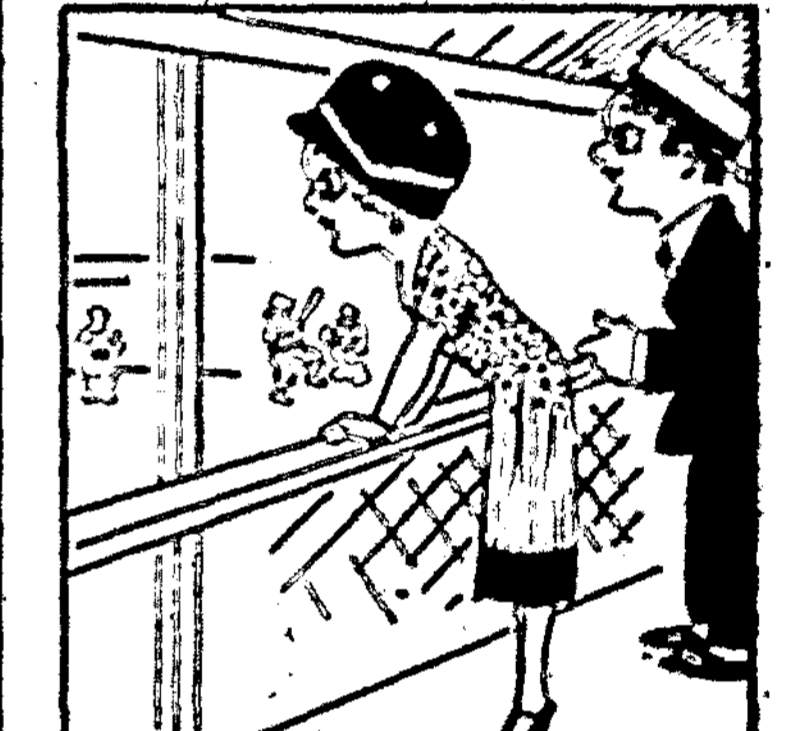

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Turning Conservative

Washington—There is a strong tide of belief here in Washington that President Roosevelt's policies are leaning more and more away from the things that marked them as the "New Deal" a year ago. It can be deduced no longer that he is leaning away to some extent from the experimentation that characterized the program advanced by the agencies of government with whom he surrounded himself at the start of his administration. Professors are not carrying the water on their shoulders that they did awhile ago, and it has been noted that Mr. Roosevelt is less and less willing to leap before he looks.

Causes Irritation

Even eminent and experienced supporters of prohibition now and then turn forth against the administration of it when men and women, otherwise respectful to their committee, were convicted as criminals because they dared to take a drink.

Almost a Fan

The Department of Agriculture supplied the newspaper correspondents with an announcement a few days ago that two men in South Dakota had been arrested and had pleaded guilty to a charge of conspiracy to defraud the United States in connection with the 1933 emergency hog buying program. The announcement described the case as "of national importance and interest as similar fraud cases are pending in other federal courts" under this and other emergency programs handled by the Agricultural Adjustment Administration.

Looks Like Backtracking

It is important to record, in this connection, that the Department of Agriculture already has taken a step in the direction of allowing private business to run its own affairs by its announcement that government control of dairy production is not to be attempted at this time. From the information I have been able to pick up here and there in high places, I suspect that dairy production control is never going to be attempted, but Secretary Wallace's announcement said only that control would not be attempted "for the present."

Too Idealistic

The American people, as I judge them, will obey orders that change their lives around for just so long. Then, they blow up in a big way. For an example of what I mean, the Congress recently passed the so-called Bankhead bill that will limit the production of cotton in the United States to ten million bales annually. It is compulsory. Unless a cotton farmer agrees to reduce his acreage and comply with the other terms of the law, "thou shalt not" market what is grown without the payment of a heavy tax, a tax so burdensome as to remove any possibility of profit. Mr. Roosevelt signed the bill and gave it his blessing, but I heard any number of newspaper correspondents and observers remark when they read his statement that he was saying merely that he "hoped" it would be of some value. Surely, he did not predict its success.

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What is the cause for the change in the scenery? There are two reasons of which I have discussed most frequently. Many of the plans were too idealistic for use universally among a practical people, and the second, there is a tendency to write "thou shalt do" into too much legislation and regulation for carrying out the recovery program.

