Coolidge Dam Only One With Multiple Domes



A new picture of the Coolidge dam in Arizona which reveals the impressiveness of the only multiple-domed dam in the world. It is situated about 135 miles southeast of Phoenix, and will serve to irrigate 100,000 acres of land along the Gila river.

SOUTHWEST NEWS

The charred bodies of two children were recovered from the ruins of cabins in which they burned to death fifteen miles east of Albuquerque. The victims were Earl Henninger, 10, and Lola Henninger, 5, children of Mr. and Mrs. Edwin C. Henninger.

The federal aid road project under construction between Portales, N. M., and Elida, N. M., is now being finished with caliche type surfacing and will soon be open for traffic, a report from Project Engineer J. R. Isler of the New Mexico Highway Department states.

Bombs burst over Carlsbad, bands played and flags flew as 350 southeastern New Mexico shriners, and more from west Texas and El Paso took possession of the City to start forty-five novices over the hot sands. The opening Shrine ceremonial was conducted in the big room of the Carlsbad Cavern.

D. A. Gilchrist, associate biologist in charge of government predatory animal hunters in Arizona, said that with the first quarter of the biological survey's year almost completed, hunters have killed 213 per cent. more bobcats, 44 per cent. more coyotes, 100 per cent. more mountain lions, and 150 per cent. more foxes than at this time last year.

A new bookplate, designed by Miss Margaret Cleck of Roswell, has been adopted by the New Mexico State College library at Las Cruces. According to Miss Lottie Peters, librarian, all books in the library were marked with a rubber stencil previous to this year. Miss Peters says the bookplate adds greatly to the appearance of the books.

The Department of Commerce announces that there were 6,428 deaths in New Mexico in 1929—the year of its admission to the registration area. No death rates for 1929 have been computed because any rates based on population estimates made at this time would be unreliable and, probably would have to be materially revised as soon as the 1930 census figures become available.

Leo Chaplin of Fort Bayard, N. M., was in Boston to attend the American Legion convention after having left his home on foot just three weeks previously. He received many lifts from motorists. Chaplin, who is 43, was wounded eight times and received the Croix de Guerre with two palms for his services in the World War. He also is a veteran of the Mexican border campaign.

Freshman students entering the University of Arizona at Tucson this fall will have an opportunity of learning the practical side of printing and magazine make-up if plans outlined by Charlton Key, editor of the Arizona Kittykat are realized. It is Key's plan to give the first year students trying out for positions on the staff of the magazine a course in make-up and a comprehensive study of printing.

On the basis of provisional population figures already announced, Arizona will gain another representative in Congress, Joseph A. Hill, assistant director of the census bureau, advised Senator Henry F. Ashurst in Phoenix. "These figures," Hill declared, "are subject to revision in the final account, although I think it very improbable that the changes will be material or such as to affect the results of the apportionment."

E. A. Hughes, chairman of the state tax commission, has released statistics in Phoenix which show Arizona taxpayers this year will pay \$21,679,333 in taxes levied for all purposes on a total valuation of \$714,945,802—an average tax rate of 3.04 on each \$100 of valuation, 14 cents less than last year. The average tax rate, Hughes explained, is based on the final property valuations as fixed by the board of equalization.

Simple prayers, and singing of quaint hymns featured the encampment of six Arizona Indian tribes at Indian Oasis, Ariz. As dawn came, more than 100 delegates to the meeting sat aside their strange dances and weird ceremonial chants of pagan days, and sang hymns. Offerings of maize, mesquite beans and sahuara fruits, which the Great Spirit Ee-Ee-Toy was given by ancestors of the redmen, was replaced with hard currency of the pale face.

Detailed investigations of a proposed large irrigation project in San Juan county, south of San Juan river, are being made by the state engineer. More than 400,000 acres of land would be included. The San Juan is one of the large tributaries of the Colorado river. Another district being investigated for possibilities is on Cucullin Negro creek in Sierra county, west of Hot Springs. For a distance of nine miles in the valley along this stream are now only 400 acres under irrigation.

Warden Lorenzo Wright, of the Arizona state prison at Florence, said Harry Campbell, prison engineer, resigned recently at his request. The resignation was requested because Campbell permitted two convicts their freedom for several hours in Phoenix.

Reared in an accident, which rivaled tales told by the mythical Don Quixote, Jim Cherry, sheep herder, is in Mercy Hospital in Flagstaff, Ariz., recovering from a broken leg. A giant bird, believed to be a buzzard, swept down on Cherry and his team of horses, causing the animals to stampede.

