Use of Flashlight by Campers Cuts Down Forest Fire Hazard



WITH the camping season in full swing, those who follow this time honored custom of achieving recreation and health in the same project, can do more to contribute toward the elimination of the ban of the U. S. Forestry Service—the forest fire.

Officials of the Forestry divisions of the various states, as well as the Federal division, have pointed out that the thoughtless use of matches by campers, has been a prime reason for the fires which have devastated great tracts of valuable timber, and laid waste an almost endless empire in the wooded regions of America.

While use of matches or an automatic lighter is essential in the preparation of campfires, it is pointed out that the camper can help to cut down the fire hazard by ceasing to use matches for other than necessary purposes. For the purpose of "striking a light" along a path, or for hunting for objects or location at night, a flashlight should take the place of matches. With the flashlight, a steady light is provided without any fire hazard whatsoever. In addition to its service in eliminating the possibility of fire, the flashlight stands in especially good stead to the camper when searching at night for articles of wear or utility.

How often have those who hit the trail muttered "dat that hatchet, I can't find it at all in this blinkety-blank blackness!"

A few minutes search with a flashlight will inevitably turn up the missing article, with a saving of time and patience to the camper and, as the Forestry people point out, a possible saving of countless trees and acres from the blight of summer fires.

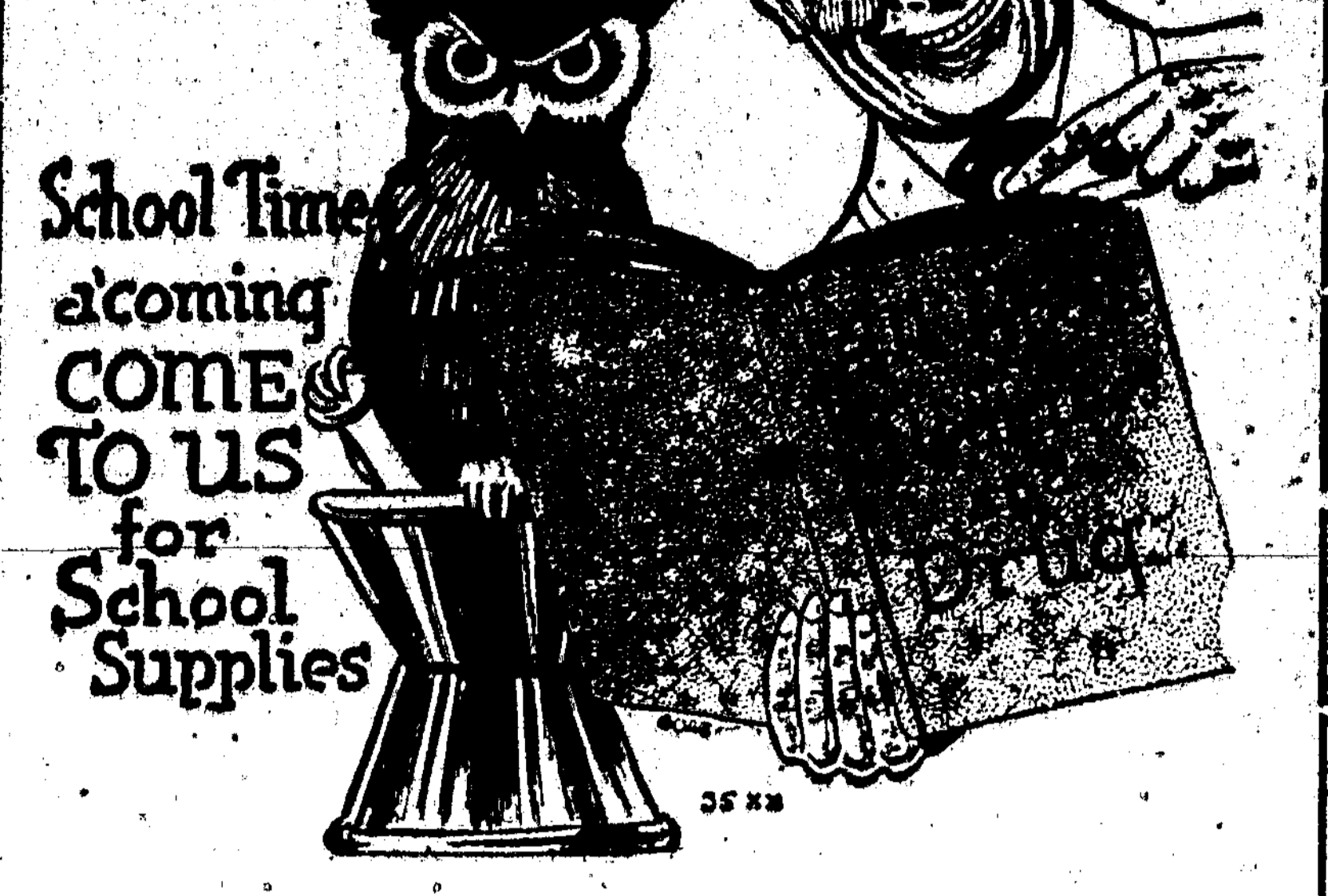