Mako Is Fiercest of Finny Fighters

Gives Greatest Thrill in Fishing, Says Author.

New York When it comes to undiluted thrill in fishing there is, according to Zane Grey, nothing that swims which compares with the great mako of New Zealand waters.

In the eyes of Mr. Grey, who is regarded as one of the world's foremost anglers, the great mako is as swift and ferocious a fighter that it is more like a torpedo than a fish.

"Never in my life," writes Mr. Grey, in the current issue of Natural History, Journal of the American Museum of Natural History, "have I seen such a magnificent fish spectacle as his leaping. He is a stubborn, strong fighter, too, and must be put in a class by himself. While it cannot be proved against him that, like some sharks, he will stalk men, I know that when provoked or hurt he will kill, and that, if he is angry and tastes blood, he will become as ravenous as any shark."

A Leaping Fool.
"One morning, trolling, we had one of the marvelous leaping mako strikes which make this sport exciting. This mako, which weighed 450 pounds, struck our bait and came out in a magnificent leap, shining in the sunlight, beautiful blue and white shark, artiling to see. He dropped back in huge splash and sounded."

"We ran as close as we dared, but

nothing happened. I began to fear that this particular fish was not going to perform of his own accord. In cases like this I usually grow impatient and relax vigilance, when as a matter of fact, the thing is to be all the keener. After about a half hour more, we appeared to be getting the upper hand and had the mako close. Its big fin, sharp and triangular, cut the surface. We ran closer, hoping to get pictures of what happened at the gaff; and we were perhaps 200 feet away when the mako leaped unexpectedly.

"He came out slick and fast, without a splash, and as he swept upward, stiff as a poker, gleaming blue white, with wide pectorals spread and huge tail curved, his great savage head narrowing to a spear point, he was assuredly a spectacle to fire any angler. Then came the second leap—a long, low greyhound bound over the sea, ending in a furious white splash as large as my boat. He shot out so close to our bow that he could have been touched, and he went up to half the height of our mast, 15 feet above the water, and turned in the air to smack down with a resounding roar. Then he split the water just opposite the cockpit and frantically close. We waited, tingling with suspense, but he did not leap again.

Wore Himself Out.
"All this happened in a few seconds. But he did not break out again. He stayed down and wore himself out in the succeeding half hour, so that when we finally hauled him up to the boat and got the gaff he had only one wag left.

"Our next notable experience with a mako occurred some days after that. We sighted one on the surface and circled him with a bait. He took it. That mako flashed straight for the boat, coming like a streak on the surface. He seized the rudder in his powerful jaws and churned the water into seething foam in his efforts to bite it off. It was iron, of course, and he could not do much damage, except to his teeth. Neither was he huge enough to tear the rudder off, as the sharks do at Suva. But he got away."

During the months of New Zealand fishing, Mr. Grey caught about 70 mako. Ten of these weighed about 400 pounds, while one weighed 530 pounds.

