Buick Roadster Stolen at El Paso, Recovered Here

Early this week, a man, Evan Tims by name, arrived at Alamogordo with a Buick Roadster which had been stolen at El Paso, concealed the car, dismantled certain portions of it and tried to sell the parts to a dealer at that place.
Being on the lookout for the stolen car, the dealer notified the owner at El Paso and the sheriff sent a deputy to Alamogordo, who worked into the good graces of Tims, or Blackey, as he is called and obtained the information that the stolen car was on a ranch near Carrizozo. Tims and Arnett, the deputy, came here, went to where the car was concealed, with a party in this locality, who had been connected with the car episode. They found the key missing, so the trio went to Roswell, had another made, which after being inserted, broke off in the lock, leaving them in a worse fix than before.
Seeing a point of advantage, the plain clothes man offered to assume all burden of the theft, pay the two men \$300, take the car off their hands. They accepted his offer, receiving the money in marked bills of different denominations. The deputy brought the car to Carrizozo. Sheriff arrested Tims and the local man, recovered the marked money and landed the pair in jail.
The local man was released on \$500 bonds, but Blackey was held, awaiting bonds to the amount of \$2500.

A Tragedy in the Hills

As a sequel to forest fires and neighborhood quarrels, a gun battle was staged between members of a sheriff's posse and T. J. Shoemaker at a point about 6 miles east of Encinosa.
A warrant was issued for Shoemaker's arrest Wednesday, the 17th, him being charged with having fired on Lloyd Taylor, Charles Pepper and a man named Garcia, this alleged offense having been committed the day before, near Shoemaker's place, as the parties fired at were getting supplies from a car. Two shots were fired at this time, both missing Mr. Taylor by a hair's breadth.
A search warrant was also placed in the hands of Sheriff Kelsey charging Shoemaker with having taken a rifle and a pistol from another car parked in the same neighborhood.
On being informed that Mr. Shoemaker had told a neighbor that he had shot at Taylor and others and that he would not submit to arrest, the sheriff organized a posse the morning of the 18th, and plans were laid to take the defendant without injury, if possible. The first plan was to surround the Shoemaker place at a distance and get a friendly party to induce him to give up. A telegram was sent to a son in Arizona to come at once. The posse was placed at various strategic points, with orders to delay an encounter,

pending an attempt to parley. Orders were also issued that in case of an accidental meeting with Shoemaker, a demand for surrender must be accompanied by a readiness to enforce the demand.
About 11 o'clock, as a party consisting of Deputy Sheriff P. E. Johnson, Forest Supervisor O. Fred Arthur and clerk, Robert White, members of the posse, were going in around about way to the Koprian place for observation, they encountered Shoemaker at the Block ranch mail box on the Encinosa-Spindle road. The testimony at the Coroner's inquest, held that evening, shows that the car stopped about 50 yards west of the mail box, after having passed that point. That Deputy Johnson got out of the car before it stopped and went back towards Shoemaker, telling him not to do that when he, Shoemaker, jumped for his rifle, which was in a scabbard on a horse he had been riding. Johnson being unarmed at this time ran back to the car to get his rifle. White was shot and fell just as Deputy Johnson gained the shelter of the car. A general fusillade took place then, Shoemaker being hit twice—either of the shots would have caused death. Shoemaker's horse was killed. White died at 8 o'clock that night at the Fort Stanton hospital.
Those testifying at the inquest were Sheriff Kelsey, as to the events leading up to the tragedy, Deputy Johnson, Fred Arthur and Mrs. Wm. Nix, the latter being an eye witness.
The sympathy of the community goes out to the members of Shoemaker's family, the general opinion being that the unfortunate man, living alone and brooding over real or fancied wrongs was mentally unbalanced at this time. One of the saddest features of the affair was the death of Robert White, a splendid young man, liked and respected by all. He is survived by a wife and mother, who lives at Stanton Tex.—Another of life's tragedies, regrettable but unavoidable.

A like number of students has been sent to Vaughn under another instructor from the school. While learning under expert instructors, the students maintain the roads and do construction work. 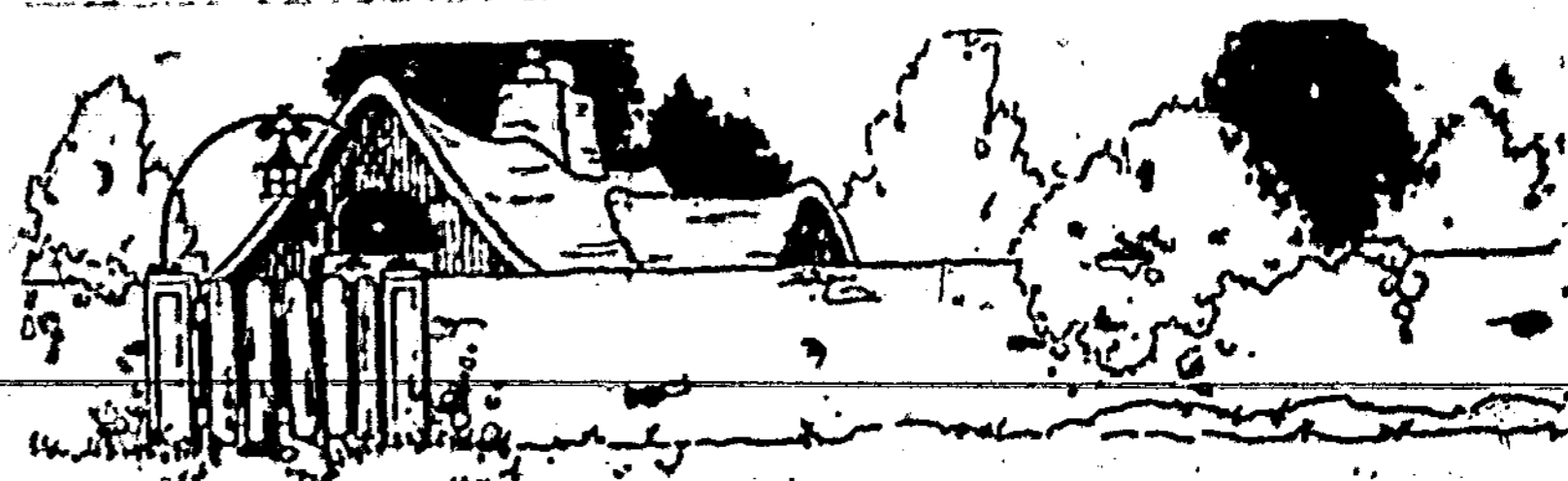
