Oklahoma Papers Out for Hoover

Oklahoma City—E. H. Gaylord, publisher of the Daily Oklahoman and the Oklahoma City Times, two of the largest Democratic newspapers in the state, announced Monday that the papers would support the candidacy of Herbert Hoover, the republican presidential nominee.

The publisher said the newspapers "will not join the republican party, but neither are they going to join a liquor movement."

Mr. Hoover would "waste no useless efforts on prohibition modification," if elected, Mr. Gaylord said. He asserted Gov. Al Smith of New York would "concentrate his efforts on the modification of the Volstead act," and added that the Oklahoman and the Times "will not assist in building up a purely liquor party nor undertake a campaign to overthrow the amendment."

The Tulsa Tribune, another of the larger democratic newspapers of Oklahoma, declared for Hoover almost immediately after his nomination.

Democratic Women Bolting To Hoover

Washington, D. C., Aug. 7.—Promises of support for the Hoover-Curtis ticket are being received daily by Mrs. Alvin T. Hert, director of the women's division of the Republican campaign, from Democratic women who assert that under no circumstances will they support their own party's nominee in this year's election. Many promised not only to vote for Mr. Hoover and Senator Curtis, but to work for them right up to election day, and to contribute financially if necessary.

Outstanding among the Democratic women turning to the Republican national ticket are Nancy Murray Mann of Huntington, W. Va., and Mrs. Gertrude M. Pattangall of Maine, each formerly a Democratic national committeewoman from her state. Mrs. Mann was elected delegate to this year's Houston convention. She received 60,000 votes though she opposed the present Democratic nominee, who carried the state. In a statement announcing she would support Hoover, she says, in part:

EASY TO VOTE FOR HOOVER

"Yes, it is easy to vote for Herbert Hoover, for American womanhood knew, admired and loved Hoover for all his fine qualities of administration and leadership in time of the strain and stress of our nation. Her clear vision of the man she came to reverence and trust, cannot be blinded or clouded by any political propaganda or political partisanship.

"It is easy for the womanhood of our nation to turn instinctively to Herbert Hoover. Outstanding Democratic women all over our land listened anxiously all during the Kansas City convention with a prayer in their hearts for the nomination of Hoover so that if the inevitable happened, we would have a safe harbor for our suffrage."

Mrs. Patangall, in announcing her support of the Hoover-Curtis ticket, said she considered her action entirely within her rights as a Democrat.

"The Houston convention adopted a platform satisfactory to the Democrats who believe in prohibition," she said. "The party's nominee and the chairman of the national committee have repudiated that platform."

ANOTHER ONE

Another woman formerly prominent in Democratic circles but now supporting the Republican ticket is Mrs. Ada Orme Dupuy of Washington, D. C. She served with the Democratic national committee in 1924 and has been one of the leading organizers of women in that party.

Working independently, she recently formed a Democratic "Women for Hoover" Club, with representatives from 12 states present. They passed resolutions declaring the Democratic nominee was "forced" on his party, and that his "training and narrow political experience leave him quite unqualified to cope with national and international problems."

A typical letter from among those from the rank and file of Democratic women was sent out by Mrs. F. Moore, 2630 E. 24th street, Brooklyn, N. Y. "My people have always been Democrats," she wrote, "but I could not possibly vote for the Democratic candidate. I hope and pray that Mr. Hoover will be our next president."

All-Year School Would Have Tendency to Lower Number of Failures

CHILDREN live day by day. They are not born to suit school terms. They do not cease growth in June or begin in September.

As schools pass from irrational to rational living conditions, we shall destroy much of this rigid administrative machinery we have created and replace it by flexible regrading and reclassifying procedures that will bring our regimental regrouping into some sane relationships to our knowledge of individual differences.

Psychologists know the permanent evil results produced in children when partial failure compels pupils over long time periods to repeat work that has lost its interest.

Parents know the unhappy children indifferently performing bore-some school work.

Taxpayers do not know the tremendous cost of re-educating failure. School financial statements conceal such costs.