180 Mosques to Close

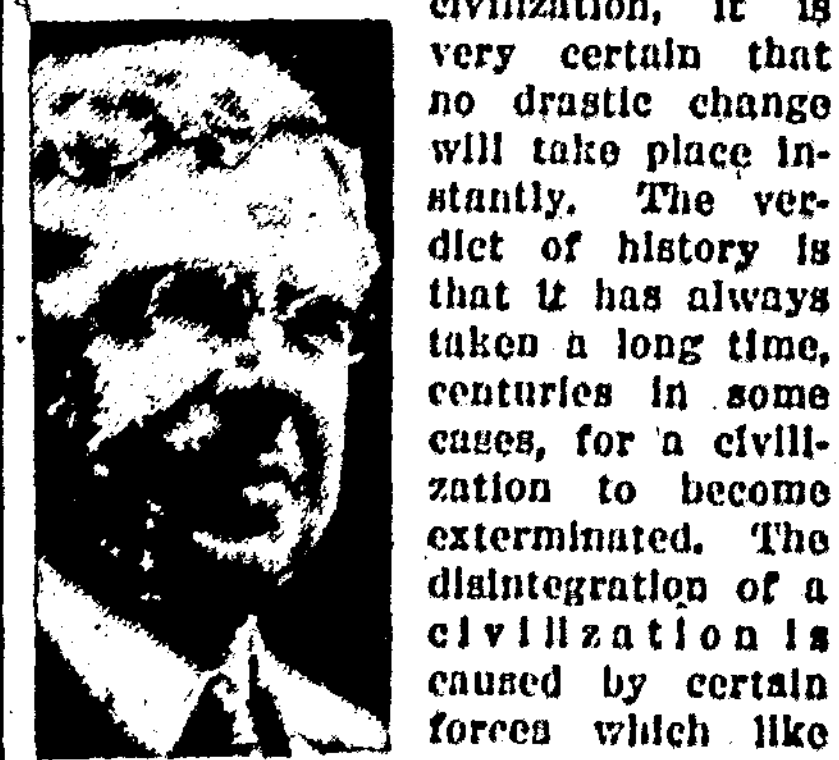

OUR PROBLEM

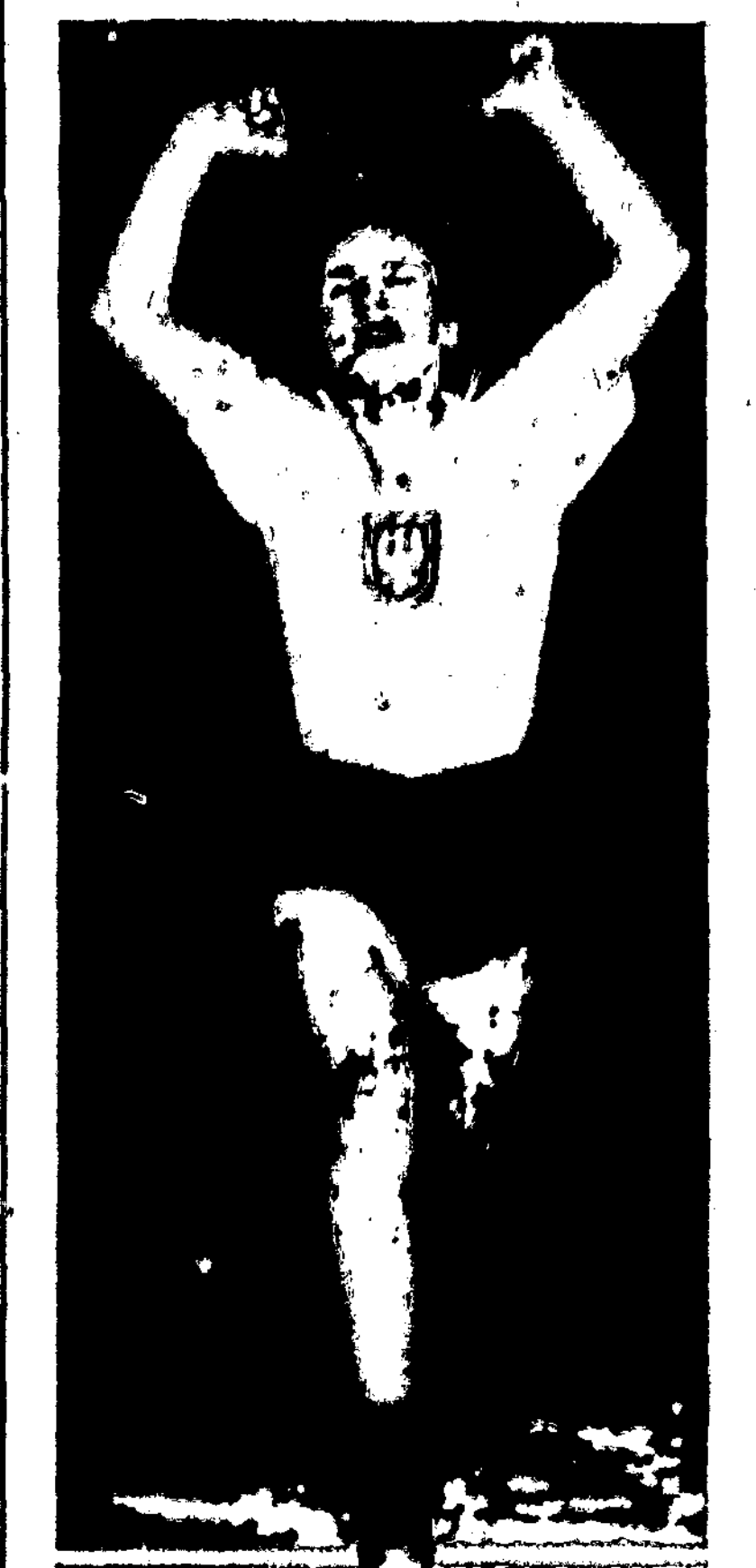

The disintegration of a civilization is caused by certain forces which like the "mills of the gods grind slowly but they grind exceedingly small." The very nature of the forces prove that they cannot easily be destroyed. Good is always more potent than evil; character more stable than immorality; and integrity more enduring than dishonesty. Civilization has a tremendous

reserve in the moral order of her citizenship, and while this may be heavily drawn upon in a crisis, it is not readily exhausted.

The fear of a disintegrating civilization is due largely to the loss of faith in economic values. Many persons believe that when securities go to pieces and the value of money is discounted, the end is perilously near. The truth is that the stability of a civilization does not depend upon economic values. History informs us that many decadent civilizations were at their height economically when the crisis came.

It is not an economic problem but very definitely a racial and moral problem. By common consent, western civilization is attributable to the culture and character of the white race, and our real problem is its enduring quality. If through intermarriage the moral and cultural fiber of the white race is allowed to deteriorate there is grave danger ahead. If our inherited belief in monogamy should be supplanted by a code of morals which undermines the sanctity of the home and denies to children the right to be well-born, we shall face a serious menace. If the oriental interpretation of culture should undermine the stability of America's educational and religious institutions, we would be sailing our ship of destiny dangerously near the rocks. How long will western civilization be able to overcome the subtle influence of some of these destructive forces? True, it is no cause for immediate alarm but the fact that the permanence of our civilization is not an economic but rather a racial and moral problem, gives us cause for grave concern. Will the Caucasian or some other race ultimately dominate the world?

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The Household

WHEN there is need of instilling rest into a company of adults at a party, try the following games. They are suggested for their novelty, and because a large or small group can play them equally well.

