Miss Foreman was shot in the back as she turned to run and Johnson placed the gun at his temple and pulled the trigger.

To meet this need for a practical household financial record, the bureau of home economics of the United States Department of Agriculture has designed a convenient loose-leaf account book...

How much money do you expect to handle next year and from what sources? Set it down at the beginning of the book. Work out an estimate of probable expenditures for the entire year...

At the head of each class of expenditures, set down the amount shown in the estimate for that purpose. Make a sort of game of trying to keep your expenses for that item within the required figure...

Some Good Things for the Table

"The house beautiful resembles the face and form of man. For real beauty requires character, and a home without home features, a home which does not reflect the spirit and tastes of its inmates, is a mere shelter, no matter how costly."

When a dainty and wholesome dish may be prepared for the main dish at luncheon with small amounts of vegetables and a bit of meat the cook may feel assured that the expense incurred is quite worth while.



Hot Vegetable Timbales.—This is a very pretty as well as a tasty dish. Cook one beet, skin and chop into dice, add one cooked carrot and one cooked turnip, also diced...

Green Pea Timbales.—These may be prepared from green fresh peas, canned or oven dried. Cook the peas with a little onion until very tender, then drain and press through a sieve.

with a farm housewife on her budget for next year. "She is showing her how to plan her expenses and make an estimate, and how to record in a convenient and practical way the various items that complicate the rural housewife's records."

To one cupful of the pulp, add two well beaten eggs, two tablespoonfuls of cream, two teaspoonfuls of butter, salt, pepper, paprika to taste, a pinch of mace and a half teaspoonful of sugar. Pour the mixture into buttered molds and bake as usual.

Mexican Tomato Canapés.—On a round of nicely browned and buttered toast lay a slice of tomato. Cover with a sauce prepared thus: Mix one teaspoonful of chili powder and half a teaspoonful of salt, add two tablespoonfuls of oil gradually...

Coffee Spanish Cream.—Heat half a cupful of coffee with one-third of a cupful of cream. Add one tablespoonful of gelatin soaked in one-fourth cupful of cold coffee. Heat to boiling, add one beaten egg with one-third of a cupful of sugar and a pinch of salt.

Squaw Dish.—Fry several slices of bacon, cut into small pieces, in an iron skillet and when brown add a pint of fresh corn-cut from the cob. Mix all together and fry until well done.

Prune Cottage Pudding.—Prepare the pudding just as a plain cake batter, sprinkle with sugar when putting into the oven. Serve cut into fancy shapes or squares, topped with a

lemon sauce or whipped cream, garnished with a large cooked prune. Prune sauce may be used with the pudding instead of the lemon sauce. This is even better served hot with a hot sauce.

This is the time when the housewife will add a few more delightful glasses to her fruit closet. The following will be something to enjoy in various ways during the winter:

Quince Paste.—Bake quinces with equal parts of sugar. Take equal parts of sugar and water, boil together until a drop stands alone in cold water. Add this syrup to the pulp, cook over the heat stirring until it is difficult to stir, then add a few balanced almonds and spread out one-half inch to dry...

Oyster Stew.—Clean one quart of oysters by placing them in a colander and pouring over a cupful of cold water. Carefully pick over to remove any broken shells; reserve the liquor. Heat the liquor to the boiling point, add the oysters and cook until plump and the edges curl.

Poached Peaches.—Lay half a canned peach on a slice of cake. Put round it a ring of meringue and brown in the oven. Serve with a custard sauce around the cake.

HINTS FOR HOUSEKEEPERS

When using a meat chopper to prepare bread crumbs, put a paper bag over the mouth of the chopper to keep the crumbs from scattering.

Mattresses which are turned and sunned regularly and protected by washable pads will not only last longer but will also aid sound sleep.

Variety and contrast in the foods chosen make the meal appetizing and interesting. This applies to texture, color and flavor.

Short-footed stockings can cause almost as much trouble as short shoes. Buy them half an inch longer than the foot for toe comfort.

