Mrs. Allen Kile has returned from a visit with her sister at Durah.

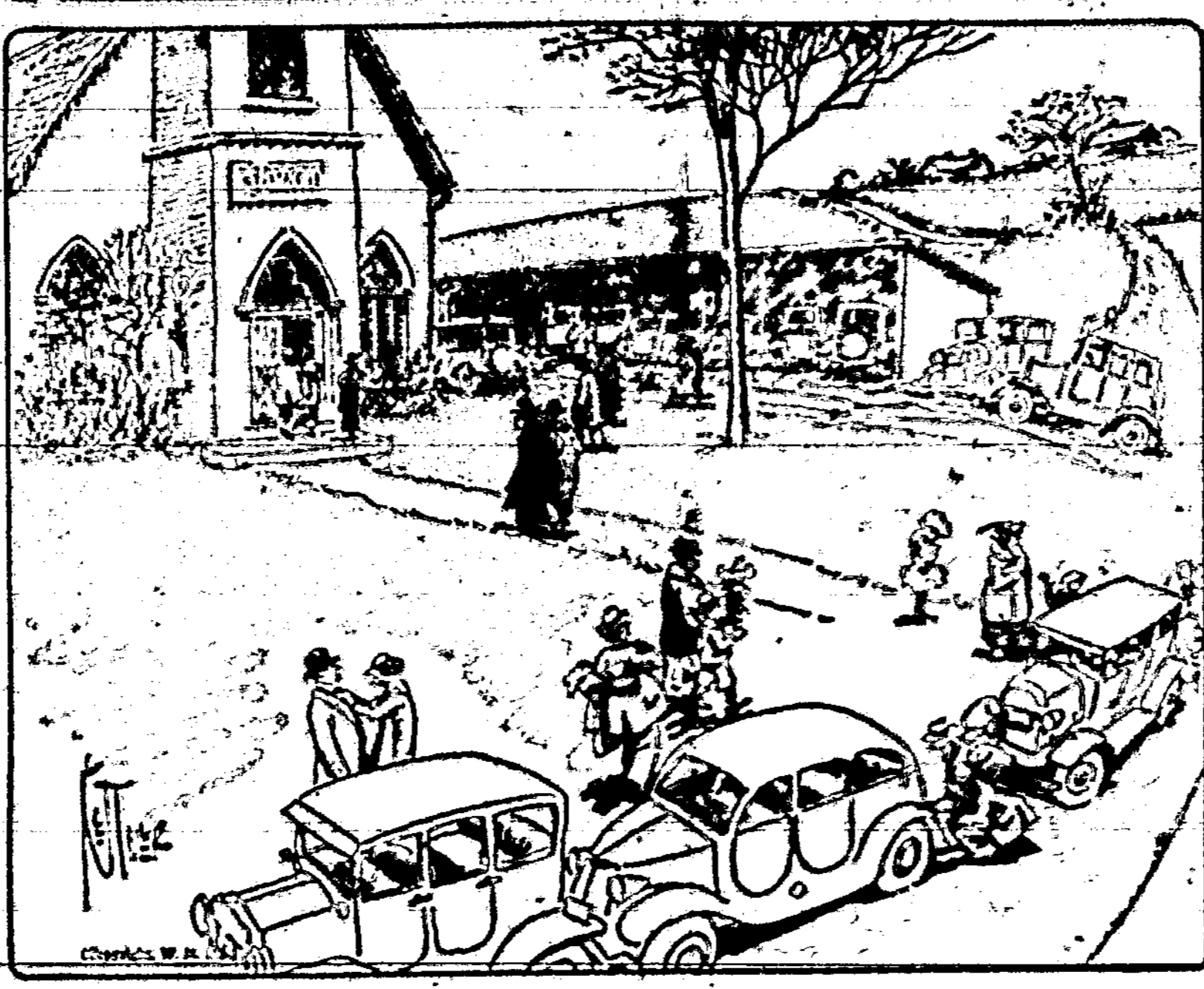

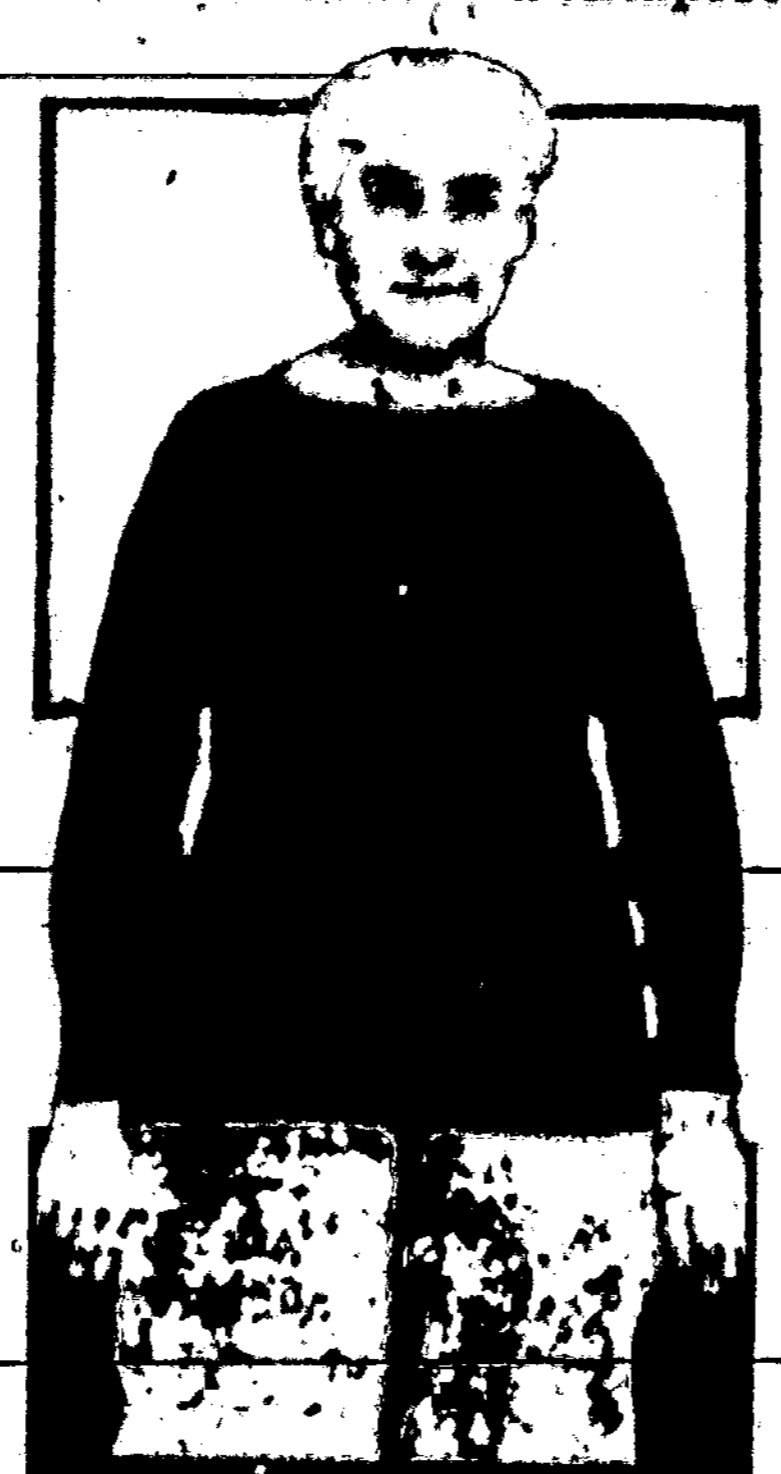

IMPROVED UNIFORM INTERNATIONAL SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

(By REV. E. B. FITZGIBBER, D. D., Member of Faculty, Moody Bible Institute of Chicago, and S. Western Newspaper Union.)