It is not easy to costume a woman when four colors are not permitted to be mentioned. Each time any one of them is named it scores five against the player. The one whose score is lowest wins the game—and a prize of anything the hostess happens to have on hand, such as a box of fancy crackers, half a dozen homemade cookies, a jar of preserves, a glass of jelly, a new handkerchief, etc.

While no prize is needed, the surprise of receiving anything for an impromptu game lends zest. One player is the salesperson and she asks three questions of each person, the questions being of her own choosing. The following are suggested: Can I help you get a dress? What kind? What color? Or it may be a hat, gloves, shoes, lingerie, stockings, etc. Or the question may be: What costume do you wish to buy for your spring wardrobe? The questions following depend on what the buyer has chosen, but always the question of color should come in. The colors to be excluded may be white, brown, blue and green, or gray, blue, red and violet, or any preferred ones. The third player to name one of these forbidden colors changes places with the salesperson, and proceeds to question those seated, who represent her customers.

Bouquet of Spring Flowers.
The hostess provides six or seven different colored sheets of tissue paper, scissors and library paste. Each guest cuts several circles from the papers, having them about 1 1/2 inches in diameter. Each represents a flower, and should be held in the center and pulled toward the circumference to give a flower-like formation.

A large sheet of wrapping paper is thumb tacked to the wall or a door. On the paper is drawn a large circle, marked off into one inch squares. This represents the bouquet. Each player is given a number, and when the hostess calls it, the one called puts a dab of paste on the center of her flower and goes to the bouquet and sticks it in any one of the squares, before the hostess finishes counting ten. Failure to do this scores minus five.

The object of the game is to avoid putting a duplicate colored flower in any adjacent square already having its colored flower in it. At first this is easy, but it becomes more and more difficult as the squares fill up with flowers. The one who puts a duplicate flower in an adjacent square, either in a straight line with it or diagonal to it, scores minus ten. When the bouquet is filled with flowers, the one whose score is lowest wins the game.

Farmers May Now Get After Weeds

Land Removed From Corn and Wheat Provides Splendid Opportunity.