When choosing linoleum for the kitchen keep the color scheme of the room in mind and select a pattern that is not too large and does not show soil.

Camera Finishes Picture—Invented by a blind man, a camera which takes pictures and makes prints at practically the same time, has appeared in London. It has two lenses, one being the ordinary camera "eye" and the other admitting only ultraviolet rays.

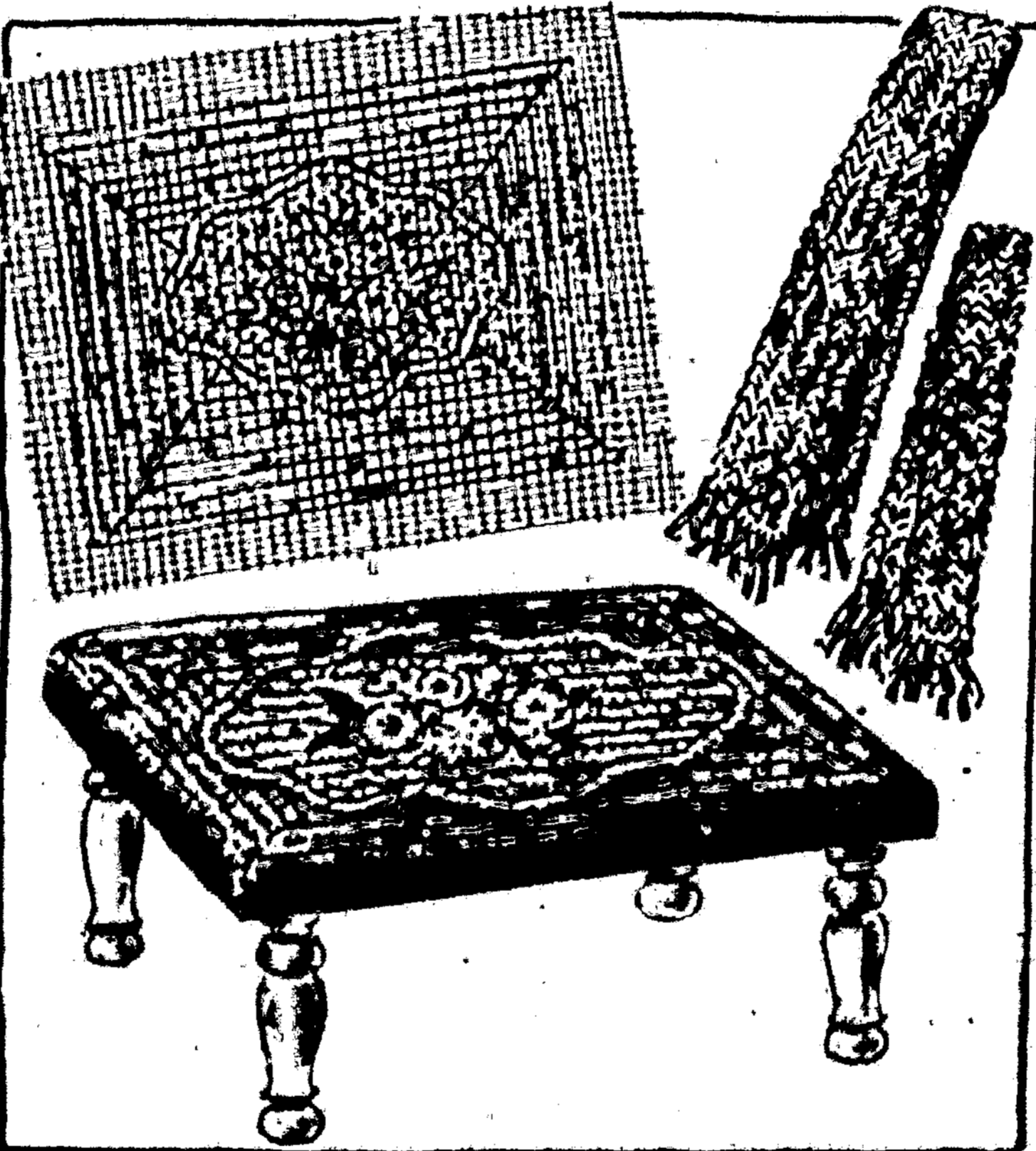
To the woman who delights in bestowing gifts of her own making upon her best beloved friends, here is a suggestion—a needlepoint embroidered footstool. The material costs comparatively little, the work is simple, and taking it all in all, a handsome footstool topped with a hand-worked piece of novel tapestry embroidery makes about as worthwhile a gift as one can conceive.

