Tommy Zumwalt and family have moved back to their residence in Nogal.

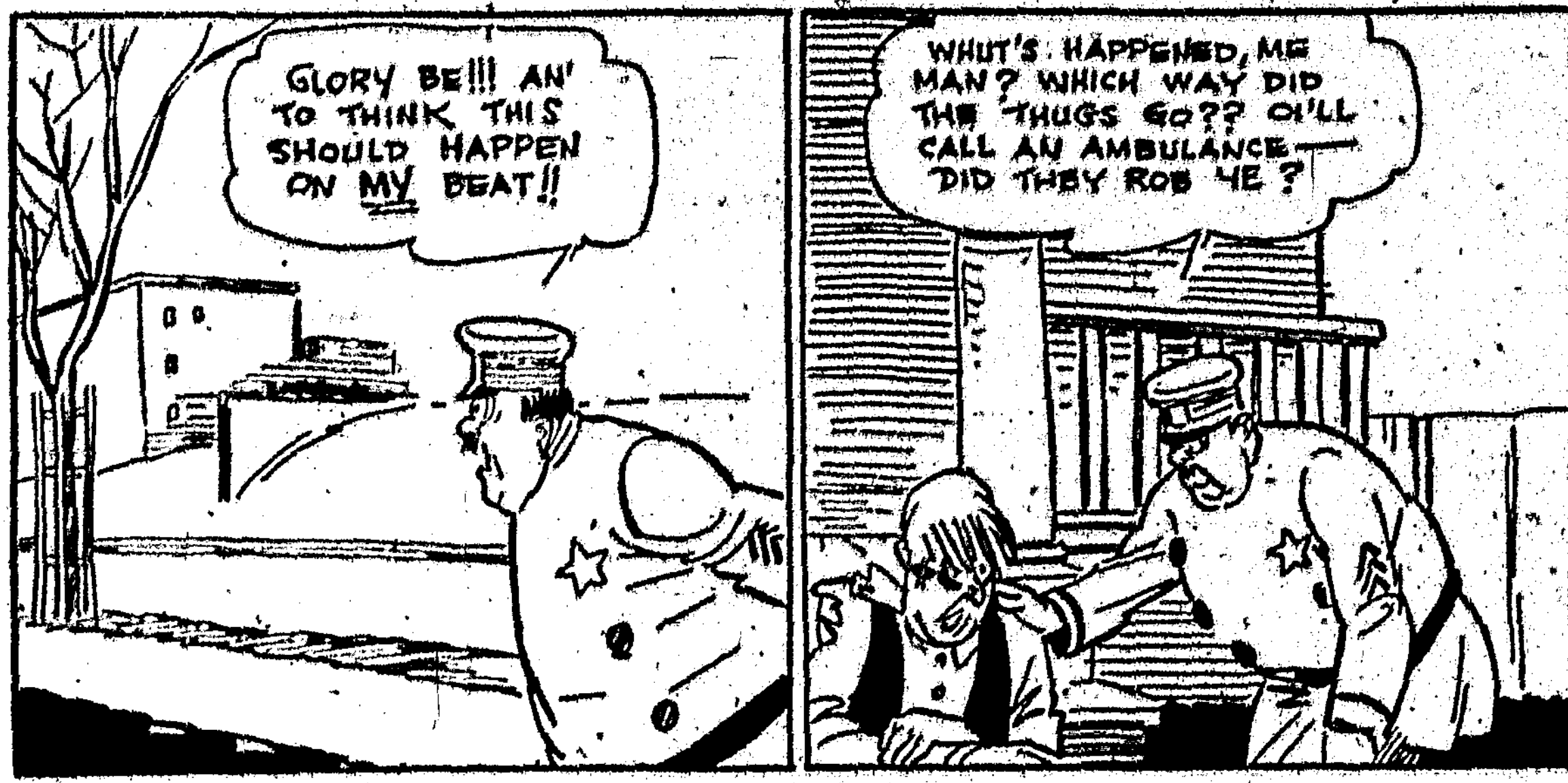

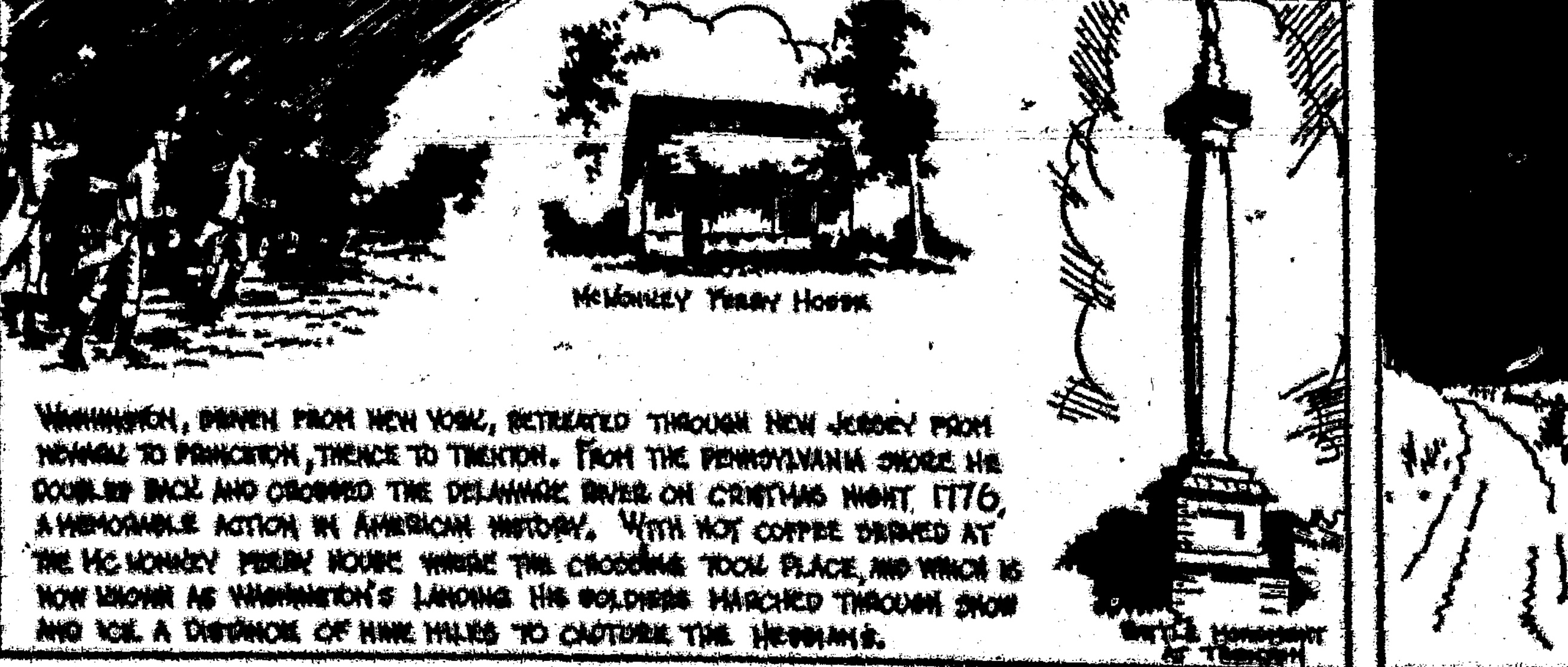

WASHINGTON'S MOST VALUABLE SECRET SERVICE MAN—NATHAN HALE—WAS CAUGHT AND HUNG BY THE BRITISH IN SEPTEMBER, 1776 AFTER CONFINEMENT IN THE SHRELANDER HOUSE AT THE CORNER OF BOWE AND DUNNE STREETS IN NEW YORK CITY. FROM THE PENNSYLVANIA CROSSING HE DOUBLED BACK AND CROSSED THE DELAWARE