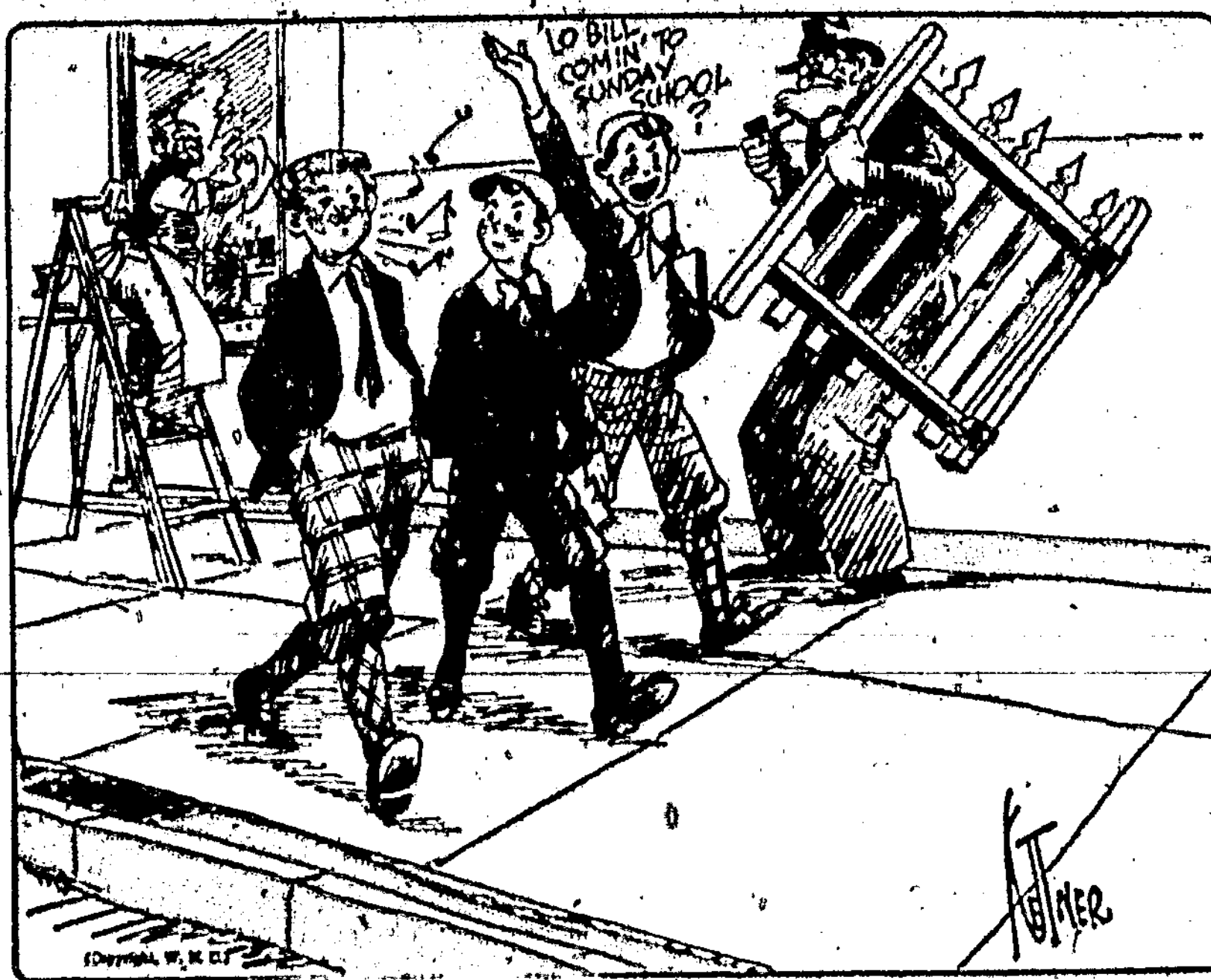

Commissioners' Proceedings

Board met Monday, Oct. 5, 1931. Meeting called to order at 10 o'clock, a. m., by Sheriff J. E. Brady.

Present - Henry Lutz, Chairman; R.S. Jones, vice-chairman; S.E. Greisen, Clerk. Absent--Diego Salcido, Member.

In the Matter of the Right of Way H. M. F., Project No. 34-A-2 in the town of Hollywood, across the property of J. W. Armstrong, it is hereby agreed by the Board of County Commissioners that J.W. Armstrong be allowed \$645 for removing his building and pumps from said right of way to which he agreed.

A petition being presented to the Board requesting it to change the Precinct lines in Precinct No. 10, making two precincts out of Precinct No. 10, the upper end to be known as Precinct No. 19. The proposed Precinct No. 19 to include the west end of Precinct No. 10, from a line running North and South across said Precinct No. 10 on Township line between Township 11 S. R. 13 East and Township 11 S. R. 14 East.

A petition emphatically protesting such a division was also presented to the Board praying that no alteration be made in the boundaries of said Precinct.

Whereas, authority to create and change Precincts is vested in the Board of County Commissioners by the provisions of paragraph 33-4216 and 33-4221, New Mexico Statutes Annotated 1929 Compilation; and

Whereas, the petition having been presented to the Board appearing to be in proper form and having a sufficient number of signers as required by law; a motion being duly made and seconded; Wherefore it is hereby resolved by the Board of County Commissioners that a new Precinct be formed out of the West end of Pct. No. 10, to be known as Pct. No. 19, and to embrace all of Township 11 South of Range 13 East.

A dozen of the leading business men in the United States when asked what the chief cause of the continuance of the present depression was, gave answers which all amounted to an agreement with the above statement. Fear is holding millions of dollars in cold storage.
