Call For County Convention

A delegate convention of the Republicans of Lincoln County, New Mexico, is hereby called to meet at Capitan, New Mexico, on the 7th day of April, 1928, at the hour of 2 o'clock p. m. of the said day, for the purpose of selecting 15 delegates to the Republican State Convention which convenes at Santa Fe, New Mexico, on the 14th day of April, 1928, at 11 o'clock a. m. The purpose of this State Convention is to select 9 delegates and 9 alternates to the National Republican Convention which is to convene at Kansas City, in the State of Missouri, at 11 o'clock a. m., on Tuesday, June 12, 1928 for the purpose of nominating a candidate for President and Vice President to be voted for at the election to be held on Tuesday, the 6th day of November, 1928.

The several precincts of Lincoln County shall be entitled to representation at the said county convention, of one delegate for every 10 votes or major fraction thereof cast for Governor R. G. Dillon at the election held in November, 1926, as follows, to-wit:

Precinct primaries for the purpose of selecting delegates to the Convention at Capitan will be held on Saturday, March 31, at a time and place to be selected by the Precinct Chairmen and notice of said primaries shall be posted, by the Precinct Chairmen, in one or more conspicuous places in the Precinct, not less than one week previous to the date of such primary.

Proxies for delegates to the said County Convention shall be governed by the same rules and regulations as adopted by the Republican State Central Committee, and as provided therein, no person should be permitted to hold more than 5 proxies of delegates to the county convention and any person holding any proxy of such delegate, must be a resident of the county where the delegate or delegates giving the proxy reside and from which they have been selected delegates.

Improved Uniform International Sunday School Lesson

Lesson for March 18

JESUS TEACHES SINCERITY

LESSON TEXT—Mark 7:1-23.
GOLDEN TEXT—Keep thy heart with all diligence, for out of it are the issues of life.

PRIMARY TOPIC—Obeying God and Our Parents.
JUNIOR TOPIC—Honoring God and Our Parents.

INTERMEDIATE AND SENIOR TOPIC—Sincerity in Religion.
YOUNG PEOPLE AND ADULT TOPIC—Jesus Denounces Formalism.

1. The Emptiness of Formal Worship (vv. 1-7).

The tendency of the human heart is to depart from the life and to choose the mere form which is calculated to express the life. The traditions and customs adopted by men for the temporary help of the spiritual life frequently are crystallized into laws and made to supersede the laws and institutions of God.

1. The charge against Christ (v. 2). This was that Christ's disciples ate bread with unwashed hands. The charge was not on the basis of physical uncleanness, but their disregard of customs which was to engage in the thorough washing of the hands before eating, as well as washing the pots and vessels.

2. Examples of empty forms (vv. 2-4).

(1) Washing of the hands before eating (v. 3). They not only washed their hands often but diligently and intensely.

(2) Washing of cups, tables, pots and brazen vessels. The ceremonial washing applied to the vessels as well as the hands.

3. Explanation demanded by the Pharisees (v. 5). They asked Christ to explain why His disciples ignored the tradition of the elders with reference to ceremonial cleansing.

4. Christ's answer (vv. 6, 7). He declared that worship which centered in forms was an empty and meaningless as was lip service where the heart was away from God. This He calls hypocrisy, even such as foretold by Isaiah, the prophet. Men of his day made much of external observance and of religious rites, while their hearts remained unchanged.

II. Making the Word of God of None Effect (vv. 8-13).

1. How it may be done (v. 8). It was done by punctiliously observing the precepts of man, such as washing of the hands, pots, etc., while ignoring the commandments of God. "This is being done by those who make much of the externalities of religion but at the same time are indifferent to the moral requirements."

2. An instance cited (vv. 9-13).

The law of God as given by Moses said, "Honor thy father and thy mother, and whoso curseth father or mother, let him die the death; but ye say, if a man shall say to his father or mother, it is Corban, that is to say, a gift, by whatsoever thou mightest be profited by me, he shall be free, and ye suffer him no more to do ought for his father or his mother." The law of God demands of children that they care and provide for parents in their need. According to an accepted tradition among the Jews, if a man should consecrate his goods or possessions to the Lord's service by pronouncing over them the word "Corban," which means "the gift," his goods would be thus dedicated to God, and would not be available for help to his parents. It was possible, therefore, for a man to be enjoying wealth while his parents were in destitution.

