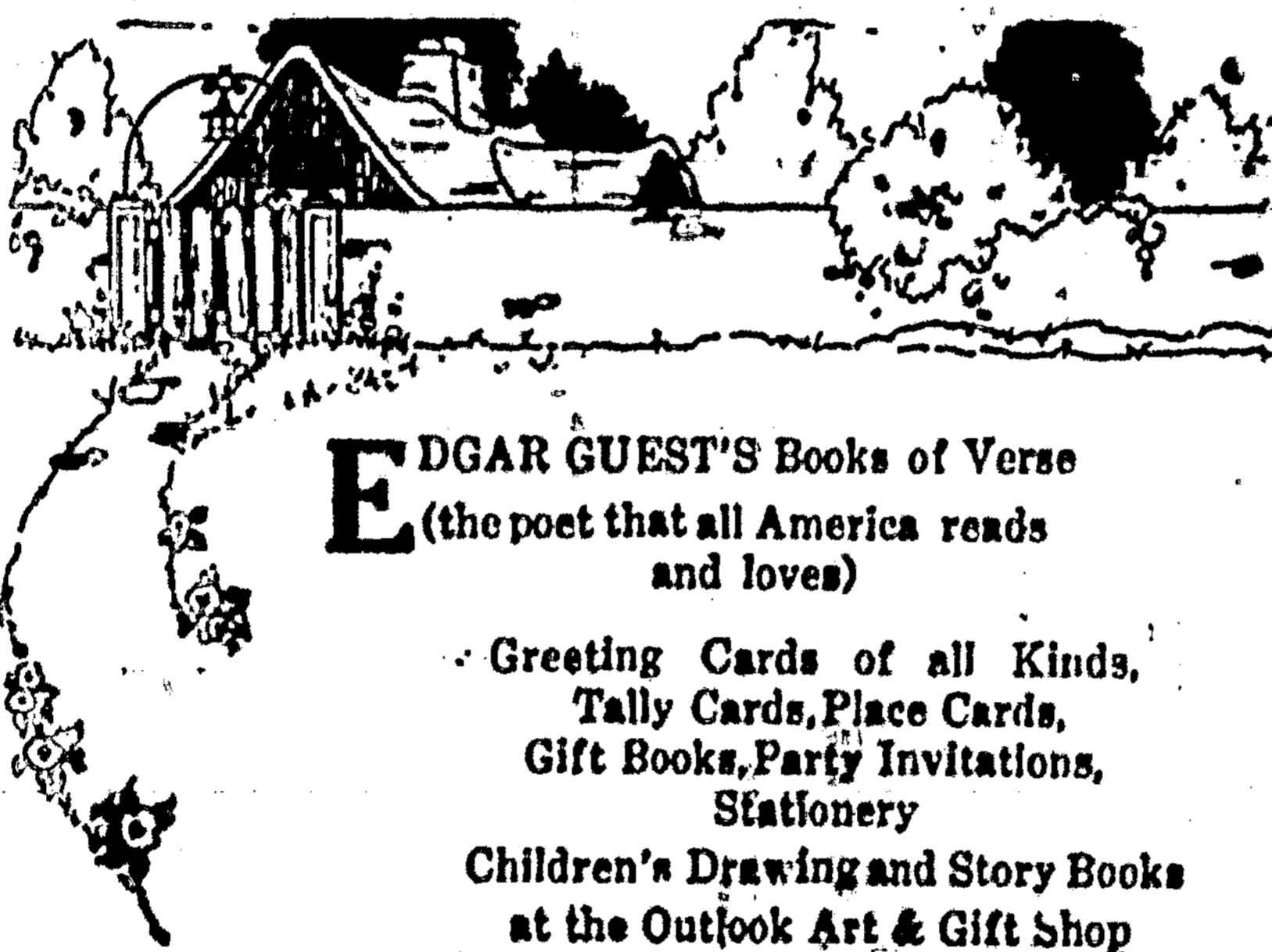

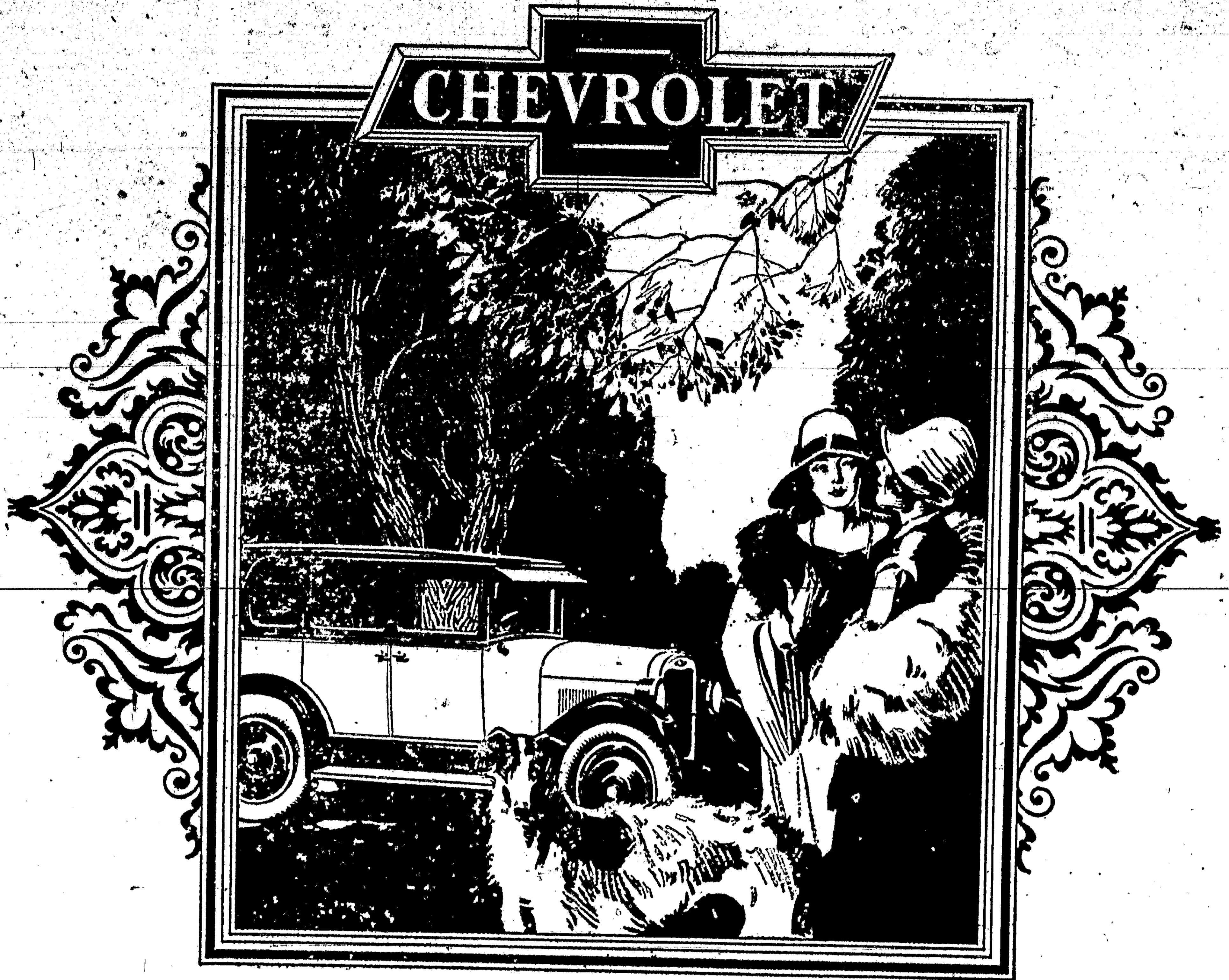

Mr. Levas served the government through the Civil War period and afterwards in the Indian Wars of which he related as being his most adventurous and trying-days under the command of Kit Carson.

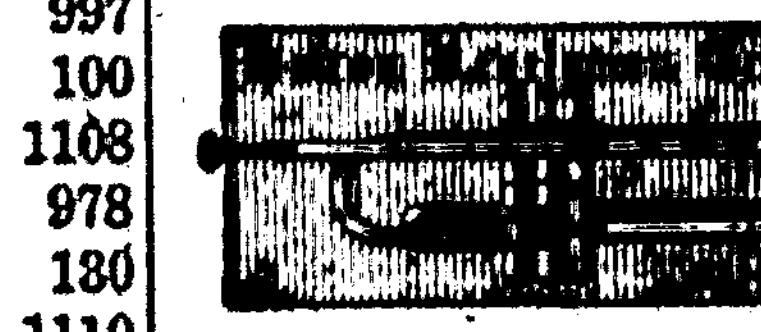
After being discharged from the service, he located and became a prosperous sheepman in the Rabenton district where he resided until coming to Carrizozo about 13 years ago.

"The seeming truth which cunning times put on  
To entrap the wisest."  
—The Merchant of Venice.

Little evil is done in the world by obvious untruth; the danger is from untruth that passes for truth. People do not willingly believe a lie. Early in life children ask of tales told them, "Is it true?" They continue to ask the same thing all their lives.

It is not, however, always easy to learn what is true. Some of the ancients said truth lived at the top of a very steep mountain; others said she lived at the bottom of a well. No matter which dwelling place was ascribed to her, all acknowledge that it was difficult to catch a glimpse of her. Whether we climb to truth by hard mental labor or dig for truth among the thoughts of other men, truth will never be found without work and inconvenience.

Emerson said: "God offers to every mind its choice between truth and repose. Take which you please, you can never have both. Between these, as a pendulum, man oscillates ever. He in whom the love of repose predominates will accept the first creed, the first philosophy, the first political party he meets, most likely his father's. He gets rest, comendity and reputation; but he shuts the door of truth. He in whom the love of truth predominates submits to the inconvenience of suspense and imperfect opinions."

When we look about us the earth seems flat. Hills and mountains seem to rest upon it as objects on a table. For centuries the wisest men believed the earth was flat and so taught their pupils. The seeming truth of the world's shape was disproved less than five centuries ago. When the truth of a simple physical fact, such as the earth's shape, was so hard to come at, it is small wonder that the truth of facts involving human actions and the truth of ideas and opinions is so difficult to learn.

We are wont to look upon history as truth; but Carlyle defined history as "a distillation of rumor," and Napoleon defined it as "a fable agreed upon." While Voltaire, writing upon one phase of history, pointed out: "So many hidden causes are associated at times with the apparent cause, so many unknown springs may be at work in the perception of a man that it is impossible, centuries afterward, to detect the hidden source of the misfortune, even of distinguished men."
