ZIEGLER'S STORE BURGLARIZED

Early Sunday morning while Night Marshal Henry Lutz was putting out the lights over town which was about 5:30, the store of Ziegler Bros. was entered by parties who broke the glass in front door. Entering, they made away with merchandise to the amount of about \$600.00, said goods consisting of men's suits, ladies' wearing apparel and 5000 cigarettes.

The men whose names are Ray Byron and Merlin Climer, were arraigned before Justice of the Peace Harvey Monday, where they walked preliminary examination and were bound over to the district court in the sum of \$1500 each which Climer has secured, we understand. The Faeroes



It Takes Two Months to Dry a Codfish in the Faeroes.

(Prepared by National Geographic Society, Washington, D. C.—WNU Service.)

THE bleak, wind-swept Faeroes soon will hear the drone of regular mail planes, for a new landing field is planned for accommodation of planes which will fly the proposed America-Denmark air mail route.

The Faeroes, numbering twenty-one small islands sprinkled over a small area about 250 miles off the northern tip of Scotland have remained practically unchanged since Viking days.

Basalt cliffs rise majestically on all the islands. Some tower nearly 2,000 feet above the restless sea.

Videro is probably the blindest island of them all and therefore visitors seldom land there.

Live in "Smoke Rooms." So poor is Videro that only one house, that belonging to the schoolmaster, a very great man indeed, has a "glass room."

While the schoolmaster has his "stove room" and is the only man of Videro with a glass room, nearly all the farmhouses on Stromo Island have glass rooms.

A glass room is an appendage of the smoke or stove room, having glass windows. Usually it is a parlor and, like parlors of an earlier day, can be used only on state occasions.

Frequently the glass room is opened for travelers but the stranger usually prefers the family living room.

Like Their Food "High." The stove room serves, of course, as the dining room.

EDITORIAL COLUMN

The New Mexico Club Woman

The Christmas number of the above-named magazine which is the official organ of the New Mexico Federation of Woman's Clubs, has just reached this office. It is published four times a year, is beautifully illustrated and on the frontispiece appears a splendid photo of the Roswell Woman's Club Building.

It also carries a goodly amount of advertising, mostly for the business interests of Roswell and is not only a credit to Roswell, as a city, but it is a piece of work so artistic in its nature to which the women of the state may justly be proud.

Parole for A.B. Fall

Albert Bacon Fall, a federal prisoner at Santa Fe, was eligible for parole on Nov. 20. For some reason or other the parole has not materialized, perhaps through ordinary delays incident to such action.

The parole of Fall will come about as a routine matter, as part of the federal prison policy. Well-behaved prisoners sentenced for a year and a day become entitled to parole upon completion of four months' time.

We assume that Fall is well-behaved; that he has had prison treatment customarily accorded to one of his age and condition of health, neither better nor worse treatment.

The Tribune would like to see A. B. Fall restored to his family by Christmas Day. We think he has paid his debt to society. This nation can gain nothing from further in the imprisonment of Fall. Justice will not profit by making harsh exceptions to his case.

To refuse Fall the ordinary clemency granted other prisoners will martyrize him. Justice should treat the case of Secretary Fall impartially, both as to punishment and mercy.

If Mr. Fall were in prison for the inter-state transportation of motor cars and if he were an unknown person, he would doubtless have been paroled by this time as the regulations permit.

We hope the prominence of this prisoner will not make federal prison authorities so sensitive that they will refuse the conventional compassion.

A. B. Fall has been punished. He has already met the terms of retribution laid down for him.

The Tribune hopes that he will eat Christmas dinner at home with his family. — New Mexico State Tribune.

BANKERS DEVELOP NEW FINANCE AID

President of American Bankers Association Describes Plan and Services of National Credit Corporation

NEW YORK.—The National Credit Corporation, a billion dollar cooperative institution, is the method worked out by bankers to put into practical effect the central point in President Hoover's plan for restoring the commercial and industrial activity of the nation as proposed in his statement to the nation of October 7, Harry J. Haas, president of the American Bankers Association stated in a recent interview.