An exceptional opportunity for farmers to control harmful weeds is offered in the removal of large acreages of land from wheat and corn under the government's plan of controlled production.

Such weeds as field bindweed or wild morning glory, white weed or perennial peppergrass, poverty weeds, Canada thistle and Russian knapweed may be controlled or eradicated by cultivating often enough to prevent any green growth appearing above the surface of the ground. Clean cultivation is the cheapest method of eradication available at present.

This usually requires cultivating once a week for two consecutive years, although cultivations may be less frequent as the plants are weakened. One year of clean cultivation has produced desired results under some conditions, weakening weeds so that a heavy sowing of alfalfa has smothered them out completely. However, there is always a chance that some plants will survive under this method.

These weed pests defy ordinary control methods because of the huge amounts of food materials held in reserve in their extensive, creeping, root systems. Usual cultural practices, where care is not taken to keep green growth from appearing, often increases rather than decreases the growth and spread of the weeds.

Clean cultivation has been hindered in the past by the hesitancy to take land out of production, although crops produced in weedy areas usually are of poor quality and low yield. Now, that farmers are being paid rentals by the government to keep land out of corn and wheat, or the production of any crop competing with any basic commodity, an unusual opportunity presents itself for eradicating injurious weeds by clean cultivation. Weed eradication will increase the value of the land and remove a source of possible further damage.

Quail, Farmers' Friend, Must Have Food Supply

Among the chief causes for lack of quail and upland birds on farms may be scarcity of necessary food and cover. Failure to supply substitute "patches" when natural feeding ground has been destroyed and neglect to preserve the natural cover for the bobwhite's habitat, are among the chief causes of gradual reduction, says the Missouri Farmer. Many measures may be taken on the average farm to increase or improve the food for quail, and help bring about an increase in their numbers.

Seed can be broadcast in early spring around gulleys and washes, on roadsides, around the borders of fields and like situations. Cain, hemp, lespedeza, clover and many species of small wild beans and cowpeas provide excellent sustenance for quail. Once started lespedeza volunteers year after year, unless killed out by burning the land over after the seed germinates in the spring. When harvesting grain a few rows on the outside near cover may be advantageously left for the birds. Quail at times do much work on the farm by destroying serious insect pests and are considered one of the farmer's best allies and deserve the serious consideration on any man's farm.

Bees Are in Demand

Were it not that honey producing is profitable enough to induce people to keep bees, it would be necessary to raise some type of insect solely for the purpose of pollination, says Dr. E. F. Phillips, professor of entomology at Cornell university, in his recent address to the Empire State Honey Producers' association. So necessary is the service that bees render to the fruit-growers of New York state that 600 colonies of them were imported last year to aid in pollination in Niagara county alone, and in other counties throughout the fruit-growing region growers are renting colonies of bees for the purpose. Not only do bees produce a \$2,000,000 honey crop annually in New York state but they pollinate more than one-third of the \$15,000,000 apple crop as well.

