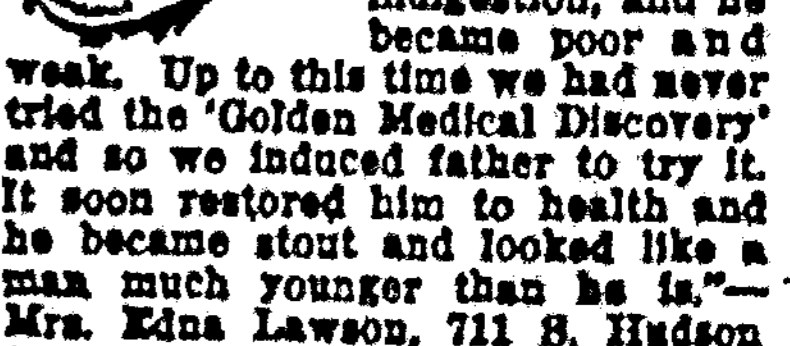

EDITORIAL COLUMN

Progressiveness of the City Council

At the last meeting of the Town Trustees, that body purchased the three lots adjoining the Community Hall, and the same will be reserved for the erection of buildings, such as a fire station and other buildings, which in the future may be used for the office of Town Clerk, a place where the Trustees may hold meetings, etc.

At some time in the future, the city will own, it is said, the Community Hall, and in view of that fact, it will be a means of saving to the city, aside from having all the city buildings confined in one block, the council acted wisely in making the purchase.

The state distributes a pro-rata fund annually among the different cities and towns, the amount allotted to Carrizozo being \$500, and with this amount gradually coming in, together with funds derived from taxation and other sources, it will not be long now before we will have funds sufficient to start the work on the buildings mentioned above.

The present council is to be commended on this action, with other acts of interest in which it has been of the greatest benefit to the city of any form of organization. Take, for instance, Trustee S. F. Miller as an example. In periods when he should be at rest from his duties at the local railroad station, he supervised the grading of the streets and performed other work which plainly speaks for itself.

The Mayor has also put in time which the people overlook in interesting himself in the city's welfare, as well as the others of the Trustees who are always on the job.

The Trustees do everything without the least of remuneration, which they are glad to do in order to be of benefit to the town, and the people should know it and appreciate it.