Real Photograph of a Genuine Duel



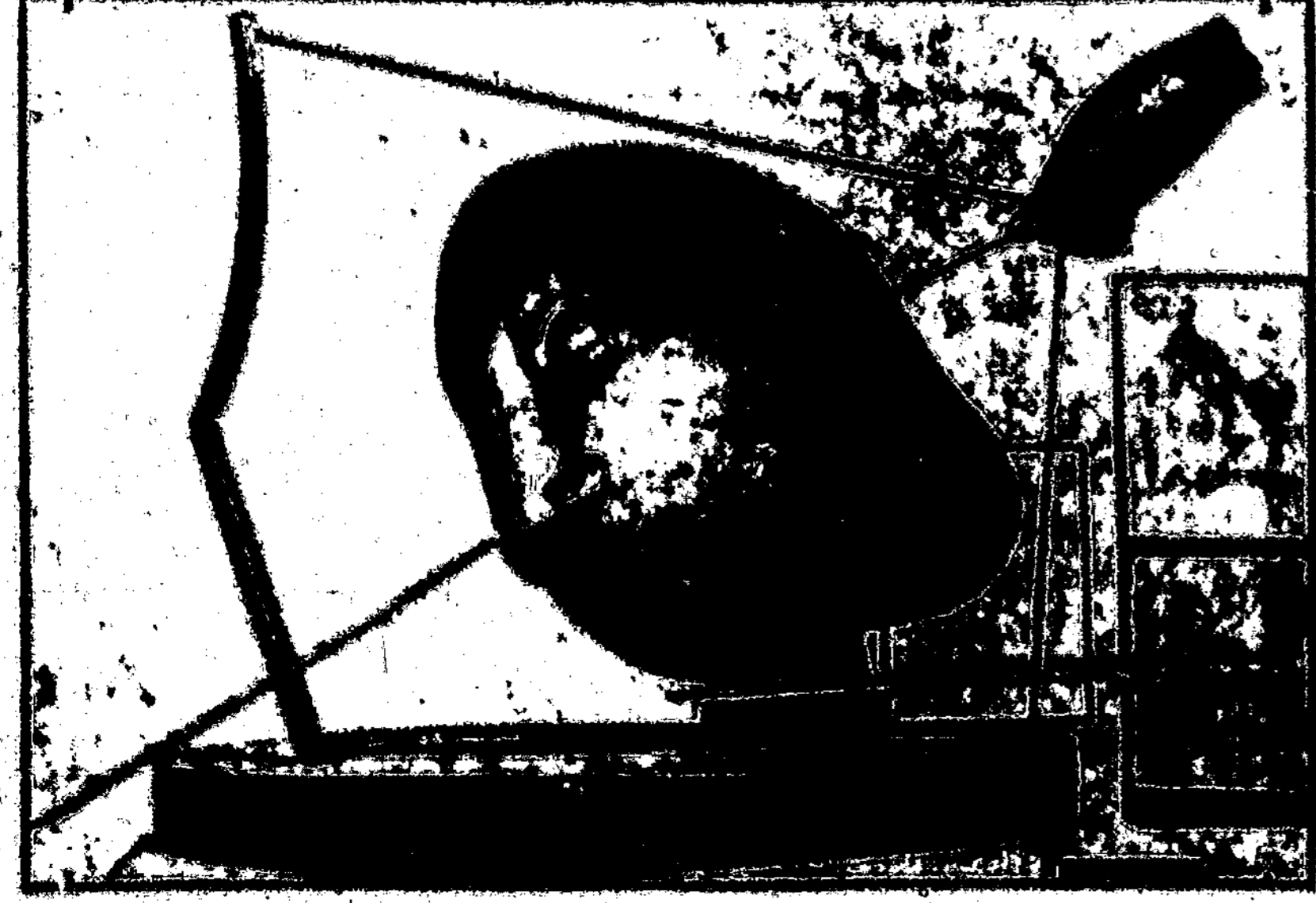

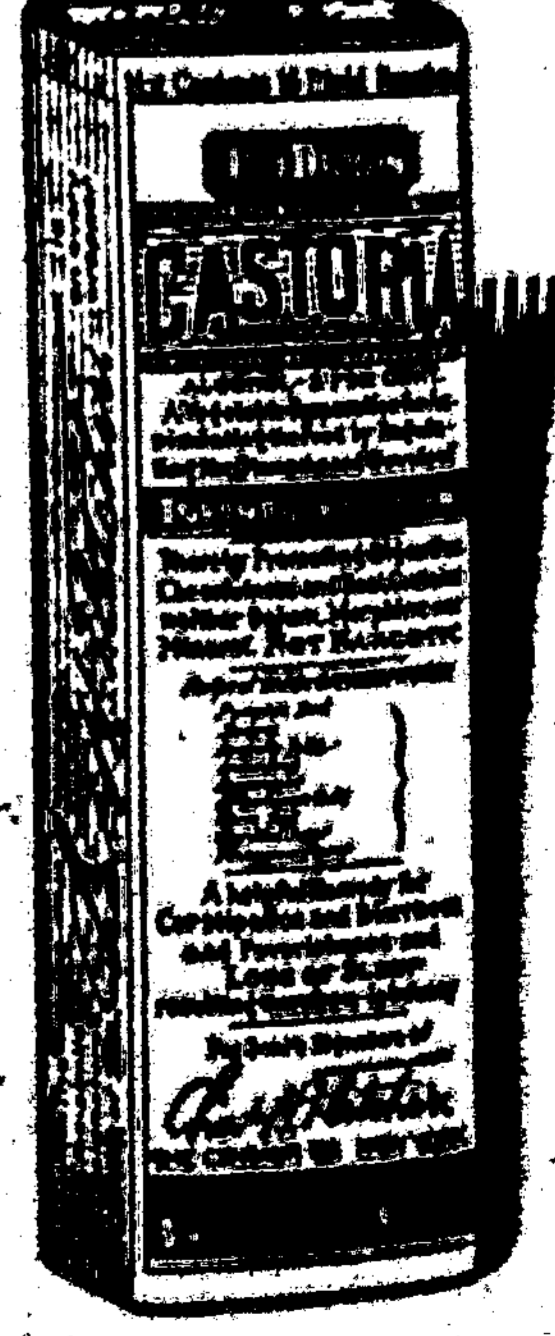

**TAKING THE GUESS OUT OF BUSINESS**

**BANKERS** and business men err in not adopting more universally the tactics of the scientist. When the scientist wishes to fathom the mysteries of the universe or to solve things into their component parts he calls to his assistance the magnifying power of the microscope. There before him, like an open book, lie the secrets of nature which unaided eyes cannot observe.

The uncanny power of the microscope's all-seeing eye has revealed countless secrets for the material and intellectual progress of humanity. It has enabled us to study the processes of growing cells in plant and animal life, trace the causes of disease and successfully combat the ills of mankind; it has aided the engineer in his search for stronger and more serviceable materials, giving us taller, lighter and more sanitary structures, and better highways; it has disclosed the defects in steel rails and brought us an era of safer railway travel; it has added to the food supply of the nation; in fact, it has affected favorably nearly every activity of the human race, whether it apply to production, distribution or consumption, in time of peace or in time of war.

In the business and banking world, economic research and analysis—serving as the microscope through which we are enabled to see basic factors more clearly and thus determine the causes of success and failure. Only recently have we begun to realize the full value of research and analysis and apply them in such a way as to eliminate the guesswork that was characteristic of industry a few years ago. "Eliminate the guess and reach success," might well be a motto for all of us.

**Banking Conducting Continual Research**

The American Bankers Association is daily submitting every phase and every department of banking to searching scrutiny and study, says John G. Lonsdale, president of this the world's greatest financial association. The findings of these investigations are made available to the 20,000 members of the organization for their guidance.

"It is a fine tribute to the spirit of cooperation among bankers that it is able to carry on this work," he says. "Bankers from one end of the country to the other are constantly giving freely and unselfishly of their skill and experience so that the association may produce the truly great results that are being accomplished."

Statistical information on national and state banks, savings institutions, trust companies and trust departments, clearing house groups and general banking is prepared after exhaustive inquiry and distributed for the use of all bankers. The organization's investigations have resulted in the passage of beneficial legislation, revision of banking practices and innumerable changes for a stronger and more efficient banking structure. It has set up an educational system through its affiliated American Institute of Banking, where 45,000 ambitious young bank men and women are now availing themselves of the opportunity to advance in the banking field.

