Expense

Cash prizes \$110.00, carnival supplies \$9.39, musicians 76.00, hot dog stand 101.99, lumber 69.80, basketball referees 50.00, printing, postage and stationery 45.50, miscellaneous supplies 73.09, express and dray 32.16, labor (total expense 659.78), net 762.76, total expense 1422.54.

The published statement of the 1927 Fair showed net \$798.68. Bills for labor, \$3.85, soda 27.00, ptg. 1.30, lumber 3.77, subsequently presented reduced this to \$762.76.

This statement for the 1928 Fair will be changed very little by the payment of any bills out or sales made of stuff on hand. The financial statement will be audited by the Chamber of Commerce. Reports of the Track events and the exhibits will be published in another issue of the paper.

Considering the condition of the roads this Fair has surpassed all expectations. The net receipts will be applied on the expense of the improvements now going on at the Community Hall.

The management desires to thank all who assisted to handle the various departments so efficiently and carefully. To our out-of-town visitors, we can only say that we greatly enjoyed your stay and cordially invite you back next year.—Management of Lincoln County Fair.

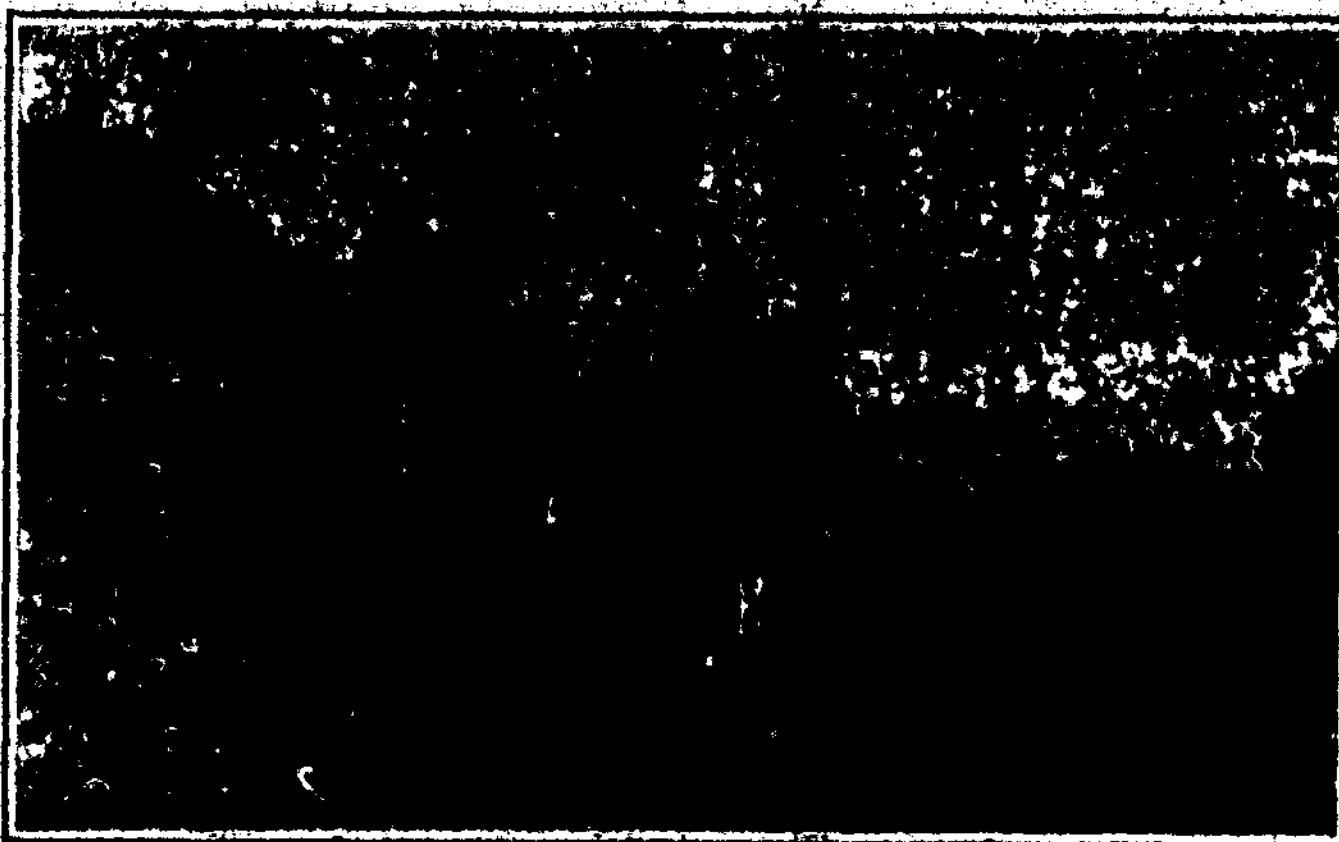
S. G. Allen Home from San Francisco

EDITORIAL COLUMN

Twilight of the Campaign

As the twilight begins to deepen on the present campaign, several things are noticeable which differ far from those of previous campaign years.

First, and we might say foremost, is the record-breaking registration of the women voters. Since suffrage was declared, many good, whole-souled mothers refrained from registering and voting because they still entertained the time-worn opinion that women were out of place in voting, but this time, women's organizations over the country have been extremely active in inducing those of their numbers to register, and by effective argument, have totaled up an alarming registration, never before known in history.

What it will mean, we are not prepared to predict, other than to say the women will vote for what they believe to be just and right.

Politicians have, in the past, changed conditions by fraudulent methods, but in the case of the women voters it is impossible.

All the political schemes in the world will never swerve the woman voter from the path she thinks is right. Then follows the question, "what is right?"

We certainly cannot believe that women, mothers, daughters, will vote for the nullification of the 18th Amendment to the Constitution, and supplant it with the inauguration of a law that will allow states to be wet or dry, contrary to the spirit of the Democratic platform adopted at Houston and denounced by Gov. Al Smith when he instituted a plank for himself.

Aside from this, he advocates 10 other things which we believe would alone defeat him.

Talk the matter over with yourself -- and see where this enormous vote will go.

