



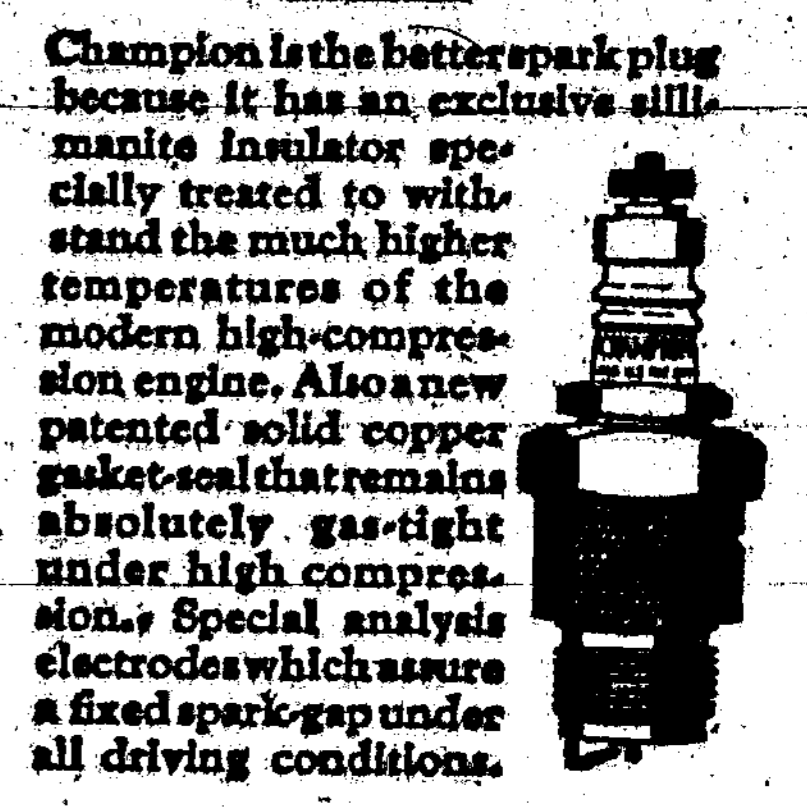

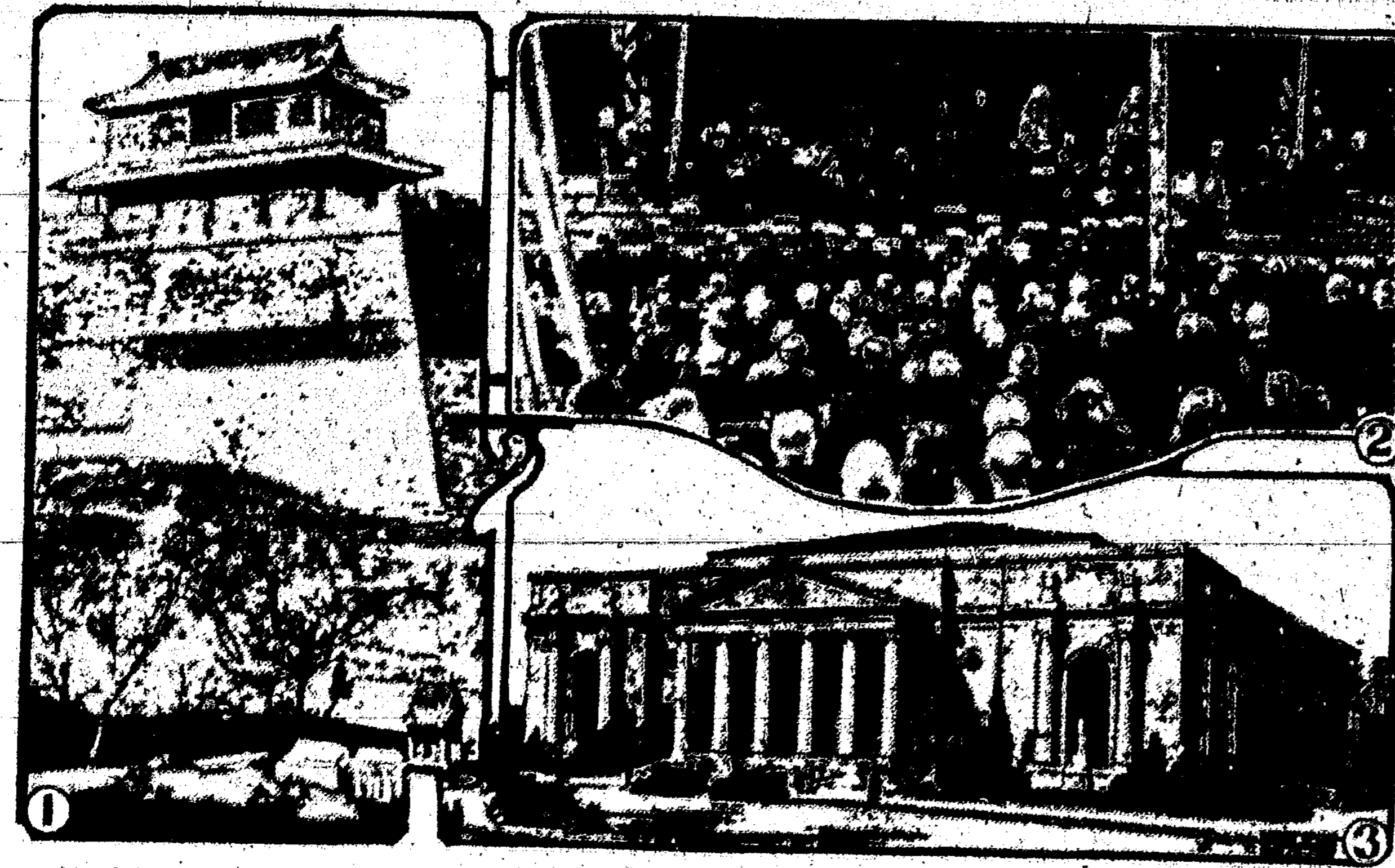

NEWS REVIEW OF CURRENT EVENTS

Signing of Flood Control Bill Stimulates the Mississippi Valley.

PEOPLE of the lower Mississippi valley threw up their hats and cheered when the news was flashed over the country that President Coolidge had signed the flood control bill and made it part of the law of the land.

Under the provisions of the act a board of three is to make recommendations to the President in connection with the adjustment of engineering differences between the Jadwin plan and the Mississippi river commission plan for flood control.

The bill centers authority in the hands of the President and the army engineers. Actual construction work will be handled by the present Mississippi river commission under the direction of the secretary of war and the supervision of the chief of engineers.

TWO more big pieces of legislation were put up to the President when the senate adopted the conference reports on the farm relief and merchant marine bills.

NOTHING happened last week to change the prediction of the Hoover and Smith backers that their respective walkways in the Republican and Democratic national conventions,

Indeed, these predictions were strengthened, for Hoover gained 21 and perhaps 23 delegates in New Jersey and 14 in Alabama, and Smith garnered 44 from New Jersey, Vermont and Montana.

The New York governor, according to his supporters, already is assured of 603 1/2 votes on the first ballot at Houston, or within 50 of the necessary two-thirds.

Hoover's certainty of nomination is more open to discussion and is especially disputed by Lowden and his followers.

Secretary of the Treasury Mellon, addressing the Pennsylvania delegation, created a sensation by giving Hoover as his choice for the nomination provided President Coolidge could not be persuaded to run again.

CHIHANG KAI-SHIK, leader of the Chinese Nationalists, rejected Marshal Chang's proposed truce in the civil war for the purpose of uniting against Japanese aggression.

PREMIER BRATIANO of Rumania denies his enemies, and has told parliament that his cabinet has no intention of resigning or heeding out of the demands of the peasants.