Yes, we agree that it is rather early to be talking about Christmas presents, but really, in order to avoid the frantic eleventh-hour rush which always comes to those who "put off until tomorrow that which should be done today," one should be "up and doing" this very minute.

You can get the necessary materials, even including the footstool, already upholstered ready for its embroidered top at almost any of the fancy-work departments in the department stores, or in any specialty shop which sells embroidery and fancy work equipment.

Heretofore, the problem has been to procure a suitable stool without the necessity of going to an upholsterer, but only this year a footstool has been gotten out which sells at a moderate price in the fancy-work departments, to which the tapestry can be attached by simply placing it over the stool and tacking it down either with tacks or by sewing it down.

GROUND BEEF ON TOAST A TASTY DISH

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.) A suitable lunch dish for the younger children and a tasty one for the whole family is ground beef on toast. This is one of the simplest and most attractive ways to prepare the cheaper cuts of beef. When cooked under a broiler for just a few minutes the ground beef has all the rich flavor of

broiled steak, and the juices which cook out of the meat flavor the toast. In case a broiler is not available cook the ground meat for a very short time in a hot skillet and serve it on buttered toast.

SOME PLEASING SALADS

Place pieces of grapefruit on lettuce. Top with a slice of orange and sweet dressing.

Select large orange and grapefruit. Peel and skin out the sections. Place lettuce leaf on plate. Arrange two or three slices of fruit, grapefruit, orange and pear, across the plate. Sprinkle the top of each with a thin cutting of green pepper.

Oranges, sliced and covered with sliced bananas and walnuts.

Four dates or soaked prunes, stuffed with cheese on sections of grapefruit or orange.

In the foreground of the picture stands an old violinist, looking intently at the picture, with his beloved violin under his arm.