Lesson for April 14

CHRIST THE SAVIOUR

LESSON TEXT—John 3:14-17; Romans 5:6-10; Philippians 2:6-11. GOLDEN TEXT—For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son...

It is not feasible to consider all the texts proposed by the lesson committee, but it is desirable to select the three suggested to be printed and to introduce several others.

I. The Saviour Predicted (Gen. 3:15; Isa. 9:6, 7). In connection with the fall of man and consequent pronouncement of judgment upon the woman, the man and the serpent, and the announcement of the undying enmity which was to exist between the seed of the woman and the seed of the serpent...

II. The Saviour Born (Luke 2:11, 30, 32).

That which had been predicted was historically fulfilled in the birth of Jesus Christ in Bethlehem. When Jesus was brought to the temple as a child the Holy Ghost revealed to Simeon that Jesus was the Messiah.

III. The Saviour Described. 1. A seeker of the lost (Luke 15:3-7). This seeking of the lost is illustrated by the man leaving the ninety and nine sheep and going after the one which was lost...

2. He died for the lost (John 3:14-17). God gave Jesus Christ to die to make an atonement for the sins of the world. As the brazen serpent was lifted up in the wilderness by Moses, so Jesus Christ was lifted up on the cross...

3. He knows his own (John 10:14). The good shepherd has a definite knowledge of the lost ones. He therefore seeks them out and gives his life for them.

4. He keeps his own (John 10:27-29). Believers are Christ's sheep, and because they are his sheep, they hear his voice and follow him. He not only knows them personally, but they, in turn, know him.

IV. Some Blessings Received Through the Saviour. 1. Justification (Rom. 5:1-11). The one who receives Jesus Christ is by the living God declared righteous. His guilt is removed and he is given the same standing as Jesus Christ himself.

2. Freedom from the power of sin (Rom. 6:1-7). It is not enough to be freed from the guilt of sin, there must be a dynamic which will enable the believer to live a life of victory over sin. Being vitally united to Jesus Christ in the power of his resurrection life, the dynamic is provided which enables the believer to triumph over sin.

3. He is free from the law as a means of sanctification (Rom. 7:1-6). Christ's death, nailed the law to the tree. The one who has been vitally united to Jesus Christ by faith died with Christ. The law, therefore, has no more dominion over him.

4. Victory over the flesh through the indwelling Holy Spirit (Rom. 8:2-9). The introduction of the law of the spirit of the life in Christ Jesus enables the believer to free himself from the dominion of the flesh.

5. Christ is the supreme example to the believer (Phil. 2:6-11). Because the Saviour became incorporated with the race through the incarnation he is able to impart life to those with whom he is identified. Furthermore, because he thus imparts life, the believer is able to make the Saviour his grand exemplar.

**EDITORIAL COLUMN**

**Congress Seems to Think Pressure Won't Work**

Washington, April 7. Concerned over slow progress Congress has made on administration legislation, Democratic leaders Sunday considered urging President Roosevelt to scrap some highly controversial measures.

Simultaneously word was circulated in administration quarters that Mr. Roosevelt plans to put pressure on Congress to get busy on his program when he returns to Washington this week to start the \$4,880,000,000 relief program.

With Congress well into its fourth month and the relief bill the only major administration measure approved, both Senate and House majority chieftains privately assert if pressure is used in an effort to put through the social security, NRA extension, the utility holding company, and centralized banking reform measures that a session extending into late summer is almost certain.

Leaders surveying the situation found:

House Democrats and Republicans both split on the social security program to supplement the relief measure with old age pensions; with House majority leaders divided on how to bring up the measure for action to prevent the \$200 a month Townsend plan from being adopted.

The only administration measure ready for Senate consideration is the Copeland food and drug revision bill, slated for passage this week. None of the other administration measures are out of Senate committees and few have been taken up.

The NRA extension, social security, and House approved bonus bills are tangled in the Senate finance committee.

Neither House nor Senate interstate commerce committees have put the Rayburn-Wheeler utility holding company measure in shape.