D. R. GUSTAV STRESEMANN, foreign minister of Germany, lay almost at the point of death most of last week, but at latest reports his condition showed a little improvement.

SECRETARY OF STATE KELLOGG's anti-war treaty plan was warmly endorsed by the British house of lords when it unanimously adopted Lord Reading's resolution calling on the government for "prompt, favorable consideration of these proposals."

REDS from sixteen countries, including the United States, attended a Communist convention at Cascel, Germany, held under the auspices of the Third International and presided over by a nephew of Rykoff.

ANNOUNCEMENT is made by the Fairchild Aerial Camera corporation that it has built for the army air corps an aerial camera with a range of eight miles, designed to photograph areas as large as four square miles.

FASCISM's new electoral law was passed by the Italian senate. It reforms the chamber of deputies and abolishes democratic popular suffrage.

UNCLE SAM is going into the business of manufacturing and disposing of fixed nitrate and electric power, if the Morin resolution adopted by the house is accepted by the senate.

GUILTY on two charges of imprudent and unministerial conduct and suspended permanently from exercising the functions of a bishop was the verdict of the Methodist Episcopal ecclesiastical court in the case of Bishop Anton East of Copenhagen.

Blabee's street railway system may be replaced by a motor bus line by July 1.

Charles Schoepf was chosen mayor at Deming by members of the newly elected city council.

Citizens of Artesia, N. M., are planning to stage a huge celebration June 13, at which time the Pecos Valley Gas company is expected to have the gas line from the field to Artesia completed.

James E. Noble, Jr., of Sanitarium, Miss., won the \$5,000 first prize and Clarence A. Crosby of Phoenix the Arizona prize in the slogan contest sponsored by lumber dealers of the United States.

Approval by District Judge Numa C. Frenger of the sale of the assets of the defunct Farmers and Stockmen's bank at Estancia, N. M., to the Albuquerque Finance corporation, has been announced.

Four annual farm women's camps are to be held in New Mexico starting in June at or near Las Vegas, Albuquerque, Tyrone and Ruidoso under the direction of the New Mexico Agricultural college extension service.

A proposed \$4,100,000 bond issue for construction of the Stewart Mountain dam and electrification of the Salt River valley in Arizona has been approved by shareholders of the Salt River Valley Water Users association.

The New Mexico state highway department announced the allotment of \$14,000 additional for road construction. Of this amount \$6,000 is to be matched by McKinley county for the Crown Point-Pueblo Bonito highway.

The industrial employment survey report just released from the office of the U. S. employment source of the U. S. department of labor at Denver states that employment increased in the major industries in Arizona during April, with indications for a continuation of the upward trend throughout May.

Well to make a short story still shorter, the latest fish that can be caught in medium water, that is, half way between salt and fresh and vice versa, is the gefel. **Benefits of Good Roads**

In good roads, as in so many other ways, the United States leads the world.

The splendid, safe highways that are so common to us, would in many other countries be considered miracles. We can cross entire states, and go from coast to coast, without encountering dangerous roads.

No Public Investment Pays Better. A city with good streets is an attraction to industry and home-seekers; our mountain and country highways, aside from their more practical uses, are a constant invitation to investigate new parts. We have come to depend on these good roads and they are now necessities of business and pleasure.

Plans are being made for a highway from this country to South America, to be the longest in the world. The possibilities of such a connection are enormous in building international good-will, in making it easy for foreigners to see and understand the United States, and for us to do the same.

**Railroad Record Deserving of Praise**

The railroads have always been equal to any demands made upon their services. The percentage of increase in investment has been conspicuously larger than the increase in ton-miles.

They have, in recent years, spent an average of 750 million dollars annually in additions and improvements to their properties, all of which has resulted in a steadily bettered service to the public.

It is unfortunate, from a standpoint of public welfare, that certain legislative action has made their progress infinitely more difficult. An example is their pyramiding tax burden, every cent of which must be paid by rates charged to the public.