The corporation is strictly cooperative in character, he said, to unite the entire banking system and increase the effectiveness of the financial services of banks to their communities in rural districts as well as the cities. The plan will marshall the banking resources of the country, he explained, by creating a national institution whose funds will be loaned when necessary to banks which have assets in their portfolios that are thoroughly sound but are not eligible for loans at federal reserve banks.

The Outlook for Business "Consequently, if we retain the same purchasing power in this country, it is quite evident that on the first upturn of business there will be a rush to replace that inventory. In developing this graph, it has come out very strongly that every third year is a big automobile year. The biggest automobile year was 1920 when 4,100,000 cars were produced for American consumption. This year the industry will produce somewhere between 1,800,000 and 1,900,000 cars. As 1932 is three years after 1929, if economic conditions were normal we could be sure we would do a tremendous business, because the third year is the time when the bulk of the replacing takes place."

He added that there are factors at work that make it uncertain how big the year will be, instancing that "money is being hoarded from lack of confidence and this takes away some purchasing power that we would otherwise have, while family budgets are being cut on account of changes in income conditions, which again means that purchasing power for the automobile, like a good many other things, will be knocked down." As a result, he said, it was necessary to measure what statistically would be a big year against a practical consideration of the curtailment of expenditures which is going on and determine how big the year will be under these circumstances.

"From a long haul standpoint, regardless of how many automobiles are sold in 1932, we are storing up a big business for the future," Mr. Grant said. "There will be fewer automobiles sold in 1931 than will go to the scrap heap. With 12,000,000 car-years out of the inventory, nine percent more gasoline was used up to August 1, 1931, than was used in 1930. With fewer automobiles, the people must have been running them faster and longer to consume the additional gasoline. This means that we have some 22,000,000 people working hard to make a fine business for our industry when there is an economic recovery."

To Benefit Everybody "There is no citizen in the United States but will benefit in very practical ways from the results of the operation of this forward-looking plan of cooperation, which may be regarded as one of the most constructive steps that have been taken toward revival of sound business activity," Mr. Haas declared, adding:

"The National Credit Corporation represents an instrumentality that should have far-reaching effect in restoring the confidence of the public. The plan not only has been formulated by the country's leading banking authorities, but also will be carried out locally as well as nationally by banking representatives who have given their time and thought to this undertaking as a real public service. "The American Bankers Association convention was in session at the time the plan was proposed and unanimously endorsed it in principle. I have examined the detailed formulation of the working plans as developed by the incessant labors of some of the Nation's leading bankers who have undertaken to put it into practical operation in single-minded devotion to the national welfare, and I am able to say without reservation that the National Credit Corporation as set up by them constitutes a practical, sound and efficient means for carrying out President Hoover's proposal."

No False Optimism "I am not attempting to create any false optimism—I am not speaking without a statistical background. Using the best sense we can, we have drawn conclusions from the figures we have, and I am willing to make the statement that as far as the conduct of our business for the first half of 1932 is concerned, we shall set the indices somewhat higher than the actualities of 1931. We are willing to set our advertising budgets and our selling expense on that kind of index. With economic conditions as they are, and since the obsolescence is so great and we have sunk so low in this year's sales, we figure that the first half of 1932 must necessarily be better than was the first half of 1931."