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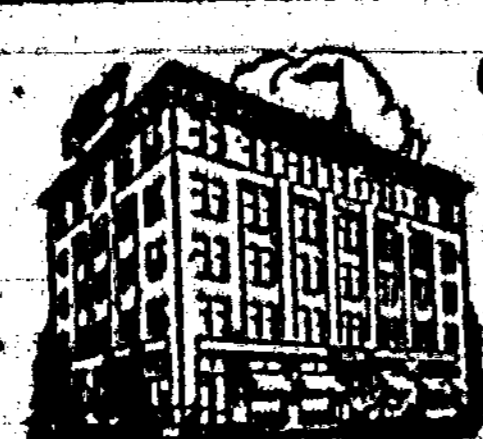

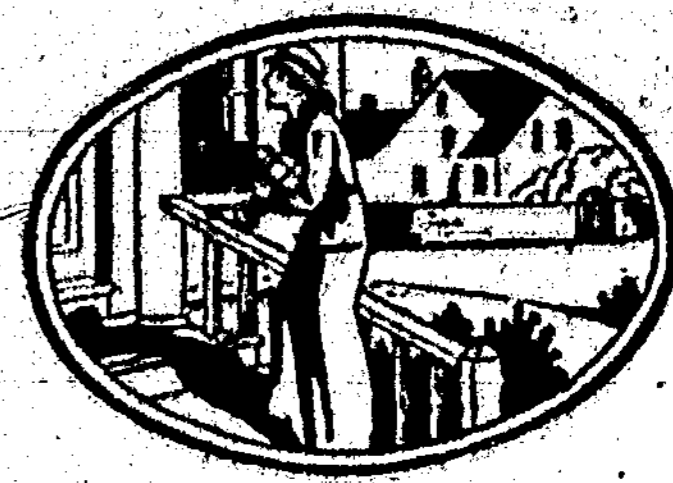

**Rights of Family to the Paternal Fortune**

"What do you think about the man who, without consideration for his wife and three children, gave away to charities his fortune of a million dollars, his idea being to spend the rest of his life in government lodging houses."

"I don't think a man should be allowed to impoverish his family that way. When a man marries and has children he takes on certain responsibilities. After that everything he has or may get belongs to his family. If he happens to feel like giving everything away, there is no reason why his family should have to suffer for that. In fact, I think there should be a law against a man with a family being able to do such a thing."

This "wall," directly put to one of America's best known woman writers, drew the following pointed remarks:

"I agree with the reader, that a man's first responsibility is to provide for his family. Also that a wife

and children should not be compelled to pay the price of noble impulses with which they may not be in sympathy—not beyond a reasonable point. By that I mean that it is the right of a family to be provided for in comfort and with some regard for the way of life to which they are accustomed. Beyond that, however, I believe it should be a man's privilege to do with his money as his conscience dictates.

"We women go too far when we claim that everything a man has belongs to his family. I think a man should be able to call his soul his own. Involved with the ownership of his soul are his principles, which are inseparable from his use of his money or his feeling of responsibility to humanity. After all, almost any family can struggle along on

**CRIMINAL EVER UP AGAINST IT**

**Lawbreaker Almost Certain to Be Run Down.**

If individuals considering a criminal venture could walk through the big new Department of Justice building in Washington, and see for themselves what cards detective science has stacked against them, they might be warned off, some of them.

Over 4,000,000 fingerprints are on file there, so arranged that expert clerks can match a set of prints sent in for inquiry if they are among the 4,000,000. The office of information exchanges prints with 69 countries in keeping its files.

Nine thousand of the most notorious criminals in this country—bank robbers, kidnapers and others—are further catalogued in a single fingerprint file, where each of their ten fingers is separately indexed for ready reference. Dillinger thought he changed his prints, but the experts identified them on 300 unchanged points.

In another file are cards showing over 5,000,000 names, nicknames and aliases. Nicknames have a way of sticking, in the underworld. Government detectives have 30,000 aliases and nicknames at their fingertips. Brass Monkey, Boxcar Casey, Boozehound, Bowlegged Joe may be traced, though they change their real names a dozen times.

