EDITORIAL COLUMN

Safety First in the Forests

The summer season is past without forest fires, but it must be remembered that the danger period will be from the present time to the approach of winter.

While tourists and summer sojourners in the mountains have observed the warnings sent out by the forest service, which is highly appreciated, it must still be remembered that moisture in these regions has offered a substantial preventative. Where lack of caution in the summer time, might be overcome by moisture and vegetation, carelessness in the fall when the leaves are dry and on the ground, will soon start a forest fire that would prove far-reaching and disastrous.

The hunting season will soon be here and care should be exercised, more especially by residents of other localities who are not acquainted with the danger that arises from not putting out fires.

On leaving the camp, oftentimes in haste to get ready to get in a day's hunting, extinguishing the fire in the proper manner is the last thing thought of, when it should receive first consideration.

For years past, the Outlook has sounded a warning to those who frequent our forests to be careful to see that fires are properly extinguished before changing camp, and we wish to be of what aid we can to the forest service along this particular line.

The forest service has at different times sent out lecturers who with the aid of pictures which show the evil results of carelessness, and it should be a newspaper's position to assist the forest service in every way possible to lessen if not eliminate the evil of forest fires. We, therefore, sound the warning to all who may enter our borders as well as to those of our own people, to do all in their power to avoid disasters which result from carelessness in our forests.
