Southwest News Items

Continued effort on the part of Arizona organizations to advise residents of other states not to come to Arizona in search of employment is urged by the Arizona Industrial Congress.

Two shepherders were drowned seventy miles north of Phoenix when a boat in which they were attempting to cross the flood-swollen Verde river broke from a cable and capsized.

The Senate has passed the House bill authorizing President Hoover to establish the Canon de Chelly national monument within the Navajo Indian reservation in Arizona in Apache county.

The fourth quarterly executive board meeting of the New Mexico Cattle Growers' Association will be held in Las Vegas on March 3. The annual convention will convene on the same date.

The New Mexico House of Representatives by a vote of 37 to 7 passed a measure to submit the question of repeal of the dry section of the state constitution to a vote of the people two years from now.

The split playing season, tried for two years, has been abolished by the Arizona State Baseball League. Action was taken to bring in a Nogales club to replace Miami, which club now is defunct.

Alpha Phi Chi is to be the Greek name for the "Arizona Pioneers' Club," newly formed club for the collecting and preserving of historical records and relics of the pioneers of Arizona, at the State Teachers' College in Flagstaff.

Miss Margaret Reeves, head of the New Mexico state bureau of child welfare, said that the St. Louis division of the Red Cross had appropriated \$1,000 to be used for the relief of between forty and fifty destitute families in Hobbs, N. M.

A resolution to continue district conferences of business and professional women's clubs in Arizona, during the year was passed at the first annual district meet attended by more than 100 delegates and members in Miami, Ariz.

Prohibition Administrator Charles H. Stearns, who led officers in a series of raids at Raton, N. M., where twenty-four arrests were made and 500 gallons of liquor seized, said he would seek to padlock all the twelve places raided along "First Street Row."

Carl Hayden, United States Senator from Arizona, wired M. C. Hankins, secretary of the state highway commission in Phoenix, that the secretary of war has approved finding of chief of engineers that cost of Dwyer bridge over the Colorado river is \$236,172.53.

W. C. Peterson of Arlington was re-elected president of the Arizona Cattle Growers' Association at the Stafford meeting. John M. Keith was renamed secretary. The 1933 convention will be held at Tucson. More than 300 delegates attended the silver anniversary.

George E. McMillan of Jerome was elected grand high priest of the grand chapter of Royal Arch Masons and Fred O. Goodell of Tucson was chosen grand master of the Royal and Selected Masters of Masonry in the annual convention of Masons held in Globe, Ariz.

Richard Nash Burrows, 19-year-old Chicago youth, arrested in Denver, May 15, 1933, who in a dramatic confession admitted killing Jack Martin, Meza, Ariz., salesman, on April 27, 1933, will be given a hearing on his appeal from the death sentence by the Arizona Supreme Court, March 9.

This huc and cry of "overemphasis" in college sports leaves Dr. Ralph W. Swetman, president of Arizona State Teachers' College, rather cold. "Our difficulty here is underemphasis," says the doctor. "If tempo can be taken as an example, the need of an enlarged athletic program is evident."

Santa Fe welcomed home former Gov. H. J. Hagerman with a reception and parade and hanged an effigy of John Collier from a tree on the ancient Plaza. Mr. Hagerman was recently exonerated as special commissioner of Indian affairs by a congressional investigation, and John Collier was his chief accuser.

Everett Bowman, Fort Thomas, Ariz., and Jake McClure, hailing from the town of Mescal in the same state, are bulldogging and calf roping champions, respectively, of the cattle wrangling world. The two Arizonans were named champions in their respective lines by the convention of the Rodeo Association of America in Cheyenne.

A suggestion to broadcast a plea for employing Arizona labor for all large construction jobs was made by W. A. Sullivan of Globe to the Arizona Industrial Congress. P. G. Pillsbury, president of the Industrial Congress, in a letter to Sullivan said that his suggestion would be carried out as soon as possible. Letters explaining the plan are to be mailed to all newspapers throughout the state.

Gov. George W. P. Hunt has appointed Samuel E. Palfrey, Tucson attorney, as a member of the Arizona-Colorado river commission. His successor is Charles E. Ward.

The New Mexico land office did the largest business in its history during the eighteenth fiscal year with receipts of \$1,837,522.46, according to the biennial report of Dr. A. D. Crane, land commissioner. For the previous fiscal year the receipts were \$1,741,177.44. Oil development was chiefly responsible for the increase during the last year.

How to Escape FLU

Prisoners will be warned that such fences would kill or seriously injure anyone coming in contact with them. "Danger" signs will be posted both inside and outside the fences, and these will be in English and in the language of the presidency. Employees of jails will not be responsible for injury or death of anyone coming in contact with the charged wires.