Along the Furrows

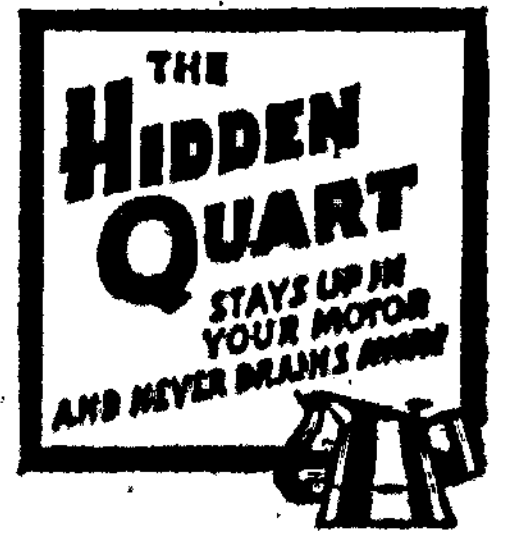

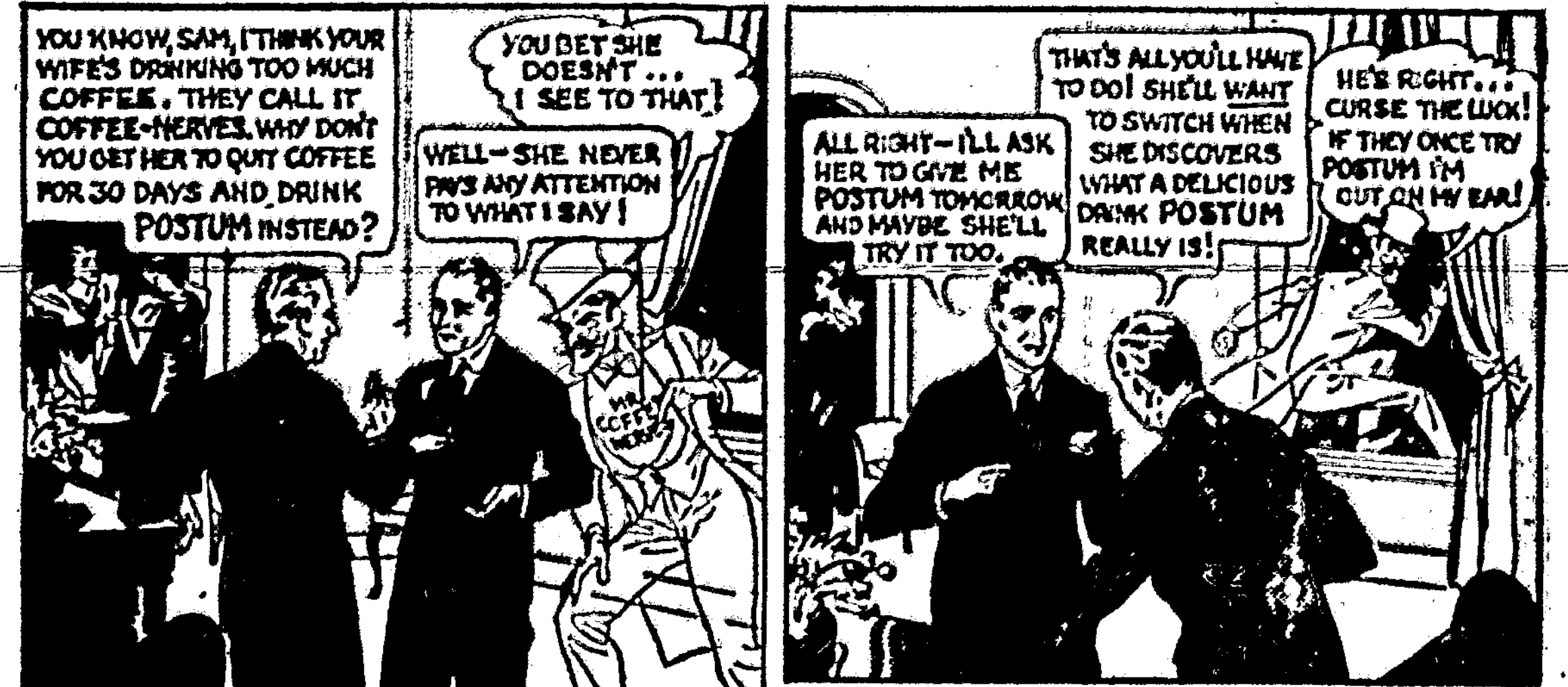

Lesson for May 20

THE FUTURE OF THE KINGDOM

LESSON TEXT—Matthew 25:1-13. **GOLDEN TEXT**—And the seventh angel sounded; and there were great voices in heaven, saying, The kingdoms of this world are become the kingdoms of our Lord, and of his Christ; and he shall reign for ever and ever. Rev. 11:15. **PRIMARY TOPIC**—A Story About a Wedding.

JUNIOR TOPIC—When Jesus Comes. **INTERMEDIATE AND SENIOR TOPIC**—Always Ready. **YOUNG PEOPLE AND ADULT TOPIC**—Christian Preparedness.

This lesson is part of the well-known Olivet discourses giving a prophetic view of the course of time from the crucifixion to the second coming of Christ. Two great facts are before us in this prophetic utterance, the destruction of Jerusalem and the second coming of Christ. The one was near, having taken place within forty years from Christ's crucifixion; the other is still future.

The parable of the ten virgins is one of the two parables designed for the instruction of the saints in view of the coming of Christ. It has a continuous application in the present time (I Thess. 4:10-18; Titus 2:11-13).