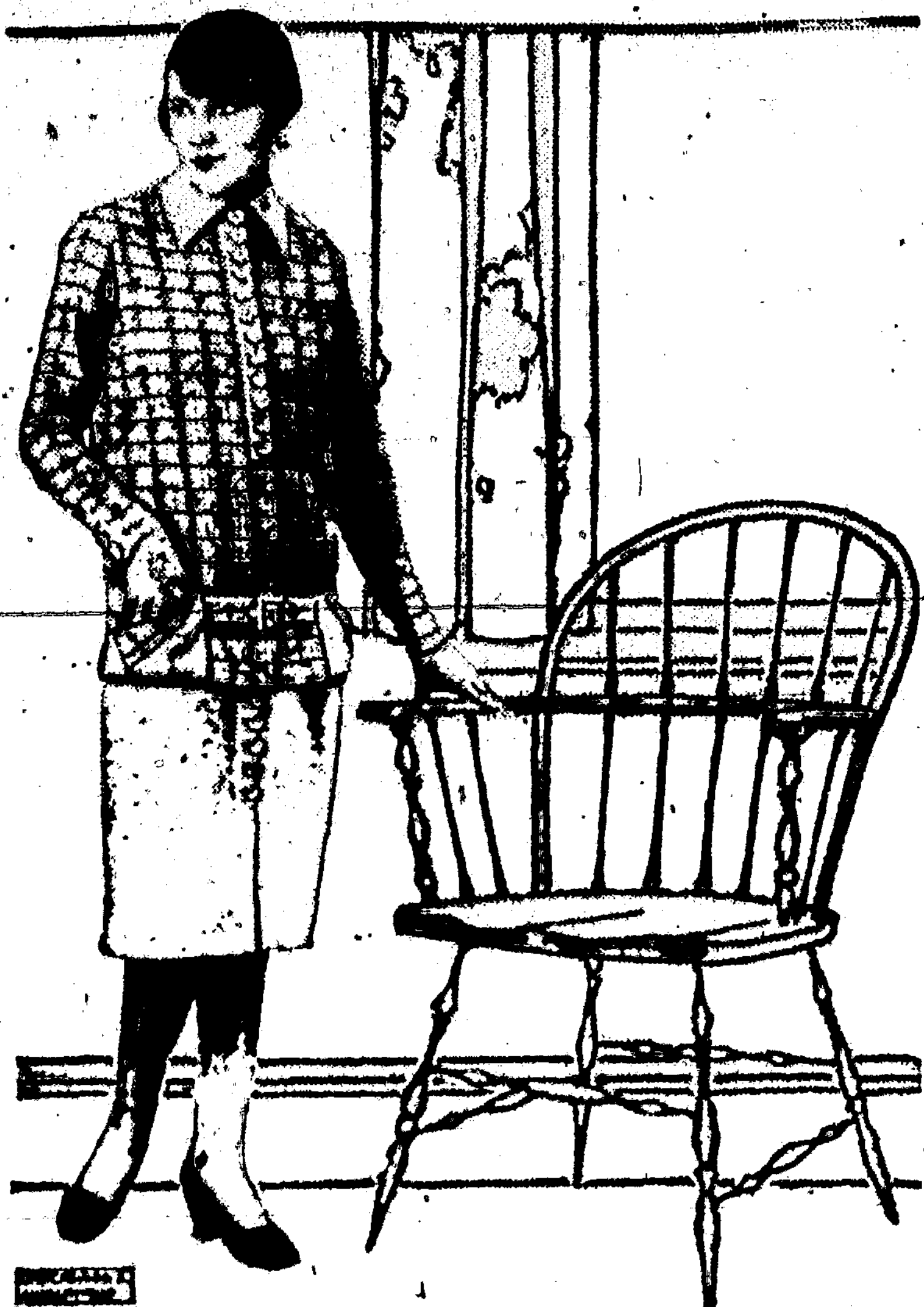

Bread-Crumb Stuffing.—Take two quarts of bread crumbs, rather stale, for the stuffing of a ten-pound turkey.

Chestnut Fudding.—Blanch a pint of chestnuts, halve them and cook until tender in a cupful of milk, letting them simmer until soft.

the yolks and whites of three eggs separately, add the yolks to the chestnut pulp, stir well, then fold in the stiffly beaten whites; put into a pudding dish and bake fifteen minutes.

Boiled Chestnuts as Vegetable.—Remove the shells and blanch the nuts in boiling water, boiling for a few minutes, then drop them into cold water.

"Flummery" Dessert Is Easy to Prepare. A "flummery" is an old-fashioned dessert that is easy to make in the season of highly flavored small fruits such as blackberries and black raspberries.

Blackberry Flummery. 2 cupfuls blackberry juice from canned or cooked fresh blackberries. 1/2 cupful sugar (if juice is unsweetened).

Heat the blackberry juice. Mix the sugar and the farina or cornstarch and the salt, and add to the blackberry juice. Cook in a double boiler for 15 to 20 minutes, or until the mixture thickens and the raw starchy taste disappears.

Chestnut Fudding.—Blanch a pint of chestnuts, halve them and cook until tender in a cupful of milk, letting them simmer until soft.

TRY FIRST NATIONAL SERVICE

WAR WORK NOT AT END FOR RED CROSS

Demands for Service to Disabled Veterans Last Year Cost Nearly \$3,000,000.

Expenditure of \$2,930,223.86 for services to disabled veterans, and of \$297,522.30 for service to men of the Regular Army and Navy, were outstanding details of the Red Cross appropriations for the past year's activities, and are cited by Chairman John Barton Payne as the continuing importance of this phase of the organization's responsibilities nine years after the end of the war.

Of the total expended for disabled veterans, the National Organization contributed \$1,161,223.86, and the local Red Cross Chapters \$1,769,000. The service to men of the regular forces was shared by the National Organization with an appropriation of \$207,322.30, and by the local Chapters with \$280,000.

Under local Chapters of the Red Cross, assistance to ex-service men in filing claims for disability and adjusted compensation, securing hospital care for disabled veterans, preparation of social histories for use in treatment of men in government hospitals, assistance in securing proper guardians for veterans adjudged incompetent to administer their affairs, rendering reports on some conditions of service men applying for discharge because of dependency, and many other forms of aid are a part of the Red Cross duty to these men.