III. The Real Source of Defilement and Impurity (vv. 14-23).

1. Sin is moral and spiritual. Uncleanness before God is not of the body save as the body is directed by the soul. A man is not defiled by that which enters his mouth but by that which springs out of his soul.

2. That which springs out of the heart—the deliberate choice of the will—is the source of defilement (v. 20).

3. A list of evils springing out of the heart (vv. 21, 22). The awful list is as follows:

Evil thoughts, adulteries, fornications, murders, thefts, covetousness, wickedness, deceit, lasciviousness, an evil eye, blasphemy, pride, foolishness, which all come from within. This catalogue includes every possible form of evil. Every one of them originate in the heart and when they become acts of the will and life they defile the man. It is only when temptations and solicitations lead to indulgence by the deliberate act of the will that they corrupt a man.

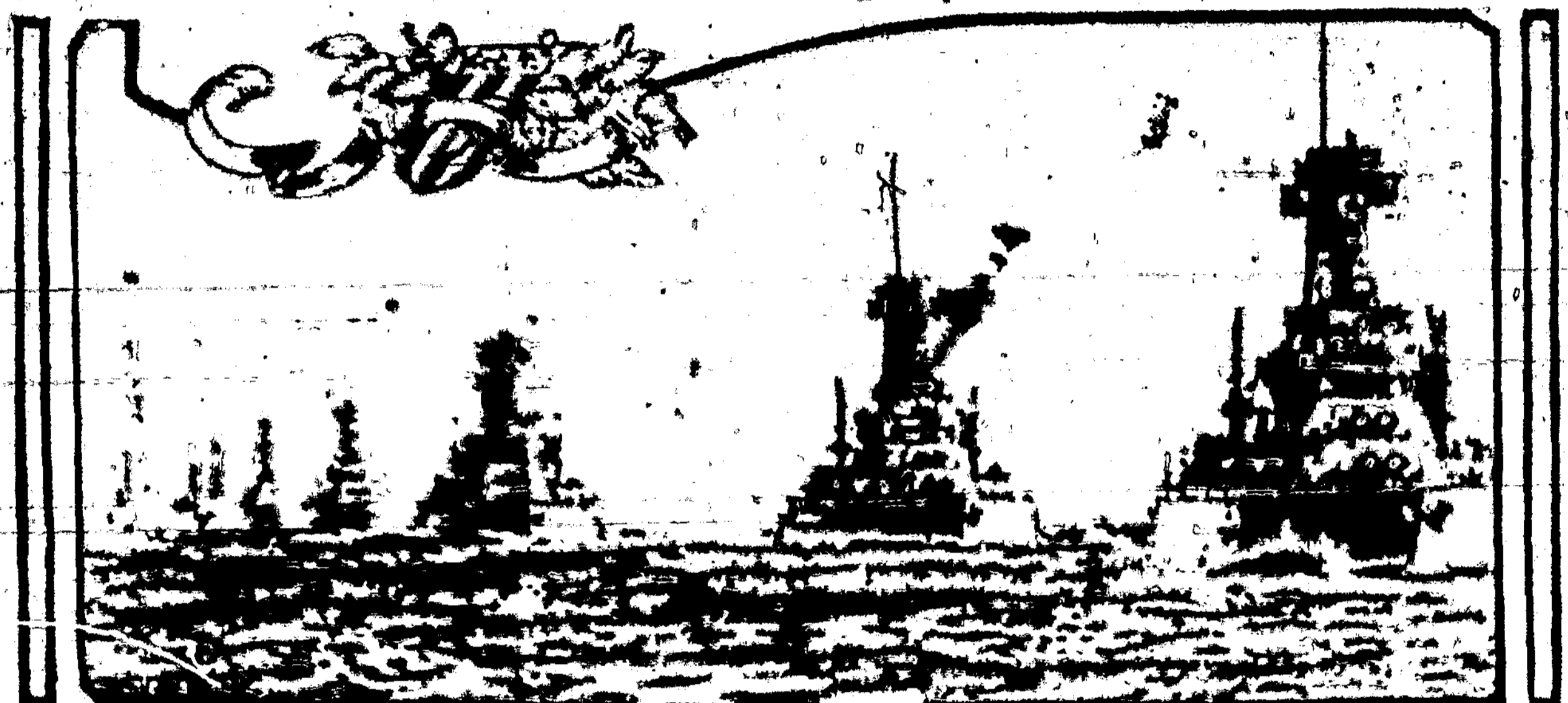

Minnesota State Societies at Los Angeles



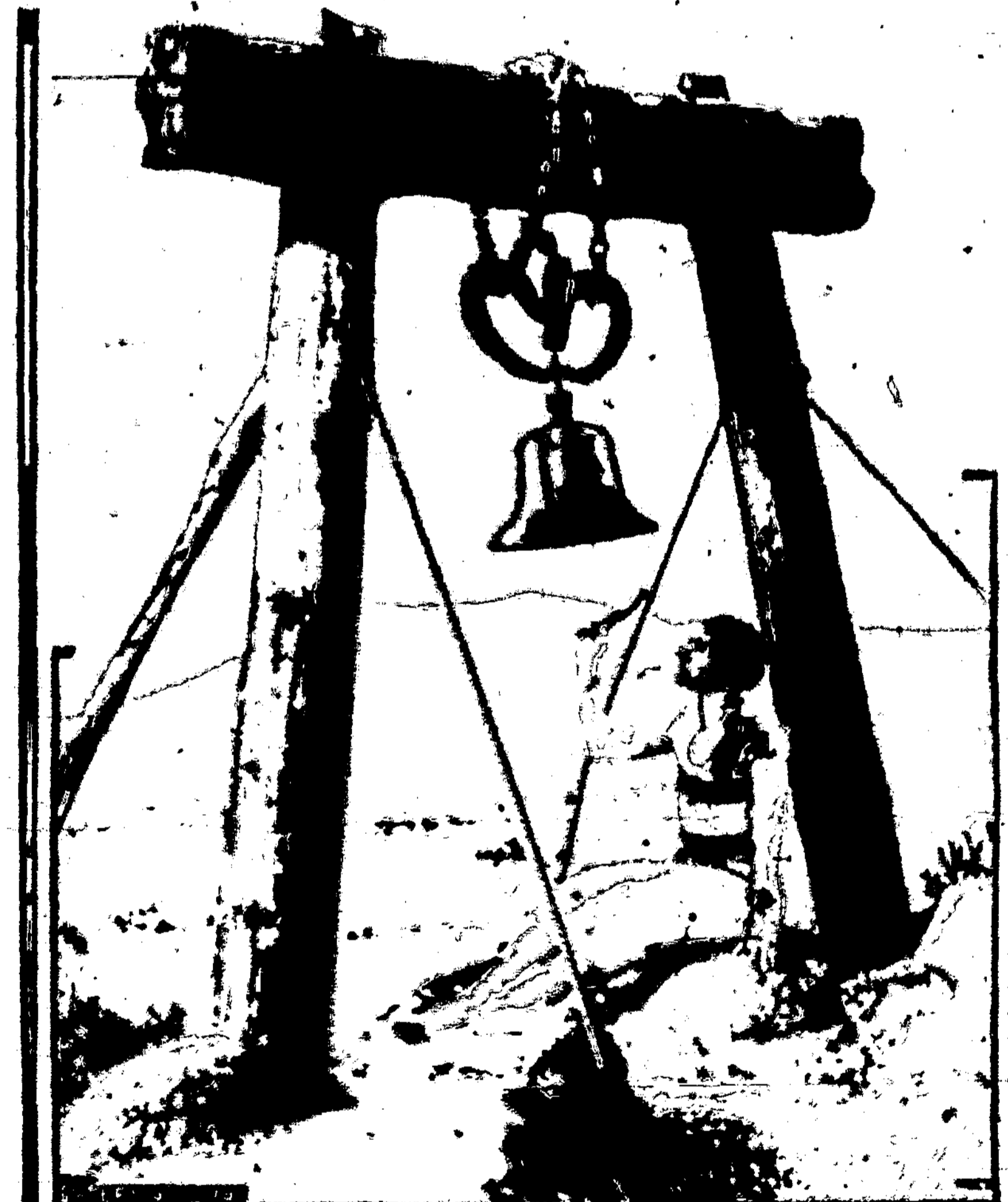

SHARK BAIT



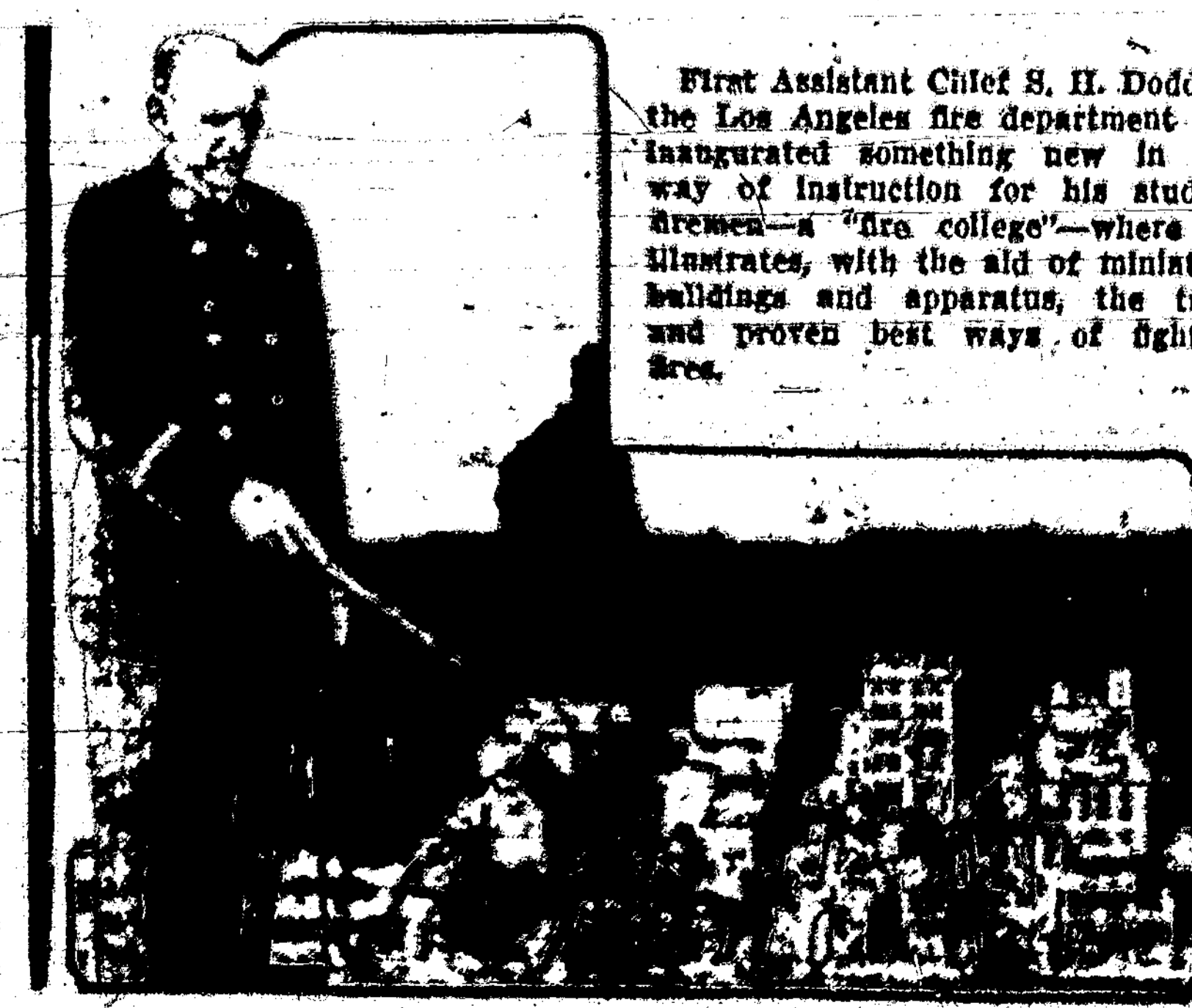

EDITORIAL COLUMN

Tariff: Defender of Our Prosperity

It becomes increasingly evident that if the tariff bars were removed, or its rates greatly decreased, we would be projected into a period of industrial upheaval.

Our American workers, with their high wages and good living conditions, would be forced to drop to the level of workmen in any country which happened to place a competing product in the American market.

A peculiar side to the situation is the belief that downward revision of tariff rates would effect farm-reliefs, on the grounds that many farm necessities now carry more than their value in duty.

What is not so evident, is that although the farmer might save on a few commodities, he would be forced to compete with foreign products in open market, unprotected by tariff, and his position would be much the same as that of the industrial worker.

In spite of political theories and promises the farmers and workers of America, representing our principal buying power would find that tariff dismembering would have dangerous consequences.