The La Follette Evaluation Act, a questionable measure, has cost both the government and the railroads many millions of dollars, which is charged to the taxpayer and the traveling public. It inaugurated a task which can be made endless.

If we want lower rates, or still better service, we must all do our part to secure equitable and reasonable taxation which will encourage railroad investments and construction.

Some Welcome Recipes

It may be interesting to study some of the foreign or national soups which are so well liked by these people. German Rice Soup.—Prepare a white roux or sauce with four ounces each of butter and flour.

stock or veal broth and let it simmer on the side of the range for twenty minutes, removing the scum from time to time. Parboil three ounces of rice, drain and add to the soup and let simmer twenty minutes longer.

Russian Cabbage Soup.—Cut into very small squares three medium-sized onions and fry them in three ounces of butter; add one and one-half pounds of sauerkraut and stew together until all moisture is extracted.

Satwina, Polish Soup.—Veal one dozen cooked beets and place in a stone jar with one quart of warm water and one pint of vinegar.

Orange Cookies.—Cream one-half cupful of butter and add one cupful of sugar; blend well, then add alternately one-half cupful of orange juice and three cupfuls of flour sifted with four teaspoonfuls of baking powder and

one-half teaspoonful of salt; add a well beaten egg and the grated rind of an orange. Mix and roll out, cut into any desired shapes, decorate with a bit of candied orange peel and bake.

Use Apricots for Pudding

Dried apricots have many uses before the season for fresh fruits returns. A very good steamed pudding can be made with them.

- 1/2 lb. dried apricots, 1 egg, 1 cup water, 1 cup flour, 1/2 cup butter, 1/4 cup sugar.

Soak the apricots overnight in the water. Drain and cut them into small pieces with scissors. Cream the butter and the sugar, add the beaten eggs and the flour, in which the salt and baking powder have been sifted.

Fried Peanut Salad.—Blanch and chop a cupful of raw peanuts. Place in a frying pan with a tablespoonful of salad oil. Cook until the nuts are delicately browned, sprinkle with salt and cool on brown paper. Meanwhile scald and peel six tomatoes, chill and scoop out the centers or serve them sliced. Arrange on nests of lettuce and fill or heap on the slices of the freshly cooked peanuts.

Pineapple and Cottage Cheese Salad.—Take one cupful of well seasoned cottage cheese to which two tablespoonfuls of thick cream have been added, add a can of crushed pineapple and a cupful of the juice. Heap on lettuce, add salt and garnish with maraschino cherries.

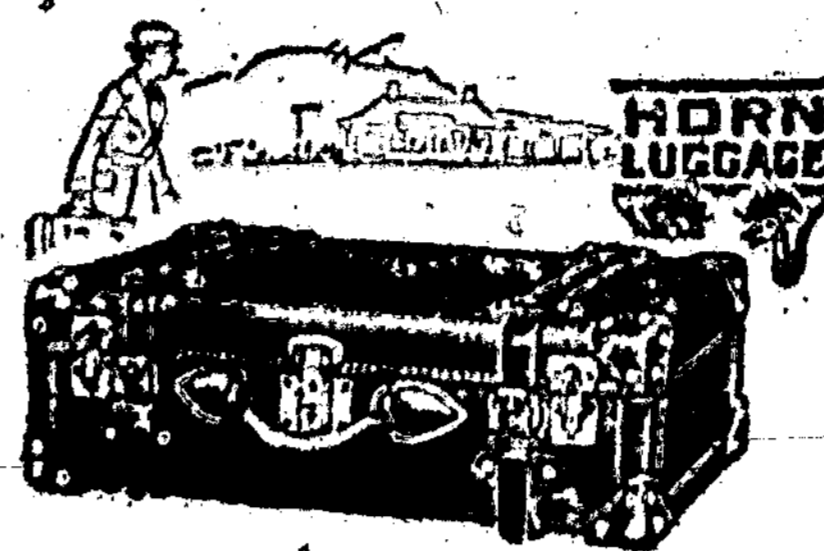