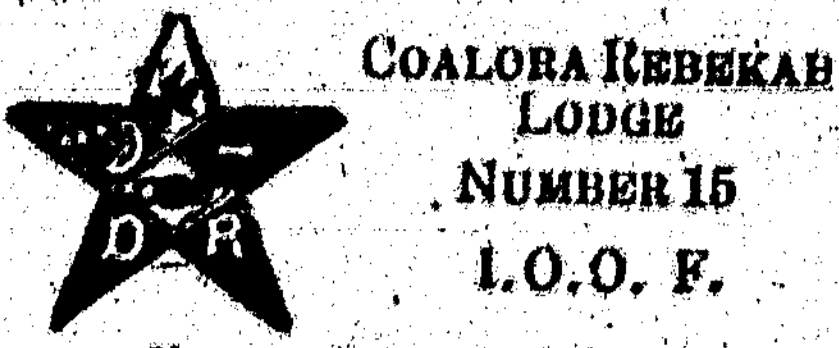

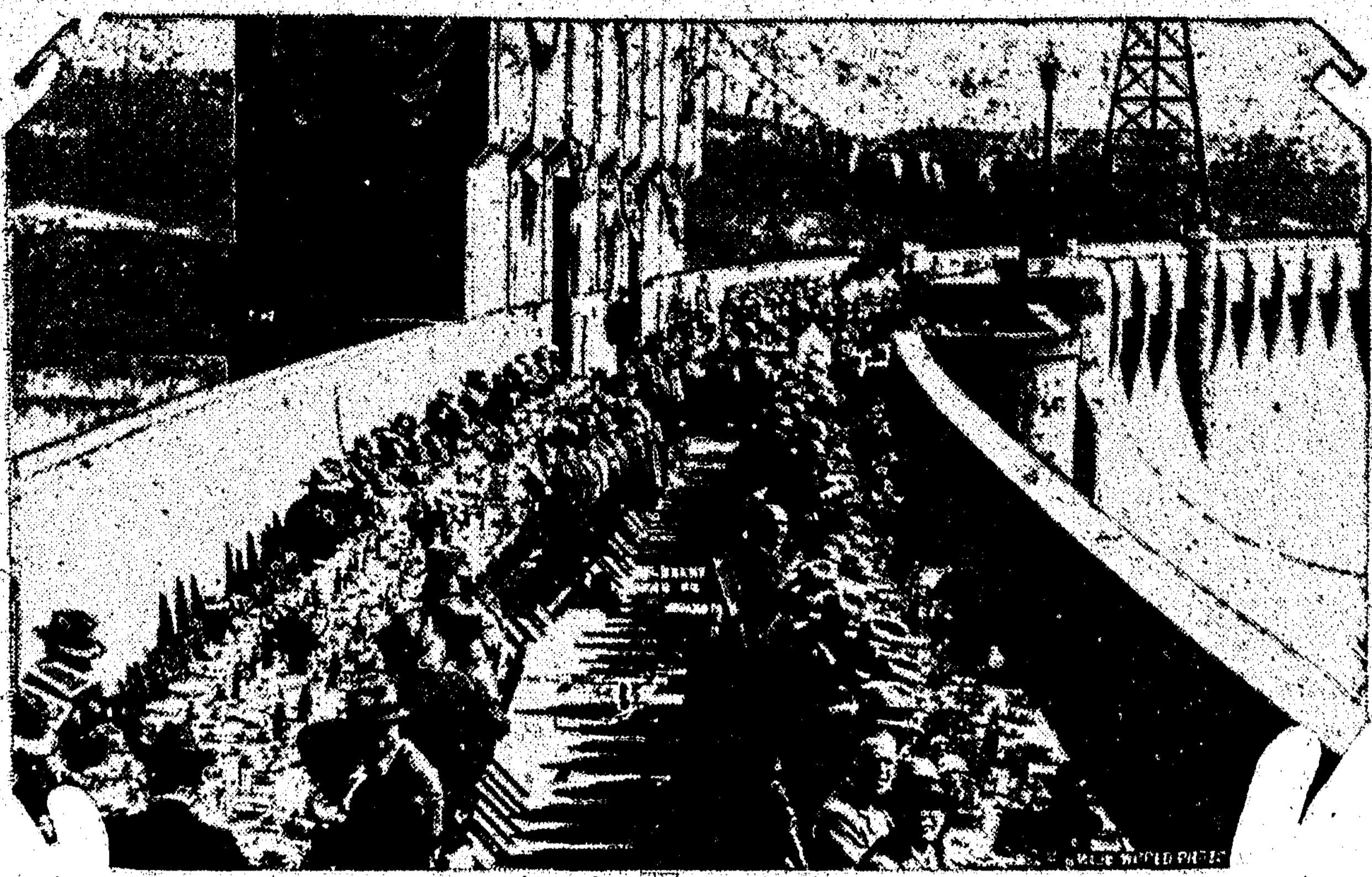

TRUE RELIGION NOT DOCTRINAL

By REV. DR. HARRY EMERSON FOSDICK, New York.

DISCARDING a religion does not necessarily mean that one discards religion, and many who regard themselves as atheists are in reality of the most profound religious nature. My advice is to break away from a religion to keep religion. For religion is not a set of theological doctrines, but a profound, native reaction of the human organism to the world in which it lives, and is a living, ever-changing reality.