Cross - Country Rider

Paul C. Lienhart, cross-country rider, came through Carrizozo last week on his way to Los Angeles.

He left New York Dec. 13, 1927, and has made the trip so far on horseback, without any mishaps whatever.

It seems that others have made the same attempt, but were disqualified by taking trains for part of the distance, and at other times they sneaked rides for certain distances in automobiles.

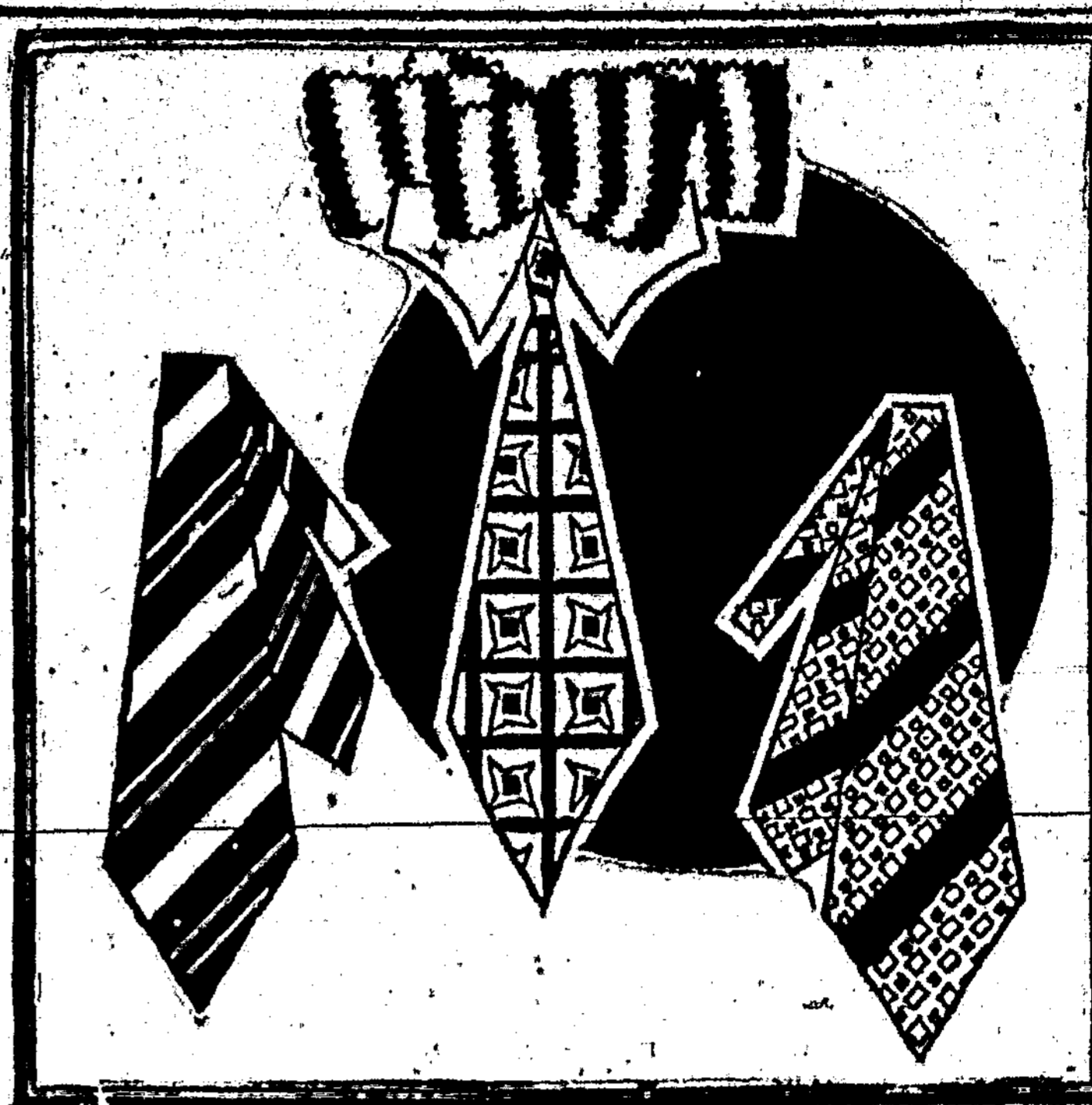