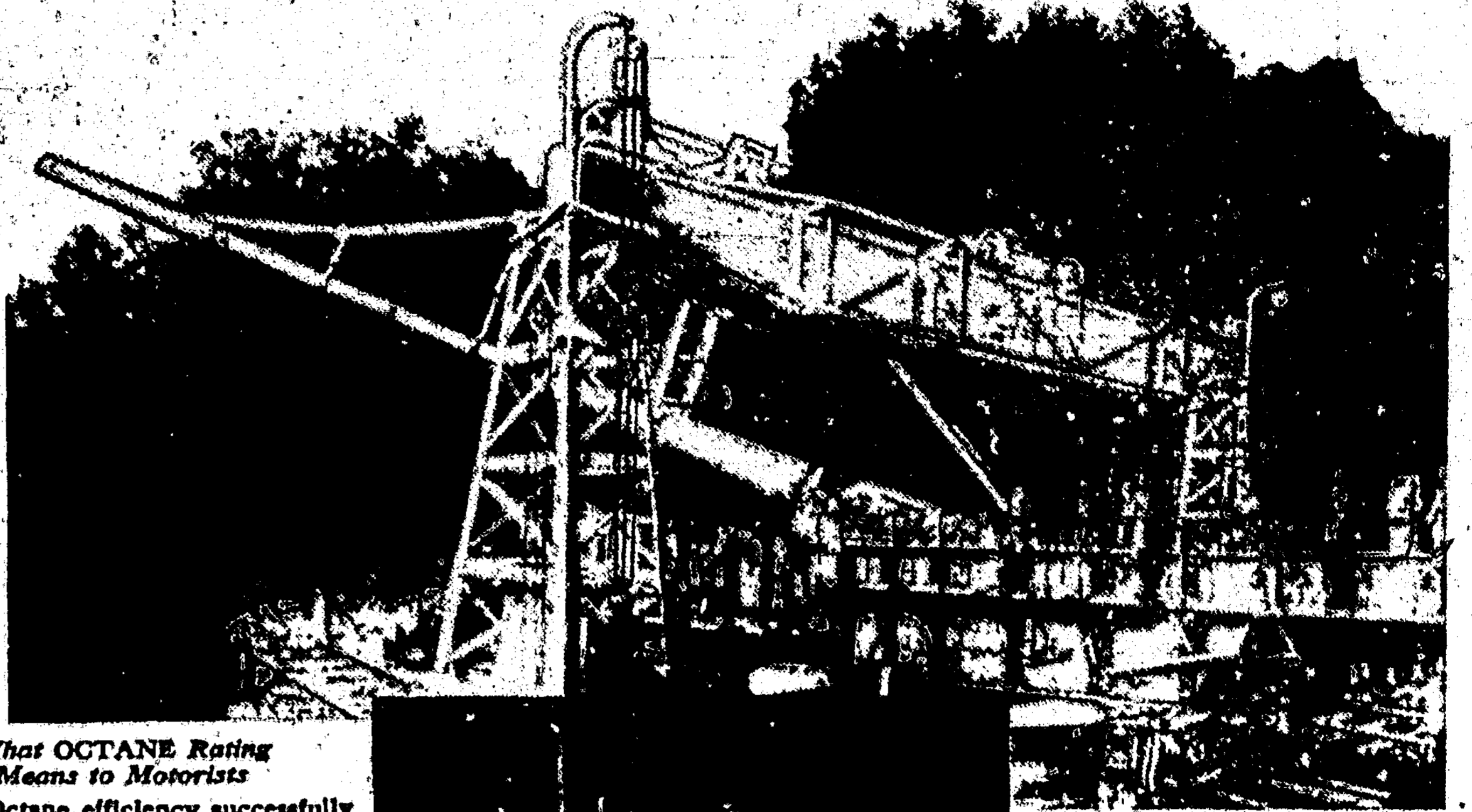

News Review of Current Events the World Over

Curtis Decides He Wants the Vice Presidency Again—New Senator and Representative From New Jersey.

ON THE eve of the opening of the Seventy-second congress the statesmen of the United States appeared to be more concerned with national politics than with legislation

for the vice presidency if it were offered him by the Republican convention of 1932.

Mr. Curtis is noted for his political acumen, and warm supporters of the administration hailed his decision as a profession of his faith in President Hoover's chances for re-election.

"The Vice President's announcement will serve to give much encouragement to his party—and he doubtless has reached this conclusion after a careful study of political conditions throughout the country.

Democrats and pessimistic Republicans, however, held that Mr. Curtis probably had decided he would have small chance of winning the Kansas senatorship and had made a choice between two rather shaky prospects.

GOSSIP concerning the Democratic Presidential situation was enlivened by the progress of Governor Ritchie of Maryland toward Chicago, where he was to spend several days conferring with party leaders and making speeches.

FOR the new congress New Jersey supplies one new Republican senator and one new Democratic representative. To fill out the unexpired term of the late Dwight W. Morrow, Governor Larson appointed W. Warren Barbour, former mayor of Rumson, who in his youth was amateur champion heavyweight of the world.

