Speaking of the O'Fallon railroad decision, the Manufactures say:

The O'Fallon railroad decision, which has just been handed down by the Supreme Court and holds that reproduction costs must be considered in the making of transportation rates, has been misunderstood in a great many quarters.

It will not raise freight rate two billion dollars a year, as one report stated, or increase the railroads' valuation 10 or 20 billion dollars.

The Supreme Court has not held that reproduction costs must be the sole basis for rate making; it has decided that they must be "considered."

The railroads have never asked for exorbitant rates, and during the last few years they have not even made the fair return allowed by the Transportation Act.

What the O'Fallon decision should do is to allow the railroads to earn a fair return on a reasonable valuation, so that they may build for the future and provide the high standards of transportation the public demands and considers necessary.

EDITORIAL COLUMN

Would Save the Forests

Again, as before, a great protest has gone forth against allowing the timber in the Sacramento mountains to be sold and efforts are being made to prevent any further destruction of the pines in the vicinity of Cloudcroft. Those who are making the protests have good and sufficient grounds for so doing, by putting in the claim that it is spoiling the great beauty of the mountain scenery and depriving people of recreation grounds where they may spend the summer seasons in rest, and seclusion.

Be this as it may, the protest will fall short of effect, because of the fact that big contracts have been let to the lumber companies for the timber and to cease operations at this time would be in violation of the contracts and place the government in an embarrassing position.

We do not know how large these contracts are, but we presume that they are perhaps large enough to consume the greater part of most choice selections of the forest, which will leave a small amount of timber for shade.

Again, will the protesting parties will have a job on their hands to interfere with existing contracts. All that can be done, it would seem, would be to further contracts from being awarded, which might leave a little or nothing to save.

In these contracts, the lumber companies see that all necessary ground is covered, as for instance in a timber grant in Michigan some forty years ago, the grant made mention that space for a road through the forest would be included and as no width was mentioned, the lumber company made a road 20 miles in width, which was a great joke on the government. We are not presuming that there exists a "colored gentleman in the fuel pile" in the Sacramento grants, but we do know that the lumber companies are not getting the worst of it. Year after year, these protests arise, but after investigating the matter, the storm blows over—wonder why?