"It has been well said that the American Bankers Association, exclusive of the Federal Reserve System, has been the greatest single nationwide source of stability and improved conditions for banking in the United States," Mr. Lonsdale says.

**Banking Grows More Complicated**

DENVER, Colo.—The increase in the technicalities of the banking business in the past dozen years was shown by a speaker before the American Institute of Banking which held its annual convention here recently when he pointed out that in 1912, when the institute last met in this city, it gave only three courses, while today it gives 10, with more subjects in preparation. At the earlier date, he said, the curriculum of the institute consisted of elementary banking, commercial and banking law, and money and banking, whereas today it consists of banking fundamentals, commercial law, negotiable instruments, standard economic, standard banking, credits, investments, trust functions, analyzing financial statements, and public speaking. While the two new subjects of bank operation and organization, and bank management are to be added.

The New Pace of Business Change  
Business evolution used to move slowly—it measured off its gradual changes almost invisibly, like the hour hand on the clock. But today its tempo is that of the second hand. The movement of evolution that is quickening business with rapid changes is alarmingly visible and makes it difficult to keep up with them.—N. S. Koch.

**Seligman Settles His Taxes for 28c on the Dollar**

A Word About Mr. Seligman

The Democratic candidate has never been known as a public spirited. He has never been active in any matter for the public interest that he did not profit—a very definite profit—for himself.

Mr. Seligman as head of the Seligman Bros. Company, became delinquent in his taxes for \$2867.81. He forced a settlement for 28 cents on the dollar. Santa Fe county fell into hard lines and defaulted on its bonds. He bought up a lot of them at a few cents on the dollar. Then he collected the bonds at par with interest added. The principle and interest thus secured amounted to \$21,666.

Mr. Seligman beat his State and County out of nearly 75% of his taxes. He bought up the County Bonds at bankrupt prices and forced settlement at par, principal and interest.

Mr. Seligman is now trying to have Elfege Baca, the last of the New Mexico "killers," elected Judge of the district court of the 7th judicial district.

Baca's unfitness for the position has no weight with Mr. Seligman so long as votes may be had for himself and his ticket. The promotion of the candidacy of Baca for the Judgeship is one of the most terrible things that has come up in New Mexico politics.

Holt and Simms

H. B. Holt and A. G. Simms should, by all means, be elected to the Senate and Congress New Mexico needs so much that cannot be had except through the federal government. You have read much of the dependance of this state on tariff legislation. The Democrats, defending Senator Bratton's vote against the bill claim that the tariff does the woolgrower no good. They point to the low price at the present moment:

The tariff bill gave an increase of from 31 to 34 cents a pound, scoured basis. That means about 11c a pound on grease or raw wool. About 40 percent of the wool used in the United States is imported. The price of raw wool is now about 15c a pound. The foreigner must pay 11c for the privilege of selling in this market. That makes his home price about 4c a pound, out of which he must pay the freight. To open our markets to the foreign woolgrower would bankrupt every New Mexico woolgrower.

This fact is admitted by Mark Smith, in his book on wool and the sheep industry.