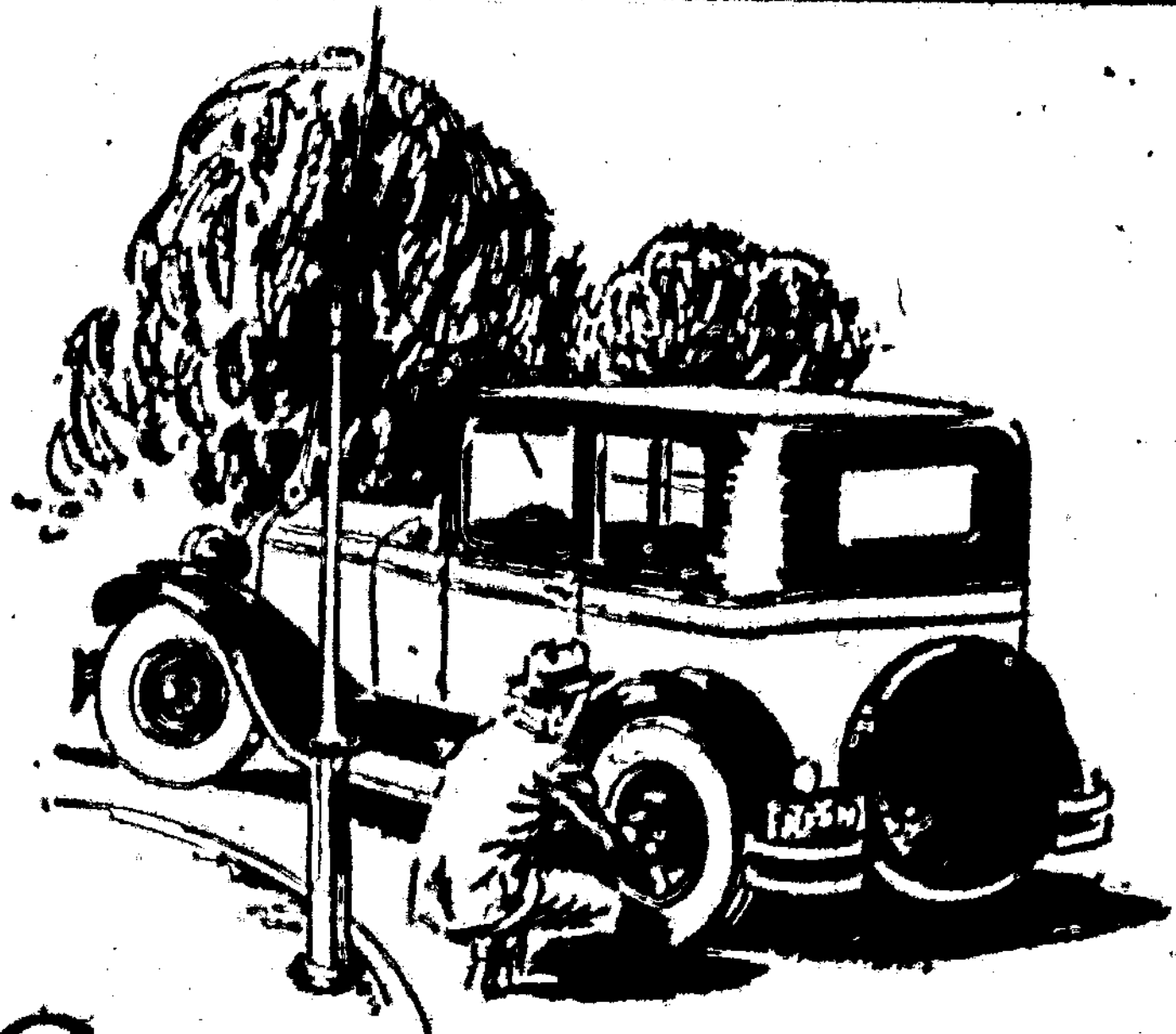

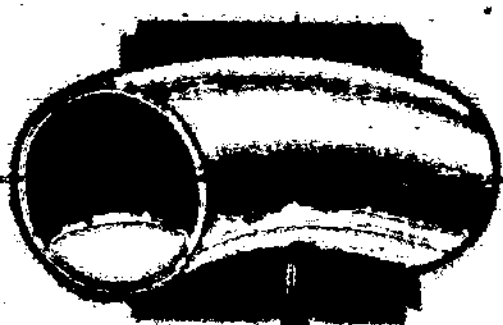

Voters of Both Parties-- VOTE IN FAVOR OF This Amendment on November 6

Voters of Both Parties-- VOTE IN FAVOR OF This Amendment on Nov. 6

We have been leasing oil and gas lands under laws made for grazing lands. We have leased, under the administration of both parties, with the approval of the legislature and the state courts, over two million acres of such lands under these laws. Now with real oil development about to begin in our state, a question has been raised as to the validity of these leases and activity is hanging in the balance until we can confirm them.

This amendment has the approval of the Congress of the United States. It will allow our legislature to pass an act to regulate the manner of leasing. The revenue will continue to go to the schools. If it should fail to pass, some two million acres of land are likely to be tied up in litigation for a long period of years and returns from new leases and renewals come to a standstill.

"Leases and other contracts reserving a royalty to the state for the development and production of any and all minerals on lands granted or confirmed to the State of New Mexico by the Act of Congress of June 20, 1910, entitled 'An Act to enable the people of New Mexico to form a constitution and state government and be admitted into the Union on an equal footing with the original states' may be made under such provisions relating to the necessity or requirement for, or the mode and manner of, appraisal, advertising and competitive bidding, and containing such terms and provisions as may be provided by Act of the Legislature; the rentals, royalties and other proceeds therefrom to be applied and conserved in accordance with the provisions of the said Act of Congress for the support or in aid of common schools or for the attainment of the respective purposes for which the several grants were made."