In the Fifth New Jersey district Percy M. Stewart, wet and a Democrat, was elected to succeed the late Alexander Ackerman, who was a dry Republican; and thus the lineup in the house became: Democrats, 219; Republicans, 214; Farmer-Laborite, 1; vacancy, 2.

THOUGH many leaders of both parties in congress insisted that economic issues must be given first place in the deliberations of the lawmakers,

the prohibition issue could not be squelched. Before the session opened the wet Republicans were conferring on plans to force the liberalization of the house rules in such a way that a modification bill or a repeal resolution might be brought out of committee and submitted to the house for a vote.

Senator Hiram Bingham of Connecticut, Republican, made public two resolutions he said he would introduce. One would repeal the present Eighteenth amendment and return the prohibitory power to the states. The other would change the amending article of the Constitution by providing that amendments should be made on a majority of the popular votes in three-fourths of the states.

HENRY T. RAINEY, veteran representative from Illinois, was supported by a majority of his fellow Democrats in the house for the important place of floor leader.

He is more of a liberal than some of the eastern Democrats wanted in that position, but his long experience and admitted ability overcame their objections.

Indicating the plans of the Democrats in the way of tariff revision, Mr. Rainey issued through the national committee a statement in which he said:

"The time has come for constructive tariff action and something must be done to bring down world tariff walls."

NEGOTIATIONS for peace between China and Japan proceeded haltingly, first one side and then the other raising objections to the plans offered. The Japanese began withdrawing their troops from the occupied parts of Manchuria, but the forward movements of the Chinese armies alarmed them, and so did the advance of Gen. Ma Chan-shan, who apparently was bent on recovering Tsitsihar.

Both nations consented to the neutral investigation planned by the League of Nations council, but both made reservations. Japan insisted on a clause in the agreement, giving her the right to "hunt bandits" anywhere in Manchuria where it might be considered necessary—and with the Japanese "bandits" is an elastic term.

SOME two thousand men and women from all parts of the country assembled in Washington for the conference on home building and home ownership called by the President. Their purpose was to study and act upon the reports of committees that have been for the last year investigating design, equipment, taxation, financing and construction for city and rural homes.

THOUGH the Republicans lost control of the house of representatives, there was a spirited contest in their caucus for the honor of being the party's nominee for the speakership. This was because the man selected would become the minority floor leader, a place of importance. There were thirteen candidates, but the real struggle was between John Q. Tilson of Connecticut and Burtland H. Snell of New York, the latter an outspoken opponent of B. H. Snell

of the administration's policies. After seven ballots Mr. Tilson withdrew and Mr. Snell was declared elected unanimously.

At the Republican caucus that preceded the close of the last session, when the Republican expected to retain control of the house, Mr. Snell was chosen candidate for speaker and Mr. Tilson was selected to be floor leader. In defeat last week, Mr. Tilson contended that his own title to be floor leader held good, and settlement of the dispute over this point was postponed until after the organization of congress.

ANNUAL reports from the cabinet officers and other chiefs were the order of the week, and some of them reflected on the economy plans of the administration. This was especially true of those from the national defense departments. Secretary of the Navy Adams asserted that additional appropriations, at least in amounts moderately in excess of those now being made for the navy, are essential to meet the minimum requirements of an American fleet within the limits of the London naval treaty.

His report was a recital of painstaking efforts in the last year at curbing operations, personnel and construction to meet the demand for reduced expenditure without serious impairment of efficiency and at the same time presented reasons advanced for more funds to insure an adequate naval establishment.

E. Trubey Davison, assistant secretary of war for aviation, reported that failure to provide needed funds has relegated the United States to fourth place among the world's military air powers. He revealed that Great Britain, France and Italy all are superior in total military air strength to the combined army and navy air forces of this country.

Mr. Davison said that the air corps is 183 airplanes behind the congressional program laid down to guide American military aviation in 1924. He added also that its commissioned personnel is 150 regular army officers and 187 reserve officers on extended active duty. Although the air corps reserve has been built up to a pilot strength of 2,000 men, Mr. Davison said "lack of funds has enabled us to give each one of these only about ten hours' flying for the entire year."