RIVER ON CHRISTMAS NIGHT, 1776, A MEMORABLE ACTION IN AMERICAN HISTORY. WITH HOT COPPER DRIVEN AT THE MCMONIE FERRY HOUSE WHERE THE CROSSING TOOK PLACE, AND WHICH IS NOW KNOWN AS WASHINGTON'S LANDING HIS SOLDIERS MARCHED THROUGH SNOW AND ICE A DISTANCE OF NINE MILES TO CAPTURE THE HEBBANS.

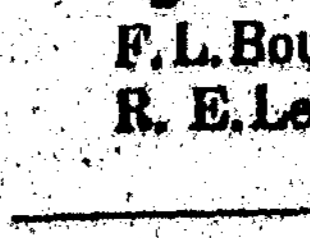

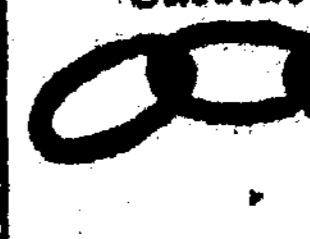

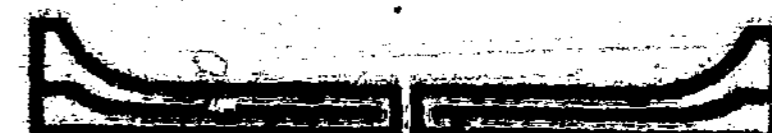

Old Citizen Passes Away