1. The Equipment of the Virgins (vv. 1-5).

1. The foolish virgins (v. 3). They took lamps but had no oil with them. Lamps signify Christian profession (Matt. 5:10) and oil the Holy Spirit (Zech. 4). Having lamps but no oil shows that they were professors of religion without possessing its reality. The Christian life is sustained by the Holy Spirit. As soon as one is regenerated the Holy Spirit takes up his abode within him. The proof that one is a child of God is that he has the Holy Spirit dwelling within him (Rom. 8:9).

2. The wise virgins (v. 4). They possessed both lamps and oil. They made a profession and backed it with a life of real righteousness. These are the true believers. Both the wise and the foolish virgins slumbered and slept. The common lot falls to both professing Christians and real Christians. They fell under the spell of sleep (v. 5). This shows that as this age lengthens the real and professing church will cease looking for the coming of the Lord. It is unspeakably sad that so many, even of God's saints—wise virgins—should give up the expectancy of the return of the Lord.

11. The Coming of the Bridegroom (vv. 6-12).

1. The midnight cry (v. 6). In the midst of the night when all the virgins were asleep the cry was made, "Behold the bridegroom cometh, go ye out to meet him." Who knows but that the time of this cry is close at hand?

2. The activity of the virgins (v. 7). They all arose and trimmed their lamps. There will be great activity when the Lord comes, those who only make a profession then realizing that they lack what is essential to entrance to the marriage feast.

3. The foolish request the wise to share their oil (vv. 8, 9). The revelation of Christ will make manifest the gentleness of our religion and expose the folly of mere profession. When the Lord comes it will be too late to mend one's ways.

4. The wise enter to the marriage (v. 10). It will matter little what else one has at that time if he has oil in his lamp.

5. The pitiful petition of the foolish (v. 11). They begged the Lord to open the door that they might enter to the marriage feast.

6. The awful judgment (v. 12). The Lord declared, "I know you not." Those who put off personal contact with Christ until that day shall be shut out from his presence.

111. The solemn obligation (v. 13). "Watch, for ye know not the day nor the hour wherein the Son of man cometh."

1. Entering with Christ to the marriage depends not upon having professed to enter the Christian race but continuing therein. It is not enough that we can refer to the lighting of our lamps. If oil and light be wanting when Christ comes there will be no admittance to the heavenly banquet.

2. Borrowed religion will not avail at that day. Association with the most eminent of God's saints will not secure for us acceptance at that day. The essential thing is personal union with the Lord Jesus Christ through faith in his shed blood.

Bible Reading

Bible reading is indispensable to the nurture and cultivation of the spiritual life. Bible knowledge furnishes the mind with food for the noblest meditation.

Not Dead, but Living

If the city of our heart is holy with the presence of a living Christ then the dear dead will come to us, and we shall know they are not dead but living, and bless him who has been their Redeemer.

Human nature is said by many to be good: if so, where have social evils come from? For human nature is the only moral nature in that corrupting thing called "society."

Co-Operation in Household Tasks

Planned Division of Work Would Seem to Have Good Points.

In every family where there are two or more women who share in the work of homemaking there can be a certain amount of community and co-operative housekeeping. Much has been said and written about the advantages of minimized labor in community housekeeping, but repeated experiments have proved the disadvantages of comparatively large groups of unrelated persons attempting to keep it up. Uncongeniality of temperaments was largely at fault. But what fails with unrelated groups can be carried on successfully within the limits of a home, with persons who are all working for the good of their own establishment. It is important to have a well-established basis of co-operation.

Let us imagine a home in which there are two, three or more women adults. They may be sisters, or mother and daughters. Each person has some special ability and preference for some part of the work. One woman may find pleasure in cooking, another in keeping rooms in order and spic-and-span. One may delight in going to market and seeing and picking out the attractive foods and the needed edibles. One may find making beds and doing the upstairs work not at all irksome, while another may dislike it decidedly. One may find the laundry work a part suited to her preference, while others may find it tiresome and uncongenial. There are some women who like to wash, while others like to iron. Perhaps it may be so in the households in question. If so, here is a good division of the laundry work.