Then came Maj. Gen. Ben H. Fuller, commandant of the marine corps, with a report saying that "stringent" administration economies have cut the corps by about 2,000 during the year. He did not mention the latest reductions which, it is understood, will remove another 600 marines from the rolls of the organization. General Fuller said: "The officers of the marine corps feel very deeply the discrimination against them (in favor of navy officers) in their relative rank with corresponding length of service in the navy, and a prompt adjustment of this condition is most urgently needed."

FROM the internal revenue bureau came a report showing a decrease during 1930 of \$7,073,805,119 in the individual net income of the nation as compared with 1929. The number of persons having incomes of \$500,000 to \$500,000 decreased from 1,622 in 1929 to 551 in 1930; the number having incomes of from \$500,000 but under \$1,000,000 dropped from 967 to 311, and the number having incomes of more than \$1,000,000 decreased from 504 to 149.

Secretary of Commerce Lamont's report showed declines in all branches of American industry, trade, commerce, agriculture and finance during the fiscal year 1931 and dwelt at length on the factors which brought about this recession. The report revealed that the cost of living for the 1931 fiscal year had been lower than in any comparative period since 1923. It was also pointed out for what it was worth that despite "the severity of the depression, industrial production was in greater volume than in the calendar years 1920, and 1922, and 21 per cent greater than in the depression year of 1921."

REVERTING to politics and New Jersey for a moment, it is interesting to read that the Democrats of that state, or at least some of them, are starting a movement that may bring to the fore a figure that has been in comparative obscurity for a number of years.

The plan is to make Joseph P. Tumulty the party's candidate for the senate next fall to fill the seat of the late Dwight Morrow and the new appointee, W. Warren Barbour. Mr. Tumulty, as everyone knows, was secretary to President Woodrow Wilson throughout his two terms, and indeed was private secretary of Mr. Wilson when he was governor of New Jersey. In 1921 he resumed the practice of law in Washington and Jersey City. He is fifty-two years old and his home is now in Washington.

JUAN ESTEBAN MONTERO RODRIGUEZ was inaugurated president of Chile on Saturday, having been elected to that office by a combination of four parties and the choice of the people being ratified by the national congress. Senor Montero is the son of a farmer and has been a professor of civil law and a practicing lawyer. He became acting president last July.

DESPITE warm competition at the International Live Stock exposition in Chicago, Herman Trelle, a World war veteran from Wembley, Alberta, Canada, won for the second time the title of wheat king of the world. The best oats were shown by Dr. J. F. Melzer of La Jara, Colo.; the best hay by H. Y. Gillett of Lexington, Neb.; and the corn crown went to Edward N. Lux of Waldron, Ind. Brian Cliff Thickset, an Aberdeen Angus steer, bred by Oakleigh Thorne of Pine Plains, N. Y., was adjudged the grand champion steer of the world.

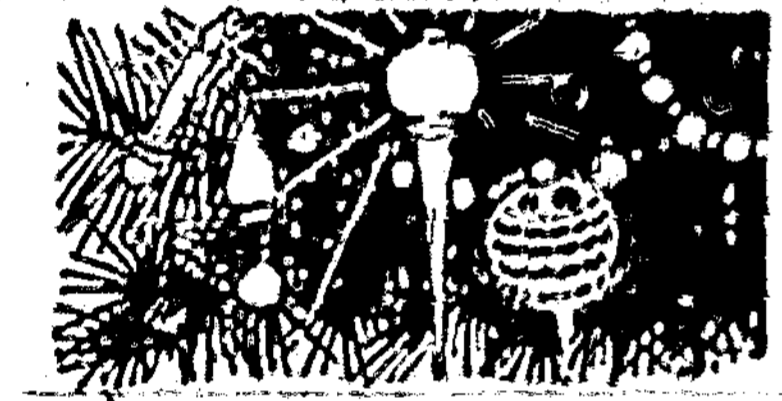

the Bible is the only book which tells His story. - It alone preserves His words, which are spirit and life. It alone records His deeds by which He saved the world, and would save it now if we would obey Him.