The mistaken concepts of religion are the causes of many breaking away from the church. Religion is not an explanation of the universe. No one can explain the universe. Even Christ on the cross asked "Why?" It is a continuation of a childhood practice for one to believe that everything can be explained by one set of rules. Religion, as in science, is not final. There are many things to be learned in science—there are many things to be learned in religion.

I've often been confronted with students who boldly declare themselves atheists. One in particular I remember was taking his Ph. D. at Columbia. After telling me that he had no belief in God, he unconsciously confessed that he had acquired the very root of religion. He had discarded one religion, but in its place he had acquired that greater religion that enables one to rise above the plane of ordinary life.

MODESTY LARGELY PRUDISH

By PROF. ABRAHAM MYERSON, Tufts College.

Modesty is an overvalued quality, largely sexual and prudish in origin, where it does not represent taboo. The advance to a freer, more human personality is worth the cost in immorality and the loss of the so-called feminine traits.

The intelligence of the average woman is equal to that of the average man, but the capacity of the exceptional woman can not as yet be stated to be equal to the capacity of the exceptional man. Discovery of the fact that woman is a human being has made it possible for man to understand her. The attitude that she is an inferior, semi-dinobolical creature has been accepted as a standard fact handed down through the ages. Men, as the writers of the past, have made part of the psychology of woman in accord with their desires or beliefs.

NEED FOR INDEPENDENT THOUGHT

By DR. JAMES A. COUSSENS, President Tufts College.

Cultivate the habit of independent thought instead of accepting without challenge every printed statement you see. Words on paper are prone to take on themselves an undeserved verisimilitude. The solution rests in the student's ability to think things out.

Social values are in a constant state of change and adjustment. It is impossible for youth and age to observe these changes from precisely the same viewpoint. . . . Whatever defects in the oncoming generation may seem to appear, the net balance must register advance, otherwise human progress is not to be accounted for. . . . On the foundation laid and left by the previous generation youth erects the relatively tiny structure which may constitute at best an infinitesimal addition to the vast building eons in the making called progress.

LEISURE IMPROPERLY EMPLOYED

By REV. DR. JOHN F. CASKEY, St. Louis (Methodist).

People never in the history of the world had so much leisure as now. If you were a city pastor, you would know. Try to telephone a group of women, and you will find hardly any of them at home. They are not doing one-tenth of the work that their grandmothers did. It is the same with men. The "lured business man" is a myth. When you call up a man's office and the answer comes that he is "in conference," the probability is that he is playing golf or is at the club having a good time.

My point is that since modern inventions give humanity so much ease from hard labor, people should see to it that all this extra time is employed for their own good. If we have electric lights, immeasurably better than the old coal-oil lamp, what is the purpose of it? That we may dance longer, or read more?

CRIME BEGINS WITH TRUANCY

By STATE SENATOR WALES, Penologist, New York.

The United States homicide rate is nine times that of England and Wales. For every robbery in London there are thirty-six robberies in New York city and one hundred in Chicago. In 1921 one large American city had twelve times as many robberies as England and Wales, and in 1923 twelve times as many robberies as all Canada.

The first indication of crime is truancy at school. I do not speak of the occasional truancy of the healthy mischievous boy, who has skipped school to go to a ball game, but of the truant who is out of adjustment with his school life. It may be because he has fallen a grade or two behind others. Such a boy is adapted to something useful in life but no one has ever found out what it was.

WORLD FAVORABLE TO PEACE

By CHARLES EVAN HUGHES, Ex-Secretary of State.

The nations could not have established an institution like the World court if public opinion had been controlled by an unruly and truculent spirit. The secure basis of international peace must be found, if at all, in the reasonableness which underlies good will and makes possible the former institutions of peace.

To one who looks beneath the surface, however, the establishment of the World court is the expression of confidence in international justice, in the existence of sufficient reserves of learning and fairness to secure final determinations which governments may respect, even when they are defeated. No international police force could keep the peace if there were a general disposition to fight.