In the cooking line there are various preferences. For instance, some women are natural cake makers. The cakes they make have a quality and texture which others fail to acquire

without much painstaking. Other women are excellent vegetable cooks, others cook meat to perfection. The women who do these things well usually like to do the work. It is a mistake for one woman of the household to assume all the culinary work. Co-operative cookery is much easier on everyone.

A home is, in reality, a small community. There are various departments. The competent homemaker learns to run them all well. But when there are other women in the family, each should take some department, some special part of the work which is well-liked, and assume the responsibility of it. This is a great relief to the homemaker. The division of labor permits each person to have a share of leisure. Without such division, one woman overworks, and the rest have the leisure, which is apt to mean leisure to criticize! Divided activity makes each respect the other's part, for work respects work. The co-operative housekeeping suggested has been proved a good idea.

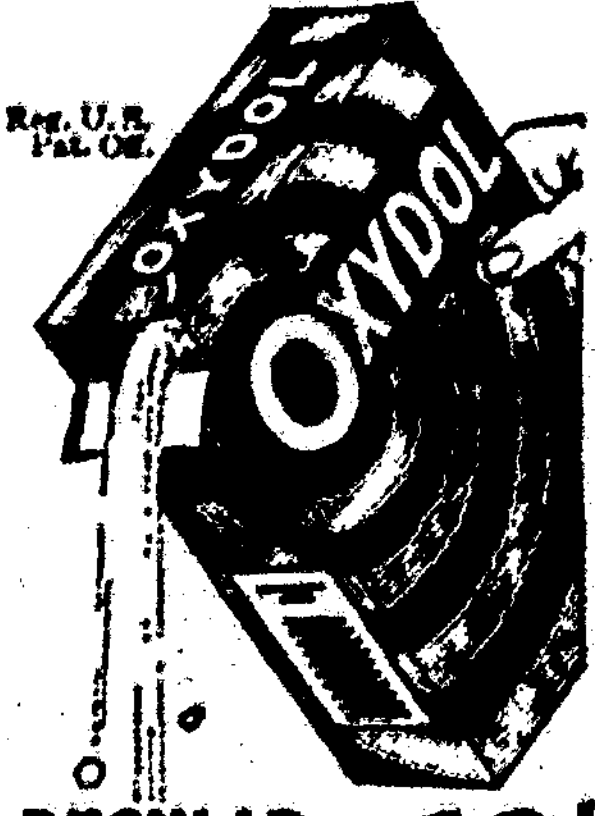

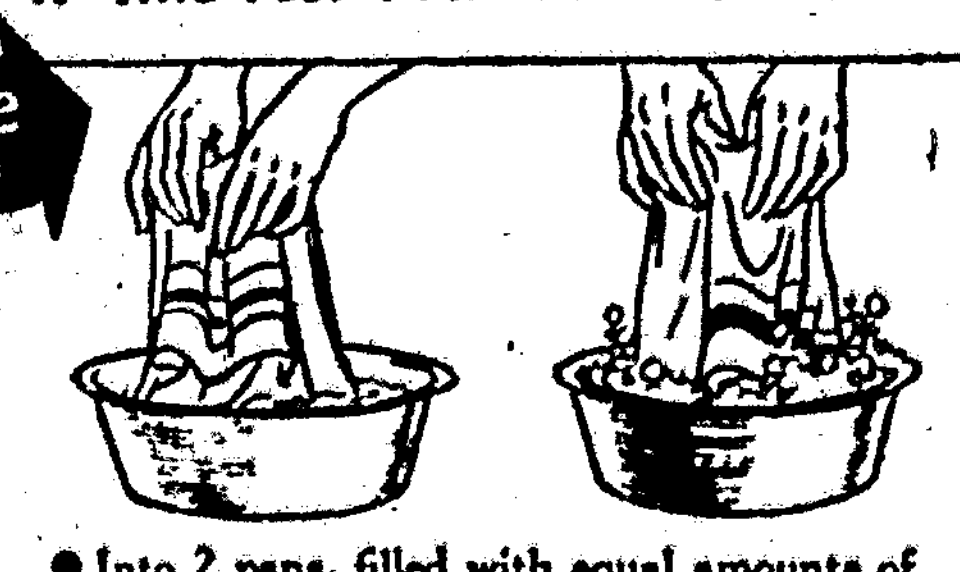