The best thing men can do is to spread the Bible, to get it read and obeyed. This would be the end of hard times, of poverty, of unemployment, of injustice, or wrong, or war.— R. E. Speer.

We have noticed that Miss Melas has run off the copies of the Semester exams, and oh how we'd like to get one squint at them!

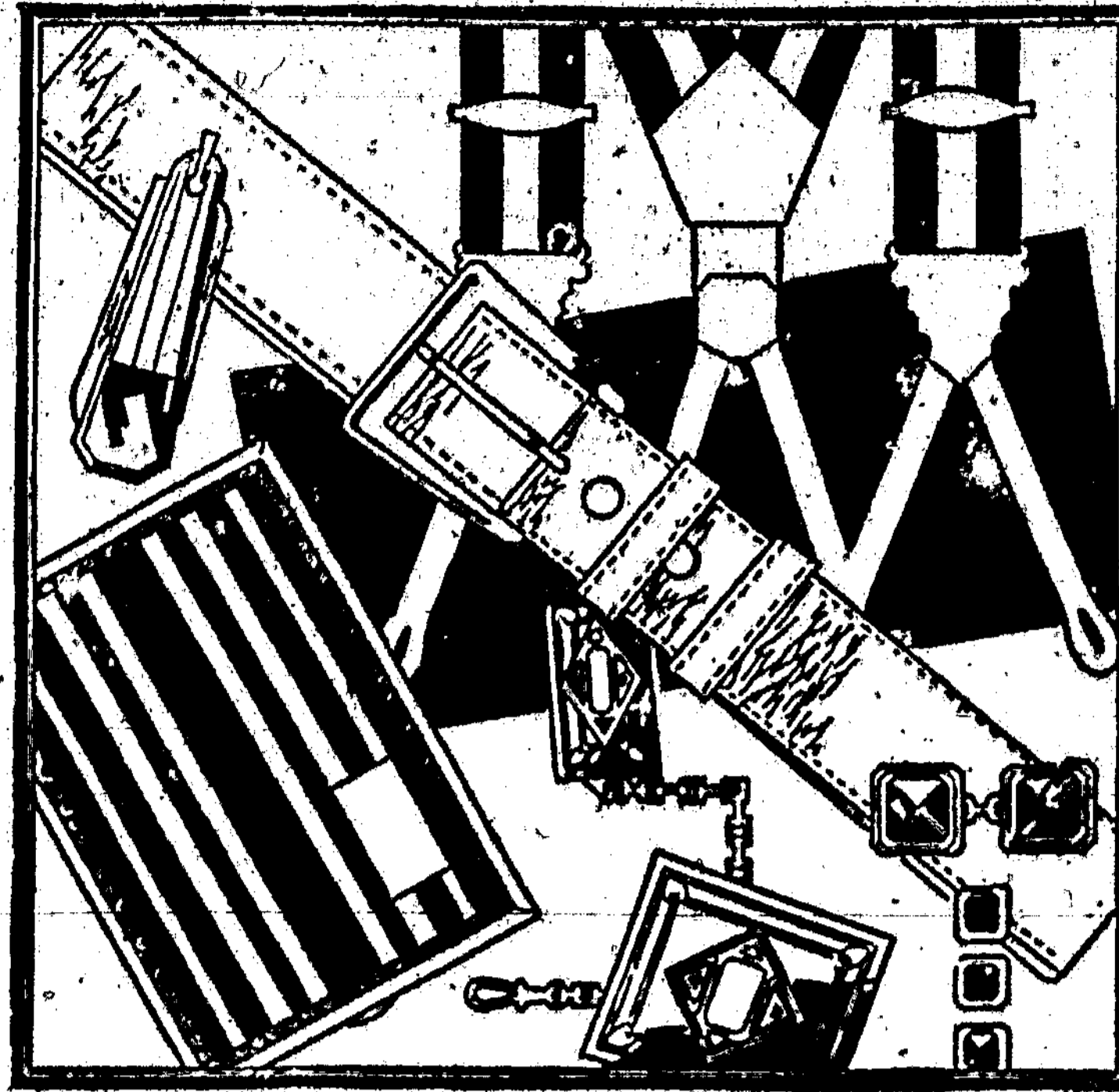
