**The Campaign Yell**

When Richard Hanna delivered the keynote speech at Portales, he found the only evils known in politics in this state or elsewhere were brought about by the Republican party.

According to Hanna, the only rectitude ever known in political management was due to democrats.

If the democratic administration under Hannett was of such holy character and of such benefit to the people of New Mexico, how the electorate was fooled when they overthrew G. W. Hannett and elected Dillon.

One of the funny things in the keynote speech was the eulogy extended to San Miguel county, where there has been considerable advertisement that did not show anything very creditable to the San Miguel democrats, but of course, Harry had to give praise there in hopes of getting that county in the democratic column.

The speech was just in the nature of sadness at the 'terrible condition in the state brought about by Republican administration', but the keynoter failed to show wherein the democratic party had brought about prosperity or advancement during the 4 years of occupancy of the state administration.

Hanna knocked at the protective tariff, but didn't explain what advancing conditions have been brought about by that policy.

The speech was just a typical campaign yell, charging everything imaginable to the Republican party. —Taos News.

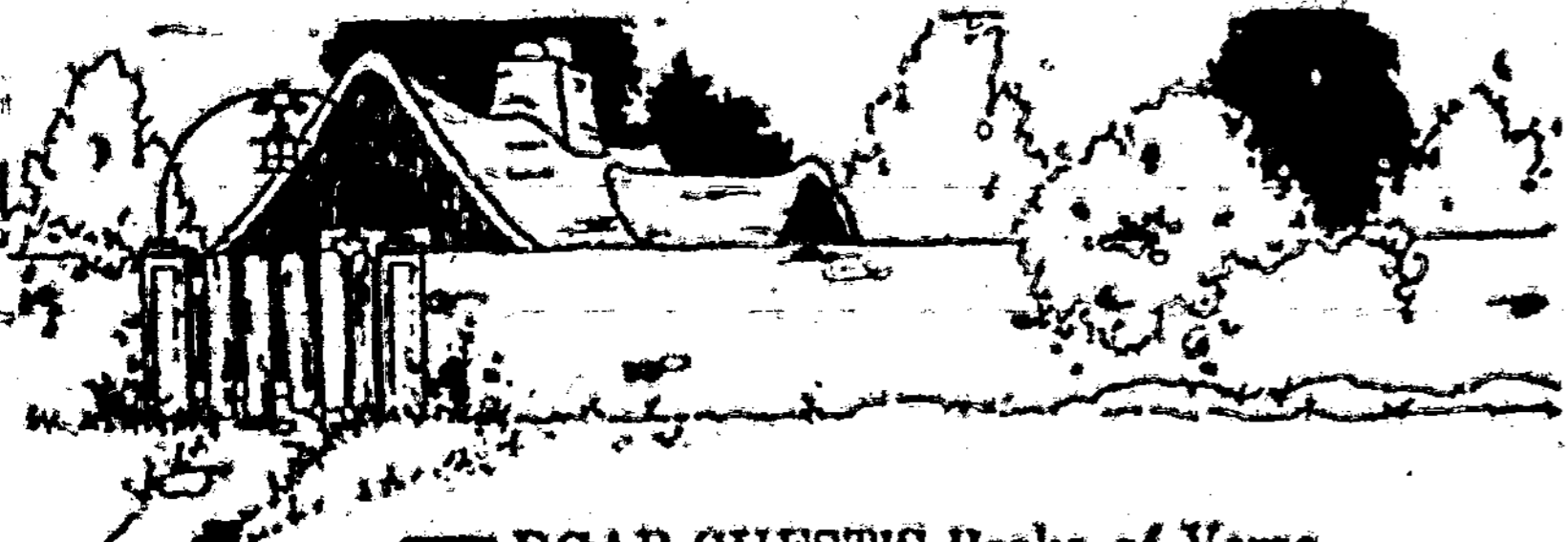

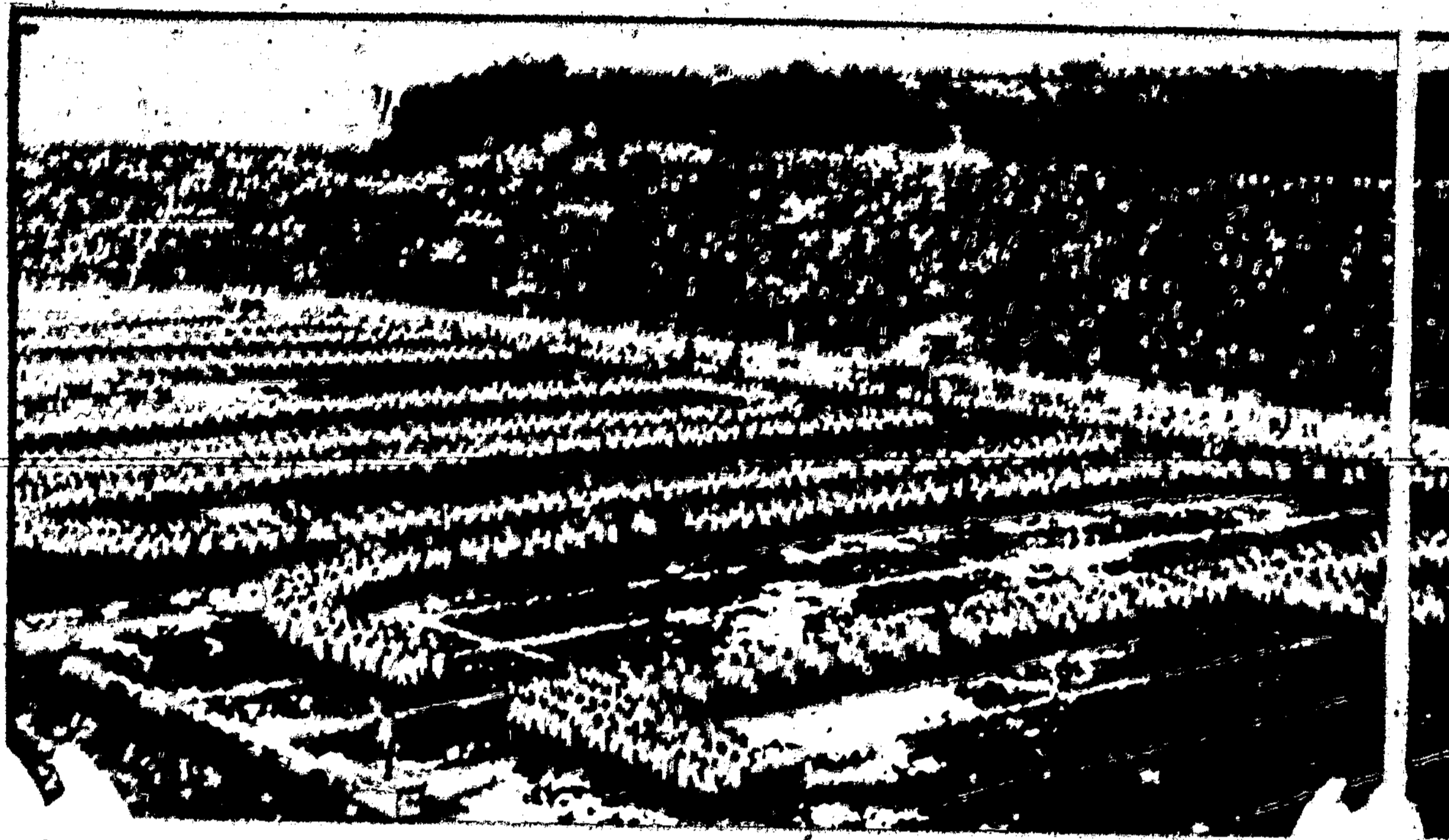
