Should Constitutional Amendment No. 4 Be Ratified

Thus it is seen that the total amount left for schools after all other governmental functions are cared for is only approximately 63% of the amount required to maintain present school standards. Therefore, the conclusion one reaches is, that should the proposed Constitutional Amendment No. 4 be ratified by the voters on Sept. 19, it would seem impossible to maintain the municipal and rural schools of Lincoln County even at the present standards for more than 5 months out of each year, and then only in the event that 100 percent of the property tax levied be paid.
