Highway Activity

Foreman J. H. Gregg of the Highway Dept. has moved equipment and construction crew to Lovington to begin construction on state road No. 31...

The improvements will consist of grading these roads to standard 24-foot width and providing drainage structures where needed.

The improvement of the Lovington-Tatum road will eliminate a much dreaded hazard to the traveling public, as it is by far the worst state road in Lea Co.

Road building equipment consisting of a ten-ton Holt tractor, Russell Mogul grader, 5-ton Cletrac tractor and Adams No. 8 grader, has been moved into Corona for the purpose of re-building state highway No. 3...

The roadway will be widened to standard width of 24 feet, drainage structures will be repaired and enlarged, and all narrow cattle guards will be replaced with guards 20 feet wide, constructed of creosoted timbers and 40-pound railroad rails.

The general alignment of the road will be bettered by changing the line in places to eliminate curves and by reducing the curvature at other points. This improvement is another step in the Highway Department's plan to bring the main state highways up to the standard requirements of present day traffic.

As a part of the State Highway Department's program, it is requisite on the part of maintenance employees to report all accidents on the highways. The reports embrace the following information: Date of accident, Location, cause (Whether speeding, intoxication, incompetence, recklessness, defective vehicle, fault of road, etc.), condition of road at place of accident (State if tangent, curve, railroad crossing, high fill, etc.)

The information so submitted is collected and analyzed by the Department and where the cause of accident is clearly one of road design, or where accidents occur repeatedly at a certain location, the cause is determined and, if possible, removed.

**TIMELY THOUGHT FOR THIS SEASON**  
**Con Year's Ledger for Cause for Gratitude.**

By a careful and painstaking application of those methods which have been found to be best adapted to the particular needs of the enterprise concerned, an annual appraisal or inventory of both assets and liabilities is made by every properly conducted business. Account is taken of all tangible and intangible resources, including stocks, accounts and bills receivable, and of what is written down in the ledger as good will. The occasion is not one observed merely as an opportunity for surveying what has been accomplished during the year just passed, or during many years of varying successes or disappointments, but more specially for the purpose of shaping the policies and activities to be followed and pursued in the immediate future.

The wise and prudent individual who realizes the importance of looking carefully to the management and conduct of his affairs knows from day to day the approximate value of his tangible assets. But perhaps he does not as continually keep before himself the realization of the true value of that protection which is vouchsafed by what, despite all that may be said or charged to the contrary, is a common regard for and obedience to that higher law which conscience and true brotherhood dictate. Perhaps he is prone also to forget that among these more or less intangible assets there may be found intangible but binding liabilities in the form of due bills payable in kind. There is an inescapable obligation for this service rendered, based upon the binding consideration of "value received," though that has not been formally or legally expressed in the contract.

Blessings Taken for Granted.  
 It is well, therefore, that all of us, no matter what our station or occupation, at this season set apart for national thanksgiving, while expressing appreciation for bountiful temporal blessings bestowed, pause while thought is given to what might be the condition, individually and nationally, were we deprived of the continuing assurance of that benign protection the source of which we seem sometimes to forget. From year to year we read the profound announcement that during the twelve months past the American nation has been the grateful recipient of a bounty liberally bestowed. The form, though not the words, has become almost stereotyped. The people of the United

States would regard with amazement a statement to the effect that for some unexpected reason the full measure of their blessings had not been forthcoming. They could not easily be convinced that while they are prepared to observe Thanksgiving day and once a year acknowledge their gratitude, at least superficially, they have not paid their obligation in full.

**Balance Private Ledgers.**  
 The truly receptive attitude of a people or a nation is determined by its attitude of thought. It has been truthfully observed that it is only by giving that room is made for that which we desire and which we should receive. This is as true in the realm of government under a social democracy as in individual affairs. Standards which have been established and which are accounted desirable can be maintained and protected only as they are fostered and supported by an overwhelming weight of popular thought or sentiment. All loyal and patriotic citizens profess, while giving thanks for material blessings received, to be thankful that their lot has been cast among a law-abiding and justice-loving people. On this day of annual thanksgiving, as we take account of all that has been bestowed, it would be well for all alike to examine our own private ledgers to discover just how much, in cheerful obedience to the rules and standards which we have voluntarily set up, has been ungrudgingly given to our own and our neighbors' cause.—Christian Science Monitor.

**Slaughter of Whales Has Brought Protest**

Wholesale slaughter of whales by Norwegian fleets in the Ross sea is being protested by naturalists and scientists of Australia and New Zealand, who say that continuation of the practice will mean the extinction of whales.

A proposal to call an international convention to regulate the killing is being considered.

It is reported that two Norwegian ships operating from Stewart Island in the Ross sea in the latter part of 1922 and the early months of 1923 captured 700 whales, yielding \$2,500,000 worth of oil, and that another ship, with Hobart as its base, took about 50,000 barrels of whale oil to Norway.

It is estimated that 1,500 whales were killed in the last year. The territory is under the jurisdiction of New Zealand, which receives a royalty on the oil.