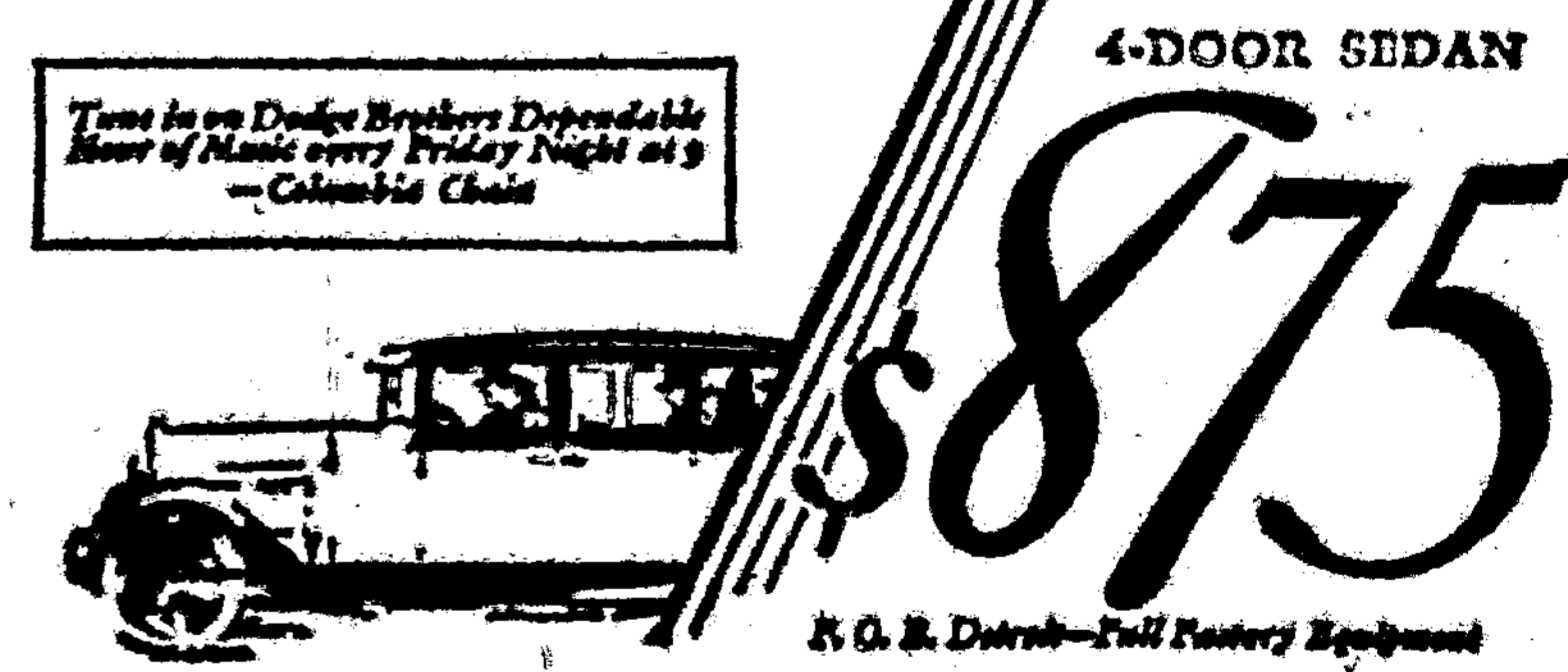
An interesting detail reveals the fact that prosecution of ex-service men's claims is becoming increasingly difficult as they grow more involved with each year that passes since the war. The number of death claims is growing constantly, in addition to the fact that there is a steady increase in the number of claims referred to various branches of the Red Cross concerned with assistance to veterans, for aid in bringing them to a close.

During the past year, National Headquarters estimated that the Red Cross assisted veterans and service men with cases involving total awards of \$644,631, for disability and death compensation, revival of insurance, adjusted compensation, pensions, medical and burial reimbursements, etc.

Red Cross representatives are on duty with the Army and Navy both in home and foreign garrisons, and contact is maintained in the hospitals and other centers where assistance to these men and women may be needed. Such Red Cross service, it is emphasized, covers only the fields where regular governmental provisions do not apply, and is designed to sup-