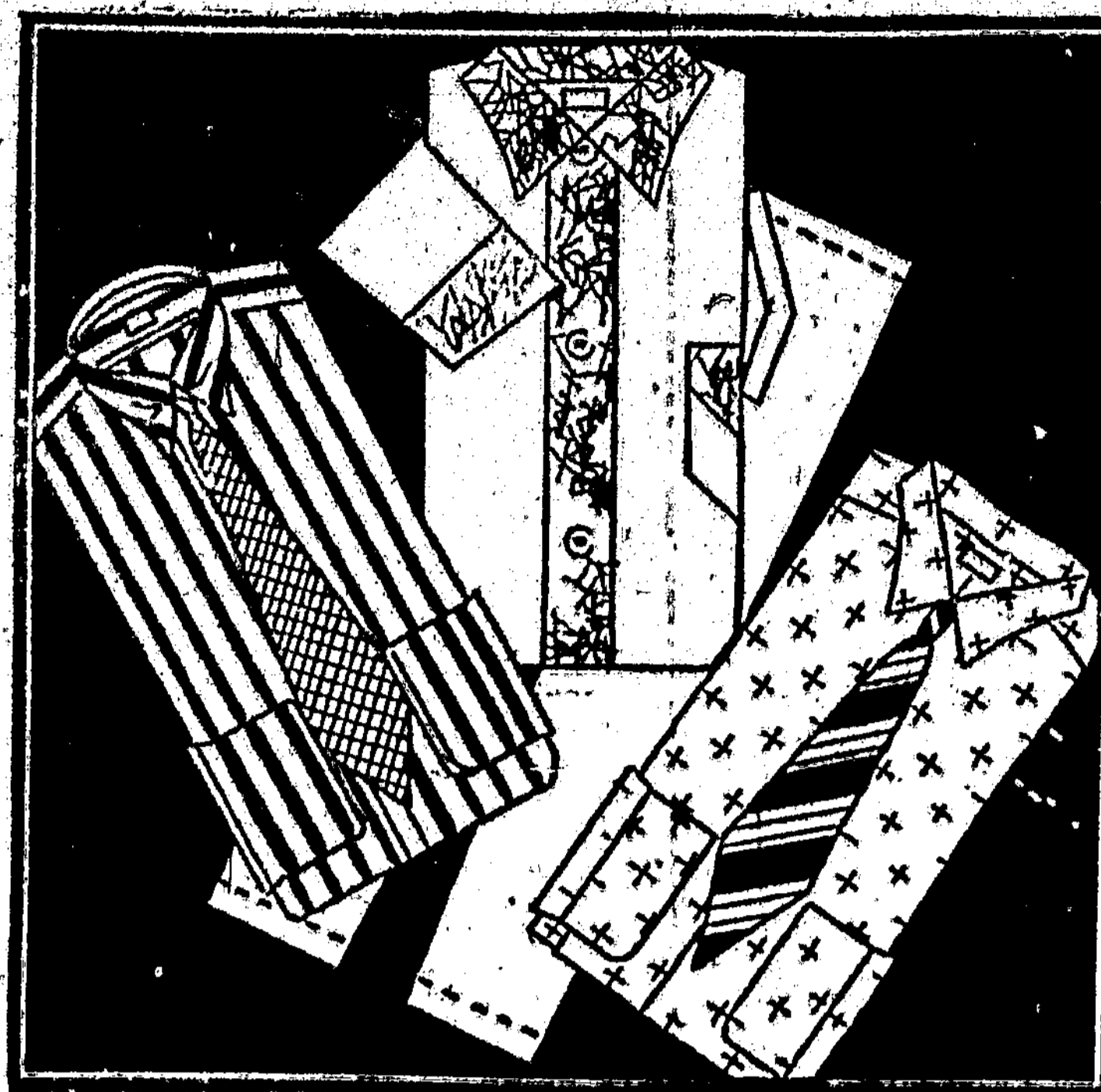