Another file shows typewriter standards, enabling investigators to find out what make of machine was used in a typed note. A toy typewriter figured in one recent case, but the office had not overlooked toys when it made up its typewriter file. Handwriting and typewriting of criminals are also on file in those ranks of green steel filing cabinets. Each individual typewriter reveals its identity by its mannerisms, no less than the human hand does when it signs a name.

A file of stationery, showing 25,000 water marks, is another ready reference aid that has trapped more than one criminal at government headquarters.

The government's crime laboratory has equipment for reading invisible writing between the lines of innocent notes. It can even read writing on a "second sheet," where a pencil has pressed hard enough to leave invisible tracing. A machine projecting parallel beams of light reflects the shadows of this "invisible" writing.

There is a trophy hall in the new offices of the government sleuths. Dillinger's straw hat and the can that held the Urchel ransom money are there—visible reminders that the Department of Justice is getting its men.—Science Service, Kansas City Star.

**Relics of Dwarf Race**  
The government of Mexico is investigating the ruins of a town built by a race of dwarfs. They are 75 miles from Durango and were discovered recently by Mr. Gamiz of that city. The site is near El Salto waterfall in the well-known Cerro Blanco, or White Hill. Many remains of dwellings have been found, the highest of which is only six feet, and human skeletons brought to light do not exceed 40 inches in stature, but are otherwise perfectly normal, and are those of adults. It has not been possible to establish the epoch when this pygmy race flourished.

considerably less than a million dollars. Many will consider they have a grievance in finding themselves with a father who wants to give away anything; and they will not be without sympathy. On the other hand, there is his side of it, which argues that a social conscience should not be entirely incompatible with having a family.

"I am afraid I cannot root for a law to deprive men of freedom of action with their money. It is rarely if ever that the problem would arise of a man so extreme as to want to practice philanthropy at the cost of subjecting his family to poverty. As a matter of fact, even in the rather eccentric case on which the reader comments, I think it would be found that the man's family were not left without support.

"The best solution is, doubtless, for a woman to make a point of inquiring, before she marries, into the

question of just what claims of eccentric ideas or philanthropic ideals may be outstanding against the potential fortune to be amassed by the man she considers making the father of her children!"

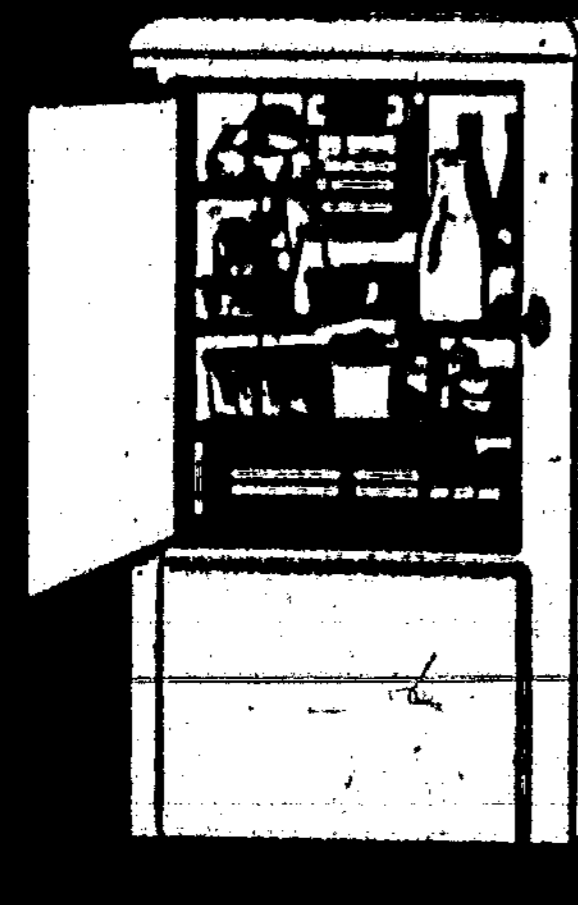
