**EDITORIAL COLUMN**

**Twilight of the Political Machine**

The elections held in November this year seem to have resulted in something like a "dog fall" so far as partisanship politics is concerned. The Democrats lost New York City to Mayor LaGuardia running on a Fusionist ticket. The Republicans won the mayoralty contest in Cleveland, usually Democratic, and were successful in Springfield, Mass., an important New England city. But they lost in Philadelphia where a fusionist candidate smashed the Vare machine and also in Pittsburgh where the first Democratic mayor in a generation was chosen. The Republicans gained in the New York assembly and the Democrats gained in the New Jersey legislature. Rather than a victory either for Republicans or Democrats, the results in most of the large cities indicated a defeat for the political machines. Since 1930 the people have been voting against the "ins" and in favor of the "outs." This is an infallible sign of public discontent, and the fact that the trend continues the same way this year indicates the public is still dissatisfied. What result this will have on the state and the congressional elections next year remains to be seen.

One thing seems certain—the intelligence of the American voter has led him to stage a battle against the political machine. The returns from the recent election, as we have pointed out will so indicate it. Men and women are paying less attention to old political lines and looking to nothing but the deep black headlines on their tickets. They are determined to vote out the political machine with all its graft, dictations and rottenness. In every state, city and town over the country, the political machine should be killed and place given to honesty. The time has arrived and the thinker is doing his work. Let it be well done. Right here in New Mexico, an effort is being made to keep financial reports of state officers out of the newspapers for a period of two years. This would be a frank confession that something was dreadfully wrong. If such be the case, have not the people the right to know it? Such propositions as that come from no other source than from the political machine—and it is time to do away with it.

Southwestern Briefs

A second inspection of the relief administration of Arizona will be made by Pierce Williams, western representative of the Federal Emergency Relief Administration.

Another move in Arizona's fight to obtain what it claims to be an equitable share of Colorado river water will be made by Attorney General Laprade during a visit to Mexico City soon.

Two hundred and fifty civilian conservation corps men from Texas and New Mexico are to be distributed to winter camps in the Silver City region. Construction of new camps and winter quarters in old camps is about half finished.

Hanging as Arizona's method of putting condemned criminals to death has been abolished. Gov. B. B. Moer issued an executive proclamation formally placing in effect the new state constitutional amendment substituting lethal gas for the gallows as the means of execution of death sentences.

Two National Miners union strikers in Gallup who were engaging in a house-to-house picketing campaign were shot recently by a non-union coal mine worker. Military authorities started an immediate investigation to determine who fired the shot at the two men. A shotgun loaded with buckshot used, they said. The strike is now in its third month.

Delegates to the annual convention of the American National Livestock Association to be held in Albuquerque on Jan. 10, 11 and 12, 1934, will have before them some of the most important problems in the history of the association. Coming at the time when Congress will be in session, action taken by the convention may have an important effect on pending legislation.

Hopes for the settlement of the stubborn coal strike in the area around Gallup, N. M., is seen in the establishment of a Rocky Mountain regional labor board which will be set up. The board will operate under supervision of the National Labor Board and will cooperate with other agencies such as the Department of Labor and, in certain fields, with the NRA compliance boards.

The New Mexico Midland Railway Company is seeking permission of the Interstate Commerce Commission in Washington to abandon ten miles of its railway running from San Antonio, N. M., to Carthage, N. M., in Socorro county. The petition declared the line has no value except as junk inasmuch as from 1920 to 1931 it was operated at a continuous loss. Since 1931 the line has not been operated.

Distribution of 30,000 pounds of pork donated by the federal government for needy families in seven New Mexico counties has been started in Albuquerque. The supply is being divided as follows: Bernalillo county, 10,000 pounds; Santa Fe and Sandoval counties, 4,800 pounds each; McKinley county, 3,000 pounds; Valencia and San Juan counties, 2,800 pounds each and Torrance county, 1,800 pounds.

With concerted action in Washington, New Mexico's road program has indications of proceeding, according to Gov. A. W. Hochenbuhl. He has received telegrams from the capital saying the program has been discussed and action had been promised, particularly in Taos, Rio Arriba and other northwest counties. Sen. Carl Hatch wired the federal road bureau in Washington is awaiting applications from New Mexico.

After a thirty-day "holiday" approximately 300 miners who walked out of the Phelps-Dodge corporation coal mine Oct. 2 returned to work Nov. 1, having agreed to waive a demand that the company sign union a contract with the workers. G. C. Davis, Phelps-Dodge manager, said the workers returned to work with the definite understanding that the company will not sign a union contract now or at any time with any union.