Changing five or ten-month terms to three months and operating school districts twelve months increases educational opportunity, increases service, produces more successes, reduces overhead, reduces failure and makes education a full-time job.

The health of children and teachers is better, for vacations may be taken during any three months. A real correlation of health and vacation between business, home and school, is made when recreation is not limited to two summer months.

Environment of Home and School Molds All for Better or for Worse

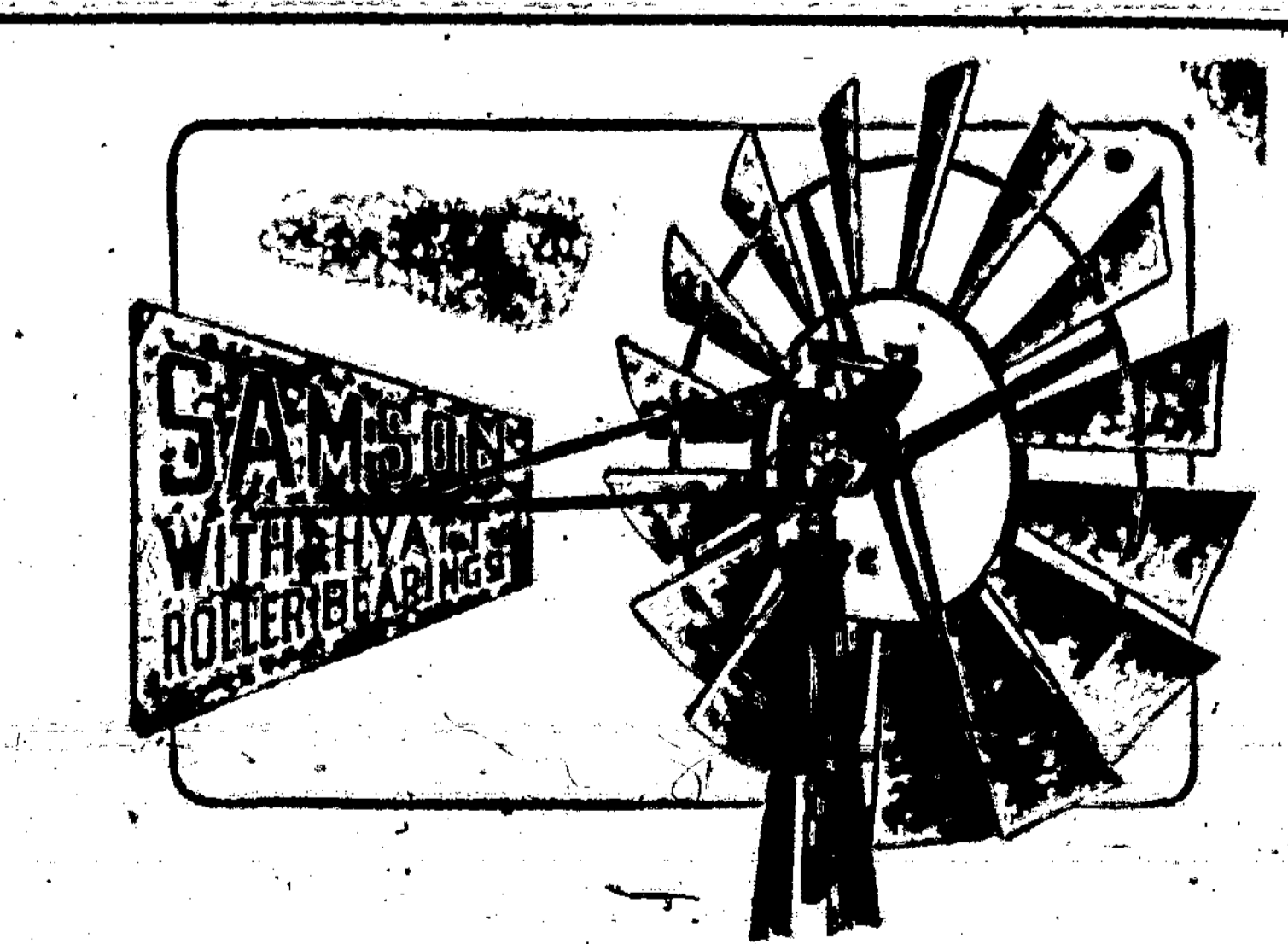

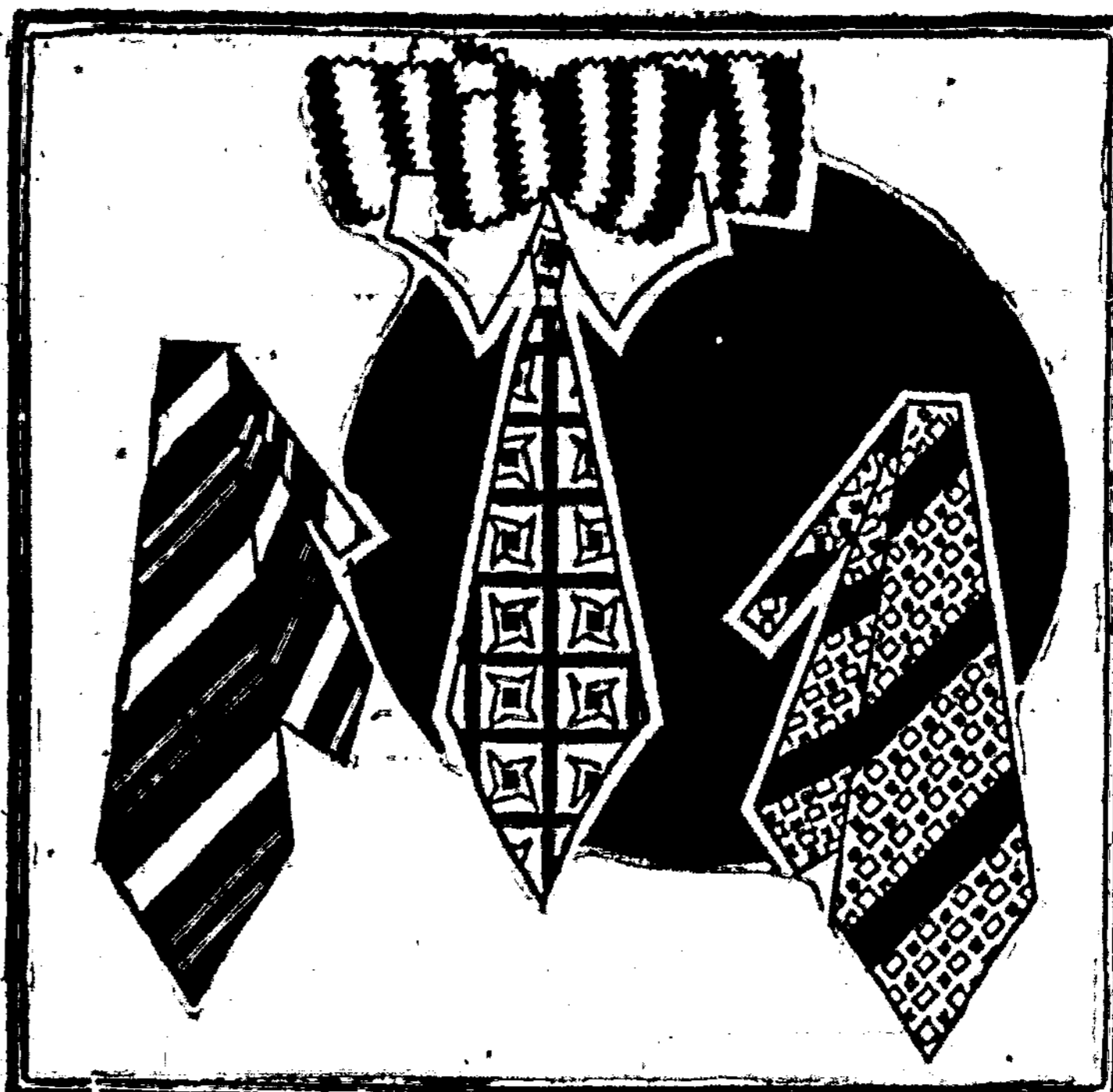