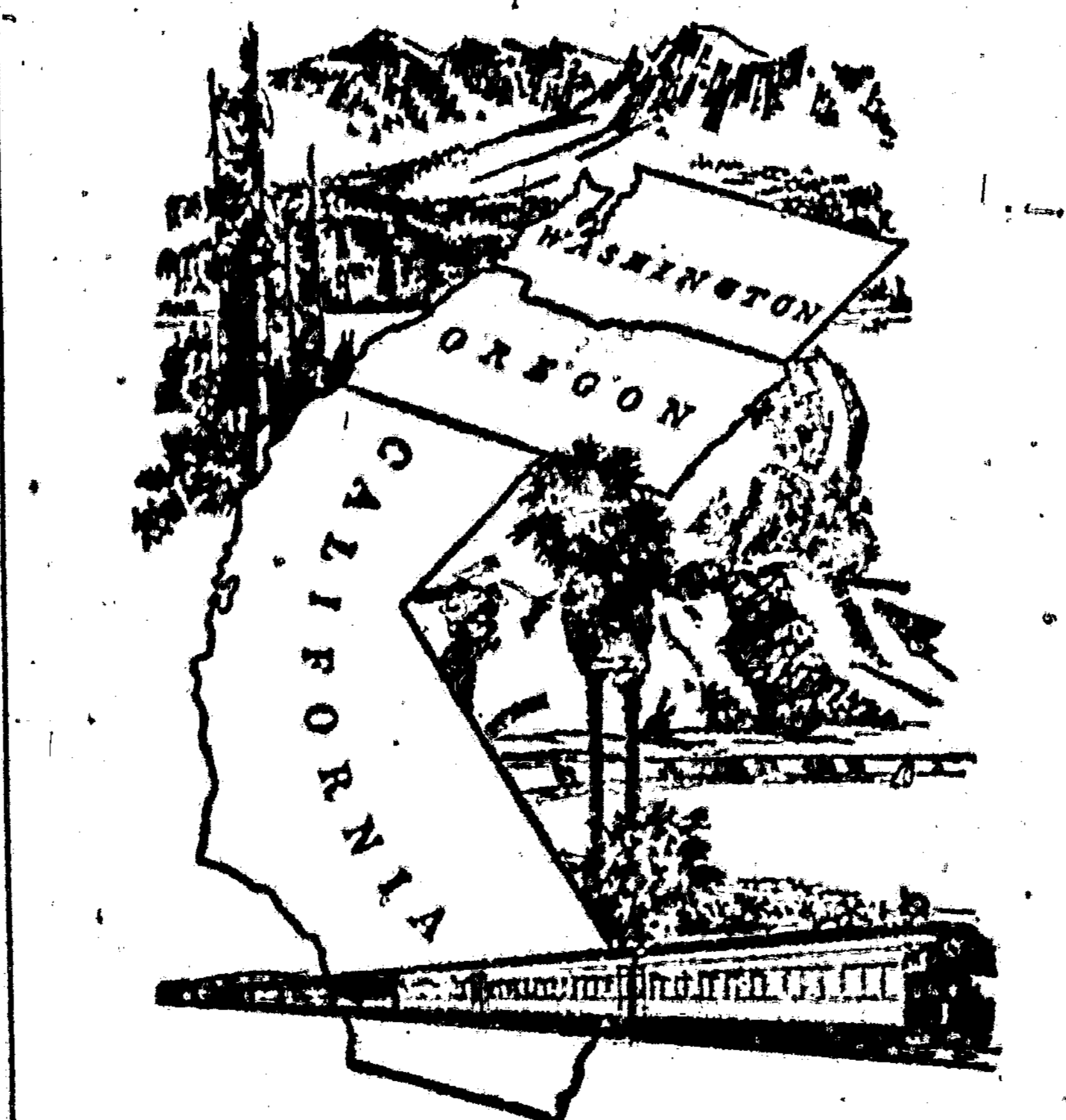

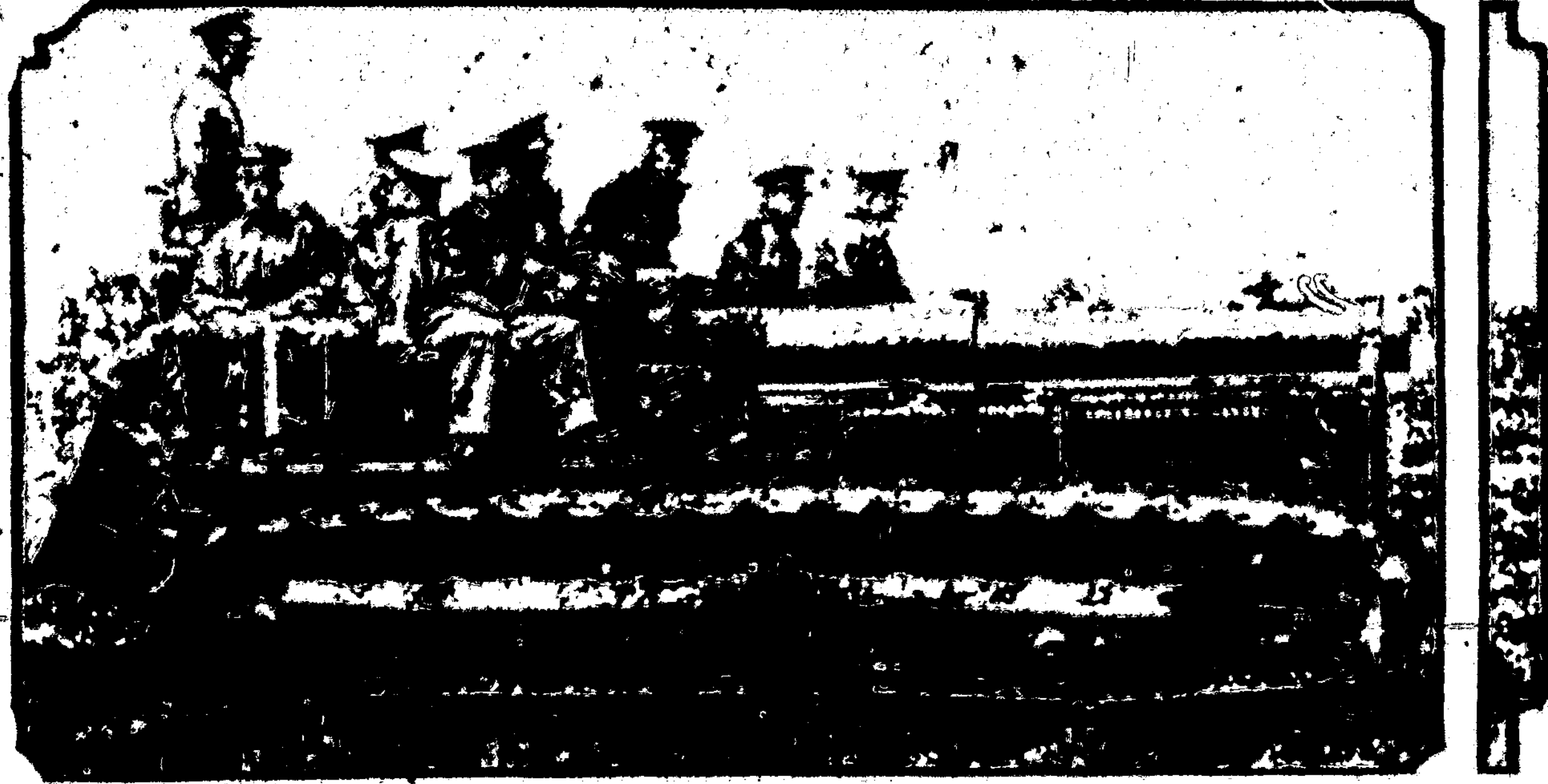

Cadets Ride on New Tractor Gun Mount



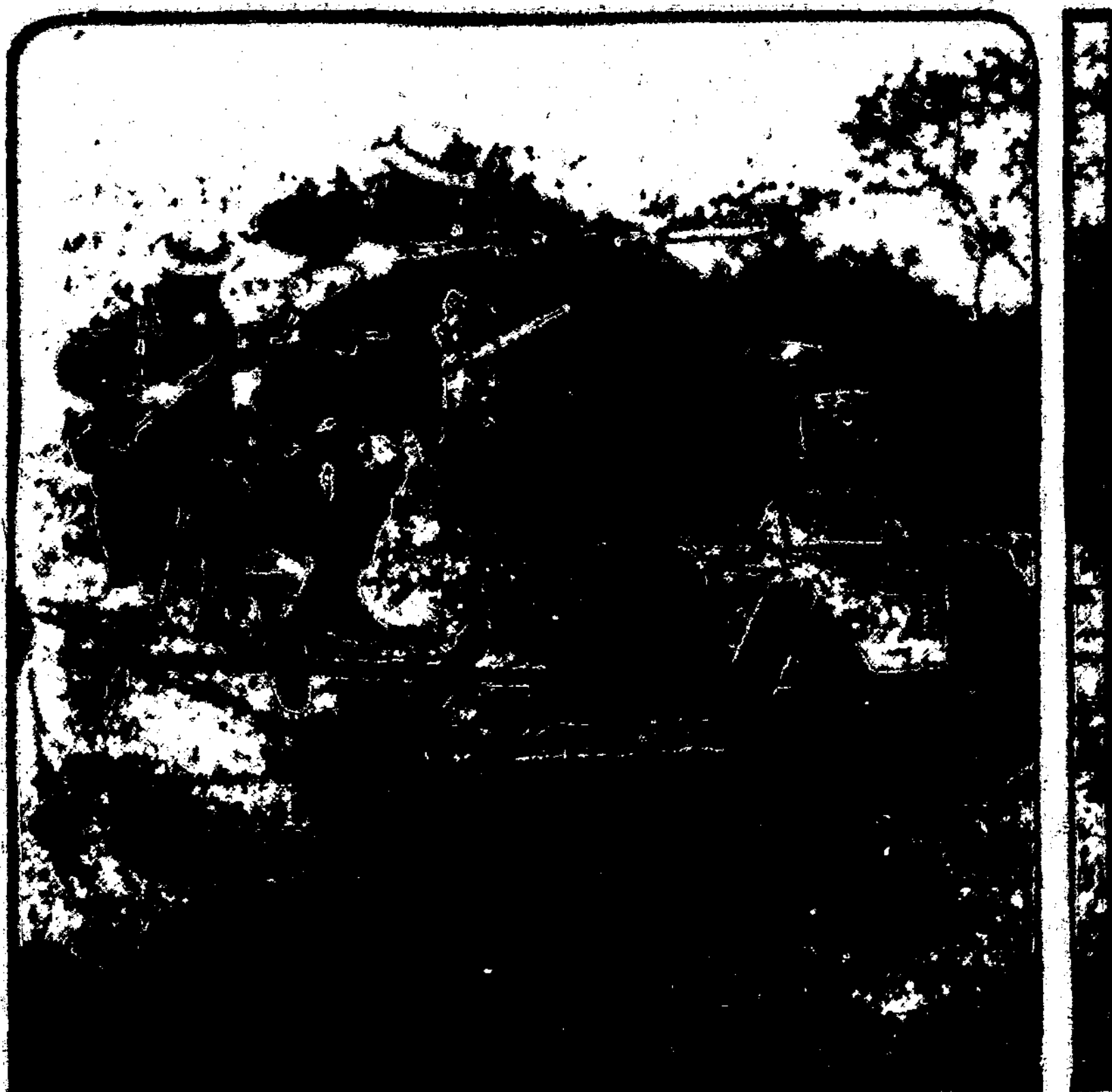

German Officers Here to Study



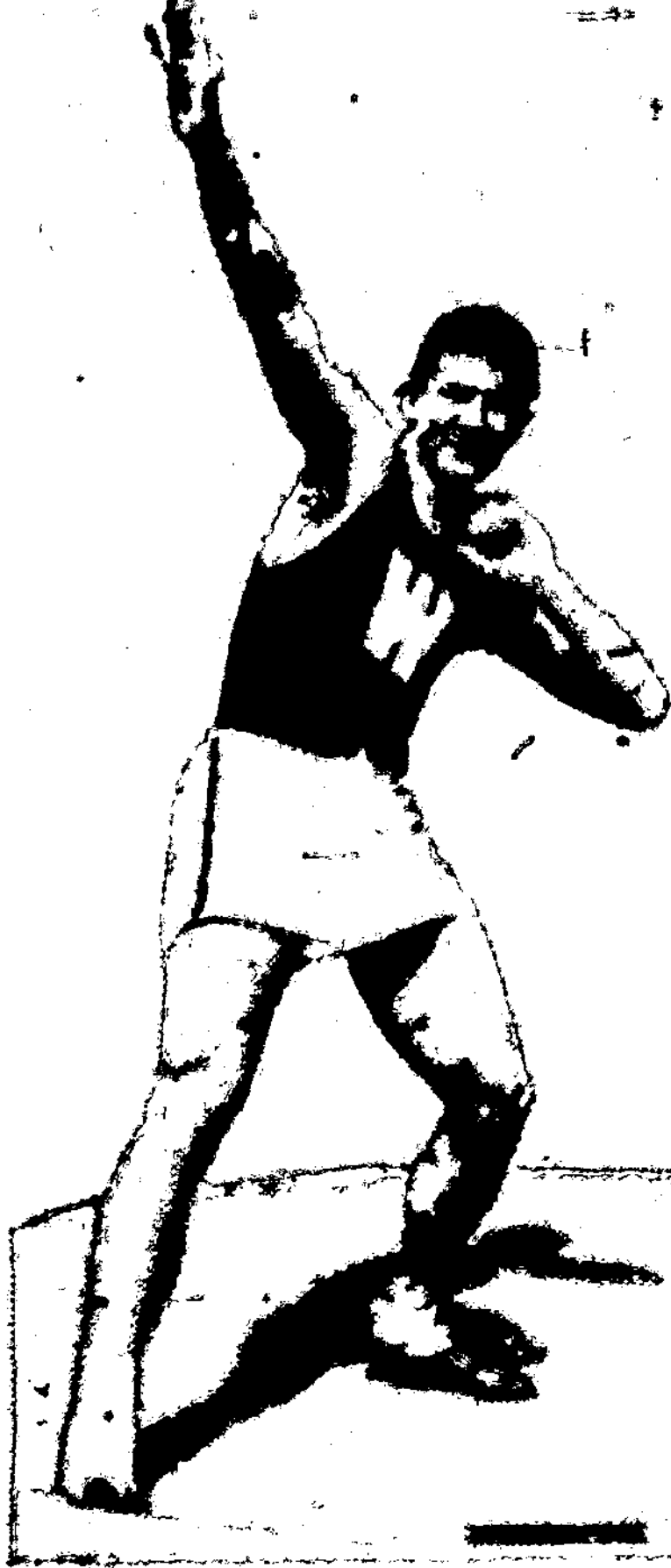

Federal Radio Commission Grants New Permit

El Paso Post:
Possibility of obtaining a national hook-up is seen in the announcement that station KOB, New Mexico A. & M. college, will double its power and entering the field as a 20,000 watt broadcasting station. It is rated now as 10,000 watts.

Dean R. W. Goddard, director and designer of the station, called on the federal radio commission. A dispatch Wednesday said the permission had been granted.

While Dean Goddard has not divulged his plans, he said last May the college was entertaining a proposition entailing a hook-up with a national chain.

Some time ago, Dean Goddard submitted a proposal to El Pasoans to join the college in advertising the Southwest through a connection with KOB.

KOB now represents an investment of \$75,000. New amplifying equipment was installed last year. It is the largest school broadcasting station in the world and one of the 22 largest in the country.

Present equipment, college officials said, is sufficient for the increase to be made without additional cost.
