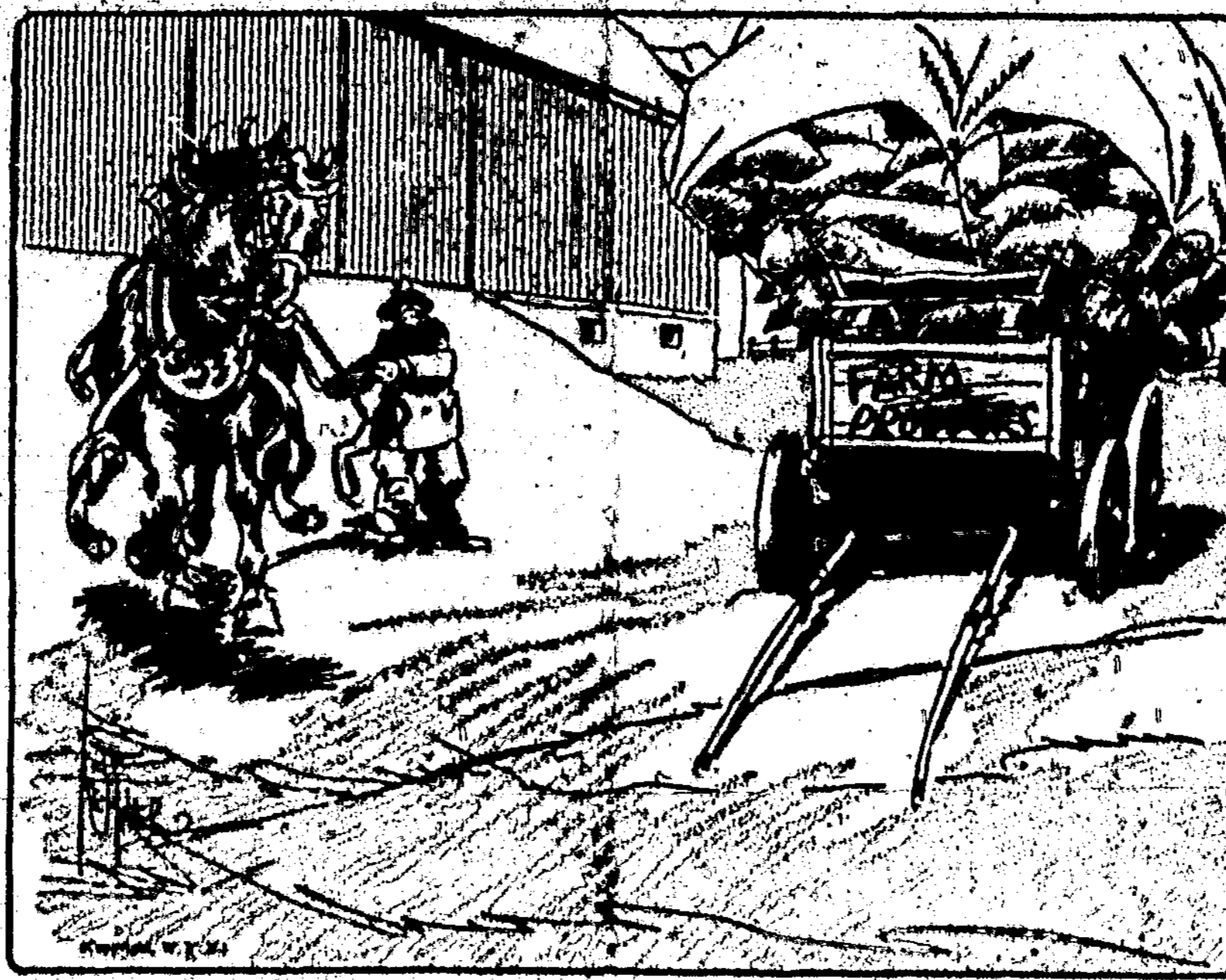

EDITORIAL COLUMN

Whither Are We Drifting?

The Research Committee, appointed three years ago by President Hoover, at the request of the Rockefeller Foundation and financed by that institution for the purpose of ascertaining the trend of the social unrest so plainly visible over this country, has made a complete report and the same is made up into two volumes, 1,668 pages. The committee renders a report that is not only startling, but it gives no assurance of peace, plenty, happiness nor anything that may go with it for our future, unless there is a radical change in "social skills and fusing of social purposes that is revealed by recent trends," says the report.