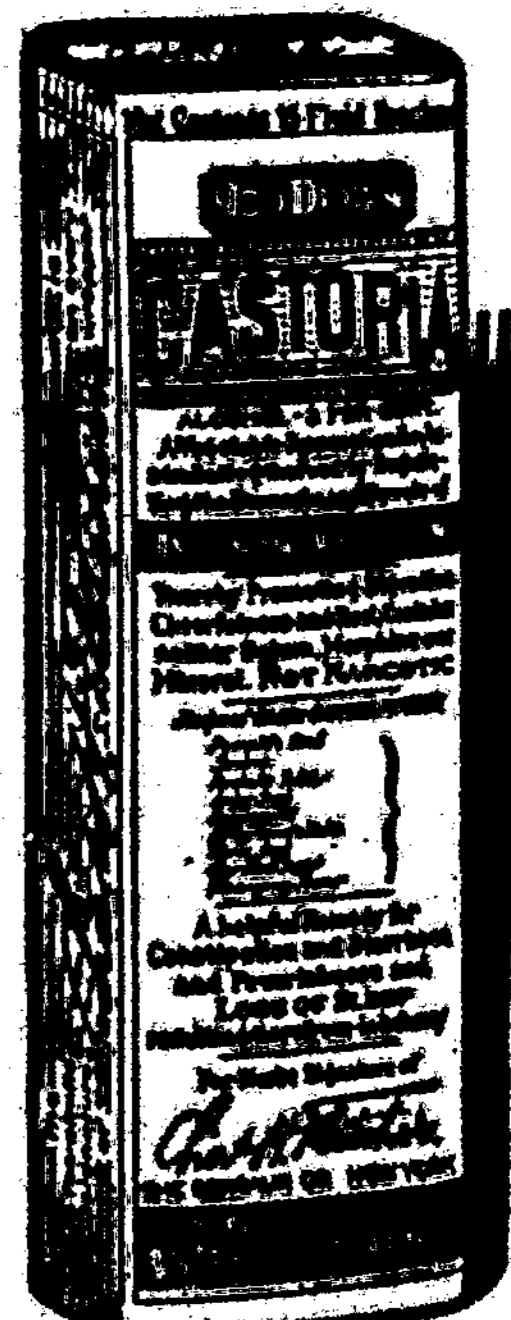

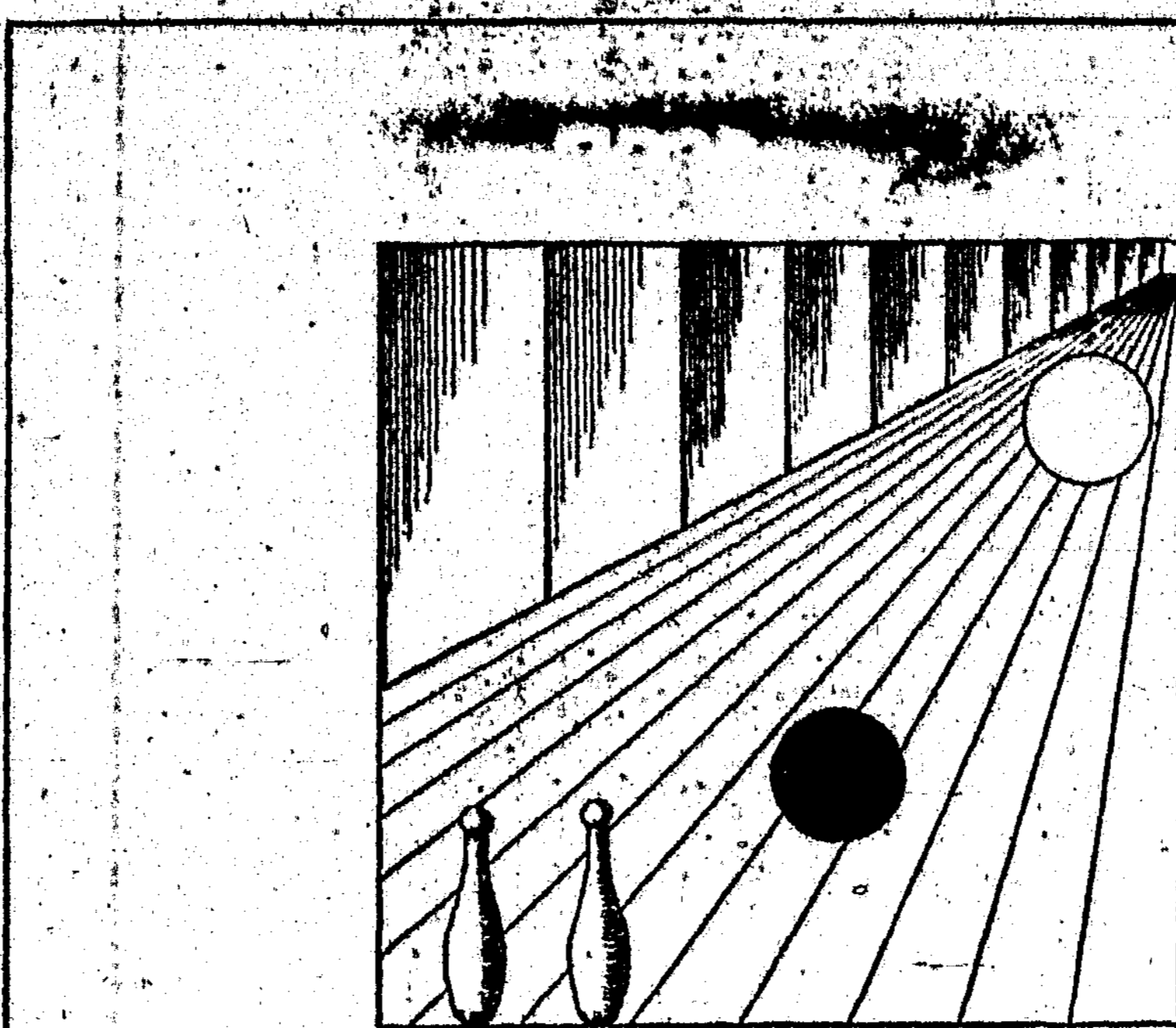