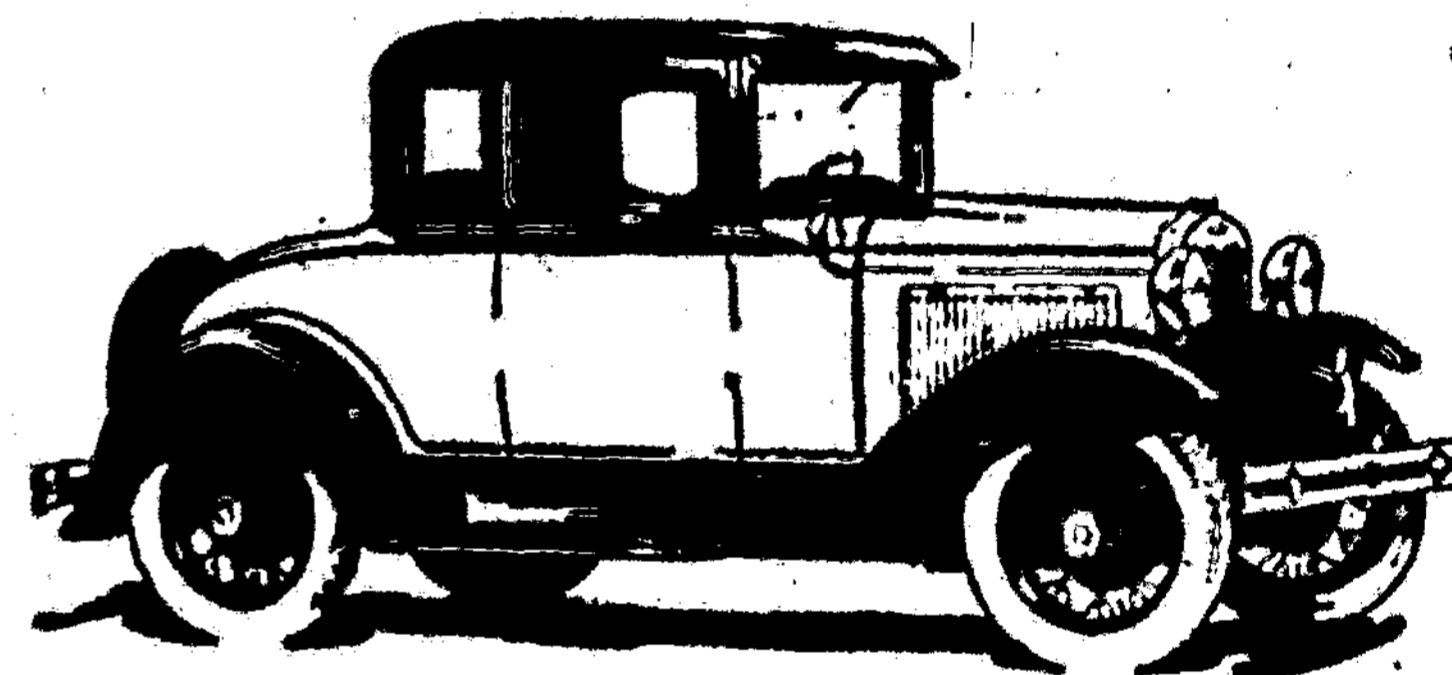

## Bank Bandits Active

The greatest number of bandit raids on American banking ever recorded in the figures of the protective department of the American Bankers Association were reported during the six months ending last February. Bank members of the association reported for investigation 311 forgery cases, 107 holdup robberies, 18 burglaries, 3 check thefts and 2 mortgage swindles while non-member banks, numbering less than half the total enrolled in the association, suffered 38 holdup robberies and 9 burglaries, non-members being burglarized or held up once for every 28 banks, as compared with once for every 144 member banks. The association detective agents caused the arrest of 143 of the 238 bank criminals apprehended during the period covered.

The association's report on these conditions urges support of the movement to provide city police departments with radio-equipped cruising automobiles which have proved particularly effective in Cleveland and Detroit in the broadcasting of alarms and the closing in on criminals immediately after or even in the midst of the perpetration of crimes. Last year the average time elapsed between the receipt of radio calls by these cars and the 133 arrests which followed was one minute and forty-two seconds, the report says.

## Home Canning Made Easy

By GRACE VIALE GRAY  
Household Science Institute.

**MEAT**  
Wash the meat for cleanliness, but do not soak in water. Cut into convenient size for packing. Add two teaspoonsful of salt to each quart jar of raw meat. Partly cooked meat may be seasoned before searing, frying and roasting. Do not add water to meat packed raw except for meat used for soup and stews. Partly cooked meat that has been fried may have one to two tablespoonfuls of water added, but this is not necessary. Do not dip meat in flour or bread crumbs before frying. Add to meat that has been partly cooked in the oven the gravy in the roasting pan, but do not fill the jar with liquid. Pack meat loosely in jar; a few small bones may be added for flavor and to allow proper heat penetration; partly seal jar and suspend the desired length of time. Seal and store. Reheat all canned meats before using.  
Canning Meat.

Select the piece of meat wanted for roast, trim and wipe with a damp cloth. Heat some grease in a roasting pan, put in the meat and sear quick-

ly, turning the meat so all sides are seared to prevent the loss of the meat juice. As soon as it is well seared sprinkle with salt and pepper. Add boiling water to the grease in the roasting pan. Baste frequently. Turn the meat from time to time and roast until nicely browned. Cook until the meat is done, (it should not be red in the center) but without cooking it entirely tender. Slice and pack into hot, clean jars to within one-half inch from top of jar. Add the gravy from the roasting pan. Partly seal and process in a steam-pressure cooker for 60 minutes at 15 pounds. Remove from canner and seal immediately.