Now, this was not a political movement, but the committee composed of over 500 men from all political parties were included in the list. In making its report, the committee gave out the following foreword:

The committee's findings emphasized that the group did not wish "to assume an attitude of alarmist irresponsibility," but added that it would be "highly negligent" to "ignore imminent perils in further advance of our heavy technical machinery over crumbling roads and shaking bridges." "There are times," the committee reported, "when silence is not neutrality, but assent."

Near the end of the findings, the committee reports: "The alternative to constructive social initiative may, conceivably be a prolongation of a policy of drift and some readjustment as time goes on. More definite alternatives, nevertheless, are urged by dictatorial systems in which the factors of force and violence may loom large. In such cases the basic decisions are frankly imposed by power groups. And violence may subordinate technical intelligence in social advance."

There is no dodging the fact that the social unrest, prevalent over the land among those who have been out of employment for months and perhaps for years, will develop into communism, violence and conditions which if not checked, will not only endanger, but destroy the entire social system. What we once viewed with lightness, we are about to face with seriousness. Neither can we laugh off the report of the committee which has spent three years in delving deep into conditions and to say the least, the report is alarming.

There were some things left unsaid by the committee, chief among which was the fact that

the danger does not exist among true Americans, but from agitators who have been dumped on our shores and under the guise of patriots, they have been using the depression as a leverage to further the cause of bolshevism, communism and anarchism. In other words, the color of the red flag deepens as the depression increases. Whither are we drifting, is not for us to say, but reading the findings of the committee between the lines, muttering threats may be heard in the distance. Let us hope that the warning sent out by the committee will be heeded, and as a reminder we offer again the phrase quoted, on which the report lays emphasis: "It would be highly negligent to ignore imminent perils in further advance of our heavy technical machinery over crumbling roads and shaken bridges." "There are times when silence is not neutrality, but assent."

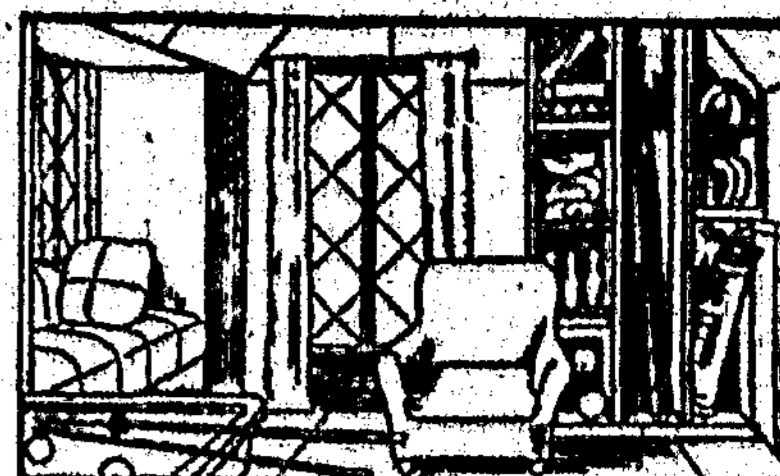

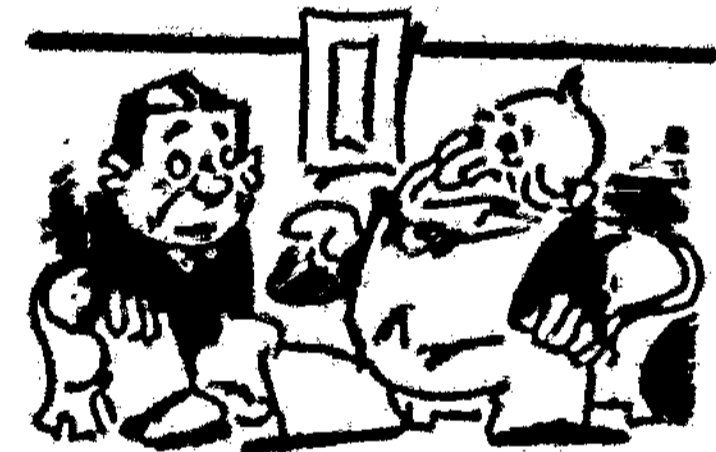
