Ford Wins Gold Cup Race

"Detailed information which I have just received on the Gold Cup race in Los Angeles last week convinces me that this was the greatest and most gruelling test ever given to the stamens of automobiles," said Roy Shafer, manager of the Carrizozo Auto Co., local Ford dealers, today. Of the 27 strictly stock models of 5 makes of cars which competed in the race, only 14 of the cars, 13 Fords and a Plymouth, were running at the finish. The first 10 places were taken by Ford V 8's. The winning time was 4 hours, 46 seconds for the sandy, dusty, rutty 250-mile course on a short track of 1 7 8 miles.

"It would take many thousands of miles driving—some say 50,000 miles—to give a car in ordinary use the punishment received on the Gold Cup race," said Mr. Shafer. "The results of the race are another proof of the quality of material and the rugged durability of the Ford, plus the advanced engineering which has made such a record possible." The drivers participating in the race included some of the best known speed masters in the country, many of whom have proved their ability in the Indianapolis races.

The race was attended by more than 75,000 fans, although it had been estimated that only 70,000 people could be accommodated. The success of the event was so great that a large meet is planned after the track has been improved, at which time there will be events for especially built racing cars, the recent race having been confined to stock models, officially certified as such by an AAA committee.

EDITORIAL COLUMN

Government by Royal Decree

New York Herald-Tribune:

Here is the great recent success of American industry. Thanks to enterprise, courage and able organization, American aviation today leads the world. It is supreme in design, speed and service, alike for both mail and for passengers. The commercial value of this swift achievement is very great. Even more vital is the contribution to national defense.

The factories have been built and equipped, the fields have been developed, the pilots have been trained in the essentials of flying, whereby the preparedness of the nation in the event of war has been enormously advanced.

Thousands have contributed to this great American success. The pilots have come forward, the mechanics have been trained for field and factory, the office organizations have been assembled, the capital has been contributed by thousands of investors, large and small.

In a time when new industry was urgently needed to give jobs, here was the outstanding creation of the last decade. The government has done its part in the only fashion possible, through subsidy. Old-fashioned American initiative has responded, has once again accorded a signal triumph.

What has Mr. Farley to criticize in this? He is outraged, first, because a very few of the companies involved have profited too greatly and, second, because the organization of the service has been chiefly and wisely accomplished with a minimum of destructive competition, and to the end that a few strong companies, technically competent to furnish safe and efficient service might be evolved instead of a group of weak, politically minded competitors.

The legality of the efficient job can properly be left to the courts. In the meantime it is amusing to note that the sort of direct, able organization is exactly the sort of achievement which the NRA was created to permit.

Wherever there has been corruption, there must be swift punishment. But, oddly enough, neither the President nor Mr. Farley brings forward a single item of corruption. What they allege and seek to destroy is efficiency and a shining American success.

The administration is wrecking the finest airmail service in the world. To what end? It is hard to see, unless the answer is to demonstrate that the right of an innocent man to be held innocent until proved guilty no longer exists in America, and that government by royal decree has superseded the democracy of the Constitution.

Southwestern Briefs

Arizona, youngest state in the Union, quietly passed its twenty-second birthday. All state, county and city offices were closed for the day—Feb. 14.

Of some \$23,000,000 a year spent in New Mexico for governmental functions, only \$12,209,363 is budgeted, according to Byron O. Beall, chief state tax commissioner, and of this sum only \$8,859,072 is levied for direct taxes.

Florence M. Warner, state administrator for the civil works administration in Arizona, has announced that passage of the congressional appropriation measure saved 17,000 Arizonans from returning to the unemployed ranks.

Application for authority to establish at least five new branches in various Arizona communities has been made to the National Banking Department in Washington, D. C., by the Valley Bank and Trust Company, it was learned recently.

One hundred men working at the municipal airport at Las Vegas were thrown out of work when civil works officials received a telegram from Santa Fe ordering the work to be discontinued. Officials here were at a loss to explain the action.

The State Highway Department has called bids for construction of two concrete bridges on the Yuma-Gila Bend highway in the vicinity of Yuma, to be opened March 6. The bridges will be sixteen and eighteen miles east of Yuma, respectively.

Four southern New Mexico counties have indicated they too might take a hand in air mail investigations being made in Washington to demand an inquiry into why the original air route from El Paso to the Pacific coast was not routed by way of Deming and Lordsburg as posted.

J. K. Richardson of Carlsbad has recently been appointed by the federal government as safety engineer for the New Mexico civil works administration. The CWA is appointing a safety engineer for each state; men who have had special training in accident prevention.

A meeting of the Sons of New Mexico was held recently in Albuquerque to complete organization details. The organization will be state-wide in scope. At its first meeting approximately fifty persons attended, among them several prominent citizens, lifelong residents of Albuquerque.

Headed by Major General Alexander M. Tutbill, commander of the Forty-fifth division, more than a score of Phoenix military officers came to Tucson to witness a demonstration recently by the Old Pueblo unit of the Arizona National Guard, in honor of Col. J. Prugh Herndon, commanding officer and other officials of the 158th Infantry.

Arizona will observe the first anniversary of the state and national bank moratorium with banquets in excellent condition. Superintendent of Banks Y. C. White declared that the moratorium proclaimed March 3 by Governor B. B. Moir was the creation of more confidence by Arizonans in the banking institutions.