Swinging into line with the rest of America in the great "Now is the Time to Buy" movement, Winslow, Ariz., has already developed a militant organization and is ready to go ahead with the drive just as rapidly as preliminary details can be worked out. In a statement by R. C. Kautman, chairman of the local committee, it was made clear that everything possible will be done by this group to speed up business in accordance with the plans outlined by the N.R.A. in Washington.

With one eye on the daily price of gold set by President Roosevelt's reconstruction corporation, miners in the Hot Springs vicinity are busier than they have been for thirty-five years filing new claims and expanding present properties. Enthusiastically approving the description of the president's gold purchasing act given by one of their number as "the greatest act toward recovery in his administration to date," operators of small and large mines alike are extremely active.

The second apportionment of state school funds to the counties, amounting to \$388,370.81, has been made by Herman E. Hendrix, state superintendent of public instruction. Basis of the apportionment was \$5.03 per attendance of 75,399 in the schools.

The Arizona state board of health has issued a warning to guard against acute gastroenteritis in infants in an effort to reduce Arizona's alarming death rate among babies. The death rate among infants in this state is the second highest in the United States.

Many and Varied Uses for Celery

Delicious Vegetable Will Always Find Favor, Cooked or Raw.

Celery—crisp, sweet, celery, has been the food of the gods, as far as I am concerned. You don't know how good it tastes to one who has not tasted it in its fresh form in several months. One of the mysteries still to be solved is why, in Europe, so little of this delicious vegetable is served as an accessory.

Of course, the cooked stalks or the thick root are to be found almost perpetually. Meals, however, are lacking in celery hearts and in the usual accompaniment—tiny, crisp radishes, of which we are so fond. In Germany and Austria the large, black radish is popular. Coming home on the boat the first things I noticed on the menu were celery and radishes and I indulged often, but not too much to enjoy them when I landed.

It seems to me that never, has celery tasted so sweet and seemed so tender. Then there is stuffed celery, usually served with a tomato juice cocktail or any other kind of a cocktail. It gives just the crispness and piquant flavor which by contrast brings out their flavors. The most popular stuffing for celery is, of course, cheese. A mixture of Roquefort and butter is always good. A bit of minced onion with some finely minced parsley or a few minced olives makes another well-known stuffing. Don't forget that when adding the seasoning to a plain cheese filling a liberal sprinkling of paprika enhances the flavor greatly. Any of the fish pastes, such as anchovy, sardine or lobster, or even lobster or crab meat put through the meat grinder and mixed with butter, gives us a change from the usual cheese filling. Cream cheese, without other seasoning, but sprinkled with caviar, is attractive to the eye and palate.

And the other day I had for the first time a mixture of cream cheese and deviled ham with a tiny bit of finely chopped dill pickle. One of my favorite salads is the

combination of grapefruit, small seedless white grapes and plenty of celery. With this I use a rather sweet French dressing to which I add minced onion and green pepper. This is one of the few fruit salads which is appropriate to serve with dinner. Another thing that I did not miss abroad was a fruit salad with mayonnaise, which too often is served at dinner time. Of course, if it is used as a combination salad and dessert, it is something different, which is its own excuse.

Perhaps the reason we do not use cooked celery as much here as is the custom in Europe is because we use it so much in its original form. Braised celery, however, is so delicious with roast beef, for instance, that it is well worth considering. Large, unbleached, green celery, which is cheaper, is not only more economical but better for this purpose because it has higher flavor. The addition of cut celery to any meat, fish or vegetable dressed with a cream sauce gives not only flavor but also that contrast in texture, which adds so much to the enjoyment of a meal. Texture, you know, is almost as large a factor as flavor in the development of fine cookery.

Celery With Brussel Sprouts.

- 1 quart sprouts
1 bunch celery
1/2 cup butter
1 tablespoon lemon juice
1/4 teaspoon nutmeg

Scalloped Corn and Celery.

- 1 1/2 cups corn, canned or fresh cut
1 small green pepper, chopped
1 cup celery, finely chopped
3/4 butter crackers, crumbled
Salt
Pepper
3 tablespoons butter
1 cup hot milk

Arrange corn, pepper, celery, crumbled crackers and seasoning in two alternate layers in a greased baking dish. Add two tablespoons butter to hot milk and pour over layers. Dot with remaining butter and bake in a hot oven, 425 degrees (Fahrenheit) 25 minutes.