Gwin Henry, former University of Missouri football mentor, will lead the University of New Mexico Lobos in their 1934 gridiron season. Henry was selected by the university board of regents to succeed Charles Riley, whose contract was not renewed after three years coaching here. Henry, chosen from among 100 candidates, will also be director of athletics.

While in Kingman, Ariz., for a couple of days recently on legal matters, Attorney P. W. O'Sullivan met and had a long talk with his friend, Senator "Keen" St. Charles. The senator related many stirring incidents of early days in the Black Hills, New Mexico, and Arizona, wherein the senator had participated. "Keen" crossed the Peccos river with a caravan of bull teams nearly sixty years ago, and was nearly caught and scalped by Indians on several occasions.

New Mexico will seek to obtain an increase in the present crude oil allowable, through the state's congressional delegation, State Land Commissioner Frank Vesely and State Geologist Dr. E. H. Wells have announced.

Police Chief C. A. Wollard of Tucson is on a par with Mae West now. Because he directed the capture of the John Dillinger gang of bank robbers, now awaiting trial in the middle west, Chief Wollard has been made a Kentucky colonel.

John Morrow, Sr., of Raton, former United States congressman and active in state and local affairs, has been named by Gov. A. W. Hockenbush to succeed Clinton P. Anderson of Albuquerque as state treasurer, who resigned some weeks ago. Mr. Morrow accepted the appointment on the condition that he be given several weeks in which to attend to pressing personal business in this locality before taking up his new duties at the head of the state's financial affairs.

Howard S. Reed, engineer for the public works administration board of Arizona and New Mexico, has been instructed by Washington officials not to accept additional applications for loans on non-federal projects.

Heavy grading and base course surfacing of 8,066 miles of highway leading to the Carlsbad cavern, in New Mexico, will be advertised next month by the U. S. bureau of public roads. The road will extend from the main highway, through Walnut Canon, to the mouth of the cavern. About \$180,000 has been set aside for the job.

Colonists May Displace Famous Greek Monastery

Feminism may have conquered the greatest portion of the world, but there are still places in Europe where equality of sexes is not yet recognized, and where no woman is allowed to enter even under an escort of the male sex.

One of these spots is in Greece, and unless the Greek government succeeds in its plans of national confiscation, women of all over the world will try in vain to climb the mountains where for centuries monks have lived carrying out their anti-woman tradition.

Amongst these monasteries are those on Mount Athos, but there are many more, less famous although not less rigid in the enforcement of the "no woman" rule.

Built on top of almost inaccessible mountains where approach is so difficult that cable rails are used instead of ropes, these monasteries are said to be immensely wealthy. In many cases, nobody knows the amount of art treasures, gems, antiques, and so on they may hide, but it is generally admitted that some of them occupy the positions which, thousands of years ago, were the sites of famous temples, when Apollo and other divinities were presiding over the immense prosperity of Greece.

The fall of Troy, the advent of Byzantium, and the arrival in Greece of the first apostles, established new rulers in these deserted temples. Where Apollo's hymns were once sung Christian hymns were heard; where pagan priests congregated, Christian monks came to live and pray. The strict rule of chastity was imposed, a rule which has survived throughout centuries.

The monks live a simple and strict life; they devote many hours to prayer, to singing, and to religious celebration; they live almost entirely on the produce of the soil they cultivate, bartering olives, honey, fruits, oil and other produce against other necessities. Some of these monks were very wealthy persons; many of them Russians, Germans and even Turks who made a gift to the monastery of all their worldly goods.

Members of some of the most aristocratic families in Europe are said to have become members of these

communities and to have brought fabulous riches to the monasteries.

Undisturbed throughout centuries, even by the many changes of foreign domination which included a long period of Turkish rule, these monasteries have prospered in their independent life.

But today their existence is threatened. The necessity for giving an outlet to their refugees from Asia Minor is forcing the Greek government to open one of the most sacred soils in the world to those families of colonists who are returning to their motherland. The monks of Mount Athos and of the other monasteries may have to go; their places being taken by the new pioneers who will bring with them their women and children, thus breaking the last of the anti-feminist tradition existing in Europe. For the first time a woman will be able to climb those mountains, which so far men alone have ruled and inhabited.

Dalmatia Still Holds Festival of St. Blaise

Few people have heard of St. Blaise, yet he was the most popular saint in England before the Reformation, and is especially regarded as the patron of the inn. The Benediction of St. Blaise, still given in Roman Catholic churches, is reputed to be effective in cases of throat trouble. Legend claims that St. Blaise was a bishop martyred in the third century. His skull and a miraculous crown, one of the most beautiful jewels in the world, are preserved in Ragusa, Dalmatia, a city he saved from capture by a miracle.

Crowds of pilgrims go to Ragusa at the beginning of February to take part in the festival of St. Blaise, held in the ancient Dalmatian city just as it was in England in olden days. They still have the processions of relics, magnificent church services, lotteries, and dancing as of yore. The only break in the observance is the liberation of all prisoners in jail.

St. Blaise still has a shrine in London, at a church at Hatton Garden, where the blessing of St. Blaise is given.—London Answers.

In his weekly comments, in the Sunday magazine of the Los Angeles Times, on the "Synagogue" he has made famous, John Steven McGroarty makes this splendid contribution to the philosophy of life:

"The Wanderer of Galilee taught all this. And it was all that he taught. Which, was, indeed, enough. Just love, and nothing else.
